What Are... Direct Cremations?

Simply put, they are cremations without a service and, more importantly, without any mourners in attendance. The person who has died is collected and kept in a mortuary until the day of the cremation when the coffin is taken to the crematorium without any mourners present.

However, there are, I would say, two distinct types... and an exception!

Direct Cremations and Plans through National Organisations

I'm sure you, will have seen, adverts on TV from companies such as Pure Cremation. They talk about how you can avoid 'being a burden' to your family.

What they don't tell you:

- You will probably be collected by van along with other people who have died.
- You will be transported to a warehouse style mortuary that is unlikely to be near home.
- You will not necessarily know where your person is.
- You are unlikely to be able to visit (view).
- You will not know when the cremation is taking place.
- The ashes will be delivered to the next of kin possibly, by post/courier without warning.

Direct Cremations and Plans with your Local Funeral Director

If you use a local firm, whilst there will still be no service at the crematorium, you will have far more control.

- The person will be collected by your FD in their vehicle and taken to their local mortuary.
- You will know where they are; you can arrange a visit.
- You will know when and where the cremation is taking place.

- It will be at a local crematorium to you.
- You will be able to be there to wave your person off as they are chauffeured away.
- You may even be able to be present at the crematorium although only outside meaning you can see them being respectfully taken in.
- Your local FD will hold the ashes until you are ready to collect.

The exception...Attended Direct Cremations

An Attended Direct Cremation is usually a simply, dignified 10-minute alternative to traditional funeral services. It is basically the committal part of a funeral service where a piece of music may be played, a few words of committal spoken and the curtains, closed.

Attendee numbers tend to be limited to close family.

And that's all fine...

My main comment on these is, if it's right for you, then it's right for you. BUT make sure your next of kin are aware of your choice and discuss, or give them permission, to do whatever else they need to begin processing the loss of you. EG: have a wake, a memorial, a scattering of ashes, a celebration of your life, a recognition of you impacts and acknowledgement of your absence.

Without the conversation, families often feel guilty doing anything, as you have chosen 'nothing' and then they're needs are not met, making processing their grief even harder.

LLANGADOG'S CHARITY RIVER DIP



On Sunday 21st December a group of twenty-two courageous souls from Llangadog, braved the icy cold water, in what has become an annual tradition, when they plunged into the river to swim a short distance for Parkinson's UK.

It was touch and go whether the dip would happen with all the flooding and awful weather leading up to it. Fortunately, on the day, the river was calmer, the flooding had subsided, and the rain stopped (briefly), though a biting wind remained making the temperature feel like 5o. All the participants reasoned their temporary discomfort was worth it, if it could help people whose lives have been touched by Parkinson's. Family and friends came to support and cheer on the river dippers.

For one participant, Sara Penson, it was particularly



poignant as she was doing it in memory of her father, who was in her heart and mind when she entered the cold water. In Sara's words, "My wonderful dad John Pilcher slipped away on 4th December 2023, a few days before his 81st birthday. He had been diagnosed with Parkinson's only 18 months earlier. Witnessing the rapid decline of my clever, dependable, active dad becoming confused, helpless and bed-ridden was devastating. Please help find a cure for this cruel disease and support Parkinson's UK."

Afterwards everyone warmed up with mulled wine & mince pies before heading to The Red Lion, Llangadog for celebratory drinks and a bowl of cawl, that was kindly donated by chef Romica Pavel. The singing of Christmas carols brought a festive atmosphere, and an impromptu auction added a boost to the fundraising. The total amount collected so far is over £1,400 and donations will continue to be accepted until March 2026.

Parkinson's is a progressive neurological condition. Around 166,000 people live with Parkinson's in the UK. Parkinson's is on the rise and in the UK today, someone is diagnosed every 20 minutes. By 2050, the number of people with Parkinson's worldwide will double to 25 million.

Parkinson's UK supports every Parkinson's journey, every step of the way. They campaign for better health and care, fund research into groundbreaking new treatments, and run life-changing support services. Currently they're running a Nurse Appeal, looking to raise £9 million pound over the next 3 years to fund additional health care professionals.

Padmasambhava Yoga and Meditation Centre

All at PadmaSamBhava hope that 2026 will be a happy, peaceful and fulfilling year for you and that your New Year is off to a good start.

