“I am the bread of life. Your ancestors ate the manna in the desert, but they died; this is the bread that comes down from heaven so that one may eat it and not die.” - Jn 6:48-50

Notes from Fr. Steve

When your outside during the summer you often see small statues of St. Francis of Assisi in people's gardens or in front of their homes. While many saints in history have not found a place in modern history and are no longer venerated, St. Francis, has been venerated from his own time until this very day. Often, when people think of Francis, they first think of animals. He did love animals and nature. But the focus of his spirituality was on living a life of simplicity. I thought it might be enjoyable to write a brief biography on him today!

Saint Francis of Assisi, born Giovanni di Pietro di Bernardone in 1181 or 1182 in Assisi, Italy, is one of the most revered figures in Christian history. Known for his deep piety, humility, and love for all creatures, he founded the Franciscan Order and played a crucial role in the renewal of the Catholic Church during the Middle Ages.

Francis was born into a wealthy merchant family but chose a life of poverty and service to God after a spiritual awakening. He famously renounced his wealth and embraced a life of simplicity, living among the poor and preaching the Gospel in a radical way. His dedication to poverty, humility, and the care of creation earned him a reputation as a patron saint of animals and the environment.

In 1209, Francis received approval from Pope Innocent III for his new religious order, the Order of Friars Minor, commonly known as the Franciscans. The order emphasized living in poverty and serving the poor, reflecting Francis's belief in imitating the life and teachings of Jesus Christ. In Detroit our own Capuchin Friars, are Franciscan's who live according to the rule of St. Francis. In fact, they are noted for strictly following the rule even in this modern world. One added note, Fr. Solanus too, was a Franciscan!

Throughout his life, Francis exhibited extraordinary compassion and a deep connection to nature. He is said to have communicated with animals and viewed all of creation as a reflection of God's love. His devotion to peace and reconciliation earned him acclaim beyond the Christian community, influencing figures across different religious cultures.

Francis died on October 3, 1226, in Assisi, Italy. He was canonized as a saint just two years after his death, and his legacy continues to inspire millions around the world. Saint Francis is remembered not only for his religious fervor but also for his profound compassion, simplicity of life, and unwavering commitment to the teachings of Jesus Christ.

Next time you see a statue of St. Francis consider living by example, to live simply, remember the poor, and to pray daily!


As always I ask you to pray for the parish, especially the sick and the suffering. Your prayers bring them healing, comfort and peace. God bless you and those you love!

GOSPEL MEDITATION

19th Sunday in Ordinary Time

This week we hear Jesus say, “**He that believes in me, has eternal life**” (John 6:47). These straightforward words, uttered by human lips, sound — how to put this? — insane. Who could possibly say such a thing? Jesus says things that are so high, so demanding, so beyond our capacity to fathom, we hardly know what to do with them and (if you’re like me), they usually go in one ear and out the other. So, let us ask: how can believing in him lead to eternal life?

To believe in something means not just to acknowledge its existence, but also to orient yourself entirely to it. If a football player believes in his team, it means he puts his life totally at the service of that goal. If a student believes in her dream to become a doctor, she gives everything she has to her studies and preparation for her MCAT test. Belief means to move boldly toward something we love, and trust is possible to attain.


What is the highest possible good at which we can aim? It is God himself, the gift of eternal life without end. Jesus has made this “good” possible in and through his human nature. To believe in him means to have him as our ultimate goal. 


The Assumption: A Sign of Hope

Readings for The Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading I *Kings 19:4-8*

Elijah went a day's journey into the desert, until he came to a broom tree and sat beneath it. He prayed for death, saying: "This is enough, O LORD! Take my life, for I am no better than my fathers." He lay down and fell asleep under the broom tree, but then an angel touched him and ordered him to get up and eat. Elijah looked and there at his head was a hearth cake and a jug of water. After he ate and drank, he lay down again, but the angel of the LORD came back a second time, touched him, and ordered, "Get up and eat, else the journey will be too long for you!" He got up, ate, and drank; then strengthened by that food, he walked forty days and forty nights to the mountain of God, Horeb.

Reading II *Ephesians 4:30—5:2*

Brothers and sisters: Do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with which you were sealed for the day of redemption. All bitterness, fury, anger, shouting, and reviling must be removed from you, along with all malice. And be kind to one another, compassionate, forgiving one another as God has forgiven you in Christ. So be imitators of God, as beloved children, and live in love, as Christ loved us and handed himself over for us as a sacrificial offering to God for a fragrant aroma.

Gospel *John 6:41-51*

The Jews murmured about Jesus because he said, "I am the bread that comes down from heaven," and they said, "Is this not Jesus, the son of Joseph? Do we not know his father and mother? Then how can he say, 'I have come down from heaven'?" Jesus answered and said to them, "Stop murmuring among yourselves. No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draw him, and I will raise him on the last day. It is written in the prophets: *They shall all be taught by God.* Everyone who listens to my Father and learns from him comes to me. Not that anyone has seen the Father except the one who is from God; he has seen the Father. Amen, amen, I say to you, whoever believes has eternal life. I am the bread of life. Your ancestors ate the manna in the desert, but they died; this is the bread that comes down from heaven so that one may eat it and not die. I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world."

What else is there to give when one has already given away their body and their life? What more can one say or do to demonstrate love for another when all they have has been given to another? 
St. Vincent de Paul Clothing Drive

**EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP
What’s Your Hearth Cake?**

“Get up and eat, or the journey will be too much for you.” I’ve been to a lot of meetings in my years of work in the Church, and you can take my word for it: the ones with snacks just seem to go better.

I don’t know what it is exactly. Maybe it’s just that people are in a more agreeable mood if you show up with donuts. Or maybe it’s about the very real sense of community and camaraderie that is created at a table where people are engaging in that most human of tasks — eating — beside one another. I think a big part of it comes down to the simple fact that we’re all just nicer people when we’re fed.

This rings true spiritually, too. We simply must remain fed if we, in turn, are to feed others. Think of a time when you have neglected your relationship with God — when you haven’t fed yourself with whatever it is that you need to remain committed to the journey of a Christian life. Is it Mass attendance? Is it prayer or Scripture reading? Is it time with your small group, or conversation with a trusted friend who knows your soul? What sustains your ability to be a good disciple, a good steward? What inspires you to give more freely, to love more abundantly?

Whatever it is, that’s your hearth cake. That’s your jug of water. Don’t neglect it. The Angel of the Lord is nudging you in your sleep: “Get up and eat, or the journey will be too much for you.”

Marriage:


