Notes from Fr. Steve

Every Sunday at Mass, after the readings and the homily, the Church invites us to stand and profess together the *Nicene Creed*. This is not simply a tradition, but a powerful moment of faith, rooted in the very early centuries of Christianity.

In the early Church, Christians struggled to express clearly who Jesus was. Some taught that Jesus was not truly God, but only a created being. This confusion threatened the unity of the Church and the truth of the Gospel.

To address these disputes, the Emperor Constantine called the first ecumenical council at Nicaea in 325 A.D. These, bishops from across the Christian world gathered to affirm the truth passed down from the apostles: that Jesus Christ is "true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father." This declaration defended the divinity of Christ and gave us the foundation of the Creed.


Later, in 381 A.D., at the Council of Constantinople, the Creed was expanded to include a fuller teaching on the Holy Spirit, who is "the Lord, the giver of life." This final version which we still pray today, expresses the mystery of the Trinity—Father, Son and Holy Spirit—and our belief in the Church, the sacraments, and eternal life.

At Mass, after hearing God's Word, we stand and together profess the Creed as a community. This is our way of publicly affirming what we believe before we approach the Eucharist. The Creed acts as a bridge between hearing the Word of God and celebrating the Sacrifice of the Altar. It reminds us that we are not passive listeners, but active believers, ready to reunite ourselves to Christ in the Eucharist.

The Creed also connects us with the universal Church across time and space. From the earliest Christians who risked their lives to profess these truths, to believers around the world today, the Nicene Creed unites us in the same faith handed down through the centuries.

Saying the Creed is not only about words on Sunday—it is about how we live every day. Each line calls us to a deeper commitment: to trust God the Father, to follow Christ more closely, to listen to the Spirit's guidance, to be faithful members of the Church, and to live with hope in the promise of eternal life.

The next time you pray the Nicene Creed, say it slowly, with conviction, and with gratitude. It is more than a statement of belief—it is our shared profession of faith, our link with the early Church, and our pledge to live as disciples of Jesus Christ.





Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

In his Gospel today, the evangelist St. Luke authors Jesus' statement on true discipleship: Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple. We are asked to renounce our former life and possessions to make Jesus first in our lives. "I live, no longer I, but Christ lives in me" (Gal 2:20) (see: Unleash the Gospel, Marker 9.2, Grow. http://www.unleashthegospel.org). Discipleship requires sacrfice and may include persecution and suffering to witness Christ and His Truth. Are we willing to pay the cost? As an example, do we uphold the Church's teaching on sacramental marriage between one man and one woman at the risk of ridicule and persecution from the secular world? Readings for the Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading IWisdom 9:13-18a

Who can know God's counsel, or who can conceive what the LORD intends? For the deliberations of mortals are timid, and unsure are our plans. For the corruptible body burdens the soul and the eastern shelter weighs down the mind that has many concerns. And scarce do we guess the things on earth, and what is within our grasp we find with difficulty; but when things are in heaven, who can search them out? Or who ever knew your counsel, except you had given wisdom and sent your holy spirit from on high? And thus were the paths of those on earth made straight.

Reading IIPhilemon 9-10, 12-17

I, Paul, an old man, and now also a prisoner for Christ Jesus, urge you on behalf of my child Onesimus, whose father I have become in my imprisonment; I am sending him, that is, my own heart, back to you. I should have liked to retain him for myself, so that he might serve me on your behalf in my imprisonment for the gospel, but I did not want to do anything without your consent, so that the good you do might not be forced but voluntary. Perhaps this is why he was away from you for a while, that you might have him back forever, no longer a slave but more than a slave, a brother, beloved especially to me, but even more so to you, as a man and in the Lord. So if you regard me as a partner, welcome him as you would me.

Gospel *Luke 14:25-33*

Great crowds were traveling with Jesus, and he turned and addressed them, "If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple. Which of you wishing to construct a tower does not first sit down and calculate the cost to see if there is enough for its completion? Otherwise, after laying the foundation and finding himself unable to finish the work the onlookers should laugh at him and say, 'This one began to build but did not have the resources to finish.' Or what king marching into battle would not first sit down and decide whether with ten thousand troops he can successfully oppose another king advancing upon him with twenty thousand troops? But if not, while he is still far away, he will send a delegation to ask for peace terms. In the same way, anyone of you who does not renounce all his possessions cannot be my disciple."

