Last August two new Trustees took over the management of the treasured Golden Grove Estate with its stunning gothic buildings, outstanding views over the Tywi valley and a magnificent arboretum.

Unfortunately, the estate has suffered many setbacks recently: From past mismanagement by previous trustees, deterioration of the building and park and damage from a leaked roof to full closure of the estate.

"We're all so lucky that a group of new people have come forward to become trustees and turn things round," says Llandeilo Mayor Christoph Fischer. "The new team are unpaid volunteers who are working really hard. They have inherited a bunch of problems but won't be deterred. Thanks to the generosity of one wonderful

donor and expertly carried out work under difficult conditions by Cled Moses and his team, emergency roof repair has been completed, which was the most important and urgent first step."

"I'm really excited to be part of the Trust and looking forward to helping redevelop the Estate for the benefit of the wider community," says new trustee Bron Jones.

"It's so great to have new dependable Trustees on the Golden Grove Trust board who have the passion, skills and community spirit to breathe new life into this well-loved Park," says Golden Grove resident Polly

Verity. "Gelli Aur park has given me so much over the years. I'm thrilled that the new Trustees and volunteers are revitalising this beautiful place for the community."

"Our next actions are to secure the appropriate liability insurances for public access, recruit volunteers, fund an arboriculturist survey, reopen the Park to the public (including the playground and toilets), improve site security and signage, and prevent further damage to the buildings this winter," says Henk Smit, chair of the new trustees. "There is a lot more work to be done in the months and years ahead, which is why we have started a crowdfunding campaign."

Formerly privately owned, the estate had been turned over to the public in 2011 with a Board of Trustees. Having closed its gates in March 2023 due to increasing liabilities, it has taken some time to find people willing to take the project on.

"Given the past history of Golden Grove, please be assured that we are committed to transparency and accountability in utilising your donations for maximum impact," says Smit. "We will keep you updated on the campaign's progress, milestones achieved, and the impact of your support."

"I have so many happy memories of days out with my children at Golden grove when they were younger," glows Llandeilo Mayoress and a longstanding admirer of the park. "Picnics in the park, hot chocolate in the cafe and climbing on the amazing trees in the arboretum. It was so exciting when the film 'Six Minutes to Midnight was filmed there, with its stars Judi Dench and Eddie Izzard regularly spotted around Llandeilo."

"It needs saving," says local resident Jason Smith on Facebook. "I have great memories on those grounds from May fayres (in the late 80's to early 90's) and exploring through the paths. It would be so sad if it was left to rot as it's currently doing."





Padmasambhava Yoga & Meditation Centre

Now that the Spring term is well underway, Padmasambhava encourages everyone to keep up their yoga practice. The better weather and increasing length of days is an excellent time to encourage our bodies to be more active and attending a yoga class is a perfect way to do so. Although the Spring 24 term is underway, do contact the Centre for available spaces.

There are a good selection of classes at the Centre in Llandeilo as well as weekly classes at the Penybanc Welfare Hall in Ammanford, the Reading Room Cwrt Henri and a Chair Yoga class at the Llandeilo Bowling Club. The group at Ammanford is suitable for both returning students and those new to yoga. Classes are held in the warm and spacious Penybanc Hall and the teacher Maria along with the existing students will be delighted to welcome new members to the class.

The Over 50s in the Llandeilo Centre is a dynamic course, welcoming both returning and younger students, too, to this Daytime class with Nada.

Chair Yoga classes use gentle movements from a sitting position on a chair, with the focus on keeping the joints mobile and muscles flexible, as well as learning relaxation techniques for daily life. Time is spent in each class with practices to maintain and improve balance. No previous experience of yoga is needed to join this friendly and welcoming group. This Wednesday morning class is held in the Bowling Club Llandeilo (10.45 to 11.45am)

The benefits of yoga resonate beyond the class and the physical practices, bringing a calmer mind and body into daily life. Yoga introduces a greater awareness of the breath and its importance to our good health. Bringing awareness into breathing opens the pathway to using the breath to bring about relaxation and balance in mind and body, and to enhance energy – all adding to a sense of wellbeing and better health. Weekly practice of yoga allows the body to gently regain strength and flexibility and these qualities are often also reflected in the mind.

