


# VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

### AT CHRIST THE KING LUTHERAN CHURCH

This year we will join with Christ the King Lutheran Church for VBS. Worship will be held at Christ the King on July 13 with a picnic to follow.



This summer, in addition to our change in liturgy, Pastor Mackey, in consultation with the church council, is encouraging everyone to bring their Bibles to worship. This change aims to deepen our connection with the Scriptures and enhance our spiritual experience during the service. The Bibles in the pews will be removed so please bring your own Bible. There will be a few Bibles available in the narthex if you forget yours. For those who need Large Print the lessons will continue to be printed in the bulletin.

By bringing your personal Bible to Sunday services, you will have the opportunity to engage with the Word in a more meaningful way. Here are a few benefits of this practice:

- Personal Connection: Having your own Bible allows you to read from a familiar text, which can make the experience more personal and impactful.
- Note-Taking: You can highlight passages, jot down notes, or mark sections that resonate with you during the sermon.
- Deeper Engagement: Actively following along in your Bible can help you stay focused and retain more information from the service.

#### Pastor's Reflections

This past week (June 14 to June 21) I was in the mountains with about sixty plus staff and about 150 plus young people from grades 2 to 12 at Camp Luther. Camp Luther is unique to the camping ministry of the ELCA. You see it is the only "non-resident" camp that I know of in our denomination. What that means is that our Synod does not own the property on which we have the camp, and we do not have a full-time paid Camp Director. We rent a camp called Camp Caesar between Cowen and Webster Springs, WV. All the staff are volunteers, some of whom have deep connections to the ministry of Camp Luther.

My first year at camp was in 2016, affectionately called "The Flood Year". This was the year the camp had to be evacuated because of the flooding all around us. I have gone every year the week beginning with Father Day. I like to describe camp as exhilarating and exhausting. It is a time where all my "schedules" are upended. It is time to focus on the campers who come to us. It is a time to give thanks for the creation all around us.

Speaking of the campers and staff. This year I noticed how diverse the group was at camp. I particularly noticed it among the staff. Personalities ran the gamut from extremely extravert to extreme introvert. I came to appreciate these differences throughout the week. I also could not help but think about Paul's letter to the Galatians who were struggling with people being different. Paul writes in Galatians chapter 3 verse 28: "There is no longer Jew or Greek; there is no longer slave or free; there is no longer male or female, for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." That is quite a statement! ALL ARE ONE IN CHRIST JESUS!

In July and August, we will have the opportunity to worship with others to be ONE IN CHRIST with our siblings in Christ. July 13 we will be worshipping with Christ the King Lutheran Church in Barboursville. This is the end of the Vacation Bible School we are having together – July 7 to 11. The plan is to worship outside and to focus on our youth/ children and the message they learned from VBS. Christ the King will have their praise musicians lead us in worship.

The other opportunity is with First United Methodist in downtown Huntington on August 24 at 10:45 a.m. Thanks to Dan Beals who made the initial contact about having a service together with our combined choirs. Pastor Scott Sears, the pastor at First UMC, and I will lead worship. Because of our full communion agreement Pastor Scott and I agreed that I would preach and preside at communion, and he would do the liturgy. We hope to make this a regular event and move back and forth to each other's worship spaces.

One in Christ. That is who we are whether we are a volunteer camp staff person, another ELCA Lutheran congregation or a United Methodist. Give thanks and praise for the diversity of who we all are together in Christ.
