It was quite a day, which began in the morning when members of the group travelled to the ATP Cable Plough demonstration. The journey was spent listening to an excellent interview on Radio Cymru by Andrea Moore voicing the concerns of the community regarding the latest GreenGEN/Bute proposals. The ATP demonstration was amazing with everybody in disbelief that pylons are still being considered with this technology available locally to get the cables underground quickly and efficiently.

Then on to the consultation which was so well attended with over 600 people present throughout the afternoon to voice their concerns! This included the march from the school to the Castle Hotel where the next generation made their feelings known to Bute! The message was

clear, these cables need to be underground, and we are not going to stand by and allow our community to be ruined!



## NEWS FROM THE TOWN HALL

April has been a sad month for us as we said a final farewell to Cllr Ivor Jackson on the 8th. It was a well-attended funeral reflecting how much respect he was held in by this community and the county. A certificate was presented to his wife and daughter reflecting the council's gratitude for his 24 years of service.

Very sadly by the end of the week we heard that his daughter, Angela, had also passed away. Our thoughts and prayers go out to Mary and her family at this very, very sad time.

As a former rugby club committee member Ivor would have been delighted to hear the news that The Drovers won the Welsh cup for the third time, on Sunday 7th April, in the Principality Stadium in Cardiff. Congratulations to the players, coaches, backroom staff, physio team, and club officials. We hope May sees the culmination of another very successful year.

Many of you will have heard that there has been a successful bid put in to fund an all weather pitch at the club. This will be a fantastic facility, which can be used by all stud wearing games, rugby, football. With the weather we had had this passed season pitches have been so waterlogged throughout the town that training has been very difficult. This new facility will offer that freedom, while giving the other pitches recovery time. There are very few all weather pitches close by so it will also be an opportunity to bring other tournaments to the town, which is always good for the economy. Although the majority of the funding is in place it will be necessary to raise a further amount. An opportunity to purchase a piece of the new pitch for £20,

We were very pleased to see a good turnout at the Pylon consultation on the 10th. We held our postponed, public meeting on the 15th to ensure everyone, of the Town Council's firm commitment against the Pylons. This is such a beautiful area that we do not want spoilt by such invasive structures.

During the year there are many times when we need help to get events running or make our town ready for the visitors that we hope will join us. We are very lucky to have a few who give us that help, but we need more support. We would welcome expressions of interest from volunteers who would be willing to give us a few hours of their time as and when needed. Please let the Clerk or any councillors know, how you would be willing to help.

I hope by know everyone knows that we have a small but very interesting museum, at Y Gannwyll, the Heritage centre, in the town, but do you know that it is run by a very small group of volunteers. There are 5, volunteer, trusties who manage upkeep, funding etc. Relying totally on donations and the occasional small grant, we struggle to find the funds for the extras we need to improve the facilities. However what would be very welcome would be more volunteers to man the museum during opening hours. Presently it is open Tuesday to Saturday 11am to 2pm, from Easter to end of October half term. There are

usually 3 on duty at a time, taking it in turn to show the visitors the exhibits upstairs. It is good fun meeting visitors from across the world, and sharing with them the amazing history of Llandovery and the surrounding area. Please call in and have a look at what is there and see if you fancy joining the team, who are a very friendly bunch. More volunteers mean we could be open longer hours and more visitors will hopefully mean more donations.

History, rugby, sport in general may not be your thing, but I hope you all appreciate how lucky we are to be living in this town. As a newcomer, of nearly 50 years, I am constantly surprised at the how much is going on here. It's very easy to moan and groan about how little there is going on here, just get out there and look for yourselves you may be very surprised at what you find.

As I come to the end of my year as Mayor of Llandovery, may I thank you all for the warm welcome I have received and the support of my fellow councillors and clerk. Cllr Ella Peel decided earlier this year that she would have to step back from her roll as Deputy Mayor due to her other major commitments. She will remain on the council and continue to be an excellent one. It is my pleasure, therefore, to announce that my successor as Mayor for 2024-2025 will be Cllr Matthew Paul, I wish him all the best and know he will do an excellent job. His deputy will be Cllr Huw Thomas. It is wonderful to have new younger, enthusiastic councillors on board. There is a space for a new councillor so please let the Clerk know if you are interested.

Through Bwrlwm, I have had the opportunity to meet and get to know so many wonderful people and organizations that I felt it would be selfish to keep that all to myself. So, what better way to share, than by hosting an event to be held on Saturday, June 8th in Llandovery.

Yr Wythnos Werdd Fawr/The

Great Big Green Week (June 8th – 16th), through The Climate Coalition (Climate Cymru in Wales), is the UK's biggest ever celebration of community action to tackle climate change and protect nature. Communities come together to host their own unique events and become a part of a national movement towards positive climate action. Bwrlwm will be doing the same in Llandovery, showcasing not only our own work but that of environmental groups and community organisations in the town and surrounding area such as The Repair Café, Climate Action Llandovery and The Llandovery Youth and Community Centre for example.

Yr Wythnos Werdd Fawr/The Great Big Green Weeks theme this year is swapping, so if you have been thinking about moving to more sustainable choices, you will be able to meet with service providers and find out how you could do just that. We will also have workshops and demonstrations in repairing and upcycling for anyone who wants to learn more about reuse and repair. Full details will be available shortly so keep a lookout for information in the local noticeboards and on our social media.

# Padmasambhava Yoga & Meditation Centre

All at the Centre hope you are well, enjoying the sunnier days and are able to spend time amongst the emerging flowers and the scents and sounds these bring. Although the Summer term at Padmasambhava has begun, there may be room in some of the classes — so it's really not too late to join in. The Summer term has a good selection of classes at the Centre in Llandeilo as well as weekly classes at the Penybanc Welfare Hall in Ammanford, the Reading Room Cwrt Henri and a Chair Yoga class at the Llandeilo Bowling Club.

Monday's 'Daytime Yoga' (1.30 – 3.00pm) at the Centre is a progressive class which develops practices through the term, working with both dynamic movements and with time in stillness. Each class includes breathing practices as well as the deep relaxation of Yoga Nidra. This class is suitable for students who have perhaps practiced in the past and wish to renew their practice or others who may wish to deepen their practice. Gentle Yoga welcomes students to 'come as they are' and discover the benefits of a gentle weekly practice. The simple PMA anti-rheumatic series helps keep joints mobile and develop strength and awareness.

Wednesday's 'Restorative' is a class of gently exploring fluid movement and yoga postures – to bring about greater freedom of movement, flexibility and balance. The class has been described as both restful and grounding and the students appreciate this time of letting go and recharging.

Chair Yoga classes use the anti-rheumatic (PMA) movements from a sitting position on a chair, with the focus on keeping the joints mobile and muscles flexible, as well as learning relaxation techniques for daily life. No previous experience of yoga is needed. This Wednesday morning class is held in the Bowling Club Llandeilo and this friendly class gives a warm welcome to anyone wishing to try out or join the group.

The benefits of yoga resonate beyond the class and physical practices, bringing a calmer mind and body into daily life. Yoga introduces a greater awareness of the

breath and its importance to our good health. Bringing awareness into breathing opens the pathway to using the breath to bring about relaxation and balance and enhance energy – all adding to a sense of wellbeing and better health. Weekly practice of yoga allows the body to gently gain strength and flexibility and these qualities are often also reflected in the mind.

Classes at Padmasambhava are suitable for people of all ages and abilities, from Beginners through to more progressive, as well as Chair Yoga. Students often remark on the sense of well-being brought about by these classes which incorporate movement (asana), breath awareness and breathing practices (pranayama) and end with the deep relaxation of Yoga Nidra. The classes are progressive throughout the weeks and terms and are suited to the students within the class. Students coming to the Centre notice and value the sense of connection and community that coming together in class brings. NEW THIS YEAR is the Gwynfe Scarecrow Trail designed to keep the children busy while you choose your plants.


Armed with a map you can explore the nearby surroundings, discover the scarecrows and vote on your favourite or have a go at some art and craft activities.



