Pastor's Reflections

Sometimes I think we human species tend to think too much. A popular phrase I have used from time to time is: "Get out of your head." In my judgment we have become a data driven culture. We especially have seen this over the years of the pandemic. So much information from so many sources it makes one's head spin. Yet in some ways we human species crave this information, this data. Do not get me wrong the information we have gathered from those willing to do research on COVID have been valuable in fighting off this virus.

In the March issue of *Living Lutheran* there is an article I found remarkably interesting. The title caught my eye: "They May Not Come Back." It is only a couple of pages long but says some interesting things as we continue to regroup post COVID. The author quotes Ted Smith, a professor at Candler School of Theology. Professor Smith has talks about two terms to describe the cultural shift in which we are in. The first term is: "Age of Association." In the "Age of Association" many of our service organizations were created. Denominations emerged in this era. These service groups and associations, including denominations, unleashed a lot of dynamism and vitality in American religious life.

The other term is one philosopher Charles Taylor calls the "Age of Authenticity." Quoting the Living Lutheran article: "In the Age of Authenticity, people can leave voluntary organizations and institutions without embedding themselves elsewhere. Things are far more fluid, and identity springs less from a web of institutions than from a series of individual choices. The systems of the ELCA and its partners were designed for the Age of Association not the Age of Authenticity."

So, what do we do? The author of the article suggests we think "outside the box." This age is full of yearning for deeper connections. So how are we doing here at St Paul and Christ the King? Are we doing ministry with new and fresh ideas that help people connect in a deeper way? What does ministry and mission look like in 2022 given all the "stuff" that is happening in the world (war in Ukraine, economic strains because of supply chain issues and inflation, general malaise, and a desire to "go back to normal")?

I suggest to you that it is less about thinking and head stuff and the best program to get the most people in the doors and become part of our association. It is more about heart and connection stuff. At the end of the Living Lutheran magazine article the author says these words: "In the Age of Authenticity, people are looking for authentic expressions of spirituality, community, and hope."

I cannot help but think about one of the post-resurrection stories in the gospel of John. In it the disciples have just finished a breakfast of fish over a fire. Jesus asks Peter three times: Do you love me? After each question from Jesus and Peter's answer in the affirmative Jesus gives him a mission: Feed my lambs, tend my sheep, and finally Feed my sheep. Seems to me that the love of Jesus is the way we can be authentic to the world. It seems to me that the people of God at St Paul and Christ the King are called to tend and feed (in authentic ways) the sheep that come our way.

I do not really think there is a program to follow to be authentic. We "just do it" in the words of the famous Nike commercial! We do it with Christ in the lead gifting people with God's gifts: the Holy Spirit, community, and hope. May God bless us and keep us in all our endeavors these days of Easter.

April is one of the busiest months of the year, if you are a church music director and a university music professor. We celebrate Holy Week and Easter, and April is also the last month on the academic calendar, filled with student degree recitals, final exams, and semester-end juries.

Looking back, I am thinking contently about Holy Week and Easter this year. The choir sang on Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Easter Sunday. In addition, on Good Friday we visited Christ the King Lutheran Church in Barboursville and sang an anthem entitled "Amazing Love." Pastor Kevin called this a nice gesture when I asked him about it, and I agree. It felt like we were appreciated. I was also happy with the choir and our guest performers on Easter Sunday. Both, Renee Harley Knapp and Devoyne Montgomery were pleased to be back at St. Paul.

Soprano Renee Harley Knapp lives and works in Ravenswood, WV, where she is the chorus director at Ravenswood Highschool. She said she enjoyed the drive down to Huntington with her youngest son and loved singing for the service. Cellist Devoyne Montgomery is a student at Paul G. Blazer Highschool in Ashland Kentucky. He plays the cello and the piano very well and is currently taking cello lessons with Dr. Solen Dikener, professor at Marshall. Like last year, Devoyne brought his family, including mom, dad, and his little sister Diamond. His mother mentioned the beautiful stained-glass windows in our church building more than once. Devoyne's family is originally from Australia.

On the second Sunday of Easter, I played a little trilogy of contemplative and short but beautiful pieces by the Ukrainian composer Valentin Silvestrov (two bagatelles and one postludium) as prelude, offertory music, and postlude. I'd like you to know that I would never use music in worship to make a political statement. I do believe that music (and all arts) can help us understand and appreciate each other beyond the intricacies of daily life, on a deeper level, so to speak. Music is a language, and, as the composer Toru Takemitsu said, "Music is a form of prayer."




CAMP LUTHER

PRAYER VENTURES FOR MAY 2022

1 Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month Praise God for <u>Asian and Pacific Islander</u> members, congregations and ministries of the ELCA that use God's gifts of culture, language and heritage to share the good news of Jesus Christ, loving and serving our neighbor in a multicultural world.

2 Pray for the safety and well-being of those directly impacted by the war in Ukraine — both the people inside its borders and the nearly 4 million who have left the country. Pray for peace, wisdom, justice, repentance and reconciliation, and give thanks for the assistance provided by Lutheran Disaster Response, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service, and our partners and companion churches in Ukraine and across Eastern Europe.

3 "O Lord my God, I cried to you for help, and you have healed me" (Psalm 30:2). Pray for healing, comfort and peace for all who suffer sorrow, trauma, illness, fear or hardship, and ask the Spirit to equip us for responding to our neighbors in need with love, hope and support.