The New Year is often a time to sow the seeds of intent for the year ahead and often brings with it new resolutions. If this year you plan to join a yoga class, the Centre has a New Beginners' starting Wednesday 28th January. This course covers the Foundation practices of the PMA series, as well as breath awareness and the deep relaxation practice of Yoga Nidra. The PMA series brings about flexibility and strength, which helps to ease both physical and mental tensions. This course provides a firm foundation upon which to begin to explore some classic postures or as a stand-alone course is a good introduction to practices with breath awareness.

Yoga Nidra comes at the end of each class and is a time of rest, which nourishes the body and spirit. Time is given in Yoga Nidra for the practice of sowing your seed of intent (a Sankalpa – or loosely defined, a resolution). With the body at rest, the 'Sankalpa' can gently galvanise the forces of the mind to follow your deeply held intention. Many have found that the practice of Yoga Nidra can softly help bring about desired changes.

Padmasambhava has a good range of classes to suit different levels of experience, fitness and flexibility. Classes are held in the Centre in Llandeilo as well as at the Penybanc Welfare Hall in Ammanford and the Reading Room at Cwrt Henri. Seated Yoga is held at the Llandeilo Lawn Bowling Club.

The classes taught by the Centre are Integral Yoga – a gentle and steady progression, always working with awareness of your body in the physical practices. Through the breath practices taught in class, practitioners experience the importance of breath to our good health. Weekly practice of yoga allows the body to gain strength and flexibility week by week and these qualities are often also reflected in the mind. Attending a yoga class is an excellent way to encourage our bodies to be more active whilst maintaining focus and poise in the mind.

Many students appreciate this quiet time each week and find they are developing useful tools for navigating the stresses of daily life. The benefits of yoga resonate beyond the class.

The dates and timetable for the Spring 2026 are now set. 




LLANDOVERY ARCHERY CLUB – COMING SOON!



Llandovery has many active sports clubs, and I hope to add an archery club over the summer months. The plan is to shoot Target on the sports field on summer evenings, and in a sports hall on winter evenings, with a tournament shoot on a weekend day in the summer. I hope there will be a junior club, plus a seniors section, and archery allows many people with disabilities to compete, from wheelchair users to blind people, so all will be welcome. The planned club has the support of the Sports Association.

Archery is possibly the most ancient sport of all - cave paintings show archers in action. Sadly many paintings show archers shooting at people as well as animals. We will not be shooting at either!

Archery includes many different facets;

- Clout archery – shooting at very long ranges (180 yards) it is descended from war shooting
- Roving – simply who can shoot nearest to say a tree stump, then you pick the next target object.
- Compound archery – using the engineered bows with cables and telescopic sights.
- Longbow archery – using traditional british longbows in target and clout shoots
- 'Make your own' – many archers aspire to make their own bows and arrows

As a sport it is accessible to all – and is good for posture, your back, shoulders, and is a very social event.



'TAILS' FROM THE TRUST..... EIGHT LIVES SAVED BEFORE CHRISTMAS

Just days before Christmas, we took part in a complex rescue involving several welfare organisations, which resulted in eight equines coming into our care. Following the death of their owner, six mules, a Shetland stallion and a pony mare, all completely unhandled, had been left roaming over 250 acres of exposed hillside with very little shelter during severe winter storms. In the lead-up to rescue day, we worked alongside The Donkey Sanctuary staff to closely monitor the group, ensuring their welfare remained stable while the necessary rescue logistics were put in place. Specialist penning was essential for the operation to be carried out safely. We are incredibly grateful to World Horse Welfare for lending additional pens, which, together with those supplied by the Mare and Foal Sanctuary, made it possible to contain and load the mules and ponies securely. Thanks to the combined efforts of Redwings, The Donkey Sanctuary, Mare and Foal Sanctuary, World Horse Welfare and our own team all eight equines were transported safely to Lluest Horse and Pony Trust at Beili Bedw Farm, Llangadog.

Once on site we wasted no time in naming them after our favourite Harry Potter characters: Harry, Ron, Hermione, Hedwig, Myrtle, Hagrid, Fleur and Dobby. Poor Hermione arrived with severely overgrown and twisted hooves and required a carefully planned first trim undertaken by our experienced farrier, Gareth Thomas. Although this was a positive first step, she will almost certainly need sedation for her next trim while we continue building a safe, trusting relationship with her.