# Denise Nicholson's Report of our meeting on 28th March

Guest Speaker: Huw Richards: Self-sufficiency in the garden and reframing permaculture.

Huw made a welcome return to the club to bring us up to date on his 7-acre garden near Aberystwyth. One of his passions is to help as many people as possible grow their own food in a sustainable way and so, last year, Huw, along with his friend and chef Sam Cooper decided to run an experiment to see whether they could grow enough fruit and vegetables to feed 2 people in one year in an average sized garden. The plan was to combine gardening expertise with cooking tips on getting the most out of the produce grown.

Back at their garden they portioned off an area about half the size of a tennis court. Their target was to grow 365kg of produce and to document their efforts in a new book entitled – "The Self-Sufficiency Garden: Feed Your Family and Save Money"

To achieve this aim Huw's priorities were meticulous planning, maintaining a healthy organic soil, succession planting and flexibility in the kitchen.

He began by drawing up a detailed month-by-month planting plan for more than 50 varieties of vegetables,



herbs, and fruit. He chose vegetables that are easy to grow, taste good and where possible, could offer more than one food source, such as onions, whose leaves can be eaten as an alternative to spring onions, and beetroot, whose leaves can be eaten in salads, as well using the root. The first seeds were sown on March 1 last year.

Within the plot they installed a polytunnel and made hotbeds. These enabled the early sowing of seeds, extending their growing season. Succession growing is crucial in smaller spaces, so as soon as one crop was harvested, he was ready with the seedlings of another crop to replace it.

By the end of the year, they had grown an impressive 600kg of produce, enough to feed a family of four. Huw's recommends growing field beans, rather than broad beans, they are easier to grow and produce more beans. He also gets good results with Asturian tree cabbage and white sprouting brocolli for over wintering crops.

Clearly, Huw is a dynamic and articulate young man and continues to produce 2-3 videos a week, whilst developing his garden near Aberystwyth.

#### READERS LETTER

After reading the No Pylon article in the Post, I am left feeling annoyed. I find the language very inflammatory and some of the facts incorrect.

Why shouldn't Bute energy make some profit? They are a business, after all, and what makes the author think the profits will be obscene? The energy to be transported is from a renewable source and this makes it actually very valuable. Has everyone forgotten that we are in the middle of a climate catastrophe, and unless we move quickly away from fossil fuel, we won't have any nature left to admire?

I understand that some few people have a bad reaction to pylons, but I have received notification from Bute, to attend a selection of meetings throughout the area and assurances from them that they want to meet people half way. I feel we should give them a chance to allay our fears.

It simply is not true that undergrounding cables is compulsory in Denmark. Like us, they have got to get the climate targets met and they are doing a bit of both, underground and pylons, which is the same as Bute proposes. Undergrounding is extremely expensive and this is an obvious reason not to use it more than necessary.

The argument that this energy will not benefit us in Wales, is also not a fair one. We are part of the UK and not an island. Most of our energy comes from England anyway. There's no reason to say we should not do what we can to provide clean energy. This is a time for thinking globally. It is an emergency!







# Kenjutsu comes to Carmarthenshire -The Art of Japanese Swordsmanship



The Japanese long sword (Katana) was said to be the soul of the Samurai, the warrior/ruling class of the Japan for nearly 1000 years. To talk of the Samurai, the sword has to be central, but to understand the Samurai comprehensively, we'd need a lifetime and a very extensive library. However, we can certainly look closer at the sword, philosophy and the training the Samurai undertook to become a proficient swordsman.

The Katana itself is a thing of beauty, every element of it is craftsman made using only the best materials. Silk, iron-wood, ray skin, bronze and of course hand forged steel, folded and hammered countless times, and then hand polished and ground to produce the ultimate cutting blade. Once all of these materials are brought together and the sword is in your hands, it genuinely feels alive, and you feel the need to handle it with the utmost respect.

