A History of the Hillsboro Courthouse

A little History about Hillsboro and our County Courthouse. Many thanks to the Dell Byrd Estate for photos.

The county seat was originally called Hillsborough but the town's name was changed to Hillsboro in 1854 when the Post Office declared names ending in "borough" should be changed to "boro".

Both the county and the town of Hillsboro are named for Dr. George W. Hill, a pioneer Navarro County settler who served as a congressman and



as Secretary of War for the Republic of Texas. He was a surgeon with a degree from Transylvania University. Not long after the county was established, the first courthouse, 12' X 12', was constructed of elm poles, clapboard, and dirt floors.

The current courthouse was constructed in 1890. It is the third and arguably the grandest of three similar courthouses designed by Waco architect W. C. Dodson in the last half of the 1880's. Nearby Hood and Parker counties also have W.C Dodson courthouses of the same vintage.

The current Hill County Courthouse is a three-story limestone structure of Second Empire style, but it also incorporates Classical Revival and Italianate influences. Two story high Corinthian columns, mansard roof treatment, and a wood framed three-tier 70-foot-high clock tower covered with ornate tin work are the most conspicuous details of this architectural marvel.

On New Year's Day in 1993, the Courthouse was gutted by an electrical fire. All that remained standing were the four limestone walls.

The first alarm was sounded at 6:35 pm. Hillsboro Firefighters quickly responded to find the third-floor engulfed in flames, and

within minutes flames spread to the bell tower.

Fifteen Hill County fire departments, along with fire fighters from other counties, battled the flames throughout the night. Hill County citizens gathered around the square, while others watched on television as the seventy-foot bell tower collapsed in flames. The official cause of the fire was determined to be electrical.



The next morning the rim of the bell was visible through the ceiling of the first-floor hallway. Weighing 1,525 pounds, it had marked the hours for 102 years until its supports were consumed by the fire.

Talk of restoring the courthouse started before the final hot spots were extinguished. Architects with the Texas Historical Commission determined that the building was restorable and just ten days after the fire, the Hill County Historical Commission called a county-wide meeting to organize the restoration efforts. Local fund-raising projects, including two concerts on the square by Hill County native Willie Nelson, along with grants and other funding sources contributed to the restoration. Since there were no blueprints, they looked at Granbury's 1890



courthouse, also designed by Dodson, and incorporated many details using Granbury as a template

The original bell was moved to a newlyconstructed bell plaza on the courthouse lawn.

The rock used in the plaza matches that of the courthouse. It was quarried south of Abbott and first used for an 1896 building that housed a shoe cobbling business in Abbott.

Restoration took over six years and \$9 million dollars to complete. The restored building was dedicated April 24, 1999 with Texas Governor George W. Bush as the keynote speaker.

- "When the Men Were Gone" by Marjorie Herrera Lewis, Mar 4, 2021

A debut historical novel about the inspiring true story of Tylene Wilson, a teacher in Brownwood TX who became the first female high school football coach in TX during WW II.

- "The Library Book" by Susan Orlean, Apr 1, 2021 On April 29, 1986 a disastrous fire broke out in the Los Angeles Public Library. It reached 2000 degrees and burned for 7 hours consuming 400,000 books and damaging 700,000 more. Was it purposefully set? Why? Who? A mesmerizing book that also tells the story of libraries and librarians.
- (In Hoffa's Shadow: A Stepfather, a Disappearance in Detroit, and My Search for the Truth" by Jack Goldsmith, May 6, 2021 His stepfather was a long-time associate of Jimmy Hoffa. Goldsmith explores Hoffa's rise and fall and why the golden age of blue-collar America came to an end. He unravels one of the 20th century's mysteries.

Landscape Committee News

The Landscape Committee has been busy during December and January. Below is a summary of the work completed.

- The inside fence area along Walnut Hill Ave was edged.
- Several areas within the park had leaves removed and chopped up. All material was placed in the compost bins.
- Five trees were planted along the north side of the Terraport. Four small donated trees were placed in pots to be planted within the park at a later date.
- Trees growing in the Avenue F pasture area were trimmed.
- Crepe Myrtles lower branches were removed along the entrance.
- All irrigation timers were removed from the Pavilion, Butterfly Garden and Mable's Park.

Compost Update

Bin 1 is closed – compost will be ready in a month or so

Bin 2 is open for composting material

Bins 3 & 4 were recently closed to any additional material.

Compost should be ready around spring time.
