Pastor's Reflections

As the trees begin to shed their leaves in preparation for the winter months so we too near the end of a Church year this month. On November 20 we will celebrate the Last Sunday after Pentecost – Christ the King Sunday -- and prepare ourselves for the new church year with the beginning of Advent.

As we celebrate the end and the beginning this November I am reminded of our ancient Christian ancestors. The church has for much of its life been a place of persecution. Those first Christians faced this so much more than you and I do today. They had to develop ways of sharing the faith and yet staying alive. One of those ways was a symbol. That symbol was a fish shape.

You all have seen me use the fish sign in most all my letters and correspondence to you. I like the fish symbol - <>< because it reminds me of my faith. It recalls to me the great burdens those first Christians went through to get God's Word into the world. I am also reminded, especially on All Saints Sunday – November 6, of the saints in my life who made sure that faith was a priority for me. People like my grandmother and my mother and my dad and my wife and all the lay people in all the churches where I have been pastoring who I have sought to serve in Christ's name. Below is an explanation about the Fish symbol.

“Briefly, the fish symbol is based on a Greek acronym for the phrase Jesus Christ, God's Son, Savior. In Greek, the phrase is Ἰησοῦς Χριστός, Θεοῦ Υἱός, Σωτήρ. When we take the first letter from each word in that phrase, we have ΙΧΘΥΣ, which happens to be the Greek word for “fish” (ixthus or ictus—the spelling can vary in English). Some versions of the Christian fish symbol contain the Greek letters inside or underneath the symbol itself.

During the early days of Christianity, Christians were often put to death for practicing their faith, so they worshiped in secret places. A fish painted or etched on the outside door of a house let other Christians know that they would be safe and welcome inside. The ancient [catacombs](#) in Rome are filled with images of fish, carved there by Christians hiding from persecution.”

I frequently receive questions from people about how to share one's faith. What do I say? What do I do when they start spouting Bible passages? How do I share my story/ my journey? Often we get scared or frightened when people ask us these kinds of questions. As I have pondered this question and what to say to people my I think sharing faith is in the words of the now infamous Nike commercial: Just Do It! We get tongue tied and twisted around because we complicate the process. All those first Christians had was word of mouth – oral tradition. We have so much more but it seems to me word of mouth – talking to people is the initial step.

All this takes courage to do. We do not want to be told we are wrong or what kind of Christian are you? We are given the courage first by God and then by our fellow followers of Christ. Next time you see the fish symbol on a car or a door or somewhere else, smile and give thanks to God.

So as the church year ends and a new one begins know God is with you as you seek to live and speak the Good News to others.

Alleluia Amen.

Dear St. Paul Congregation,

I have been admiring the fall foliage here in West Virginia; perhaps it is just my state of mind that colors this subjective impression, but it seems especially beautiful this year. October always reminds me of the passing of time - in a good way. So precious to give, but also so precious to experience. I'd like to thank the choir for a completely unexpected early birthday celebration with scrumptious cookies after a Wednesday evening rehearsal earlier in October. They do this every year, and each year, my oblivious self is surprised again! Finally, at the end of the month, Reformation Sunday is one of my favorite Sundays in the church year. The music will include the hymns "A Mighty Fortress" and "Thine Is the Glory", a choral anthem with text by Martin Luther: "Lord, Keep Us Steadfast", and a virtuoso organ toccata by Belgian Romantic composer Alphonse Maily as postlude that I have been working on for a while.

The first Sunday in November is All Saints Sunday. The choir will sing as anthem "Onward, Ye Saints" in a setting by Robert Wetzler, the music will of course include "For All the Saints" as one of the congregational hymns, and as a postlude I will play a rather up-beat version of "When the Saints Go Marching In" on the piano.

After returning to in-person worship with congregational singing, Pastor Kevin, the choir, and I decided to go with setting 10 from the Red Hymnal. It is the easiest, and it would allow us to sing comfortably and with confidence after the break caused by the pandemic. On the first of Advent this year, the last Sunday in November, we will change the setting for the liturgy to Setting No. 5 in the Blue Hymnal. It includes all of our standard liturgical items: Kyrie, Song of Praise, Gospel Acclamation, Let the Vineyards, Holy, Holy, Holy, Lamb of God, and the Post-Communion Canticle. The melodies fit well into Advent season and are quite catchy at the same time. I will rehearse this setting with the choir throughout the month of November, and I am sure you will embrace it instantly.