Children of the Samurai class, would start their martial training from around 10 years old, with a wooden sword (Bokken) and by the time they were 16 years old they should be proficient in swordsmanship and unarmed combat (Jujitsu). But the study did not end there, many thousands of hours of training would be undertaken for the whole of the Samurai's life. An old Samurai proverb is "Train for 1000 days polish for 10,000 days". In the Edo period 1603-1868 over 400 schools (RYU) of swordsmanship existed, some of which still exist, the skills taught remaining virtually unchanged in over 400 years.

So, why learn Kenjutsu today? Stepping from the 21st century into a place of learning (Dojo), changing into traditional Japanese clothing and clearing our minds by way of a short meditation (Mokuso), helps us let go of all but the present moment. This allows us to learn this ancient skill, developing physical discipline, flexing muscles and increasing the heart rate. That's a good start.

Using either a Bokken or blunt steel training sword (Iai-



to) we start flexing our mind, by learning new patterns of movement (Kata) in sequential ways to understand how the sword moves as an extension of ourselves, our minds creating opponents in front of us, which we always cut down in the confrontation. As you progress, Kata with a training partner (Kumitachi) and Bokken, will give you a physical presence in front of you, as you practice set movements together in a deadly dance. Test cutting (Tameshigiri) will reveal to you, whether or not you are getting it right with live blades on static targets. Eventually you may wish to try free sparring (Gokaku Geiko) with bamboo and leather swords (Fukuro-shinai) to test your courage and technique safely with a training partner.

A progressive system of training is ready and waiting for you at the Koishi Ryu Dojo in Pumsaint Village Hall, which itself is a gem of local history, being over 120 years old. The Dojo is a place where Courage, Commitment, Discipline and Respect are core values to develop and maintain. There are skills to be learned, a different culture to explore and fun to be had.

# **RE-THINK**

# DON'T BREAK THE HEART OF WALES

Call to arms: RE-think rallies support for fight against industrial scale renewable energy plans.

Date: 26th March 2024

RE-think is going from strength to strength! We are a group of like-minded people who came together in March 2023 when the GreenGen Towy Usk Power line was first announced. Six months earlier its sister company Bute Energy had revealed plans to build a huge wind (and solar) energy park on Radnor Forest. As the combined effect of these plans sank in, we knew we had to act. So, what started as a way of coordinating and structuring a response to the plans quickly snowballed into a much larger effort.

It soon became clear how vital that larger effort was going to be. Recently the number of Bute's energy park proposals in the public domain reached 10 across Mid Wales and beyond. And there are more to come, from Bute and from other companies as well.

In Radnorshire, Bute alone hopes to build 70 turbines between 200-220 metres tall, towering above Builth Wells, Llandrindod Wells and Aberedw. In response we must all up our game by attending the consultation meetings en masse, and replying in droves to feedback requests from the developers. Writing to all the decision makers in the Senedd, local authorities and relevant public bodies is also essential. The more emails and letters they receive, the more notice they will have to take.

RE-think is not against renewable energy. The group supports small wind and solar projects built near to the communities using them and encourages the development of other forms of renewable technology. We question the intentions, locations and scale of these projects as well as the effect on people and nature. We are concerned about the carbon costs involved, particularly in construction, as well as the risks of relying on more intermittent, weather-dependant, electricity generation.

RE-think believes that developments such as "Nant Mithil Energy Park" in the Radnor Forest, "Bryn Gilwern EP" near Llandrindod Wells or "Aberedw EP" are unnecessary. Existing wind and solar schemes, plus floating offshore wind projects being planned in the Celtic Sea will provide all the power that Wales needs to meet the Welsh Government's renewable energy targets. Additional capacity will be used in England and elsewhere.

What's more when the wind stops blowing and the sun doesn't shine, the turbines won't turn and we will have to rely on expensive imports, some from non-renewable sources. Conversely, in some weather conditions energy companies are paid to shut down their turbines because too much energy is being produced and there is no means

of large-scale storage. Again, this will increase the cost for the consumer.

We are continuing to work hard to stop the industrialisation of Mid Wales and to provide our local communities with the facts about these developments. For example, the inefficiency of intermittent onshore renewable energy sources such as wind and solar, the environmental damage of turbine construction, the financial realities of these largescale schemes and why these projects are not beneficial to Wales.

