



2024 has been a busy and successful year for your Woodring Wall of Honor and Veterans Park. The activities for Vietnam Veterans Day, Memorial Day and Veterans week were well attended and added numerous new contacts and supporters for the park. The exhibit at the old Sears location at the Oakwood Mall has added new exhibits and improved exhibits of information ranging from the Constitution of the United States through the conflicts that our veterans have served over the years. In addition, several volunteers have stepped up to help improve the exhibits and to guide tours of the facility. The exhibit was officially named the American Military Heritage Museum.

The Museum offers guided tours for school students and provides packets for all students to take home to remind

them of the exhibits at the museum and the sacrifices of our veterans over the years. The Museum also hosts a representative of the Veterans Administration twice a month to help veterans with their claims for benefits and hosts the monthly meeting for the Enid American Legion Post and other service organizations. #### **Community Partnerships**

### **Boy Scouts of America Partners** for Eagle Scout Projects

We collaborated with Boy Scout Troop #27 under the leadership of Cashen Shire to build a viewing pad and seating for the Woodring Airport Historical Mural.



The project also included creating a handicap accessible sidewalk to a large viewing pad. The Corvette Club of Enid bench was restored with new supports and placed on the pad. In addition to the concrete work, Cashen secured funding to place electrical lines to light the mural and repair the lighting at the Army gun display. We partnered as his mentor to provide contacts for funding and public speaking bullet points. Cashen made several presentations and raised more than \$6,000 which allowed for the purchase a professional 2' x 3' sign.



#### **Eagle Scout Project continued:**

The sign shares the history of the airport, description of the mural, sponsors that made the mural possible and the donors who supported the Eagle Scout project. It is a stunning view at night and allows visitors to experience the remarkable history of our airport.

The Woodring Wall of Honor and Veterans Park, Inc., an award-winning Oklahoma educational center and home to Oklahoma's official Vietnam War Monument, is thrilled to announce receipt of another ample collection from the International Bird Dog Association (IBDA) currently located in Fredericksburg, Texas. We're overwhelmed by the IBDA's generosity, along with their collaboration to ensure that the Bird Dog memorabilia they are donating continues to build the future of educating our youth on the service of our veterans who flew the Bird Dog aircraft. The IBDA's gift was made possible with the donation of unique items attached to the Bird Dog aircraft along with an extensive research library which will bring in Bird Dog pilots from all over the world to Enid.

The Woodring Wall of Honor has partnered with the Oklahoma Veterans Administration provide much needed assistance to Northwest Oklahoma veterans outlining veteran disability state-specific benefits. It includes financial assistance, educational opportunities, recreational benefits, housing employment support, burial and memorial arrangements, tax incentives, VA resources within the state. The VA meets monthly at the American Military Heritage Museum at Oakwood Mall.

Wartime veterans and their surviving spouses, 65 years and older, may be entitled tax-free benefit called Aid to and Attendance provided by the Department of Veteran Affairs. The Benefit is designed to provide financial aid to help offset the cost of long-term care for those who need assistance with the daily activities of living such as bathing, dressing, eating, toileting, transferring. We work with retirement homes to help their residents apply for these benefits.

The American Legion Post #4 held a meeting to discuss the status of their charter. State leaders came together and several members took on the challenge to build the post and work to increase veterans' participation and membership. The post meets monthly at the American Military Heritage Museum. The group is actively participating in Boys State and arranges great speakers and a wonderful meal each meeting.

## Making an Impact through Community Partnerships

The Quilts of Valor Group, led by Jovita Lang, provides quilts for approved veterans. A beautiful handmade quilt was presented by the group to three WWII veterans, HB Evans, RD Lawrence and Dr. Earl Mabry.



Shirley Suttles leads another private quilting group and has provided more than 15 handmade patriotic quilts to our Legacy Veterans of the Year on Veterans Day, and for our Gold Star families on Memorial Day. The value of these quilts exceeds \$1,000 each. Erma Williams hand crocheted more than 7 Afghans for our veterans.



The Woodring Wall of Honor and the Corvette Club of Enid has a long-standing relationship. The car owners host an annual event and disburse the funding to local non-profits. Due to their generosity and support, we were able to expand the mural project. In addition to their club donation to the mural, individual members donated to the mural and the viewing pad project. One of their members also facilitated a craft show, food truck festival and encouraged members to display their cars throughout the mall! It was a tremendous success!



Vance AFB is a key asset to our city with their community involvement. The airmen from Vance have donated hours of volunteerism and support to the park. They wash the Vietnam and Living Walls, help with yard work, gardening, and assist with programs and events. Many airmen volunteered their skill sets to help organize the storage areas in the new American Military Heritage Museum.

The Blue Star Mothers have a long-time relationship with our organization. The mothers assist us with dedicated events that honor our veterans. We have jointly organized meals for veterans and helped with collection of items for their boxes sent to soldiers. This December, we hosted a Christmas Party for the Oklahoma National Guard by serving a meal to the soldiers and their families. Our organization secured the donations of food, prizes and gave away more than \$5,000 worth of gifts. The group had just returned from a deployment to Africa. We want to thank those that donated gift cards, money, food, and items for the giveaways. We plan to do this again next year.