Classes at Padmasambhava are suitable for people of all ages and abilities, from Beginners through to Progressive, as well as Chair Yoga. Students often remark on the sense of well-being brought about by these classes which incorporate movement (asana), breath awareness and breathing practices (pranayama) and end with the deep relaxation of Yoga Nidra. The classes are progressive throughout the weeks and terms and are suited to the students within the class. Many students say how they are enjoying and value the sense of connection and community that coming together in class brings.



MUSEUM NOTES: LLANDOVERY TOWN BAND



Although Llandovery Museum is currently closed for its winter break its volunteers are busily engaged in essential work. This includes the detailed cataloguing of all the items – both on display and in storage – to ensure the museum's continued accreditation.

As in every museum, space dictates that only a fraction of the total number of objects in its collection may be displayed at any given time. A glimpse through the myriad photographs under the care of Llandovery Museum, reveals that the town once had a brass band.

The photograph shows eighteen members of the band, with their instruments. Although the date given is 1905, it's possibly of slightly earlier origin. A newspaper report at the end of September 1904 reported: "Music, so far as brass instruments are concerned, is dead in Llandovery."

Only two years earlier, at a public meeting at the King's Head Hotel, it had been decided to re-establish a brass band and to collect money for new instruments. Eleven instruments were available in working order, and only four or five new instruments had to be bought. By April 1903, a band was practising in the Town Hall several nights a week. However, rumours were soon circulating that the band was about to disband once more.

In March 1905 W. D. Watkins, of Llandeilo, agreed to become the band's conductor at fee of £4.10s, provided it was better organised. Obviously, he was too ambitious; the following month he left Llandeilo to accept an appointment as bandmaster elsewhere. On the mayor's suggestion, the instruments were placed in green baize bags and hung in the Town Hall.

In January 1910, the Town Council was told that it had been decided to re-form a town band, and the Council was asked for permission to use the instruments for practices in the Town Hall. Members agreed to this but insisted that the names of those who received instruments should be registered because in the past instruments had been damaged and some had not been returned.

A few weeks later, it was reported that the newly formed town band had made its first public appearance on St. David's Day, and had given a good account of itself, thanks to the ability of the conductor, Mr. Morgan, of Llandeilo.

However, success was short-lived. By May 1915, the band had disappeared, and so had many of the instruments. A meeting of the Town Council was told that nearly all the young men who were members of the band were fighting in World War I.

At the end of the War, Llandovery College applied for the loan of the band instruments belonging to the Town Council so that a band could be established among the boys at the college. The application was accepted, on condition that the warden would be responsible for the safety of the instruments. The college's connection with the band dated back to December 1849 when the foundation stone of the new college was laid. The dignitaries made their way from the Town Hall to the college site 'amid the chiming of the church bells and the strains of the town band.'

The instrumentalists frequently entertained the visitors to Llanwrtyd Wells, and were even engaged by Bostock's Menagerie. On one occasion, in June 1888, after the band had been playing selections of music throughout the menagerie's performances at Llansawel, the gigantic elephant, Madame Jumbo, died suddenly. Much to the relief of the band members, it was determined that death was not music-related, but due to natural causes.

We are now cataloguing and labelling our artefacts to meet accreditation criteria and are working on ideas for the coming season's displays. Several volunteers have offered to help with various work to be undertaken before we open in April, but there is plenty yet to be done! 



Guest speaker Ollie Griffith-Salter was introduced by Rosie. They have known each other a long time. Rosie feels that Ollie is an inspiration as he woke up one day when he was about 13 and no longer had the use of his legs. He has gone on to play wheelchair basket ball for Wales, competing abroad and is a disability access champion for those living with a disability in Wales.

- · Ollie discussed finding it hard when he lost the use of his legs in 2013 and felt very sorry for himself until his Mum encouraged him to take up wheelchair basket ball and this gave his life meaning again.
- · Ollie went on to compete for Wales and GB in wheelchair basketball.
- · Ollie then lived in Italy for two years competing, but came home due to struggles with his mental health.
- · Since being back, he has wanted to help others with their mental health and does this by being open about his own struggles.
- · Ollie attended the Eisteddfod when it was in Llandovery, but was disappointed with the limited access for wheelchair users, he got in touch with the organisers and they appointed him "Disability Officer"
- Ollie has now consulted on the Eisteddfod and the National Urdd and was shocked to learn that there are no companies in Wales that make or supply disabled toilet blocks.
- · Ollie got the specifications and had the disabled toilet blocks built, these can now be moved around the sites.
- · Ollie's aim is to get all festivals in Wales working together and ensuring that they meet the Gold standard of disabled access.
- · Ollie discussed useful apps that let wheelchair users know where appropriate toilets/ changing facilities are in their area.
- Ollie talked about the challenges are everyday activities as a wheelchair user, he gave the example of having

Our thanks must go to DiEnw, Alan Walters, Dough Diddley's Pizzas, Llangadog Community Hall, all those who attended, the local businesses who helped sell tickets and donated raffle prizes, and our relentless band of volunteers who made it all happen. The event raised an amazing £1,548.07 which will support our fight against pylons through our valley and for which we are so grateful. We will keep you updated as our fundraising teams are planning several events in 2024.

On the business side, Bute Energy is yet to be granted its licence from OFGEM, so we continue to play the waiting game. Be aware, Bute Energy will move very quickly once it has been granted so, next year, as with this year, we are likely to get very little notice of the next consultation. You may have seen Julie James MS speak in the Senedd last month where she announced that a report has been commissioned that will provide an up-to-date cost comparison of the different cable routing methods, namely overhead and underground (including cable ploughing). An article on this in the South Wales Guardian explains more if you missed it and is encouraging news (https://www.southwalesguardian.co.uk/news/23952954.cable-ploughing-looked-welshgovernment/). However, the real possibility of three or

more pylon routes through mid Wales means the threats are only increasing. Jonathan Edwards MP continues to be very supportive and in the last week, also in the South Wales Guardian, called for clarity on the Welsh Government's position (https://www.southwalesguardian.co.uk/news/23984843.welsh-government-needs-clarify-cable-ploughing-towy-valley/). Meanwhile, we continue our dialogue with representatives of the three main political parties, who have been sympathetic to our cause, and these conversations will continue into the new year.

Please do keep visiting the website https://nopylons. wales/index.html. There is new material going up all the time. Particular thanks must go to Dr Chris R Langley who has shared some 'slippy maps' which show historical sites along the routes. Inspired by these, an interactive map has been created which allows you to zoom in and see how close the route may come to your home (with cables over the top in some cases!) Combined with the visual impact maps we are starting to build a real picture of the devastation pylons would mean to our valley. All the different maps can be found here (https://nopylons.wales/maps.html).

Finally, we would like to say a massive thank you to the Group's members who have kickstarted this campaign and have continued the fight. They are all volunteers and have tirelessly given up their time day after day. So, to them and all of you out there who continue to support us we wish you a Happy New Year.

Llandovery RFC Secretary Robin Barlow still manages to raise a smile

Who would want to be a rugby club secretary, given the task of re-arranging fixtures and endlessly juggling dates on the whims and wishes of both the WRU and other Premiership clubs? writes Huw S Thomas

Such has been the work of Llandovery RFC club and fixture secretary Robin Barlow in his efforts to cut the Gordian Knot of who, what, where and when.

Postponements through bad weather, date alterations through ground unavailability, clashes between Premiership and WRU Cup dates have resulted in a redrawing of the fixture list for the rest of the season.

Saturday's game between Llandovery and Cardiff was called off by the Cardiff club because the Arms Park was reserved for hosting the Cardiff Blues v Harlequins Champions Cup game.

After lengthy negotiations between the two clubs the Drovers will now play Cardiff in the Premiership at the Arms Park on Thursday evening February 1.