Last, something to look forward to: For the first time in several years, we will do the Holden Evening Prayer again for Advent mid-week services (to start Wednesday, November 30). It is a contemplative and, I find, very meaningful musical setting by Marty Haugen, one of the most important living composers of Lutheran church music.

In the meantime, I wish you a very Happy Reformation Day!

There were 18 joyous stations that offered candy, popcorn, cotton candy, s'mores, games, prizes, hand painting and more. Many families came and enjoyed the festivities. This was a wonderful way to reach out to our community and to see so many children have so much fun.

The youth have been focusing on prayer and the Holy Spirit. We have discussed the Holy Spirit is not something you see but something that is felt as it moves through us. We made some Holy Ghosts filled with treats and discussed how the Holy Spirit is so sweet. We have also taken time to look at the light inside of ourselves. Even though we don't have to say it, God always knows what lies in our hearts. The youth decorated pumpkin cookies to remember God's love is so good! When discussing the story of the Pharisee and the tax collector, we concentrated on the part where God always knows what is in our heart. We made a pumpkin with a piece of satin, a roll of toilet paper and a cinnamon stick. We talked about how no one else would know what was inside of the pumpkin, but God always knows what is inside our hearts.

The CCC youth group continues to meet on the first and third Wednesdays. We have been working on a song to perform for the congregation too. They also practice on Sundays for a bit before Sunday school. The older youth have planned to do community service and take a moment to have some fun too. They plan to see Mercy Me at the civic center in November, if seating allows. Wonderful things are being stirred up in our youth. We will start practicing our Christmas program on November 9th. Let your lights SHINE!

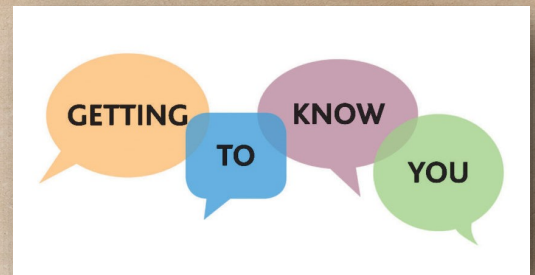

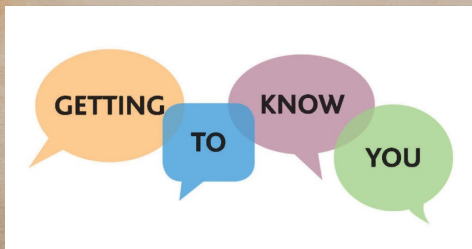

PRAYER VENTURES FOR NOVEMBER 2022

- 1** *All Saints Day* Give thanks and praise to God for saints who have helped enrich our faith in Christ, inspired us to lives of service, cared for us, demonstrated grace when we needed it most, taught us life skills, influenced our values and stirred our hope and joy.
- 2** *Native American Heritage Month* Praise God for Native American and Alaska Native neighbors and siblings in Christ, who represent a rich diversity of gifts, backgrounds, tribes, regions, communities and congregations, and whose history long predates the colonization of North America. Pray for the work of ELCA Indigenous Ministries and Tribal Relations in seeking justice and reconciliation for all people, celebrating diversity within Christ's unifying love and supporting Native congregations and ministries.
- 3** "Learn to do good; seek justice, rescue the oppressed, defend the orphan, plead for the widow. Come now, let us argue it out, says the Lord: though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be like snow" (Isaiah 1:17-18). Pray that we will respect the word and desires of God, seek the Spirit's guidance in responding to our neighbors in need, and trust God to create and renew a spirit of compassion and generosity within us.
- 4** Pray for those affected by wildfires, flooding, droughts and hurricanes, especially people struggling through immediate and long-term recovery. Ask the Spirit to inspire our generosity toward and involvement in the work of Lutheran Disaster Response and its partners to bring relief, support, hope and resources to our neighbors in need.
- 5** "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:1). Pray that, in every challenge we face, the Spirit will increase our trust and confidence in God's presence, care and help in our lives.
- 6** Praise the teachings and example of Jesus, who calls for us to be caring disciples, unafraid of being involved in the lives of those suffering injustice, persecution, isolation, grief, poverty or illness.
- 7** Pray for our outdoor ministry leaders as they gather for the Lutheran Outdoor Ministry conference in Boise, Idaho. Pray that their time together in the presence of the Spirit will be rich in mutual care and encouragement, ideas and resources, and opportunities to nurture their skills for serving in camp and retreat ministries.
- 8** *Election Day* Pray that our elected leaders will respect and serve all people, and that the Spirit will inspire and guide them in mending divisions, creating unity and encouraging constituents to work together for the well-being of all.
- 9** Ask the Spirit to deepen our understanding of Jesus and how the gift of God's son has the power to transform our lives and identities in amazing and unimagined ways.
- 10** Give thanks and pray for leaders of our church as they gather for the ELCA Church Council, that the Spirit will inspire faithfulness, wisdom, vision and creativity in their deliberations, decisions and guidance.
- 11** *Veterans Day* Honor and give thanks for those who have served in the military to secure freedom, justice, peace and security for our country and other nations. Remembering the sacrifices they have made on our behalf, pray for their families, their congregations, federal chaplains, and organizations that support and care for returning veterans.
- 12** Give thanks for the ELCA Lay Schools for Ministry Network and for the Select Learning program, through which our church and its partners provide laity with opportunities to deepen their faith, study Scripture and apply their skills and life experiences to following Christ and serving the church, their communities and the world.
- 13** Pray that the Spirit will help us live our baptismal journeys in anticipation of the return of Christ, with confidence in God's grace and without fear, worry or obsession over when or how that day will come.
- 14** Reaffirm to God our commitment to equal employment opportunity for all citizens, especially our neighbors and siblings in Christ who live with disabilities but whose gifts enrich our communities and nation.
- 15** Pray for a peaceful end to the war in Ukraine, and that the millions of people displaced from their homes and communities might find comfort, healing, hope and stability, returning to the daily lives and routines they once knew.
- 16** Pray for the ELCA's Homeless and Justice Network, a coalition of ministries called to serve those on the margins who experience homelessness, poverty and injustice.

