

Notes from Fr. Steve

This past week we celebrated the feast of St. Martin of Tours, his life is interesting and inspirational so, I thought I would share his biography with you here today.

Saint Martin of Tours, the soldier who became a saint: November 11 marks the feast day of Saint Martin of Tours, one of the most beloved saints of the early Christian church and the patron saint of soldiers, beggars, and the poor. Saint Martin's life is celebrated not only for his conversion to Christianity and dedication to monastic living, but also for his kindness, humility, and commitment to helping those in need.

Early life and military service: Born in 316 AD in what is now Hungary, Martin was the son of a Roman soldier and was named after Mars, the Roman god of war. Despite his pagan upbringing, he encountered Christianity at a young age, feeling drawn to its teachings. When he was just a teenager, he was required by Roman law to join the military, and he soon became known for his integrity and courage on the battlefield.

One of the most famous stories from Martin's life occurred during his time as a soldier. On a cold winter day, Martin saw a beggar shivering at the city gate. Moved by compassion, he cut his own cloak in half and gave it to the beggar. That night, Martin dreamed of Jesus wearing the half-cloak he had given away. This encounter deeply affected Martin, prompting him to leave the military and dedicate his life to God.

A life of service: After leaving the military, Martin was baptized and began a life of Christian devotion, eventually becoming a monk. His reputation for kindness and humility spread throughout the region, and he was later elected Bishop of Tours in France. Martin initially resisted this honor, preferring the simple life, but he accepted the role of a sense of duty. As bishop, he continued his mission of serving the poor and spreading Christianity, traveling throughout Gaul (modern-day France) to preach and convert many people.

Martin is also remembered for his commitment to ending idolatry in his region. He worked to destroy pagan shrines and convert former worshippers to Christianity, yet he did so peacefully, often befriending those he encountered instead of condemning them.

Legacy and fest day: Saint Martin of Tours is remembered as one of the first non-martyr saints and as a symbol of humility, generosity, and compassion. His feast day on November 11 is celebration of his life and teachings and is recognized in many countries across Europe. The holiday, known as Martinmas in some areas, is often marked with processions, feasts, and charitable acts.

Through his life and legacy, Saint Martin of Tours inspired people to show compassion, serve the poor, and live humbly, just as he did. His story reminds us that true strength lies not in power or wealth but in kindness, empathy, and a willingness to help those in need.

Next week we will celebrate the feast of Thanksgiving, please plan on coming to Mass Thanksgiv-

ing morning, to thank God for all of the blessings you have received. Mass will be Thursday morning at 9:30 a.m.

Please remember the parish in your prayers, especially the sick and the suffering. Your prayers bring them healing, comfort and peace. Also, please consider following the example of St. Martin of Tours, and remember to keep in mind, the needs of the less fortunate. God bless you and those you love!

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

Giving Until it Hurts

In the time of Christ, sacrifice was nothing new to the Jewish people. The Israelites were experts at sacrifice. So, after centuries of every kind of offering imaginable, what was so special about Christ's? What made it so different from the sacrifices offered by the Levitical priests for centuries before his death?

Well, to adequately answer that question would consume whole volumes. And, of course, the first and most important reason is that Christ was the son of God and the savior of the world, not a random (if "unblemished") lamb offering. It was only by the blood of Christ that we could be redeemed.

But another answer is this: Christ's sacrifice cost him. In fact, it cost him everything. The offerings made by the Israelites through their priests cost them too, of course. They gave of their flocks, of their household stores, of their wealth. But Christ gave differently. He gave of himself. He gave until it was all gone.

Such is the highest form of stewardship: the gift of self to the point of discomfort. It can take a multitude of forms and I am not saying we are all called to be nailed to the cross. In fact, for most of us, our gifts will not involve physical discomfort at all. But certainly, stewardship demands discomfort. It demands that we go against our human nature of putting ourselves first, of thinking primarily of our own needs and desires. And most of all, it demands love. For that, above all else, distinguished the gift Christ gave us.

