

Notes from Fr. Steve

The Church makes saints because the person elevated to sainthood, is a person of virtue. Then it is the hope of the Church that by reading about the saint, the faithful would be inspired by the saint's life and story, and that then they would be so inspired to live a similar life. Today, I would like to present a biography of our patron saint, St. Rene Goupil. I hope you find him inspiring, and can draw from his spirituality graces that would enhance your own spiritual life.

St. Rene Goupil, born on May 15, 1608, in Saint-Martin-du-Bois, France, is celebrated as one of the first martyrs of North America and holds a significant place in the history of early Jesuit missions. The son of a devout Catholic family, Goupil showed a strong inclination towards faith and service from an early age. His path to sainthood began with a medical condition, as he trained to be a surgeon in a period when medical knowledge was a blend of burgeoning scientific understanding and traditional practices.

Drawn by a deep sense of mission, Goupil decided to join the Jesuit novitiate in Paris in 1639. However, his tenure was short-lived due to health issues, which forced him to leave the order. Undeterred, he sought another way to serve and applied his medical skills to missionary work. He offered his services to the Jesuit missions in New France (present-day Canada), arriving in Quebec in 1640. His commitment to both his faith and the well-being of others was unwavering, and he quickly integrated into the challenging life of a missionary.

Goupil's dedication saw him working closely with the Huron people, providing medical care and sharing his faith. His journey took a perilous turn when he accompanied the renowned Jesuit missionary, Father Isaac Jogues, on a mission to the Huron county. In 1642, during one of their journeys, Goupil, Jogues, and several Huron Christians were captured by a Mohawk war party. The captives were subjected to severe torture, a common fate for those taken in such conflict, as they were perceived as enemies or intruders.

Despite the relentless suffering, Goupil's faith did not waver. He continued to minister to his fellow captives and even attempted to teach the Mohawks about Christianity. His efforts, however, were met with suspicion and hostility. On September 29, 1642, while Goupil was showing a child how to make the sign of the cross, he was brutally killed by a Mohawk warrior, an act which cemented his status as a martyr. His final words were reportedly an invocation of Jesus' name, a testament to his deep and enduring faith.

Rene Goupil was canonized by Pope Pius XI on June 29, 1930, and is venerated as one of the North American Martyrs. His feast day is celebrated on September 26. Goupil's legacy is one of profound faith, resilience, and dedication to the services of others, embodying the spirit of the early missionaries who played a crucial role in the history of the Catholic Church in North America. His life and martyrdom continue to inspire countless individuals in their own journeys of faith and service.

GOSPEL MEDITATION 12th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Right now, you and I are only worried about one of only two things: wind or water. Bear with me. This week we hear the account of the terrified disciples waking Jesus in a sea-storm. He chastises them for their lack of faith, and then, "rebuking the wind, he said to the sea, 'Quiet, be still!'" He rebukes the wind and stills the water. In the Bible wind and water represent the two most fundamental poles of our experience of creation. Wind means heaven, spirit, that which gives identity, unity, order, light. Water stands for earth, variation, potential, that which can be drawn into identity, darkness, chaos.

Too much "wind" is when things get way too rigid, abstract and ideological — when we face oppressive leaders and tyrants, when we get addicted to our own way of doing things, when our attention is too narrowly focused on one thing. Too much "water" is excessive novelty, passivity, indifference, and chaos — when our attention is too broadly diffused on many things, when things seem to be crumbling without direction into the dark abyss. We know both terrifying experiences all too well.

The point of the miracle is that God in Christ is the One who brings final cosmic harmony between these two vital but threatening forces. He ultimately does so from the wood of the cross, when he breathes forth the wind of his spirit and pours forth the water from his side to establish a new creation, filled with harmonious peace. When the wind and water are out of control, trust him.


But sadly, love doesn't give you the ability to read minds. And in the end, we learn the lesson again and again, we have to verbalize our feelings, our needs, our wants. Expecting your partner to anticipate your needs is guaranteed to end badly.

It's the same with God, even though, oddly enough, He *does* have the ability to read minds. But He still desires us to explain ourselves to Him, doesn't He? "I'm feeling scared of this." "I'm really worried about that." "God, I think I need x, y and z. Help me. Please."

Jesus slept on that boat, as it was tossed and turned by the waves, until his disciples woke him. "Why were you sleeping?" they ask. Well, geniuses, he was sleeping because they hadn't woken him up yet. They had wasted time cowering in fear, waiting for him to act. They gave him the silent treatment and they didn't even know it.

God doesn't desire us to verbalize our needs as a way of keeping us submissive. He's not that petty. What He desires is the communication — that's what really counts. That act of opening yourself up, of becoming vulnerable, of relying on Him, trusting Him. If it feels like God is asleep in your life, ask yourself this, have you tried waking Him up?

In turn,, they are in great awe of Jesus' power over the wind and the water. As Christian stewards, we find comfort in the assurance that the Lord is always there to calm the storm during challenging times and to bring peace to our lives.



So whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come.

On that day, as evening drew on, Jesus said to his disciples: "Let us cross to the other side." Leaving the crowd, they took Jesus with them in the boat just as he was. And other boats were with him. Then he asked them, "Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?" They were filled with great awe and said to one another, "Who then is this whom even wind and sea obey?"

SVDP Statistics

St. Rene St. Vincent de Paul would like to give parishioners information about the scope of assistance provided by our organization with the following statistics:

- 1. For fiscal year 2023 ending in September 2023, St. Rene SVDP visited 21 families in their homes helping a total of 65 people with various needs.
- 2. The St. Rene food pantry was visited 96 times totaling assistance for 362 people for fiscal year 2023.
- 3. Assisted 10 families for Thanksgiving in 2023 and 10 families for Christmas in 2023.
- 4. Assisted 15 families with evictions in fiscal year 2023.
- 5. So far in 2024 SVDP has assisted 81 adults and 23 children with the food pantry. And seven families for Easter. Six families have been assisted with evictions.



Fruited Chicken

4 chicken breasts

1 (20 oz.) can pineapple chunks, drained (reserve juice)

1/4 c. flour

1/8 tsp. cayenne pepper

1/3 c. raisins

1 stick margarine


1/2 tsp. salt

Dash of cloves

3/4 c. apple juice

1/4 tsp. cinnamon

Rinse chicken and pat dry. Coat chicken with mixture of flour, salt, cayenne pepper and cloves. Melt margarine in fry pan and brown chicken. When brown, stir in reserved pineapple juice, apple juice, cinnamon and raisins. Reduce heat to medium low and cover. Simmer for approximately 25 minutes or until tender. Add pineapple chunks and heat through, about 5 minutes. Serve over rice.

Parish Registration:

Baptism:

Baptisms are celebrated the third Sunday of the month at 12:00 p.m. A parent preparation class is mandatory. Classes are held on the fourth Saturday of each month at 10:00 a.m. Call the Parish Office during weekday office hours to register for a class.

Penance: Saturday 3:00 p.m. Special schedules for Advent and Lent.

Marriage:

Arrangements must be made through the Parish Office at least six months prior to the desired wedding date. One person of the couple must be an active, registered member of St. Rene Goupil Parish for six months.
