Notes from Fr. Steve

We often talk about being a disciple of Jesus. So, I thought it would be helpful to write out a little guideline for your prayerful thought. To be a disciple of Jesus Christ is more than simply calling ourselves Christians—it is a way of living each day. Jesus invites us to follow Him not just in word, but in action. Discipleship is a daily commitment to walk in His footsteps and to reflect His love in all we do.

One of the simplest and most powerful ways we live as disciples is through **kind-ness**. A kind word, a patient response, or a helping hand can change someone's day or even open their hearts to Christ. In a world often marked by division and harshness, kindness is a true mark of a follower of Jesus.

Discipleship also calls us to **prayer**. Spending time with the Lord in silence, and in the Mass strengthens our relationship with him. Prayer grounds us in God's love and gives us the grace to meet life's challenges with faith and peace.

Through **good works**, we put our faith into action. Jesus reminds us that whatever we do for the least of our brothers and sisters, we do for Him. Whether it is serving at the parish, helping a neighbor, or supporting those in need, our good works show the presence of Christ in the world.

Finally, discipleship means **sharing Christ with others**. At home, in the workplace, or in our community, we are called to witness by how we live. This does not always mean speaking about faith directly—sometimes it is the quiet witness of patience, honesty, generosity, or forgiveness that reveals Christ most powerfully.



Readings for the The Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading I Amos 8:4-7

Hear this, you who trample upon the needy and destroy the poor of the land! "When will the new moon ever be over," you ask, "that we may sell our grain, and the sabbath, that we may display the wheat? We will diminish the ephah, add to the shekel, and fix our scales for cheating! We will buy the lowly for silver, and the poor for a pair of sandals; even the refuse of the wheat we will sell!" The LORD has sworn by the pride of Jacob: Never will I forget a thing they have done!

Reading II Timothy 2:1-8

Beloved: First of all, I ask that supplications, prayers, petitions, and thanksgiving be offered for everyone, for kings and for all in authority, that we may lead a quiet and tranquil life in all devotion and dignity. This is good and pleasing to God our savior, who wills everyone to be saved and to come to knowledge of the truth. For there is one God. Sit down and quickly write one for fifty.' Then to another the steward said, 'And you, how much do you owe?' He replied, 'One hundred kors of wheat.' The steward said to him, 'Here is your promissory note; write one for eighty.' And the master commended that dishonest steward for acting prudently. GOSPEL MEDITATION

25th Sunday in Ordinary Time Luke 16:10-13

Before I was a priest, I was a lazy worker for a retail Apple store. Hearing a rumor that my boss was going to fire me, I secretly sold iPhones for half-price, gave away dozens of free iPads, and donated several brandnew laptops to managers in other stores in the mall. After a week, my boss called me into his office. He knew what I was up to. He said I had cost the store thousands of dollars. "Really great work, John," he said. "I am going to recommend you to be my assistant manager and double your pay." I was amazed.

And so are you. Which is understandable because it never happened. How could it? My tall tale is a retelling of Jesus' brow-furrowing parable we hear this week. A lazy, dishonest steward defrauds his boss and then the "master commended the dishonest servant for acting prudently" (Luke 16:8). What is the Lord saying to us?

Most of us treat our spiritual lives like a lazy teenager at an Apple store. We really don't care. We go through the motions. Then, if we are lucky, something happens that shakes us to spiritual action; to employ whatever time, money, and resources we have to build around us a strong network of love. Every saint did that. Our Lord is so good he *wants* us to use his stuff to forgive debts and to bless others. He wants us to ensure our future. So do it!



Devotions, *Explained!* The Jesus Prayer



Mini Explanation

The Jesus Prayer is a short invocation of mercy in the name of Jesus: "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner." Often attributed to the tradition of Eastern Christianity, its short form makes it ideal for meditative prayer.

The Jesus Prayer, Explained!

The Jesus Prayer is a short invocation of mercy in the name of Jesus: "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner."

The exact origins of the prayer are unclear, though it is often attributed to the tradition of Eastern Christianity, possibly via the Desert Fathers (early Christian ascetics who dwelled in Egypt). The prayer has been important to the traditions of both the Eastern Orthodox and the Eastern Catholic faithful. The text echoes the words of the publican in the parable from Luke 18:9-14, whose humble manner of prayer was praised by Jesus. Its short form and simple wording make it ideal for meditative prayer.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church, in paragraph 2667, highlights the Jesus Prayer, saying that "by it the heart is opened to human wretchedness and the Savior's mercy."

Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's First Reading, the prophet Amos sternly admonishes the unlawful that God will discipline those who trample upon the needy and destroy the poor of the land! In St. Luke's Gospel, a foundational principle emerges on the topic of riches: one cannot serve both God and money. Wealth itself is not necessarily bad when used wisely. Christian stewards recognize that all gifts of treasure are Godgiven and, out of gratitude, give back generously a portion of these blessings to God and to those in need. Many commentators suggest 5 percent of their gross annual income to the weekly parish offering, 1 percent to the Catholic Services Appeal, and 4 percent to other charitable Christian causes. Generosity can atone for a multitude of sins as God looks kindly on a generous giver. Today's worldly culture reveres money and wealth. Who will you choose to serve—God or mammon? 

(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC – BENEATH THE SURFACE

Mini reflection: Jesus' parable of the untrustworthy steward sums up all our anxieties surrounding material wealth and the delicate balance we have to strike of caring for our physical needs while prioritizing our spiritual ones.

God and Mammon

Dealing with money is unpleasant.

You might be good at dealing with money (I am not). You might even do it for a living (I do not). You might be careful to use as much of your money as you can for good purposes (I try to, but man, these skyrocketing grocery prices are killing me).

But ultimately, money does not bring out the best in us. We waste it. We manipulate it. We hoard it. We become obsessed by it. We let pursuit of it define our decisions. Money is something akin to — it corrupts by touch, it seems. But unlike witchcraft, you can't avoid money altogether. It's necessary. These dollars and cents keep us alive in this world, for a time. We need them for food, for warmth, for health.

Jesus' parable of the untrustworthy steward sums up all our anxieties surrounding material wealth and the delicate balance we have to strike of caring for our physical needs while prioritizing our spiritual ones. But the parable reminds us that we can't escape money, just like we can't escape the world and all the barriers forged by this world between man and the happiness his Creator intends for him. We could retreat to the highest, remotest mountaintop, but the human condition would follow us there.

We would still feel doubt. We would still feel pain. We would still feel fear. We would still sin.

And we would still be hungry and cold. We would still need money.

Money will never be something that is easy to handle virtuously. But guess what? Nothing in this world is. And it's probably best that we remember that.

Fixing the Scales


Most people don't intend on being selfish. The reality of selfishness usually lies in the grey shades of our decision-making. We would never go out of our way to kick a homeless person begging by the highway exit. We would never steal money from our parish collection plate.

But would we drive past the homeless person without even extending a thought or a prayer toward his need? Would we justify stinginess in time, talent, and treasure because of our own comfort? We all have been guilty of transgressions such as these in the past. We will fall again in the future.

Most of the evil in this world can be traced back to a feeling of entitlement that lurks deep within each of us — a frantic concern for our own good that we find difficult to shake. The same instinct that compelled Eve to reach for the fruit that would give her the knowledge of good and evil still compels people to focus on what they are owed, on what they have "earned," on what they have "coming to them." We are so tempted to fix the scales. We are so tempted to keep score.

We would do well to remember that our God is not a God who keeps score. He is not a God who acts entitled or who tacks on extra dues, taking as much as He can get. He is a God who seats the lowly with princes. He is a God who seeks avenues for reconciliation and mercy.

Marilyn's Heart Smart Angel Food Fruit Pudding



1/2 angel food cake

1 (6 oz.) pkg. instant vanilla fat free pudding

2 3/4 c. skim milk (for pudding)

1 pt. fresh strawberries, washed and sliced

1 (8 oz.) can pineapple chunks, drained

8 oz. canned apricots, drained and sliced

8 oz. canned sliced peaches, drained

1 (8 oz.) ctn. Fat free whipped topping

Cut up cake into bite size pieces. Make pudding according to package directions using skim milk. Mix with cake and set aside. Set a small amount of the strawberries aside for the top. Mix remaining strawberries with the other fruit and set aside.

In a large bowl, place half of the pudding mixture. Layer half fruit mixture on top of the pudding mixture. Top with half of the whipped topping. Repeat layers and garnish with the strawberries that have been set aside. Best if chilled well before serving. To make this "aesthetically pleasing to the eye," use a large glass bowl, positioning strawberries on the outside. The red is a beautiful contrast when finished.

Option: Use sugar free pudding.