GOSPEL MEDITATION


23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time Luke 14:25-33

One hot Arizona summer afternoon my car ran out of gas. I phoned the parish office and begged for help. My secretary came and helped me fill the gas tank. She chided me, "If you can't manage getting your car from A to B, how can we expect you to guide the parish where it needs to go?" Point taken, Julie. I vowed to always make sure I have plenty of gas in my car.

The Lord Jesus chides us in this week's Gospel, too. He uses the two images of a man building a tower and a king marching soldiers into war to make this single point: acquire what is needed to follow him or look ridiculous. We rightly mock the builder who lacks money for his tower and the king with a short-handed army. But our mocking boomerangs back on us. How do we expect to follow Jesus to the end with insufficient detachment from our possessions and divided hearts?

The good news is, there is still time. Jesus is building a great tower to heaven—his own body. So we renounce all and give ourselves to him as his precious stones. Jesus is waging a battle against our enemy. So we forsake all and swear allegiance and march under his banner. In this way, we will finish what has begun in our discipleship. Or better put, our Lord will have the stones and soldiers required to see his great work through.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP Where's the Sacrifice?

"It's not that I want you to do it. It's that I want you to want to do it."

If you're married or in a relationship, your partner has probably either said something like this to you or you have said it to them. If one of you hasn't said it, you have probably wanted to, and it's likely that a big argument or two was had where you dance around the sentiment, these exact words flashing in your mind like an old-time movie marquee.

The "it" never really matters much. Taking out the trash, painting the bedroom, traveling to your in-laws' for Christmas — whatever the subject matter of the disagreement is, it's all just so much set dressing. The heart of the matter is the sacrifice and desire. That's what it all hangs on. *Am I with a person who will sacrifice for me?*

When Paul writes to Philemon that he is sending Onesimus to him, he says exactly this. He tells Philemon that he would prefer to keep Onesimus with him, but that he does not want to deprive Philemon both of Onesimus and the opportunity to make a sacrifice worthy in the sight of the Lord.

The point is not who gets to hang out with Onesimus. The point is, as it says in the Gospel, who is willing to carry his cross? Who is willing to renounce his possessions? Who is willing to do the good deed for the sake of the other?

God doesn't care that much about what we have to offer. He cares much more that we have the strength to offer whatever we have.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP Reach Out in Love








Devotions, *Explained!* Lectio Divina

Lectio divina ("divine reading") is an ancient practice of praying




Lectio Divina, Explained!

Lectio divina ("divine reading") is a practice of praying through the reading of Scripture, opening oneself to the inspiration and communication of the Holy Spirit.

The practice of *Lectio divina* dates to ancient monastic communities, but it has gained popularity in modern times as a way to meaningfully engage with the word of God.

The formula for *Lectio divina* is simple and follows four steps. The text of the Scripture is read (*lectio*) multiple times, and the reader takes note of any words or phrases that resonate with him in a particular way. The reader then reflects deeply on the passage (*meditatio*) and the words that he noticed, turning them over in his mind. Following this, the reader prays with the passage (*oratio*), and dialogues with God, inviting him to illuminate the reader's understanding of the text. Finally, there is rest and contemplation (*contemplatio*).





They do not need to be parish members. All information is kept strictly confidential. Pantry items needed: cooking oil, dish detergent, hand soap, laundry detergent, rice, pancake syrup and shampoo.

Stuffed Cabbage

1 head cabbage

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef and ground pork

1/4 c. instant rice

1 c. chopped onion

1/4 tsp. salt

1/4 tsp. pepper

1/4 c. lemon juice

1/4 c. brown sugar

1 can tomato soup

1 can tomatoes, diced

1 bay leaf

1 garlic clove

1 c. water

Core center of cabbage and inset whole head of cabbage in boiling water to wilt leaves; drain. Separate leaves and cut back of center vein so leaves can be folded. Combine beef and pork, rice, onion, salt, pepper and minced garlic. Place in center of leaves and fold. Place folded side on bottom of baking dish. Mix lemon juice, brown sugar, tomato soup, diced tomatoes and water. Pour over stuffed cabbage. Add bay leaf. Bake at 350 F for 1 1/2 to 2 hours.
