Cheddar Scallion Black Pepper Jalapeno Biscuits By Amy Van Artsdalen



Last time I told everyone about how we, John and I, were trying to avoid bread. Well, the saying "everything in moderation" came into play with this recipe.

I would have to say, I've eaten a lot of biscuits, but these would rank right near the top. Not spicy, but with lots of flavor these biscuits are worth messing with any dietary restrictions.

I love cast iron and baked these biscuits on an old cast iron griddle my father used to make pancakes when I was a child. It's seen a lot of use and using cast iron really is a perfect way to bake biscuits. It heats up well to give a nice crust to the bottom of the biscuit and retains the heat keeping the biscuits warm. This particular recipe came from a Facebook page, "Cast Iron Cooking".

Kathi Mitchell said she was going to serve biscuits at the Board Breakfast on March 1, 2022 and I was ready to give this recipe a try so I volunteered to bring some biscuits. I received lots of compliments, so I hope you'll enjoy the recipe.

I did brush the tops of the biscuits with melted butter before I put them in the oven and then again when they came out. Some people brush them with cream before baking, but I think more butter is best. Moderation, right?

Cheddar Scallion Black Pepper Jalapeno Biscuits

Pre Heat oven to 475 degrees

Ingredients:

- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1TBS granulated sugar
- 4 1/2 tsp Baking Powder
- 3/4 tsp cream of tarter
- 3/4 tsp ground black pepper
- 3/4 tsp Salt
 2 Jalapenos (1 deseeded & 1 whole-seeds and all) all finely diced
- 3/4 cup cold buttermilk
- 1 Egg
- 3/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 4 scallions diced
- 3/4 cup cold butter

Directions

Mix all dry ingredients, cut in butter with a pastry cutter. Blend in wet ingredients. Fold all ingredients only until combined.

Turn out to a floured counter or floured board. Fold together 3-4 time. Pat out to a rectangle, cut out biscuits. Place into 475 degree pre heated oven and cook for 15-16 minutes or until golden brown.

Remove from oven and butter tops with melted butter!!

NTAC Board Highlights

Your NTAC Board of Directs met this past May 17th. Approximately 40 attended the meeting,

Officer and Committee reports highlighted the increase in number of rallies being held on our Terraport and all the work done to keep our community as nice as it is. Please be sure to say hello and welcome our visitors when you see them.

Mike Mack, VP-OPS noted the availability of Turkey Creek Landfill in Alvarado for large item disposal. Things like antennas, appliances, lawn equipment, or other large items should not be placed in the dumpsters or next to them. Residents can get a letter from our office manager to drop these items off at the landfull.

Steve Zeringue provided an update on the Drainage project. Lots of work has gone into guiding water flow off the hill and away from occupied lots. Many thanks to all involved. Cement bags were the last addition and will be followed by some backill work to cover them, once they are set.

A number of motions were presented and voted upon.

- Four motions were introduced to amend Villa and House specifications regarding fences. In all cases permanent fences will be prohibited except for special circumstance and by Board approved variance. This motion also incudes guidelines for fences which might be approved, and also specifically notes Temporary Pet Enclosures are permitted. All were approved
- Two motions were introduced by the Solar Eclipse Committee, to hold a Special Event for the 2024 Solar Eclipse on 8 April 2024 and to set parking rates for the event. Both were approved and formally starts the planning process for the even.

Public comments included various issues regarding park security and the gate being open until 8PM to accommodate deliveries. Mike Mack is continuing to look at alternatives.

The next regularly scheduled Board of Directors Meeting is planned for Tuesday, September 27, 2022 in the Rally Room.

Old National Road ~ Cumberland Road ~ The National Pike ~ Western Pike

Keith and Ellen Enstrom, Jenn Hicks, Lynne Mack, Ken & Kathi Mitchell, and Millie O'Donnell and I gathered with other Airstream Club members in Woodbine, MD for the start of the 2022 Old National Road Caravan (East segment). The whole National Road



Caravan is divided into three one-week segments to allow for people with less vacation/free time to experience a caravan, and participants were welcome to join any, or all segments to learn the history. For some, it was their first caravan, so the familiar faces started the adventure off on a comfortable footing. For a few, caravans were familiar; meeting new faces and recognizing others made for easy fun.

Baltimore, MD saw much activity at the turn of the last century and was the starting point for the early American expansion into railroads, canal paths, and motorways ... all leading westward to the frontier of Pennsylvania! The historic 1884-built roundhouse has been restored to house a grand museum of Railroad history, with engines and cars from many stages of the growth of the rail transit system. The importance of the immigrant, primarily Irish in the neighborhood of the museum, was also highlighted by a tour of the Irish Railroad Workers Museum, just across the street. The attached photo was taken after our afternoon Inner Harbor boat tour ~ a little chilly and rainy, but interesting history and scenery.

Next caravan stop was Clearville, PA. Day trips to the Laurel Caverns and Fort Necessity taught us some cave formation science, as well as much of General George Washington's military history. A day trip to the Cassleman River Bridge (the largest stone bridge of its type) is also the site of the Spruce Forest Artisan Village in Grantsville, MD. Historic cottages are home to various crafters and tradespeople – potters, wood carvers, blacksmiths, and bakers. The final first segment stop was Washington, PA (southwest Pittsburgh). Here, our fledgling American government saw its first military challenge, as the Whiskey Rebellion took hold and caused President Washington to enact the young national military against those who protested our first national duty tax. A lot more history was to be learned on the second and third leg, but the East segment ended after just a short two-night' stay in western PA. (con't next column)

The route along "Alt-US 40" was a mountainous, albeit beautiful, drive. Conversations were had about traveling the terrain on stagecoaches, trains, canal boats and even towing Airstream Trailers! We could see the need for the evolution of transit methods; and I, for one, was truly appreciative of the paved road and signage to lead the way!

Noteworthy Accomplishments:

Peggy Spruell and Philip Spruell received a Certificate of Appreciation for their dedicated work and volunteerism.

They joined Hill County Master Gardeners in 2017 and since that time have logged in more than 700 hours of volunteer time.

Peggy served as secretary and Phil is treasurer of the organization. Some of the projects they



have worked on are Wallace Nature Trail Butterfly Garden, Whitney Veteran's Park, Maintenance of the AgriLife and Hillsboro library flower pots, Farmers Market information booth, and the plant sales for scholarships.
