The tower trailer has been outfitted with flood lights at the top of the bottom section. We have also acquired a tri-band HF beam and rotator for use with the tower but we didn't have a rotor plate that was large enough to fit the tower, so a new rotor plate had to be made from scratch. My thanks to Robert Greene, KE4HFH for his assistance in mounting the lights and for "manufacturing" a new rotor plate.

AMATEUR HARDWARE UPDATE

One of the biggest problems we have with our Amateur Radio equipment is keeping it clean. Getting in all those small places where dust and dirt hide can be hard. This month's project is the VACUUM CLEANER ADAPTER. It will allow you to hook up your full size vacuum to a small flexible hose to get into those small places. The adapter can be built out of wood, metal or plastic. I built mine up from a piece of scrap plastic. The adapter reduces the diameter of the vacuum hose to a small piece of flexible hose for cleaning. The small plastic hose is available at hardware stores. The unit works well and has lots of suction from the full sized vacuum it is hooked to. This adapter will let you keep your equipment clean and operating properly. I will have the VACUUM CLEANER ADAPTER at the meeting for those who wish to build up their own units.

AMATEUR PACKET UPDATE......

TNC manufacturers are constantly adding features to their Packet controllers and improving them. One of the newest units is the new KPC-3 PLUS from Kantronics. The original KPC-3 has been out a while. One of it's nicest features has been the power drain of only 30 MA. This allowed the TNC to run on a single 9 volt battery. The newest version has added some additional features. The TNC adds two analog voltage inputs. This allows monitoring of temperature, wind speed, light levels, etc... by connecting the proper sensor to the unit. This information can be sent out via Packet Radio. Two digital control line outputs from the new Kantronics TNC allow you to remotely turn on your lights or coffee pot via packet from a remote location. The unit has additional commands for APRS repeater and telemetry beacon operations. If you are looking for a new TNC for APRS or telemetry work check this new one from Kantronics.
