Notes from Fr. Steve

Today we rejoice with the young adults of **St. Rene Goupil Parish** and **St. Jane Frances de Chantal Parish** who have received the **Sacrament of Confirmation** from **Bishop Jeffrey Monforton.** We congratulate them, their families, and their sponsors as they take this important step in their journey of faith. May the Holy Spriit strengthen them to live courageously as witnesses to Christ in our world.

The roots of Conformation go back to the earliest days of the Church. In the Acts of the Apostles, we read how the first Christians, after being baptized, received the Holy Spirit through the laying on of hands by the Apostles (Acts 8:14-17). Over time, as the Church grew, the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation came to be celebrated separately so that the bishop could personally confer the Spirit upon the newly baptized. This preserved the close connection between the local Church and the wider, apostolic Church.

Confirmation completes the grace of Baptism. Through the anointing with **Sacred Chrism**, the Confirmed are "sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit." This seal is an indelible spiritual mark—a sign that we belong completely to Christ and share in His mission. The gifts of the Holy Spirit—wisdom, understanding, counsel, fortitude, knowledge, piety, and fear of the Lord—are strengthened in us, helping us to grow in holiness and to serve others in love.

Confirmation is not merely a rite of passage; it is a personal Pentecost. The Holy Spirit empowers us to live as active, joyful disciples of Jesus. This sacrament deepens our relationship with God, unites us more firmly to the Church, and gives us the courage to live our faith publicly and without fear. The Confirmed are called to take their place in the mission of the Church—proclaiming the Gospel through word and action, standing for truth and justice, and building up the Body of Christ in everyday life.

As we celebrate our newly confirmed adults, may their "yes" to the Holy Spirit inspire all of us to renew our own commitment to live the faith boldly. Let us keep them in our prayers, that they may always be guided by the Spirit of wisdom and love.

As always I ask you to pray for the parish, especially the sick and the suffering, your prayers, bring them healing, comfort and hope! God Bless You and those you love!


SOCK DRIVE

Readings for the The Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading I Sirach 35:12-14, 16-18

The Lord is a God of justice, who knows no favorites. Though not unduly partial toward the weak, yet he hears the cry of the oppressed. The Lord is not deaf to the wail of the orphan, nor to the widow when she pours out her complaint. The one who serves God willingly is heard; his petition reaches the heavens. The prayer of the lowly pierces the clouds; it does not rest till it reaches its goal, nor will it withdraw till the Most High responds, judges justly and affirms the right, and the Lord will not delay.

Reading II 2 Timothy 4:6-8, 16-18

Beloved: I am already being poured out like a libation, and the time of my departure is at hand. I have competed well; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. From now on the crown of right-eousness awaits me, which the Lord, the just judge, will award to me on that day, and not only to me, but to all who have longed for his appearance. At my first defense no one appeared on my behalf, but everyone deserted me. May it not be held against them! But the Lord stood by me and gave me strength, so that through me the proclamation might be completed and all the Gentiles might hear it. And I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from every evil threat and will bring me safe to his heavenly kingdom. To him be glory forever and ever. Amen.

Gospel Luke 18:9-14

Jesus addressed this parable to those who were convinced of their own righteousness and despised everyone else. "Two people went up to the temple area to pray; one of the Pharisee and the other was a tax collector. The Pharisee took up his position and spoke this prayer to himself, 'O God, I thank you that I am not like the rest of humanity—greedy, dishonest, adulterous—or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week, and I pay tithes on my whole income.' But the tax collector stood off at a distance and would not even raise his eyes to heaven but beat his breast and prayed, 'O God, be merciful to me a sinner.' I tell you, the latter went home justified, not the former; for whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted."

GOSPEL MEDITATION Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time Luke 18:9-14

Every now and then readers of these reflections write letters in which they object to something. Years ago, this Gospel of Luke 18 prompted such an email. A man wrote to me: "I find it deeply offensive that you suggest we are still sinners once we are God's sons and daughters." His objection stirred in me a profound awareness of the paradox at the heart of our faith. Are we sinners or beloved children of God?

In this Gospel (Luke 18:9-14), a tax collector appears as one who has missed the mark. His sins have isolated him. His breast-beating is not an act of self-flagellation for pride's sake but a heartfelt admission of his failure and unworthiness. Remarkably, Jesus honors the candid humility of the parable's penitent. Why? Because we are always in need of mercy, always. But even more, perhaps because on the cross, Jesus will fully embrace a similar place of humiliation and rejection. He will enter into the most shameful, offensive place of the sinner so that we might "go home justified."

There is a sacred tension in admitting that we are sinners and yet have profound hope. We are beloved sons and daughters of God, growing precisely through our honest acceptance of failure. When we cry, "Have mercy on us," during Mass or when we repeat the "Jesus Prayer" in quiet moments, or in the confessional, we embrace our imperfections as fertile ground for divine grace. In doing so, we follow Christ's example — finding true exaltation in the humble acknowledgment of our human frailty.

30TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME WORD SEARCH

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FAMILY ACTIVITY

To go with Luke 18:9-14, start by reading the story together. Talk about how one man bragged about himself while the other man was humble and asked God for forgiveness. Explain that being humble means remembering that we need God's help and treating others kindly. Then, give each family member a small mirror or a piece of paper shaped like a mirror. Ask everyone to decorate the frame with drawings or stickers that remind them of kindness, love, and forgiveness. In the middle (or on the back), have them write a short prayer like, "God, help me to have a humble heart." Afterward, let everyone share one way they can show humility that week-such as saying sorry, helping someone, or giving thanks instead of bragging. This activity helps remind the whole family that God looks at our hearts, not just our words, and He loves when we come to Him with honesty and humility.

Mini Explanation —

Often one of the first prayers taught to children, the Guardian Angel Prayer consists of two rhyming couplets invoking the protection of one's guardian angel. Its exact authorship is unknown, but it originated in the medieval period.

The Guardian Angel Prayer, Explained!

The Guardian Angel Prayer, also known as the Angel of God Prayer, invokes the protection of one's guardian angel. Often one of the first prayers taught to children, it consists of two rhyming couplets: "Angel of God, my guardian dear, to whom God's love commits me here, ever this day be at my side, to light and guard, to rule and guide."

The exact authorship of this prayer is unknown. Scholars previously attributed it to St. Anselm of Canterbury, though many now believe a version composed by Reginald of Canterbury in his "Life of Malchus" serves as the prayer's inspiration.


Guardian Angels are referred to in Scripture in the Book of Daniel (Dan. 12:1), the Gospel of Matthew (Matthew 18:10) and the Psalms (91:10-13). "From its beginning until death, human life is surrounded by their watchful care and intercession," says the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC 336).

Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

A theme of humility connects today's Scripture readings. In the Book of Sirach, the prophet states: the one who serves God willingly is heard...the Most High responds to those who persist in their petitions. In St. Luke's Gospel, the evangelist retells Jesus' parable of the self-righteous and arrogant Pharisee and the humble and contrite tax collector. In this story, the Pharisee is humbled, and the sinful tax collector is exalted. In Paul's Second Letter to Timothy, he instructs his followers that God grants us strength to do His will, even if all abandon us in time of need. Faith-filled stewards recognize their sinful nature and humbly seek the Lord's mercy and forgiveness, especially through the Sacrament of Penance. Participate in this sacrament regularly to receive Christ's gifts of forgiveness, grace, and peace.

(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC – BENEATH THE SURFACE

Mini reflection: The Pharisee did the right thing sometimes. He fasted. He tithed. But he gazed so long at his own holiness that he became blinded by it. He stood before God, and he could only think of what he had done right.

Tunnel Vision

There are some parents on the playground I really can't stand.

You know them, probably, if you're a parent, or if you're not, you know a different version of them. They'll tell you about how their little Brayden is a bilingual violin prodigy who sleeps through the night and only ever asks to snack on vegetables. But as soon as Brayden starts to chase your screaming kid with a stick, they're conveniently scrolling on their phone, unaware.

You're not irritated that their kid is smarter than yours and likes veggies (well, maybe you are, a little). You're irritated that they have tunnel vision. In striving for perfection, they have become unable to acknowledge imperfections.

If you're reading this, you're probably in church. If you're in church, you're probably someone who is concerned with what is right and what is wrong. I've got news for you: that might just make you (and me) more at risk of being like Brayden's parent than the people who stayed home today.

Unclutch your pearls! It was good of you to come to Mass. Definitely keep doing that. That's the right choice. Just don't forget that in making the right choice, we don't *become righteous*.

Look, I'm not going to lie to you. Sometimes, it's my kids who are doing the chasing with the stick. They're kids, and kids do dumb things, just like everyone else. And maybe it's because they hate vegetables and sleep terribly that I'm less reluctant than Brayden's mom to admit their mistakes. It's a hard fall from the pedestal.

If we're churchgoing followers of Christ, we are hopefully people who earnestly want to do the right thing. Maybe, sometimes, we do exactly that. The Pharisee did the right thing sometimes. He fasted. He tithed. But he gazed so long at his own holiness that he became blinded by it. He stood before God, and he could only think of what he had done right.

We need to stay vigilant, folks. Just when you look away, that's when Brayden grabs the stick.

1 pkg. Knorr dehydrated vegetable soup mix


1/4 c. onion, very finely chopped

Adoration Chapel

In the documents of the Second Vatican Council, the Church Fathers describe the Eucharist as: "The source and summit of the Christian life. The term "Eucharist" originates in the Greek word Eucharistia, meaning thanksgiving.

"Take; this is my body" Mark 14:22

- 1. The real presence of Christ in the Eucharist is real, true and substantial.
- 2. "It is called the Eucharist because it is an action of thanksgiving to God." (CCC. No. 1328)
- 3. "Jesus awaits us in the sacrament of love." (St. John Paul II, Dominicae cene, no. 3)
- 4. Eucharist makes the one present sacrifice of Christ the Savior." (CCC, no. 1330)

If you would like to take the opportunity to be still and listen to God (without worldly interruptions), we have a need for almost every hour to have a second adorer, thereby making less the need for a substitute.
