

Notes from Fr. Steve

The Feast of the Holy Family is a significant celebration in the Christian liturgical calendar, particularly within the Catholic Church. Observed on the Sunday within the Octave of Christmas, or on December 30th when no Sunday falls within the octave, this feast honors the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph as a model for all Christian families.

The formal observance of the Feast of the Holy Family was introduced by Pope Leo XIII in 1893 as part of his efforts to uphold the sanctity of family life in response to the societal changes and challenges of the time. In 1921, Pope Benedict XV extended the feast to the universal Church, emphasizing its importance for Catholics worldwide. The celebration reflects the Church's recognition of the family as the basic unit of society and a vital element in nurturing faith and moral values.

The Gospel readings for the Feast of the Holy Family often center on the life of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph as depicted in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke. Lay passages include the Nativity, the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple, and the Flight into Egypt, all of which highlight the virtues of faith, obedience, and mutual love that characterized the Holy Family.

The Holy Family lived a life of simplicity and humility in Nazareth. Despite the unique nature of their mission, they faced many of the same struggles and challenges as any family. These experiences make them relatable and an ideal example for Christian families striving to live lives rooted in faith and devotion.

- 1. **Faith and Trust in God:** The Holy Family's unwavering trust in God's plan is a central theme. Mary's fiath ("Let it be done to me according to your word"), Joseph's obedience to angelic messages, and Jesus' submission to His earthly parents demonstrate profound faith that Christians are called to emulate.
- 2. **Sacrificial Love:** The Feast of the Holy Family underscores the importance of sacrificial love within families. Each member of the Holy Family puts the needs of others above their own, exemplifying the selfless love that should characterize family relationships.
- 3. **Holiness in Daily Life:** The hidden years of Jesus' life in Nazareth remind believers that sanctity is often cultivated in the ordinary moments of daily life. The Holy Family's example shows that even mundane tasks and routines can be sanctified when performed with love and dedication to God.

In today's world, families face numerous challenges, from economic pressures to cultural shifts that can undermine the traditional family structure. The Feast of the Holy Family serves as a reminder of the enduring values that sustain strong, faith-filled families. It invites families to pray together, support one another, and seek God's guidance in their journey.


Pope Francis has often highlighted the importance of family life, describing the family as "the first school of human values." On this feast day, many parishes encourage families to participate in Mass together and reflect on how they can grow in love, unity, and holiness.

The liturgical celebration of the Feast of the Holy Family includes specific prayers and readings that focus on family life and the virtues exemplified by Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. The Collect prayer for the feast asks God to help families imitate the Holy Family so that they may enjoy eternal happiness in heaven.

The Feast of the Holy Family is a profound opportunity for Christians to reflect on the sacredness of family life. By looking to the Holy Family as a model, believers are encouraged to foster environments of love, faith, and mutual respect in their own homes. This feast reminds us that, like the Holy Family, all families are called to be domestic churches, places where God's presence is cherished and shared with the world.



Readings for The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph

Reading I Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14

God sets a father in honor over his children; a mother's authority he confirms over her sons. Whoever honors his father atones for sins, and preserves himself from them. When he prays, he is heard; he stores up riches who reveres his mother. Whoever honors his father is gladdened by children, and, when he prays, is heard. Whoever reveres his father will live a long life; he who obeys his father brings comfort to his mother. My son, take care of your father when he is old; grieve him not as long as he lives. Even if his mind fail, be considerate of him; revile him not all the days of his life; kindness to a father will not be forgotten, firmly planed against the debt of your sins—a house raised in justice to you.


Reading IIColossians 3:12-21

Brothers and sisters: Put on, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another, if one has a grievance against another; as the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also do. And over all these put on love, that is, the bond of perfection. And let the peace of Christ control your hearts, the peace into which you were also called in one body. And be thankful. Let the world of Christ dwell in you richly, as in all wisdom you teach and admonish one another, singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or in deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him. Wives, be subordinate to your husbands, as is proper in the Lord. Husbands, love your wives, and avoid any bitterness toward them. Children, obey your parents in everything, for this is pleasing to the Lord. Fathers, do not provoke your children, so they may not become discouraged.

