PROCEDURE FOR ORDERING TENNESSEE AMATEUR AUTO LICENSE PLATES

Here is the procedure for ordering Tennessee amateur auto license plates. Note that you can order a plate whether or not your are emergency, rescue squad, or ARES member, but if you are not a member, it will cost an extra \$25.

I assume the application is the Application for Tennessee Personalized License Plates embedded in the IMPORTANT-PLEASE NOTE area of the License Plates section.

I also assume that if you are an ARES member, you do not have to submit payment until you pick up your plate at the County Court Clerk's office downtown which is included in the total fee (\$106 for City of Memphis residents).

I believe the plate will be the new design of the personalized plate; not the embossed plate as shown on the website.

TOOTHACHES, EXTRATERRESTRIALS TOPICS IN HAM RADIO CHATS WITH ISS CREW MEMBERS

Toothaches in space and the possibility of intelligent life on other planets were among the topics piquing the curiosity of students in Germany and Canada when they spoke via ham radio with the ISS. The Amateur Radio

on the International Space Station (ARISS) program arranged the back-to-back contacts on November 20. During what may have been the first-ever ARISS school contact in German, youngsters gathered at the Museum for Industry in Mannheim, Germany, to speak with European Space Agency astronaut Thomas Reiter, DF4TR. One wanted to know what would happen if he or one of the other ISS crew members developed a toothache.

"Thank goodness, not yet," Reiter said. "Of course, in preparation for flight, we get an extens ive medical examination and that includes a close look at the teeth, precisely for the purpose of making sure that [a toothache] doesn't happen. If it happens anyway, there are painkillers and medical support onboard to treat the tooth and bring relief."

The museum, home to the "Adventure Space Travel" exhibit, played host to some 200 participants, ranging from 12 to 20. Southwest Germany Radio's daily youth-oriented program "Das Ding" (The Thing) conducted the event and selected the 16 questions asked from among those listeners proposed. Since there were no ISS passes over Europe, Tony Hutchison, VK5ZAI, served as the ARISS ground station for the event, and Verizon Conferencing provided two-way audio to the participants. ARISS Europe Chairman Gaston Bertels, ON4WF, assisted on site.

Reiter also explained that the crew has little free time. "Leisure time is a foreign concept up here," he quipped. He described the effects of weightlessness on the muscles as "the biggest problem that we have to fight here" through vigorous exercise. He said he exercises an hour in the morning and an hour in the afternoon to stay fit, "and when we come back to Earth it will be easier to re-accommodate to gravity." Reiter will return to Earth this month.

A short time later, ISS Expedition 14 Commander Mike Lopez-Alegria, KE5GTK, fired up NA1SS to speak directly on VHF with high schoolers at Centre Hastings Secondary School in Madoc, Ontario, Canada, via ground station VE3UR. Responding to one student's question, Lopez-Alegria described commercialized space travel as "the wave of the future."

"I'm not sure that I'd call it 'routine' just yet, but I think that probably in the not-too-distant future we will start to see it develop like the airline industry did about 100 years ago or so."

Lopez-Alegria said that while he doesn't believe there's intelligent life on Mars, he's convinced it exists elsewhere. "The universe is too large for us to be the only one with intelligent life," he suggested.

The 10 high schoolers managed to fit in nearly two dozen questions before the contact concluded. "I wish you all the best," Lopez-Alegria said as he signed off. The

Ottawa ARISS team provided radio equipment for the contact and gave a presentation to the students before the QSO. Radio and newspaper reporters covered the event as an audience of 800 looked on.