We would welcome anyone who would like to support us. We are always looking for volunteers to help us make our voices heard loud and clear. Whatever your skills, we can put them to good use. We are also looking for local representatives who can keep communities informed. We intend to give regular updates and improve our communication with you all. Our first speaker was someone who broke all records in the mileage travelled to be with us. Thank goodness we weren't charged expenses for this one but Professor Simon Kemp had flown in from Mexico to be here. Derek introduced Simon. He is a Llandovery boy, his parents were from Cynghordy and he is a very keen sports enthusiast. Simon is a Professor of Astronomy at the University of Guadalajara, Mexico.

- Level 2 in Mexican National System of Researchers
- Gives classes in Spanish.
- Organising event for 90% eclipse of the Sun on 8th April
- President of the Academy of Optics and Astronomy
- Shared picture and gave description of Guadalajara, Mexico.
- Showed picture of Guadalajara in 1940 to show the contrast from then to now.
- Shared picture of event for the partial eclipse in 2023
- Shared picture of his home in the gated community that he lives in.
- Guadalajara is 1500 metres above sea level, which is higher than any point of the UK.
- Shared picture of him and his wife, Fei, at a Doctor Who convention.
- Discussed areas of research of the galaxies, including how observations of these galaxies are done using telescopes over a long period of time
- Shared image of galaxy from his first paper published in 1991
- Shared images of spiralled galaxies
- Shared images of discovery made of spiral arm made of stars distorted by gravity
- Discussed what they are working on now "Stephan's Quinet". Explaining that the closest galaxy in the image is approx. 40 million light years away, with the next one being 300 million light years away
- Talked about the difference between the different lights that pictures are taken in to get a comprehensive picture of galaxies.
- Talked about being able to take the temperature of dust in space.
- Cerrig Duon little circle of stones in the Towy Valley. The link between Astronomy and archaeology
- Y Pigwn Roman Camp-image showing rectangles
- Mynydd Bach Trecastell image
- Waun Mawn image
- Discussed the theory some of the blue stones from Waun Mawn and taken to Stone Henge.

Visited Stonehenge for the December solstice last year. A Q&A followed ......

- Q: Is there life out there? A: 25-30 years ago we weren't sure that other stars had planets. But now we have identified that almost every star has planets, which makes it probable that there is other life out there.
- Q: What is the age of the Earth? A: The Earth is about 4.5 billion years old.
- Q: Taking that into account how long have homosapiens been here? A: Less than a second if it was an hour.
- Q: Is Wales a big area for the ancient stones? A:
   Yes. Wales doesn't have the big stones that have become tourist attractions, but Wales has got a lot of archaeological sites.

- Q: If you can fly faster than the speed of light, you could fly to a far off star, come back, land on earth and see yourself coming back? - A: There are particles that are suspected to fly faster than the speed of light.
- Q: Is there such a thing as infinity? A: In physics, no.
- O: What are we confined to? A: One theory is that if you travelled in a straight line infinitely you would end up where you started.
- O: When did you start getting interested in astronomy with the limitations in the education system? - A: I started interest through the Apollo mission and Doctor Who and Star Trek. I did physics degree and went from there. In my teens I kept buying astronomy books from the book shop on Stone Street.
- Q: Do we know anymore now than the guys that used to navigate using stars? Would we be able to do it now without the technology? - A: Using the strategies that they used back then would still be effective now. The principles of navigation are still the same.

We had two tables at the Green Grove Barns Black Tie Evening in memory of Arwel Davies Ad-Clad in aid of Air Ambulance Wales. A fabulous evening spent in great company with Rotarians bidding furiously and even succeeding to purchase a few of the donated items. As a few did not return home on the bus it is unsure how they returned. Even they don't know!

Our second speaker of the month was Chris Evans who has lived in the area for 26 years and is part of the meditation retreat in Llansadwrn, near Carmel.

Again, many thanks to Rosie's minutes who I quote below ......

Chris trained as an independent funeral celebrant, qualified to facilitate funerals, memorials, and life celebrations.