The Carry the Flame Across America is a group that has supported us for more than 15 years. They arrange a ride that travels from California to Washington DC each year during May. They come through to bring riders to the Vietnam Memorial Wall. We also participate in the opening ceremony for the Jr. College World Series and they bring a Special Olympic type flame for the WWII, Korean, Vietnam, and modern-day warriors to carry around The bases. It's a moving ceremony that illustrates The value of our military and encourages patriotism in our next generation.





There are 58,318 names on the Vietnam Memorial Wall, of which over 990 are Oklahomans. Each name is of a loved one who paid the ultimate price and made the supreme sacrifice in the shedding of their blood and giving of their lives so that others might live in freedom. One of those brave men is USAF Captain Neil "Cherokee" Bynum from Vian, Oklahoma. I first met Neil in 1963 at Oklahoma State University. We were both in the Air Force ROTC Program. He was a natural leader, a patriot, and a man set on serving his Nation. Neil graduated in December 1966 and was off to Pilot Training at Vance AFB. I graduated in May of 1967 and was also going to Vance.

Upon graduating from Pilot Training, we both went to F-4 training and then assigned to the 8th Tactical Flying Wing (TFW) at Ubon Royal Thai Air Base in Thailand in 1969. After a few months of flying combat missions, we both were then hand-picked to become members of the Elite Wolf FACs. A specialized unit tasked to Seek Out and Destroy Enemy targets. On 26 October 1969, Neil was shot down and his body has never been recovered.

I then volunteered for a second combat tour and returned to the 8th TFW in April 1971 and again asked to join the Wolf FACs. I was subsequently shot down over North Vietnam and captured on 16 February 1972. On 28 March 1973, I was released from captivity during Operation Homecoming and returned to flying the F-4 and F-15 for 21 years.

Everyday day since my return, I have worn Neil's MIA Bracelet to keep his Memory Alive. Please Join me in **NEVER FORGETTING those Whom have yet to Return Home.**

In 2023, the Woodring Wall of Honor and Veterans Park became the first Chapter of Oklahoma the Military Heritage Foundation. The Military Heritage Oklahoma Foundation founded the Military Hall of Fame to honor Oklahoma veterans. There are many more heroic and patriotic Oklahomans deserving of significant recognition so the Hall of Honor was established in 2023 to expand the impact of the Foundation and honor additional veterans.

These chapters will identify and nominate honorees who will receive a Hall of Honor citation and awards. The Hall of Honor awards are made throughout the year. We were honored to present Hall of Honor awards to four worthy veterans on Memorial Day, 2024. USN veteran Gene Atkinson, USMC veteran Jack Culbertson, USA veteran Jack Toney, and USN veteran Dr. Earl Mabry were presented by the Heritage Foundation Founder, General Douglas Dollar, USA Retired.



On Memorial Day, each year, we continue the strong support that Enid shows its military armed forces through services and events that honor our fallen and remember the sacrifices of those who served before us. Enid leads the charge to honor these honorable men and women who defended our nation. We have honored 215 of Oklahoma's fallen heroes since 2000.



This year we added a unique way to honor those who have earned the Medal of Honor through the Medal of Honor Ride. Vehicles and motorcycles rode to three sites in NW Oklahoma to pay tribute to three Medal of Honor recipients.

An amazing event occurred at the NJCAA Baseball World Series this year. WWII, Korea, Vietnam, and today's warriors carried a flame around the bases ending up at home plate. The families of two Medal of Honor recipients, a WWII USAAF airman and CMSgt Henry McReynolds raised the flame at home plate as a Blue Star Mother extinguished the flame following the "flame run" to begin the series.




#### **Impacting the Community - Education**

One of our goals is to educate our next generation, not only of the value of all members of our armed forces but to provide hands on learning for subject they may not receive in the classroom. We have hosted more than 100 organized tours from small groups from retirement centers to large groups of students. We also began organizing tours with travel companies to open up additional tourism to our museums in Enid.

We host several oral history presentations each year. 
Our Huey, the Workhorse of Vietnam exhibit included more than 40 testimonies of veterans who were tied to the Huey helicopter during the Vietnam War. Those oral histories are currently on display at the American Military Heritage Museum at Oakwood Mall and the ML Becker Educational Center. The testimonies range from crewing the aircraft, to flying the warbird, to being medi-flighted out of the war zone, to being transported to other drop zones. One testimony from a POW. 

In late 2022, we were approached by the Kansas Military History Museum about their closure and the acquisition of their collection with a value of more than \$500,000. It took six months to bring the collection down to Enid for storage in the old Sears anchor store in the Oakwood Mall. Under the direction of one of our key volunteers, Justin Messenger, we began unpacking boxes, assembling aircraft, transporting vehicles and the process of setting up our merged collections into an educational history of American war. We schedule school tours for all age groups throughout the year. Teaching modules for educators are on our new web site for the Vietnam War and Constitution.

additional assets programs while remaining a 100% volunteer non-profit organization. We continue to expand our events to include programs and free meals for veterans, contests for school children, Events that have expanded into week-long celebrations. We have developed multiple school curriculums for a variety of 2/4/6-hour tours with STEM activities and trained docents providing tailored education experiences.

We've made partnerships and connections that reach far beyond Oklahoma and serve as a "go to" resource regarding veterans' oral histories and experiences. We have become more than a small local veteran's park and will leave a legacy of military history for our next generation and beyond.