FCC REVOKES AMATEUR RADIO LICENSE OF CONVICTED FELON

The FCC has ordered that David Edward Cox, W5OER, of Pride, Louisiana, be stripped of his Technician class Amateur Radio license. In October 2005, the FCC sent Cox an Order to Show Cause to initiate a hearing proceeding to determine if Cox, who's serving time on several felony convictions, possessed the requisite character to remain an FCC licensee or should face license revocation. The FCC says Cox failed to respond to the show-cause order. A Commission administrative law judge subsequently concluded that Cox had waived his right to a hearing, terminated the proceeding and released an Order of Revocation December 4 http://hraunfoss.fcc. gov/edocs public/attachmatch/DA-06-2463A1.pdf>. The revocation order is effective 40 days after that date, unless Cox appeals. A few years ago, the FCC began applying its so-called "1990 Character Order," initially intended to apply to Broadcast Service licensees. to Amateur Radio licensees and

applicants.

"The Commission's character policies provide that any felony conviction is a matter predictive of licensee behavior and is directly relevant to the functioning of the Commission's regulatory mission," the FCC revocation order said. "The serious convictions described above mandate the conclusion that Mr. Cox does not possess the requisite qualifications to be or remain a Commission licensee."

An Amateur Radio licensee since 1995. Cox has a clean record in terms of obeying FCC rules and regulations, the Commission said. The revocation order recounts that a Louisiana court in January 2004 convicted Cox on two counts of simple burglary, a felony, and sentenced him to five years in prison. The judge suspended the sentence, however, and placed Cox on supervised probation instead. He was arrested on federal firearms charges in September 2004 and has been incarcerated ever since, the FCC Order said. Following a plea agreement, a US District Court judge sentenced Cox to concurrent terms of 41 months for felony firearms-related violations. The court also ordered him to pay \$3000 in restitution to a firearms dealer and shooting range.

"We find that such egregious criminal misconduct justifies a finding that Mr. Cox will obey the law only when it suits him," the FCC Order said. "Mr. Cox's record as an amateur licensee and his

assertions regarding his character and his crimes are insufficient to overcome the impact of the crimes. Thus, we find that Mr. Cox does not possess the character qualifications required by this Commission to be or remain a licensee." The FCC order noted that in September 2004, Cox had written James W. Shook of the FCC Enforcement Bureau's Investigations and Hearing Division.

In footnotes, the Commission cited several cases in which it has applied its character standards to Amateur Radio licensees. Two of the cases involved radio-related violations, while one stemmed from a felony conviction for indecent assault upon and corruption of minors and another from a felony conviction for computer fraud and lack of candor regarding that conviction in representations to the FCC.

AMATEUR RADIO EXAM QUESTION POOLS ALTERED TO AGREE WITH NEW RULES

With numerous new FCC Part 97 rules soon going into effect, the National Conference of Volunteer Examiner Coordinators' (NCVEC) Question Pool Committee (QPC) has dropped two dozen questions from the three Amateur Radio examination question pools. The deletions will bring ham radio license exams offered starting December 15 into line with rule changes spelled out in the recent FCC "omnibus" Report and Order (R&O) in WT Docket 04-140. ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM, says ARRL

VEC-sponsored examination sessions will go forward without interruption.

"ARRL VEC will not be replacing any of our exam booklets affected by the WT 04-140 rule changes," Somma said. "We will, instead, be using stickers to substitute alternate questions. The stickers will contain valid questions to place in the exam booklets to cover up the deleted questions." The stickers will go out by December 15 to ARRL VEC volunteer examiner teams that have been formally field stocked.

The QPC cut just one question from the Technician question pool, 13 from the General pool and 10 from the Amateur Extra pool. Changes in rules governing frequency privileges and external RF power amplifier standards accounted for the lion's share of the questions cut from the General and Amateur Extra pools.

The table below includes all questions eliminated from the current question pools as a result of changes dictated by the "omnibus" R&O. In a letter earlier this month to all ARRL VEC teams, Somma pointed out that even after the deletions, "sufficient questions will remain in the applicable pools to meet the mandated '10-times' rule, so no new questions are being added to existing pools." The "10times" rule requires question pools to include 10 times the number of questions on a given examination for that license class.

Somma says that while questions G1D01 and E1F04 remain largely correct, they're being removed at this time because they do not meet current standards for the degree of completeness or accuracy the QPC desires of exam questions.