Mules are the hybrid offspring of a male donkey (jack) and a female horse or pony (mare) and are almost always sterile due to the difference in chromosomes between the two species. They inherit the donkey's intelligence and strong self-preservation, along with the horse's strength and curiosity. As the saying goes: "Ask a horse, tell a donkey... negotiate with a mule." Although generally hardy, mules still require proper shelter and calm, consistent handling to feel safe and to thrive—both of which they had been without for some time. All eight are now quietly settled at Lluest and appear relieved to finally have shelter, ample hay, clean water, and calm, appropriate care.

Amongst the group are cheeky, confident Ron and bonded pair Dobby and Fleur who are currently living in a separate area from the other six new rescues. They clearly take confidence from one another and have settled in nicely together. Both are friendly, gentle souls, but cute little Dobby is the most people-oriented of the entire group. During our initial welfare checks, he went well out of his way to run over and say hello—and has continued to charm everyone since. Pretty pony Fleur is calm and confident in her own way. She's happy to accept a scratch on her withers and will step forward to take treats without hesitation. Because of their confidence and willingness to engage with people, we're hopeful these two will progress more quickly with training and rehabilitation, helping prepare them for future homes.

We are also delighted to be supported in this rehabilitative work by The Donkey Sanctuary's behaviour specialists Ben and Katana who will be helping us with assessments and individual training plans. They have already been on site to start work with Dobby and Fleur. Although friendly, both equines are unhandled, which means that even routine care such as hoof trims or being held for the farrier and vet can currently be stressful

for them. When trained correctly though, in ways they understand and appreciate, they work willingly. However, a negative experience, even an unintentional one can have a lasting impact, making future care and training more challenging. Their psychological wellbeing is just as important as their physical. This work is about building trust and confidence at their pace, so they're better prepared for the care they'll need throughout their lives

The arrival of the whole group has brought the number of equines in our care to 27, above our intended capacity but when welfare is at risk, especially during the winter months, turning animals away is simply not an option. We are immensely grateful to everyone in our support community who has already donated time, resources, and expertise to help us take in this very special group of equines. SOW THE WIND AND REAP THE WHIRLWIND

The little village of Kinlochleven nestles in a hollow, with the backdrop of the Highland Mountains. Although not as well-known as its near neighbour, Glencoe, Kinlochleven has a claim to fame. It was the first settlement in the whole of the United Kingdom to have electricity in every home. The then laird installed a hydroelectric system to supply electricity for the aluminium works in the village. The factory provided employment for the locals. The bonus was that the electricity produced was supplied free to each home. Until electricity was nationalised.

Closer to home, villages like Drefach Felindre in Carmarthenshire used waterwheels to supply energy for the power looms used for converting wool into cloth. The woollen industry provided employment for locals. Although it declined in the 1920s, waterwheels could still have functioned for other purposes if water hadn't been nationalised.

Water and electricity are no longer owned by the nation for the nation's benefit. They are privately owned, with shareholders and investors.

Today's political go-to is wind and solar power in rural areas. It doesn't even devolve from direct local benefit, but starts from foreign sources, who stand to reap the

dividends from establishing industrial scale windfarms, pylon lines and battery storage units. Understandably, those who would be most closely affected by these proposals (about 70 schemes in Wales at present) are, to say the least, very concerned.

So, the hustings organised by CPRW in Llandovery last November was very well-attended. Representatives of Plaid Cymru, Labour, Conservatives, Reform, Gwlad and the Heritage Party answered questions from the floor. I think it's fair to say that most of us in the audience were most impressed by Gwlad and the Heritage Party speakers and, in fact, they were the only two with manifestos prepared. Anyway, decisions about voting strategies in May are up to every individual.

But if you are concerned about the UK and Welsh Governments' plans for industrialising our beautiful countryside, please join us in the mass protest at the Senedd Wednesday 11th February from 12 noon. MUSEUM NOTES

Although Llandovery Museum is closed for a winter break, there is still much going on behind the scenes. Volunteers are busily engaged in various activities to ensure that visitors will have the best possible experience when *Y Gannwyll* reopens during Easter.

