Hardware Update

Many Amateurs monitor different radio frequencies. We listen to the Amateur radio nets, Shortwave programs, and commercial broadcasts. Sometimes we would like to record these activities for information or later reference. The problem is that normal cassette recorders only allow for a maximum of 1 hour per side recording with a C-120 cassette tape. Some companies offer special long play recorders for this purpose. These special recorders cost from \$159 to \$350 dollars. They sure look nice but it's a lot of money. This month's project makes a long play recorder from a surplus portable cassette recorder. The recorderI modified was a old Radio Shack CCR-81 computer cassette recorder. These cost \$ 20.00 to \$35.00 new, and used go for as low as \$ 5.00. Opening up the unit revealed a small D.C. motor for moving the tape. The speed at which the tape is run will determine how long it will last. On a C-120 cassette at 1 7/8 inches per second (standard cassette speed) you get 1 hour per side. By adding 2 diodes in series with the motor the voltage the motor received was lowered and tests show the speed was cut in half giving 2 hours per side recording time. By then adjusting the speed control resistor on the small motor control P.C. board I was able to get stable operation and slow the tape down even more to give more than 3 hours recording time per side on a standard C-120 tape. This is similar to the record times for the \$ 150 units. The modification makes it possible to record nets and commercial broadcasts without using lots of tapes and allows much longer recording times without having to change tapes. This modified recorder with good results and it makes a nice addition to the radio shack . I will have the LONG PLAY RECORDER at the meeting to show and answer questions on for those who wish to do their own units. SEE YOU AT THE MEETINGJames, KB4LJV

Packet Update

Many of us have had our Packet systems up and running for while. The average packet station consists of a lot of equipment. The computer with case, keyboard, and monitor, the TNC, Radio, Antenna and all connecting cables. Now is a good time to organize and clean up the shack to avoid problems with your Packet station. Use a mild detergent to clean all surfaces. Check cables to make sure they are not frayed or crimped behind the desk. Check all connectors to make sure that they are in good shape and plugged in all the way. Make sure cables are properly routed. Clean off the case of the TNC so it can get rid of heat it generates while running. Don't forget to check that TNC battery that stores setup parameters. Check the SWR's of the Antenna system to make sure it is operating properly. With a little work now you can keep your Packet Station up and running and avoid problems. James Butler KB4LJV

Education Plans 1997

This coming year will see a shift in emphasis for Delta Club's educational goals. There is no doubt that additional Novice/Technician level classes are needed to recruit into the ranks of amateur radio, and these level classes will continue to be offered at least two to three times during the year.

However, the success of our Club's education program over the past few years points out a need to get along with several upgrade classes as well, and this is the major goal for the coming months. At least one General class upgrade program and al least one Advanced class upgrade program will be in the offering if there is sufficient interest from the Club's membership. The caveat here is that the General class requires 13 wpm Morse code speed, so that a cw class has to be part of the offering. Plans are being made now to conduct both the 5wpm and a 13wpm class in the near future.

A word about cw. IT IS POSSIBLE! What it takes is a lot of practice. Accordingly, there have been several ideas expressed so that you can get the kind of practice you need, on the air, at a comfortable speed, and in a "forgiving" environment. There are several "CW Buddy" relationships developing where one experienced "Elmer" works with the "aspiring young ham." If this route appeals to you, please contact me and I will seek out an "Elmer" for you.

Other cw options may very well amount to placing your tone oscillator next to the mike on your VHF or UHF rig and tapping out the code through the repeater in a slow cw net. Also, KE4TLY/AA reports an active cw meeting several times after the Traffic and Information Net at 28.200 MHz.***speed adjusted to accommodate. As you can see, there are several options.

Now, the fly in the ointment is this...I can not do this alone. I need volunteer instructors to assist with all levels of class offerings. I do have commitments from two recently advanced (is that redundant?) class operators to teach the General level class, but the Novice/Tech classes and the Advanced class are instructor-less at this time. If you have thought about teaching, but never made the leap there are some opportunities in which we will train the trainer to teach the material. Additionally, the ARRL has extensive material available as training aids. If you are interested in becoming an ARRL certified instructor, please see me.

Speaking of training material, I am requesting of the Board an allotment to purchase several training items to be placed in our inventory, notably some of the video instruction tapes put out by the ARRL/King schools, thus making them available (with a security deposit) for checkout by the membership.

This will be a good year, educationally speaking. I am looking forward to it. For now, 73 es cu in class.

Jill authored children books, and a text book "How To Care for Patients With Traumatic Brain Injuries", that is still used in classrooms at this time. Upon getting her ham license, Jill became very involved with Packet from her bed. Thanks to her husband Gus, KF4FPT, Jill sent out a few messages on packet and before you knew it she was making friends all around the world. Gus tells me that ham radio had become a very big part of her life since getting her ticket. Gus is still getting messages from hams all over the world. Gus told me that one ham from Switzerland sent flowers to Jill's funeral. Through her years Jill had impacted many peoples lives, and because of ham radio she had impacted many people throughout the world these last few months. Ham radio made a very lasting impression on Jill and we will all miss her dearly.