- 17** “Do not be weary in doing what is right” (2 Thessalonians 3:13). Pray that our assurance of eternal life in the kingdom of God will free us to live in the here and now, fully engaged with our lives and vocations, sharing the gospel, serving our neighbor and working for justice.
- 18** Pray that we might confess our role in the climate change wreaking havoc throughout the world and might grasp the urgency of managing and caring for the earth, its resources and all living things — fragile gifts that God has entrusted to our use, care and restoration.
- 19** Pray for the ELCA’s advocacy network and the work it empowers us to do for justice, equity and the well-being of society.
- 20** The love and mercy of God, which we experience in the life, suffering and sacrifice of Jesus, are for our sake and salvation. Pray that the Spirit will deepen our faith in Christ and help us reflect God’s unconditional, sacrificial love for humanity.
- 21** Give thanks for Lutheran Men in Mission, Women of the ELCA and congregational ministries that attend to the spiritual, physical, emotional and relational needs of all ages, and that nurture leaders for the church, our communities and society.
- 22** Remember the people of Puerto Rico, who have suffered multiple natural disasters and endure ongoing, extensive recovery work. Ask the Spirit to renew their faith, hope, stamina and resilience; pray that they will make progress in restoring their infrastructure and regaining access to food, water, shelter, sanitation and medical services.
- 23** Give thanks to God for rescuing us from the power of darkness through the gift of Jesus Christ—our teacher, our truth and the light illuminating our complicated lives.
- 24** *Thanksgiving Day* Remember that everything we have to sustain and renew us, physically and spiritually, comes from God. Let us promise to be generous with all we have and to tirelessly bear the good news that Jesus Christ, the bread of life for the world that is never depleted, is our hope and salvation.
- 25** *Native American Heritage Day* Give thanks for the cultures, values, accomplishments and spirituality of Native Americans that have shaped our nation and church. We commit to learning more about Indigenous people and tribal nations and to working together to correct inaccuracies of history.
- 26** Pray that we will be responsible in what we consume and how we spend our money, knowing that our neighbors suffer hunger and poverty amid abundance.
- 27** *First Sunday of Advent* We will not be disappointed in our confidence in God’s love and forgiveness, our anticipation of Christ’s return or our welcome in the kingdom of God. Praise God!
- 28** Give thanks for the diverse work of the 28 ELCA missionaries accompanying 18 church bodies and 18 companion organizations in Latin America and the Caribbean. Ask God to bless and guide our ministry together so that we might respond to the needs of our neighbors in need who are most vulnerable and might spread the good news of Jesus Christ, far and wide.
- 29** Pray that the Spirit will deepen our generosity in sharing our resources and financial assets for the sake of our neighbors and the well-being of the world.
- 30** Pray that we will be generous and respectful in responding to and caring for those who cannot find secure shelter, pay for food or medical care, or support the children or older adults dependent on them.
