Other jurisdictions such as Singapore, Dubai, Gibraltar, and the Cayman Islands have become sites of blockchain technology innovation. The participants in this workshop work on the front lines of building crypto projects in banking, rails, NFTs, and entertainment. The goal of the workshop is to share stories and experiences, network, and discuss the future of blockchain.