4 Give thanks and pray for Lutheran Men in Mission and other ministries with men in our congregations, that they will reach and serve men of all ages, strengthening their faith in Christ, equipping them to love and serve their neighbor, and creating faithful communities of men.

5 Remembering the story of how God transformed Paul's life, purpose and spirit, pray that people everywhere might be changed by the grace of God, the work of the Spirit and the influence of caring and loving people, including ourselves.

6 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Metropolitan New York Synod, the New Jersey Synod and the South-Central Synod of Wisconsin, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and encourage them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders, proclaim the gospel, serve our neighbor and do God's work in the world.

7 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assembly of the Southeastern Minnesota Synod, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and encourage them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders, proclaim the gospel, serve our neighbor and do God's work in the world.

8 On Mother's Day, thank God for mothers, stepmothers, foster mothers, expectant mothers, women struggling with parenting, women trying to conceive and women who cannot bear children of their own but serve as loving and caring adults in the lives of children and youth.

9 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assembly of the Rocky Mountain Synod, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and encourage them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders, proclaim the gospel, serve our neighbor and do God's work in the world.

10 Remember in prayer students at college, university and seminary as they prepare for final exams, celebrate graduation or begin their careers, that they might find opportunities to use their gifts, faith and passion in service to their neighbors and communities.

11 "The Lord is my shepherd" (Psalm 23:1). Pray that we might find clarity and be reassured of God's love and attention through the psalmist's description of a shepherd who restores, leads, nourishes and accompanies us, calming our fears and showing us mercy.

12 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Delaware-Maryland Synod, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and encourage them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders, proclaim the gospel, serve our neighbor and do God's work in the world.

13 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Oregon Synod, the Saint Paul Area Synod, the Northeastern Ohio Synod and the East Central Synod of Wisconsin, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and encourage them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders, proclaim the gospel, serve our neighbor and do God's work in the world.

14 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Northern Great Lakes, Southeast Michigan and North/West Lower Michigan synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and encourage them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders, proclaim the gospel, serve our neighbor and do God's work in the world.

15 Pray that we will be faithful to Jesus' commandment to love one another, and pray that we might be recognized as disciples of Christ and communities of faith through our Spirit-inspired acts of love, kindness, service, justice and hospitality.

16 Remember in prayer the conflict in Ethiopia, which has caused displacement, suffering and loss of life among the most vulnerable — women, children and older adults. Pray for relief, hope and strength for those who have been impacted and for an end to the violence and ethnic discrimination. Give thanks for the relief work of Lutheran World Relief and the Ethiopian Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus, and for the financial support of Lutheran Disaster Response.

17 Ask the Spirit to stir our enthusiasm for sharing the good news of Jesus Christ throughout the world, that all people might know the boundless love of God that renews and unites us as siblings in Christ.

18 Pray that we might not grow weary or apathetic about the needs of our neighbor, especially when their difficulties and situations seem complicated, overwhelming or distant from us. Ask the Spirit to nurture within us love and concern that are enduring, impartial and wise.

19 Praise God for everything that brings joy, hope, encouragement or brightness into our lives.

20 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Pacifica, Greater Milwaukee, Southeastern lowa and Texas-Louisiana Gulf Coast synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and encourage them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders, proclaim the gospel, serve our neighbor and do God's work in the world.

21 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assembly of the Northwestern Minnesota Synod, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and encourage them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders, proclaim the gospel, serve our neighbor and do God's work in the world.

22 Promise to respond to those we encounter who are struggling, homeless, lonely, grieving or ill; ask the Spirit to encourage, equip and guide us when we feel ill-equipped to love and care for our neighbor.

23 Thank God for our special relationship with The Episcopal Church, a full communion partner with the ELCA since 1999. Pray for the church, its members and its leaders, that together we will find strength and resources for the work of sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor, especially in these challenging times.

24 Among your siblings in Christ, who has surprised you with their welcoming spirit, generosity, wisdom or eagerness to share their faith? Give thanks to God for people who unexpectedly enrich our lives.

25 Give thanks for young adults from across the country who have responded to the call to serve in summer ministries at ELCA camps. Ask the Spirit to equip, inspire and sustain them for sharing their faith in Christ and developing caring communities of faith with campers of all backgrounds, abilities and ages.

26 Ascension Day "Clap your hands, all you peoples; shout to God with loud songs of joy. For the Lord, the Most High, is awesome, a great king over all the earth" (Psalm 47:1-2). Praise and honor our wonderful God!

27 "The Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you" (John 14:26). Remember in prayer the gift of the Spirit in our midst, working through us to call, gather, enlighten, bless and unify the church on earth.

28 Pray for the ELCA Justice for Women program and its work fostering gender awareness, justice and dignity, that our congregations and communities might value, embrace and be shaped by the unique voices and experiences of people across race, ethnicity, ability, class, sexuality and age.

29 Ask God to unite us as communities of faith and siblings in Christ, introducing others to what God has done in the world through the life, teachings, suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus.

30 *Memorial Day* Remember, honor and give thanks for members of the armed forces who sacrificed their lives for the sake of peace. Pray for those who serve in harm's way today and for our neighbors around the world who have served their own countries in pursuit of peace, justice and freedom.

31 Pray for congregations as they prepare for mission trips, service-learning experiences and local community ministries, that their efforts might exemplify compassion, respect, mutual relationship, intentional partnership and our call to love and serve our neighbor as Christ loves and serves us.