Meanwhile, we would like to share a few interesting snippets of local history with you.

BONAPARTE'S VISIT TO LLANDOVERY



Prince Louis Lucien Bonaparte
(1813-1891)

Forty years after the Battle of Waterloo, there was nervous anticipation in Llandovery when people lined the streets to greet Napoleon Bonaparte's nephew, Prince Louis Lucien Bonaparte. Although he bore the family name of the man who had once been the most hated and feared person in Europe, he was no warmonger.

He was on a tour of Wales to enhance his reputation as an expert on languages and

dialects by recording the various Welsh-language dialects. On his arrival in Llandovery on 28 September 1855, he was unable to resist the temptation of a bookseller's shop, where he bought a copy of the latest Welsh Grammar together with other books of Welsh interest. He also expressed interest in a stuffed white owl which was exhibited among the books.

The bird was immediately presented to him by the bookseller who informed him that it had once stood in the dining hall of the Gwynne family at Glanbrân, Cyngordy.

CYNGHORDY BRICKWORKS


The demolition of a 160-foot-high chimney on the outskirts of Cyngordy in 1978 marked the end of a long tradition of brickmaking in the area.

The bricks were loaded by women onto trolleys to be taken to the kilns because a woman was deemed to have a gentler touch than a man and was less liable to leave fingerprints on the bricks.

The twenty kilns were operational round the clock and workers would receive a bonus if they produced 95,000 bricks per week. They were used mainly to build sewers

and were also in great demand in steel plants where they could support the weight of massive cranes. About half of the production went to London. Even the largest lorries could only carry 6,000 Cyngordy bricks because of their weight (21 tons), but 12,000 lighter London bricks were loaded for distribution on the return journey.

A POSTCARD'S TALE



This postcard depicting a yeomanry camp on the banks of the River Brân at Llandovery in 1904, was taken by a local photographer, H.F. Dann. In the years prior to World War I, yeomen were a familiar sight in Llandovery. In between manoeuvres, many would travel on horseback to Twm Siôn Cati's cave in the hills above Rhadir-mwyn, where they used bayonets to carve their names in the rock.

When more than a thousand Glamorgan and Pembroke Yeomen and their horses, arrived in Llandovery by special trains at the end of May 1904, hundreds of people and Union Jack banners lined the streets to welcome them. A few banners were also waved by members of the Temperance Movement, who urged the soldiers not to frequent the town's numerous hosteries.


According to a report in the Carmarthen Journal, "The troopers looked very smart and fit in their attractive uniforms. Already we fancy they have found a warm spot in the hearts of eligible ladies."

THE LURE OF LLYN-Y-FAN FACH FOR A LEADING POET

Edward Thomas (1878-1917), now considered to be one of the most important poets of his generation, was irrepressibly charmed by the Black Mountain and its environs. One of his favourite haunts was Llyn-y-fan Fach, "the lonely, deep gentle lake", where, in his mind's eye the beautiful lady still emerged from the chilly waters.

Recounting one visit in high summer, he wrote: "And even as I walked, the whole of time was but a quiet, sculptured corridor, without a voice, except when the tall grasses bowed and powdered the nettles with seed at my feet ... Then, after some miles up a hot and silent hill, I came to the lake under the chin of a high summit, and it was cool."

Although he was born in London, Thomas's parents were Welsh. He gave his own children Welsh names and sang Welsh songs to them.

DUGOEYD Y DD AND ONE OF BRITAIN'S RICHEST MEN

If ever you visit Reading University and climb to the fifth floor of the main library, you will see a room containing over 10,000 books which were once owned by a man who had family connections with Blaenau Tywi.

Although Samuel Jones Loyd (Baron Overstone, 1796 – 1883), is largely forgotten nowadays, he was one of the richest and most influential men of the 19th century. His advice was constantly sought by the Cabinet and the Bank of England, of which he was a director for over 50 years.

He was also an avid book collector; his valuable collection was presented to Reading University by his daughter, Lady Wantage, in 1920. Although born in London, his forefathers were Carmarthenshire farmers. The earliest known forebear was Thomas Lloyd of Dugoedyd, Cil-y-cwm, who died aged 83 and was buried at Cil-y-cwm in March 1735.