MASSACHUSETTS ARES/ RACES TEAMS MUSTER FOLLOWING DEVASTATING FACTORY BLAST

Eastern Massachusetts ARES and RACES teams went on alert November 22 after an earlymorning explosion destroyed a paint and ink plant in Danvers, located on Massachusetts' North Shore some 15 miles north of Boston. The blast, felt as far away as Southern Maine, destroyed more than a dozen nearby homes and damaged upward of 100 others. Minutes after the 2:45 AM explosion at the building occupied by CAI Inc and Arnel Company, North Shore ARES members initiated an informal net on a Danvers repeater while monitoring the situation. The blast awakened North Shore ARES Emergency Coordinator Jim Palmer, KB1KQW, who lives about a mile from the plant site.

"As soon as I heard the explosion, I followed our well-established ARES protocols by getting on my local SKYWARN/ARES frequency and starting an informal net," Palmer said. "I also monitored my scanner to hear information directly from the incident area."

Palmer also notified North Shore ARES District Emergency Coordinator Eric Horwitz, KA1NCF, and Eastern Massachusetts ARES Section Emergency Coordinator Rob Macedo, KD1CY.

Macedo said, "It is very important to maintain a high state of readiness and to react and start a net, but at the same time, we do not self-deploy to any serious incident."

North Shore ARES Assistant Emergency Coordinator for Operations Gordon Gravelese, KX1KTY, assisted with net control duties during the informal ARES net. Also checking in was Region One RACES Radio Officer Terry Stader, KASSCP. He informed Palmer that at that point there had been no calls for RACES assistance.

Macedo, meanwhile, got in touch with Massachusetts Bay Red Cross, which opened a shelter at Danvers High School to accommodate some 100 to 150 displaced residents. He said Red Cross had necessary communication with the shelter, but he noted that radio amateurs were ready to provide communication support for the Red Cross or other agencies.

"We continued the informal net until 6 PM and secured," Macedo told ARRL this week. "No deployments were required, but we were ready to deploy if needed. We had over 40 check-ins to the informal net and between 6 and 12 amateurs ready for deployment."

Authorities have yet to determine the cause of the explosion but have ruled out criminal activity. An Environmental Protection Agency team will begin cleaning up the chemical-laden debris.

PACKET UPDATE

Many times when we want to run QRP we like to build up our own equipment. We can buy inexpensive kits from a variety of manufacturers. One company that has some really nice kits is Hendricks QRP kits. He offers a new Software defined radio for only \$60.00. This is offered in a 20 meter or 30 meter CW only radio that hooks up to your sound card on your computer. A frequency spectrum is displayed on your computer screen similar to PSK31 so you can see where the CW signals are in the passband of the radio. The better your sound card, the better the performance of the radio on receive. He also offers a small QRP transceiver that does not require a computer called the DC40. Accessory kits such as a SWR monitor are also sold in kit form. If you are thinking about a low price kit for QRP work check out Hendricks QRP. His web address is http://www.qrpkits.com/

AMATEUR HARDWARE UPDATE

Many of us use a variety of Morse code keys and paddles for Morse code. One thing they all have in common is they are just switches that are opened and closed by hand motions. In order for these keys and paddles to work properly the contacts have to be clean and we must have good electrical connections to these contacts that open and close and go back to our radio or keyer circuit. Since straight keys and paddles have different designs, the electrical connections to the contacts sometimes have to travel through bearings and or pivot points to get to the contact. On some keys this seems to be good enough and actually works pretty well. On some keys though we can have intermittent connections on the key or paddle, which makes sending good code almost impossible. One fix for this problem is to actually run flexible jumper wire across the pivot points and connect to each side to make a good solid connection point which does not rely on the pivot point to conduct electricity through them. I have seen high end keys

and paddles where the manufacturer has added these wires to their product for reliable operation. On our keys and paddles we can just add wires to get this reliable operation. The picture shows some Vibroplex Code Warrior Jr. Paddles that had to have the wires added for reliable Iambic operation. This is an inexpensive modification which can make all keys and paddles operate as they should.


