

## Notes from Fr. Steve

As we begin our celebration of Advent I wanted to give you some background information beforehand so you could better appreciate this beautiful season. Advent, a season of hope, reflection, and preparation, unfolds over four weeks, each marked by its own profound meaning. This cherished tradition invites us to journey towards the celebration of Christ's birth while deepening our faith. Each week carries a unique theme, symbolized by the lighting of a candle, which illuminates the spiritual path leading to Christmas.

The first week of Advent centers on **hope**, represented by the Prophet's Candle. This candle reminds us of the Old Testament prophecies foretelling the coming of the Messiah. It's called to anticipate Christ's arrival with joyful expectation, knowing that His presence brings light to the darkest corners of life.

The second week brings the **peace** of God's promise. The Bethlehem Candle, lit during this week, symbolizes the peace that Jesus brings as the Prince of Peace. It encourages us to quiet our hearts and reflect on the tranquility and unity He offers in a divided world.

**Joy** radiates in the third week, represented by the Shepherd's Candle, which is often pink to reflect a lighter mood. This week recalls the angels' message to the shepherds: "I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people" (Luke 2:10). It is a celebration of the glad tidings of Jesus' birth and the rejoicing it brings.

The final week of Advent focuses on **love**, symbolized by the Angels Candle. It represents the boundless love of God, who sent His only Son for our redemption. This love invites us to extend grace and compassion to others, embodying the spirit of the Christmas season.

Advent is a season of both inward preparation and outward expression. Through hope, peace, joy, and love, we are drawn closer to God and reminded of His promises. As the light of each candle grows brighter with every passing week, so too does our anticipation for the arrival of Jesus Christ, the Light of the World.

This Advent, let the meanings of each week inspire a deeper connection to your faith and a renewed appreciation for the gifts of Christmas.

I hope all who read this have many wonderful years ahead of them. However, let's approach this Advent like it is our last. I bet Christmas will seem that much sweeter. And who knows, we may find a new and improved way to live all year long.

#### National Religious Retirement Office Announces Annual Retirement Fund for Religious Collection

**DETROIT, Oct. 31, 2024** — The National Religious Retirement Office (NRRO) is announcing the annual Retirement Fund for Religious collection, scheduled in parishes throughout the Archdiocese of Detroit on the weekend of Dec. 7-8

In 2023, parishioners contributed \$455,779.85 to the collection. From this collection, the Basilian Fathers received a total of \$94,928.65 in financial support made possible by the Retirement Fund for Religious.

Mr. John Knutsen, NRRO director, expresses gratitude for the "profound generosity" of U.S. Catholics, emphasizing the importance of ensuring the "comfort and dignity" of those who have served tirelessly. "As we prepare for this year's collection," Knutsen stated, "we invite all Catholics to join us in honoring the legacy of these dedicated women and men by contributing to their well-deserved care."

Escalating healthcare costs and a lack of traditional retirement plans have created financial challenges for many religious communities. The Retirement Fund for Religious addresses this need, supporting more than 20,000 religious over the age of 70. In 2023, the average annual cost for their care was roughly \$59,700 per person. With skilled nursing care, the average cost was \$90,700.

Since its establishment in 1988, the collection has raised over \$1 billion, with nearly \$870 million distributed for direct care and over \$103.5 million allocated to self-help projects.

In 2023, the appeal raised \$29.3 million, providing financial assistance for the retirement needs of 286 U.S. religious communities. Beyond financial aid, the collection supports educational programs, empowering religious communities to plan for their long-term needs.

#### About the NRRO

The NRRO coordinates the annual national appeal for the Retirement Fund for Religious and distributes financial assistance to eligible religious communities. It is sponsored by the Conference of Major Superiors of Men, the Council of Major Superiors of Women Religious, the Leadership Conference of Women Religious and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops.

### **Preparing the Manger**

Where do you fall in the "Christmas-songs-in-November" debate — do you like them, tolerate them, or outright hate them? There's no theological problem with Christmas songs in November outside of worship, even if it's not everyone's cup of tea. But there is a problem with getting so caught up in the baggage of the season — the trimmings, the gifts, the celebrations, all of which are marvelous in their own way — that you forget to prepare the manger.

Every good Catholic knows that Lent is a penitential season. It's hard to miss that point — Lent doesn't even have any fun songs you can groove to on the radio. We are pretty good at recognizing that Lent calls us to examine ourselves. To deny ourselves. To give of ourselves. And most of all, Lent calls us to prepare, as a good steward does, for the return of our master.

It's harder for us to remember that with Advent, but Advent is just as much of an opportunity for penance, preparation, and reconciliation to God — and just as much reason, too. The very name of the season — "advent" — encourages us to focus on what is coming, not what is already here. Be on guard, the readings tell us today, "so that your hearts are not weighed down with dissipation and drunkenness and the worries of this life, and (the coming of the Lord) catch you unexpectedly, like a trap."

So let us not forget — our master's advent is upon us. And let us ask ourselves: how can we prepare the manger?