Bridgend were due to visit Church Bank on March 2 but that fixture has had to be moved to April 27 because the WRU have named March 2 as WRU Cup semi finals day when Llandovery play Ebbw Vale at Aberavon and Swansea face Merthyr at Bridgend.

Complications arise thereafter as if either or both Llandovery and Swansea win their semi final games, then they will be in the Cup final at the Principality Stadium in Sunday April 7.

That is one day after their scheduled Premiership game against the All Whites on Saturday April 6.

So, if Llandovery and Swansea both lost their semi finals on March 2 then the April 6 league game will take place as per fixture list.



If either Llandovery or Swansea get to the Principality on April 7, the league game will be re-arranged for Saturday April 20 – hope you got it?

Other confirmed changes will see the Drovers play Swansea at St Helen's on Saturday February 10 (KO 1 00 pm), the day of the England-Wales Six Nations game at Twickenham (KO 4.45pm)

The clubs were due to play on December 2 but a frozen St Helen's pitch forced a postponement.

The Pontypool – Llandovery clash, originally fixed for Saturday March 9, has been brought forward a day to Friday March 8 and to be played under the Pooler lights in front of TV cameras.

The Llandovery-Bridgend game, scheduled for March 2 – WRU Cup semi finals day – has had to be moved to April 27.

There is every hope that the Drovers will make the Premiership play offs on May 4, when the top of the regular season club will entertain the fourth placed club and the second placed side will have home advantage over the third placed.

The two successful semi finalists will meet on Saturday May 11, venue dependent on semi final results providing – as Dr Barlow wistfully says – "that the season is not extended because of bad weather!"



VISIT TO THE MANAGEMENT TEAM OF GLANGWILI HOSPITAL

Last week, Derek Jones, of 'Love Llandovery' and I were invited to a discussion with the Management of Glangwili General Hospital. We had raised concerns previously with the Chief Executive of Hywel Dda University Health Board about the conditions suffered by patients being admitted into Glangwili through the Emergency Unit (EU – formerly A&E) and being held thereafter in the Medical Admission Unit (MAU) within the Clinical Decisions Unit (CDU) pending admittance to a ward or discharge.

You will all know that Glangwili, like hospitals everywhere, is short of beds on wards because of the difficulty of discharging patients who no longer need a bed in an acute hospital. There are around 80 such patients currently in Glangwili, some of them may still need some therapy, such as physiotherapy or occupational therapy, but 45 or so have no such needs and are just waiting for care packages or places in care homes. This equates, effectively, to two whole wards.

At the same time, pressure on the EU means lengthy waits for treatment for many and those who need admitting cannot be found beds on wards. To alleviate this problem, the MAU has been holding a number of patients, who ought to be on wards but cannot be, in chairs during the day and on theatre trolleys at night. This is distressing for patients and not helpful in helping them to get better. We wanted this procedure to be stopped and all patients in the MAU be given a bed.

The lead for the Glangwili management team was their Head of Nursing, Ms Olwen Morgan. She was frank: pressure on the hospital was immense and greater than that for which it was designed and, no, the system wasn't right, it was of deep concern to the Hospital and she 'lost sleep' over it. She was also clear that the hospital could not provide a totally safe environment for all; merely attempt to reduce the risk as much as possible. She was quite clear that the lack of available beds within the Hospital was of grave concern and discussed at nearly every management meeting. But... there was certainly insufficient room for there to be beds in the MAU during the day when the through-put of patients was considerable (only some of those being seen there were, of course, staying overnight). Having beds in the MAU

would mean fewer patients being seen there at any one time and therefore, more remaining in the EU where conditions were even less favourable.

In short, for the time being, there was little prospect of an improvement in this situation. While this is very disappointing, it is apparent that there is no quick fix which would make things better overall as improvement in the MAU could only result in less good conditions for many in the EU.