Gospel Luke 2:41-52

Each year Jesus' parents went to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, and when he was twelve years old, they went up according to festival custom. After they had completed its days, as they were returning, the boy Jesus remained in Jerusalem, but his parents did not know it. Thinking that he was in the caravan, they journeyed for a day and looked for him among their relatives and acquaintances, but not finding him, they returned to Jerusalem to look for him. After three days they found him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions, and all who heard him were astounded at his understanding and his answers. When his parents saw him, they were astonished, and his mother said to him, "Son, why have you done this to us? Your father and I have been looking for you with great anxiety." And he said to them, "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" But they did not understand what he said to them. He went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them; and his mother kept all things in her heart. And Jesus advanced in wisdom and age and favor before God and man.

The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph

The topics of family honor and obedience connect today's Scripture passages. The Book of Sirach instructs those who respectfully honor their father and revere their mother atone for their sins and in turn, store up riches. Those who are caregivers for aging parents are also remembered—their generosity is an offering against sin. In St. Luke's Gospel, Mary and Joseph find Jesus in the Temple after a frantic three-day search. The evangelist tells of their return to Nazareth, where Jesus is obedient to them. Pope St. John Paul II emphasized the family as the "Domestic Church." Archbishop Vigneron also discusses the importance of the "Domestic Church" in his pastoral letter, Unleash the Gospel (see: Guidepost 7, Families. https:// www/unleashthegospel.org). Please pray for the faith-filled families, as their discipleship is the foundation for vocations to the priesthood, religious life, permanent diaconate, and other ministries to the Church.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

The Holy Family

As a first-time pastor in a parish, I received a phone call one afternoon from a young married couple, "Father, our 2-year-old son drowned in our pool this morning. We are at the hospital. Please help us." I sped over. The little boy was gone, his body cold, slightly blue, laid out on a bed. His parents were distraught and in shock. For the next few years, I walked with the couple along their difficult and painful road. They openly shared with me how they were often tempted to blame and accuse each other for the loss. And yet, by God's grace, their love for each grew stronger and deeper as the years went by.

The Holy Family was not without its pain and loss, either. Luke tells us, after losing their twelve-year-old son, Joseph and Mary "after three days found him in the temple area, sitting among the teachers..." (Luke 2:46). We don't know specifically what those three days were like for them except for what Mary says: "Your father and I have been looking for you anxiously." The three days of his absence foreshadow his death and burial. His finding in the temple is a kind of resurrection for his family. They had to learn, again and again, that their family was becoming a place where death and resurrection was not only accepted but welcomed and celebrated. But surely they deeply felt the dangerous agony of their loss — just like every couple who has lost a child.

What losses in your experience of family still cause you anxiety? In what ways has God's presence seemingly vanished in your family? Will you keep searching for Jesus? Remember, he will rise and be found. Your family may be suffering, but when he is found, it will be stronger than ever before.



Everyday Stewardship



Are we committed to a life of stewardship that not only serves as a good example, but also helps our relatives thrive? Using our gifts without wisdom might mean we have little to give to those we love. Finally, do we hold each other accountable for our decisions and shortcomings?

We are on the journey of life together, and no one exists in the Body of Christ alone. Stewardship is about the entirety of our lives. Our faith life is not reserved to Mass on a Sunday. It all begins and ends with those we love.



Old Fashioned Bread Pudding

4 to 8 slices bread

2 Tbsp. margarine

1/3 c. brown sugar

1/3 c. granulated white sugar

2 1/2 c. scalded milk

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Dash of salt

1 tsp. vanilla

3 eggs, beaten slightly

1/3 c. raisins

Melt margarine in warm milk. Mix vanilla with eggs. Put everything in bowl, mix good and pour in buttered casserole dish or bread pan. Bake 30 minutes at 350 F or until you insert a knife and it comes out clean. Serve warm or cold with or without a topping (Cool Whip).

- 1. The real presence of Christ in the Eucharist is real, true and substantial.
- 2. "It is called the Eucharist because it is an action of thanksgiving to God." (CCC. No. 1328)
- 3. "Jesus awaits us in the sacrament of love." (St. John Paul II, Dominicae cene, no. 3)
- 4. Eucharist makes the one present sacrifice of Christ the Savior." (CCC, no. 1330)