# First Sunday of Advent

As we begin this holy season of Advent, we should consider taking inventory of our lives. In today's Gospel from the evangelist St. Luke, Jesus tells of the signs associated with the end times. For faithful disciples, though, Christ reassures us: But when these signs begin to happen, stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand. In other words, stand firm in your faith before the Lord when He comes again in glory and power. St. Paul reminds the Thessalonian community, and us, that our Lord strengthens us to love God and one another — to be blameless in holiness before Him. Faithful stewards acknowledge that expressing evangelization through stewardship as a way of life deepens our quest for holiness. As we prepare for Christ's birth, avoid the busyness of the "holiday season" by making time to read Scripture daily and attend Mass frequently to receive Holy Communion.

In those days, in that time, I will raise up for David a just shoot; he shall do what is right and just in the land. In those days Judah shall be safe and Jerusalem shall dwell secure; this is what they shall call her: "The LORD our justice."

Brothers and sisters: May the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we have for you, so as to strengthen your hearts, to be blameless in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all his holy ones. Amen. Finally, brothers and sisters, we earnestly ask and exhort you in the Lord Jesus that, as you received from us how you should conduct yourselves to please God—and as you are conducting yourselves—you do so even more. For you know what instructions we gave you through the Lord Jesus.

Jesus said to his disciples: "There will be signs in the sun, the moon, and the stars, and on earth nations will be in dismay, perplexed by the roaring of the sea and the waves. People will die of fright in anticipation of what is coming upon the world, for the powers of the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. But when these signs begin to happen, stand erect and raise your heads because your redemption is at hand. "Beware that your hearts do not become drowsy from carousing and drunkenness and the anxieties of daily life, and that day catch you by surprise like a trap. For that day will assault everyone who lives on the face of the earth. Be vigilant at all times and pray that you have the strength to escape the tribulations that are imminent and to stand before the Son of Man."

#### **GOSPEL MEDITATION**

## 1st Sunday of Advent

When I was a young priest, about one year after ordination, I was called to the hospital to anoint a dying mother of three young children. She had a painful, terminal cancer. After celebrating Last Rites with her, I said, "Don't be afraid." She looked me square in the eye from her hospital bed and said, "Oh Father, I am in a lot of pain, but I am not afraid. Something wonderful is about to happen." A few days later she died.

Christians face the ending of our personal various "worlds" in a totally unique way. This first Sunday of Advent, Jesus says that when people see their world falling apart, they find themselves "fainting with fear and with foreboding of what is coming on the world" (Luke 21:26). In our fear, our natural response is to check out, to hide our heads in drunkenness, distraction, and false securities. But Jesus commands us to "look up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near." He then compares what's coming to a lovely summer in full bloom. That's what the cross and resurrection empower us to do, as strange as it may seem.

Advent challenge: What world in your life is collapsing? A relationship, a dream, a work opportunity? Maybe you're troubled by a crumbling world in the political or economic sphere. Or maybe someone you love is seriously ill or dying. Name that world or worlds. Then pray: "Lord, help me to not faint with fear. Help me to raise my head and see your redemption coming."

"This is my comfort in my affliction, that your promise gives me life." — Psalm 119:50

This scripture from the book of Psalms is HOPE in this time of pandemic. Despite illness, despite pain, the Psalmist finds life in the promise of God's love.

In this time of illness, loneliness, and frailty, not only can we find comfort in God's love, but we can also bring hope to those around us by our own loving actions. By wearing a mask – offering those around you the hope that you wish them safety and good health. By making a phone call or a safe visit, bringing the hope of friendship. Or by running an errand for your neighbors, giving them hope of avoiding the virus.

As we light the first candle of Advent, we pray in hope in the words of the Psalmist from today's scripture:

Restore us, O God; let your face shine, that we may be saved. Psalms 80:19

# **Holiday Trifle**

2 pkg. ladyfingers or pound cake or sponge cake

2 cans cherries packed in juice—drained (not pie filling)

2 cans custard or vanilla pudding

4 bananas (sliced and placed in lemon/sugar mixture to keep from browning—drain before layering)
1/4—1/2 cup Harvey's Bristol Cream sherry (or your favor-

ite liquor)

1 large container Cool Whip

Sprinkles (red dots and green long pieces to form holly)

Use trifle bowl for presentation purposes. Place split ladyfingers (pound cake or sponge cake) on bottom of bowl. Line split ladyfingers around the bowl standing up. Place layer of cherries that have sat in the sherry or liquor for several hours; layer of custard; layer of bananas; layer pieces of ladyfinger or cake; layer of cherries; layer of custard; layer of bananas; thick layer of Cool Whip. Place red dots on top of Cool Whip and add two green sprinkles to form leaves (looks like holly). Chill overnight. Makes a lovely presentation. Use a large spoon and go to bottom of bowl to get a little bit of everything.

Welcome to all new families/individuals. Please register as soon as possible. Membership is a condition for the reception of the Sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation, First Eucharist, Confirmation and Marriage.

Registration is also required before the parish can issue a sponsorship certificate for those asked to be a sacramental sponsor. Registration forms are available in the Parish Office.

#### **Baptism:**

Baptisms are celebrated the third Sunday of the month at 12:00 p.m. A parent preparation class is mandatory. Classes are held on the fourth Saturday of each month at 10:00 a.m. Call the Parish Office during weekday office hours to register for a class.

**Penance:** Saturday 3:00 p.m. Special schedules for Advent and Lent.

#### Marriage:

Arrangements must be made through the Parish Office at least six months prior to the desired wedding date. One person of the couple must be an active, registered member of St. Rene Goupil Parish for six months.