OUR OWN BREED OF SHEEP

Did you know that Blaenau Tywi can boast its own breed of sheep? Known as 'Balwen', the animals were once confined to the catchment area of the river Tywi north of Rhadir-mwyn. In recent years, however, the breed has become extremely popular and flocks are to be found in several parts of Britain. The Balwen Welsh Mountain Sheep Society was formed on 21 February 1985 at the Glanbrân Arms, Cyngfordy.

TEETH GUARANTEED

Many years ago, a preacher in Blaenau Tywi warned his congregation that there would be weeping, wailing and gnashing of teeth among the wicked when they passed on to the next world.

After the service, he was approached by an old farmer who enquired: "What about those of us who haven't any teeth?"


"Teeth will be provided," was the immediate reply.

ROYAL WELSH WINTER FAIR CELEBRATES EXCELLENCE IN FOOD AND FARMING

Thousands of visitors flocked to the Royal Welsh Winter Fair for two days of celebration, competition and festive atmosphere. The annual event was held at the showground in Llanelwedd, Builth Wells on Monday 24th and Tuesday 25th November.

First staged in 1990 and originally just a modest one-day event, the Winter Fair has become one of the most popular attractions in the British agricultural calendar. The Fair continues to maintain its position as one of the finest prime stock shows in the UK, this year attracting nearly 700 exhibitors from across the UK.

The 2025 Winter Fair was officially opened by father and son duo, Ieuan and Sion Edwards of the esteemed Edwards of Conwy butchery family on Monday morning. A fitting choice within this year's educational theme of 'Our Food / Ein Bwyd'.

In his opening speech, master butcher Ieuan Edwards welcomed visitors and reflected on the Winter Fair's importance in the industry. Speaking candidly about the challenges and opportunities facing food production, he highlighted the crucial role of farmers in feeding a growing global population. He noted the pressures facing the industry but also its remarkable resilience, emphasising the importance of creating an environment where farmers can produce high-quality, sustainable and affordable food.

Ieuan also shared how deeply the Royal Welsh has shaped his professional and personal journey, recalling highlights such as winning the Sir Bryner Jones Award in 2013 and decades of involvement at the Fair.

Ieuan's son, Sion Edwards continued the address with an optimistic view of the industry's future. He also acknowledged the changing landscape of food production, emphasising the importance of ensuring the next generation can thrive.

"To meet the challenges ahead, our industry must be economically viable and function in an efficient and sustainable manner. The future will look different, but the importance of what we do remains the same," said Sion.

Reflecting on the joy that food can bring and the pleasure it provides around the table, Sion quoted the writer and Harvard University professor, Michael Pollan:

"Food is not just fuel. Food is about family, food is about community, food is about identity. And we nourish all those things when we eat well."

During the official opening, the ceremony also celebrated notable achievements within the agricultural community. Susan Jones, Honorary Assistant Director for Publicity, Press and Awards, announced the winners of several prestigious awards, presented by John Owen, the 2025 President for Caernarfonshire:

John Gittins Memorial Award 2025 – Kevin Parry, Brecknock.

Oxford Farming Conference Bursary 2026 – Eiry Williams, Ceredigion.

RWAS Nuffield Farming Scholarship 2025 – Tudor Roderick NSch, Brecknock.

The inaugural Dai Jones Llanilar Memorial Award was presented to Elen Gwen Williams from Anglesey. Elen is the first person to receive this special award and will now have the exciting opportunity to develop an original idea for broadcast on S4C.

Education and policy

Education once again played a central role at this year's Fair, with over 2,000 schoolchildren and students attending across the two days, making the most of free entry for organised primary and secondary school visits, along with reduced rates for further and higher education groups.

This year's educational theme, Ein Bwyd / Our Food, provided a dynamic learning experience. Year 6 workshops delivered by food wholesaler Castell Howell, broadcaster Myfanwy Alexander, and The Big Science Project helped deepen pupils' understanding of where their food comes from and how it is produced, with live cooking demonstrations and interactive sessions bringing the message to life.