We then spoke about our concerns about the treatment of patients waiting in EU. We stressed that for many, "a trip to A&E" was feared as much as the symptoms bringing them there. A lack of privacy, uncomfortable seating, extensive waits and poor communication from the EU team all contributed to a miserable experience. We asked that, for those patients who had seen the triage nurse and were now waiting for treatment, more comfortable, reclining, seating be provided. We asked that the reception area might be reconfigured to provide better privacy and reduce the barrier between patients and the receptionists (they are currently partially-hidden behind smoked glass) and we asked that the hospital employ volunteers to liaise between waiting patients and the EU clinical staff to give waiting patients and their carers clear points of contact to ensure a better flow of information and reassurance that no one was being forgotten, while taking that pressure off clinical staff who would better be able to move about in the waiting area without interruption. And, lastly, we asked that the plethora of temporary paper signs stuck all over the walls might be reduced and clarified so that patients and carers could have clear, easily-read guidance which was regularly reviewed for currency and necessity.

Ms Morgan agreed that these things, among others, would be looked at so as to improve the experience of those waiting in the EU. We hope that those of you unlucky enough to be visiting Glangwili EU in the coming months, will see the result of our shared efforts with an overall improvement in conditions there.

We are grateful to Ms Morgan and Mr Luke Lenton from the Health Board Complaints Department for agreeing to meet us and for the time they spent with us.

Frost in the garden is a transformative natural occurrence that can both enchant and challenge gardeners. As temperatures plummet, delicate ice crystals form on leaves, flowers and grass, creating a breathtaking winter wonderland. However, this picturesque scene belies the potential harm it inflicts on vulnerable plants. Frost poses a risk of freezing plant tissues, leading to wilting, discoloration and even death. Gardeners employ various protective measures, such as covering plants or relocating them indoors, to shield their gardens from frost's icy grasp. Navigating this seasonal dance between beauty and danger, gardeners must balance appreciation for nature's artistry with the need for strategic plant care.

Hoar frost and ground frost are captivating phenomena that transform winter gardens into enchanting, frosty landscapes. These unique occurrences happen under specific weather conditions, creating a delicate, crystalline beauty that blankets plants, grass and various surfaces.

Hoar frost forms when water vapour in the air directly transitions into ice crystals without first becoming liquid. This process typically happens on cold, clear nights when the temperature drops below freezing. As the moisture in the air freezes, it adheres to surfaces like leaves, branches and even spider webs, creating a breathtaking display of fine, feathery ice crystals. The term 'hoar' is derived from an old English word meaning 'showing signs of old age' aptly describing the frost's frosty, white appearance.

In the winter garden, hoar frost adds an ethereal touch, transforming mundane elements into glistening works of art. Trees and shrubs become adorned with delicate ice formations, resembling intricate lacework. Blades of grass stand adorned with sparkling crystals, turning the entire landscape into a magical winter wonderland. The beauty of hoar frost lies in its ephemeral nature, as it can disappear with the first rays of the morning sun or a slight increase in temperature.

Ground frost, on the other hand, occurs when the temperature at ground level drops below freezing, causing moisture in the soil to freeze. This phenomenon poses both challenges and benefits to the winter garden.

On the downside, ground frost can potentially harm plants by freezing the water within their cells, leading to cellular damage. However, it also has protective aspects, insulating the roots of certain plants from more severe cold temperatures.

Winter gardens adorned with ground frost showcase a different charm. The frozen ground takes on a silvery sheen, accentuating the contours of the landscape. Grass blades become stiff and coated in a thin layer of frost, creating a crisp, winter tableau. While some plants may suffer from the effects of ground frost, others, particularly those adapted to colder climates, may thrive in these conditions.

Peonies, for example, revered for their lush blooms, require a period of winter chill to thrive. This chilling requirement, often measured in chill hours, is crucial for the peony's flowering process. Chill hours represent the cumulative time a plant spends at temperatures between 0°C and 7°C during the dormant season. Peonies, being cold-loving perennials, depend on this chilling period to break dormancy and stimulate robust flower bud development. Without adequate chill hours, peonies may exhibit delayed or reduced blooming, emphasizing the intrinsic connection between winter chill and the vibrant. abundant blossoms that make these ornamental plants a cherished addition to gardens.