Everyday Stewardship

The ancient Greek dramatist, Euripides, wrote, "No one can confidently say that he will still be living tomorrow." We seldom focus on that reality and often act like we are confident of a tomorrow. However, we all know names of those who died suddenly, maybe in tragedy or simply in the quiet of sleep. Calling those names to mind will probably still not force most of us to contemplate our own mortality tonight before placing our head on the pillow, but perhaps it should.

We don't need to obsess about dying or fear the unknown, but realizing the gift of today and reflecting on the possibility that it may be our last day can cause us to act differently. We might forgive more easily, argue less, and embrace one another. Rather than procrastinate, we might act now. We could become more mindful of our surroundings, see the needs in people, and reach out to those who are lost.

I write these Everyday Stewardship reflections every Sunday. You might read them in your parish bulletin, on a website, or in social media every Sunday. Just in case this is the last Sunday you ever have a chance to read these reflections, what is God calling you to do now before it's too late. If you are still here next Sunday after taking all this seriously, you might wonder at what it was to live more fully and to give of yourself more freely. Don't let a single day pass you by without truly loving others and your God. One thing you can be confident about: This day will never come again.



God bless all of you who gave so generously!





Readings for The Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading I Daniel 12:1-3

In those days, I, Daniel, heard this word of the Lord: "At that time there shall arise Michael, the great prince, guardian of your people; it shall be a time unsurpassed in distress since nations began until that time. At that time your people shall escape, everyone who is found written in the book. "Many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake; some shall live forever, others shall be an everlasting horror and disgrace. "But the wise shall shine brightly like the splendor of the firmament, and those who lead the many to justice shall be like the stars forever."

Reading II Hebrews 10:11-14, 18

Brothers and sisters: Every priest stands daily at his ministry, offering frequently those same sacrifices that can never take away sins. But this one offered one sacrifice for sins, and took his seat forever at the right hand of God; now he waits until his enemies are made his footstool. For by one offering he has made perfect forever those who are being consecrated. Where there is forgiveness of these, there is no longer offering for sin.

Jesus said to his disciples: "In those days after that tribulation the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light, and the stars will be falling from the sky, and the powers in the heaven will be shaken. GOSPEL MEDITATION


33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

I recently moved into a new neighborhood. On my first evening I went grocery shopping and could not find my usual favorite Greek yogurt. Strangely, my heart started to race. All the losses of my previous life hit me. So many of my old friends, habits, comforts, and predictable experiences had fallen away. There I stood, a grown man, crying like a little boy whose world was falling apart in the dairy aisle.

This week, Jesus describes what to do when one world ends, and another begins. Does it apply to the end of time? Yes. Does it apply to the end of our individual lives? Yes. It also applies to every "world" we inhabit throughout our lives, in school, family, friendships, work, play and so on. First, the sun, moon, and stars fall. The old, familiar ways of running things suddenly stop working. Light fades. Things fall apart. It's awful. But, second, Christ comes "in the clouds." Jesus, the Son of Man, replaces those old powers with himself as the prime governing principle. Third, he sends out his angels to "gather his elect from the four winds." He re-integrates the fragments into a new integrated whole. "Summer is near," he concludes. A new world begins.

Is your world crumbling? Are your sun, moon, and stars falling from the sky? Learn to discern the pattern of the Cross and Resurrection at work in it. This is the power we touch in the Mass. Jesus is coming precisely in this transition from the old to the new world. It doesn't make our losses easy. But it does make it possible to glimpse the dawning of a summer, a new beginning, the life of the world to come.






Make Ahead Mashed Potatoes

8 lg. potatoes, pared 1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese 1/4 c. sour cream Salt and pepper, to taste Butter Paprika

Boil potatoes in salted water until tender, drain and mash. Add cream cheese, sour cream, salt and pepper, mixing well. Put in greased 2 quart casserole or baking dish. Top with pats of butter; cover. Potatoes may be stored in refrigerator for several days. Before serving, sprinkle with paprika and bake uncovered in a 350F oven for 30 to 35 minutes or until heated through. Makes 8 servings.