Rhys Jones, founder of Cattle Strength Gym in Lampeter, presented certificates to participating schools and spoke about the importance of healthy eating and exercising. A former rugby professional, Rhys established his farm-based gym in 2015 following a family loss and has since combined his passion for fitness and farming to raise awareness of mental health in agriculture.

The two-day event is an important platform for policy discussion and debate, with Ministers from both the Welsh and UK Governments in attendance, together with representatives from the German and Irish Embassies, helping to put the event on the international map.

The Society is proud that the Winter Fair has once again played a role in facilitating discussions between highly influential individuals and organisations that affect the future of Welsh agriculture and the rural economy. This included events such as Hybu Cig Cymru (HCC) breakfast featuring an address by Deputy First Minister and Cabinet Secretary for Climate Change and Rural Affairs, Huw Irranca-Davies MS.

Livestock and Equine

Livestock competitions remained at the heart of the event, with excellent support from exhibitors. There were record numbers in the pig section, the second-highest number of lamb carcass entries, and sheep classes at full capacity.

The Supreme Cattle Champion - one of the most prestigious accolades of the Winter Fair - was awarded to 'Glangdwen Velvet', a Pedigree Limousin heifer weighing 598kg, bred by CL & FE Jerman and exhibited by Edwards Brothers of Denbighshire. The impressive animal sold for a whopping £27,000 at Tuesday's auction, setting a new record price for the event.

The Sheep Supreme Champion went to a superb pair of Dutch Texel lambs, both bred and exhibited by Tirion Griffiths of Corwen, Denbighshire.

The Pig Supreme Champion (Single) title was awarded to a Welsh x Pietrain bacon pig exhibited by Teulu Jenkins of Newcastle Emlyn, Ceredigion. In the pairs

section, the Pig Supreme Champion Pair was claimed by Mark Horsley from East Yorkshire with his outstanding Pietrain-cross bacon pigs.

The Supreme Horse Champion title was awarded to 'Llanmorlais Buster', a Section D yearling colt exhibited by Mark Swistun of Swansea. The Welsh Horse Champion went to another impressive yearling colt, this time a Section B exhibited by Josh Hampson of West Yorkshire and owned by Alison Wright.

Building on the hugely popular Heavy Horse Village first introduced by Caernarfon's Ambassador Rhys Griffith at the 2025 Royal Welsh Show, a dedicated area in the Farriery Pavilion showcased magnificent Heavy Horses alongside the nearby Hound Show, with visitors enjoying live farriery demonstrations and displays.

Festivities and shopping

Elsewhere on the showground, the winner of the Best Overall Tradestand Award went to Shearwell Data based in the Livestock Building, for their engaging and informative stand.

This year saw over 370 tradestands, along with more than 80 additional stands in the Food Hall and street food area, where guests were able to sample a wide range of produce from across Wales. The Best Food Hall Tradestand went to Mountainview Ice Cream of Carmarthenshire, recognised for its premium artisan ice cream made using locally sourced dairy and rich flavours.

After the success of last year's Winter Fair, the Gwedd | Feast Welsh food and drink village offered a vibrant mix of live entertainment and delicious Welsh street food. Performances included the Welsh Whisperer, Parti Camddwr and 50 Shêds o Santa Clos, as well as local schools and choirs.

The popular late-night shopping on Monday evening also returned, drawing thousands who enjoyed the festive atmosphere, Christmas shopping and a spectacular firework display set to music.

The success of the event is owed not only to the hard working and determined committee, but also to the loyalty of the exhibitors, traders, volunteers, and stewards. Our events would not take place without the support of our sponsors, and we thank our headline sponsors, Welsh Government, HSBC and Dunbia, along with all the sponsors for helping to support the Winter Fair.

Honorary Winter Fair Director, William Hanks was delighted with the success of the event:

"We've been thrilled to welcome such high visitor numbers to this year's Winter Fair, which once again delivered a wonderful festive atmosphere across the whole showground. From exceptional live music and outstanding food and drink to the superb standard of entries across all sections, the event truly showcased the very best of Welsh agriculture and rural life."

We are deeply grateful for the hard work and dedication of our volunteers, stewards, traders, sponsors and, of course, the visitors who make this event possible. The Society is immensely proud of what has been achieved this year, and we are committed to building on this success to make next year's Winter Fair even better."