- He offers residential retreats every year.
- Trained as a councillor in Ammanford.
- Trained in the field of supporting people through grief, looking at finding a more mature and a more humane way of welcoming death.
- The importance of normalising grief within the community.
- Quoted Dylan Thomas, "Do not go gently into the night, rage rage against the night"
- Death is something that we have this belief around that it is morbid and incredibly painful. It is marginalised, we often don't see the body.
- Facing the reality of death is facing the reality of change. Death is a part of life.
- Death happens in nature all the time, look at the trees and the flowers around us.
- If we didn't have death, where would we be? If we lived forever, we would soon get bored.
- Grief is a very individual process. You cannot fix grief, you are there with grief. You should honour grief instead of trying to fix it.
- We all experience grief, grief for our loved ones, grief for our planets, grief for the unmet parts of ourselves that we don't allow ourselves to be.
- We should have more places in society where people can be a part of grief, allow it to move through us, then move on, not dwell on grief.
- Currently having workshops in Brecon due to cocollaborator, who has lost three children and is an inspiration with how she had dealt with her grief.
- Current health care system sees death as the enemy, as something to be fought against. As a result, our healthcare system has become good at keeping us alive for longer but does not keep our quality of life. We are dying longer.
- The importance of having a will, to give clarity to family of ones wishes, what they want for themselves and for their possessions. Having a will can be a part of minimising the emotional burden on those that are grieving.
- When supporting those grieving, be with the person, don't try to fix, don't try to change, just be there, sit with them, be with them, allow them to be.
- Having an advanced decision in place, where you want to die, how you want to die, who you want with you, if you want to refuse treatment. Stating on this form if you are experiencing a terminal illness, dementia, stroke, etc. You can express if you don't want to receive CPR.
- A part of a panel in Llangadog in January, to change the law to enable Wales to make their own decision. To give people the right (within a certain criteria including terminal illness, sustained mental illness, dementia) to end their life with dignity without the need to get to Switzerland to end your life. This allows for a more mature and humane choice that people can make, giving people the option instead of having a slow and painful deterioration.
- A more compassionate approach to death.
- We can use death as a teacher, because if we can turn to face the reality of death in life, that enhances our experience in life, knowing that there is an end

- it shines a light on how we are living now- are we making the more of this opportunity of life?
- Living our life to the fullest becomes more meaningful when we acknowledge the presence of death.
- If someone is dying or grieving, don't go in with an agenda, don't try to fix. Go in as an empty vessel, go in and try to feel what that person actually needs.
- Chris shared a poem by Mary Oliver

Apologised if his talk has touched anyone here and caused them upset. Chris says that he feels that if we take on these views step by step, our society will become more empathetic and more compassionate.

Chris engages in regular sessions in Brecon as well as death café in Cwm Du, an opportunity for people to get together and normalise death.

Chris again emphasised that was vital that everyone gets their will in place.

Thanks were given to Chris for a most interesting talk. And again, thank you Rosie for the minutes.

Llandovery Rotarian Rosie'Boo McCartney was recently awarded the 'FREEDOM OF THE CITY OF LONDON'. Yes, really.

Rosie'Boo attended the Chamberlain's Court in the Guildhall in London to be given this magnificent honour. Rosie's grampa used to own a woollen mill and he was a Liveryman.

Rosie'Boo is currently a Freeman of the Worshipful Company of Weavers, the oldest livery in London. Becoming a Freeman of London will enable her to become a Liveryman of the Company.

On the very first day of spring, volunteers from Criw Amgylchedd Llanymddyfri / Climate Action Llandovery (CALl) did some essential care work to the trees of the community orchard. # CAN THEY RUN A BATH?



No doubt many people in this area attended the public consultation that the power transmission company Green Gen staged at The Castle Hotel on 10 April 2024. The purpose behind this second round of consultations was to allow Green Gen to communicate the changes made to its proposed pylon route after "carefully considering all feedback received in our first round".

As somebody involved with a protest group that opposes the unwarranted industrialization of rural Wales, I was particularly interested in attending this session to gauge the effectiveness of this novel feedback process.

At the Llandovery consultation meeting I talked with a Green Gen representative about the changes, and to start with, I asked if they could they confirm what the most cited complaint was from the first round. Without any further prompting they said, "Visual impact". Not a surprise to anybody, and they went on to say that almost every feedback entry cited visual impact and landscape damage as the primary issue.

Given that backdrop, I asked how they had responded to such an obvious public concern. They indicated that a section of the proposed route has been put underground. When asked what proportion of the route is now underground, they stated that 4% of the revised route is now likely to be buried. When I queried them about the credibility of such a paltry response to the most vociferous complaint, they fell back on the cost factor excuse. Burying cables is supposedly a lot more expensive than installing pylons, and that the project would be unlikely to proceed if they were required to bury the cables for most of the route. I asked why cost should be a factor given that infrastructure projects are typically assessed over a longer 10+ year plus timeframe. After all, even if the burying option cost 4 times more the pylon approach over a 10-plus-year timeframe this

differential is marginal. Green Gen were unwilling to respond to that viewpoint.

And there lies the rub. Somehow, the Welsh Government has turned infrastructure provision, normally a subject that requires a top-down strategic long-term view of investment, into a short-term profit opportunity for the free markets. Markets are by their very nature opportunistic, and in that context, you might excuse Green Gen for seeking to exploit this. The real fault lies with the Welsh Government.

This criticism is not without weighty reference. The UK Treasury publishes a document called the 'Green Book' that outlines standards, best practice, and good governance on infrastructure projects. Here is how the Green Book factors societal concerns into evaluating an infrastructure project:

- Focus on Public Value: The core principle is ensuring the project delivers social and economic benefits to the public.
- Cost-Benefit Analysis: The Green Book emphasizes a comprehensive cost-benefit analysis over the expected lifespan of the project (60 years for most infrastructure). This analysis considers both financial costs and wider social, economic, and environmental benefits
- Long-Term Impact: Good projects should provide positive impacts for a significant period, considering future economic and social needs.

In essence, the Green Book promotes a framework to assess if an infrastructure project offers a positive return on investment for society, not just financially but also in terms of social and environmental well-being.

Elsewhere social needs are much to the foreground. Take the furore over improving road links around the Stone Henge site in Wiltshire. The UK government has gone to extraordinary lengths to protect this site and avoid 'visual impact' by proposing the development of a two mile under pass for the main road that passes close by. Fortunately, Green Gen are not involved, otherwise you might have ended up with a vista like something shown below.

There is a practical reason why it is a bad idea for private businesses to run things like the police, army or own essential assets like utility infrastructure – there is a basic conflict between market forces and what economists call the provision of common or social goods. This is not an anti-capitalist rant, just a reminder



of the conditions where markets are appropriate and alternatively where top-down government direction provides is more effective and cost-efficient solution.

Wales is now in something of a pickle. The special 'fast track' planning process that the Labour Party pushed through has created a bottom up and fragmented approach to the delivery of new power infrastructure, where no outcomes are guaranteed. Given that each development is considered as an isolated project, you could in theory end up in a ridiculous situation where the transmission network project is approved, and the wind turbine projects turned down – or vice versa.

When you consider the actuality of the situation we have ended up with, then the public is entitled to ask whether the ministers involved have the executive competence and knowledge to oversee this level of strategic change. In simple terms – can they run a bath?

At Cadw Cambria we are calling on the Welsh political parties to place a moratorium on all new power generation development projects until such time that a proper top-down strategy is defined and mapped out for the Welsh public to review, understand and approve. With 2024 as an election year, we would like to see each Welsh political party be quite explicit over its power generation strategies.

In our view that strategy should cover:

- Resetting the power generation strategy around a realistic view of Welsh energy demand
- Mandating the burying of all power transmission routes.
- Prioritizing the scaling up of existing power plants and prioritizing the use of brown field and offshore power generation sites.
- Provide added protection to rural areas against unwarranted industrial developments.
- Provide realistic compensation packages for the rare situations where people's lives are overturned by the introduction of new infrastructure.