Gardeners often employ various strategies to protect their plants from the adverse effects of frost, such as covering vulnerable plants, mulching to insulate the soil, or selecting frost-resistant plant varieties. Understanding the nuances of hoar frost and ground frost allows gardeners to appreciate the transient beauty of winter while also taking necessary precautions to safeguard their beloved plants.

LETTER TO THE WELSH GOVERNMENT ABOUT A NATIONAL CLEAN ENERGY PLAN AND LOCAL ENERGY

CRIW AMGYLCHEDD LLANYMDDYFRI - LLANDOVERY CLIMATE ACTION GROUP

We urgently need a National Clean Energy Plan for Wales. A plan that shows how we will transition to clean, renewable energy generation and distribution. A plan that allows us to judge whether investments from the private sector are consistent with the Well-being of Future Generations Act (2015) and in the best interests of the people of Wales.

In December 2021 The Welsh Government published its "Renewable energy deep dive: recommendations" December 2021. That document included the following:

"Our Vision is for Wales to generate renewable energy to at least fully meet our energy needs and utilise surplus generation to tackle the nature and climate emergencies. We will accelerate actions to reduce energy demand and maximise local ownership retaining economic and social benefits in Wales.

We will scale up local energy plans to create a national energy plan by 2024, mapping out future energy demand and supply for all parts of Wales to identify gaps to enable us to plan for a system that is flexible and smart matching local renewable energy generation with energy demand." Renewable energy deep dive: recommendations [HTML] | GOV.WALES

Wales has long been subject to the despoiling of its landscape and the removal of its natural assets to the profit of usually non-Welsh investors and "entrepreneurs". The legacy of this exploitation can be found in the scarred landscapes and scarred health of Wales and its people. This legacy should make us determined to resist further exploitation for the profit of others and more insistent that the benefits of renewable technologies should stay here. The question of how to build our infrastructure and make it more resilient to future demands should be for us to decide. Surely that's what devolution and local accountability should mean.

Whether that is through a national infrastructure plan with a Welsh Government owned energy company at its heart, or through local energy projects generating and distributing energy in local areas, or a combination of the two, is for us as a democratic nation to debate, decide and implement. Local energy projects have the potential to promote a very positive message about renewables, bring ownership and accountability to local people, generate funds for other community projects and bring down energy bills for members.

Criw Amgylchedd Llanymddyfri - Llandovery Climate

Action Group hasn't taken a position on the issue of the Bute Energy pylons in the Tywi Valley to date and there are differing views in the group. Some members are also members of the anti-pylons action groups in Llandovery, Llangadog and Llandeilo; advocating the burial of the cables for resilience to storm damage as well as aesthetic reasons. Others believe that the need for increasing renewable energy, strengthening the grid infrastructure and phasing out fossil fuels takes precedence over other considerations. We understand there are detrimental environmental impacts whatever choices are made, which have to be mitigated. As a climate action group we are committed to doing the least harm to the environment in pursuit of a climate responsible future. However, what we do agree on is that it is also an issue of who benefits from the energy and the earnings from generating and distributing the electricity. There is a shared lack of trust in the intentions and behaviour of the company(s) operating as Bute Energy. Devolution should mean a greater benefit in Wales from energy generated in Wales. What place is there for a foreign owned company, who will take the energy produced to benefit others outside Wales and the profits to benefit themselves, to dictate that our precious landscapes are altered irrevocably?

There is currently renegotiation in the relationship between the devolved administrations and Westminster, and between Wales and the rest of the UK. We saw that happening through Covid and on-going as Westminster attempts to prepare itself for a general election next year. That creates an opportunity for Wales to define itself in relation to the environment and climate action, building on the Well-being of Future Generations Act, One Planet Development and the climate emergency declaration.

So whether we want onshore wind turbines (the most cost effective renewable energy source) or other technologies; whether we want an above ground or buried strengthened grid network; how much local community energy generation and distribution we want should be something we debate and decide together knowing that we do so for the health and wellbeing of future generations in Wales. And that debate should be expressed in the National Clean Energy Plan for all to see.