# APRIL 7 2024 CUP FINAL DROVERS WIN CUP WITH LATE SURGE

## LLANDOVERY 20 – MERTHYR 18

Hot favorites Llandovery duly won the Indigo Premiership Cup but had to draw on all of their reserves of energy and experience to scrape home against Merthyr at the Principality Stadium on Sunday.

It was their third WRU National cup win in 17 years following on from triumphs in 2007 and 2016 but for long periods, they failed to impose their game on a battling Merthyr side who so very nearly upset the odds.

Cheered on by what seemed half the population of the little market town, the West Walians stayed on course for an historic league and cup double having already qualified for the Premiership league play offs on May 4.

They only need two points from their remaining three games against Aberavon, Swansea and Bridgend to be sure of a home draw at the semi final stage.

It was a special moment, too, for Llandovery skipper Jack Jones who emulated his late grandfather, the great Welsh international lock Brian Thomas who was at the heart of Neath's defeat of Llanelli in the first ever final back in 1972.

"That one was for Brian and the family who have supported me through thick and thin over the years and to do it at Wales's national stadium, in the company of some outstanding players and friends made it a perfect day."

"But Merthyr took us all the way – as we fully expected – and we left it late to bring home the bacon."

"The game could have gone either way but we must re-focus on the league now and get ready for Aberavon on Saturday,"

"We'll have to up our game," admitted Jones

Coach Euros Evans paid tribute to the Merthyr effort. "Merthyr posed a significant challenge for us boasting a team filled with players of high quality, who have clinched multiple leagues and cups."

"The Ironmen made life difficult for us from first to last and we are just thankful that we had enough character to edge the tightest of contests."

Llandovery were knocked out of their stride from the very start, unable to dominate the breakdown or break the shackles of a hefty midfield defence in which centres Cole Swannak and Morgan Sieniawski were outstanding.

The Drovers fell into the trap of being over-ambitious in their offloading and errors crept into their game in the face of huge Merthy commitment.

They watched Llandovery's danger man and scrum half Lee Rees like a hawk and he could rarely find gaps to get behind the iron defence.

Merthyr were big in the contact area from the very start and nearly went ahead when fly half Josh Lewis hit the post with a 35 metre penalty.

With Llandovery frustrated from playing their usual all court game, it was no surprise when Swannak intercepted a loose Llandovery pass to speed away for the converted try and a 7-0 lead for the underdogs.

The Ironmen had a temporary set back when second row Craig Locke was yellow carded for a high tackle on lock Chris Long and within minutes a catch and drive line out ended with hooker Taylor Davies crashing through, fly half Ioan Hughes adding the conversion.

A Lewis penalty regained the lead before the unheralded Merthyr backs created the best try of the day, with swift passing and straight running creating the overlap for full back Morgan Meaclem to put wing Lloyd Rowlands racing in for a 15-7 lead.

Wing Kian Abraham all but got a try back before being forced into touch on the corner flag and Merthyr's interval lead was no more than they deserved.

Just after the break, Drovers full back Harri Doel made a slashing break only to run out of support and it was Llandovery's close range line out drive that brought them right back into the game, hooker Davies peeling off to plant the ball on the line for – remarkably - his 18th cup and league try of the season.

Hughes's touch line conversion brought his side to within a point and a terrific burst through the middle by No 8 Joe Powell set up a Hughes penalty and 17-15 lead for the West Walians.

Merthyr under lock Paddy McBride would not lie down and the pack set up a position for Lewis to kick a close range penalty to restore the lead.

The physicality of the Merthyr effort began to wane and the last ten minutes saw Llandovery speeding up their approach to find more holes in a tiring defence.

Hughes kicked an easy penalty to make it 20-18 before scrum half Lee Rees agonizingly knocked the ball on in the act of scoring.

It made no difference as a penalty against the gallant Ironmen allowed Hughes to tap and shunt he ball high into the stands, much to the relief of Jones and his men.

\*\*\* The Drovers go back to league action this Saturday with a visit to Aberavon. They will need to get a minimum four points if they have any chance of heading the table at the end of the regular season.




