Notes from Fr. Steve

Over sixty years ago, the Catholic Church experienced one of the most important moments in its modern history; **The Second Vatican Council,** or **Vatican II** (1962-1965). Called by **Pope St. John XXIII**, the Council was not meant to change the faith, but to **renew the Church**—helping it bring the timeless truth of the Gospel to the modern world with fresh energy and understanding.

The Council sought what Pope John XXIII called *aggiornamento*—meaning "bringing up to date." The goal was to open the windows of the Church so that the light of the Holy Spirit could refresh and renew her life and mission. Vatican II wanted the Church to engage the world, not withdraw from it—to read "the signs of the times" and proclaim Christ in ways that spoke to the hearts of people today.

Major Points of Vatican II

1. The Church as the People of God:

The Council emphasized that all the baptized share in the mission of the Church—not just the priests and religious. Every Christian is called to holiness and to serve others.

2. Active Participation in the Liturgy:

Vatican II encouraged the faithful to take part more fully in the Mass—praying, singing, and understanding the Scriptures and prayers in their own language.

3. The Role of Scripture:

The Bible was placed at the center of the Church's life. Catholics were urged to read, study, and pray with Scripture.

4. Ecumenism and Dialogue:

The Council opened the door to respectful dialogue with other Chrisitan denominations and with people of other faiths.

5. The Church in the Modern World:

Vatican II taught that the Church must engage with social, cultural, and moral issues—promoting peace, justice, and the dignity of every human person.

When Pope Francis says he wants the Church to be **synodal**, he is continuing the spirit of Vatican II. The word *synod* comes from Greek, meaning "Walking together." A **synodal Church** is one where all the baptized—laity, clergy, and religious—**listen to one another**, **pray together**, **and discern the voice of the Holy Spirit** as one family of faith.

Pope Francis envisioned a Church that listens more than it lectures, that welcomes rather than excludes, and that journeys together in humility and hope. Synodality is not a new program—it is a way of being Church rooted in communion, participation, and mission.

Vatican II called the Church to renewal and dialogue with the world. Pope Francis was reminding us that this renewal is ongoing—that to be faithful to the Gospel today, we must walk together, listen to one another, and let the Holy Spirit guide our steps. I am writing about this today because the archbishop has begun a synodal dialogue on the restructuring of the Archdiocese of Detroit, and its parishes and resources. In the next few weeks, I will give you more information when I receive it as this "Spirit" driven process begins. The goal is to create a diocese and parishes that thrive in ministering to God's people now and into the distant future. Please pray that the Holy Spirit guide us as we journey together in restructuring the archdiocese.

Please remember to pray for the parish, especially the sick and the suffering, your prayers bring them healing, comfort and peace! God bless you and those you love!


streets of Italy, Abbi decided to paint her senior parking spot with that saying. What a statement of youth evangelization to her





Readings for the The Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading I 2 Kings 5:14-17

Naaman went down and plunged into the Jordan seven times at the word of Elisha, the man of God. His flesh became again like the flesh of a little child, and he was clean of his leprosy. Naaman returned with his whole retinue to the man of God. On his arrival he stood before Elisha and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth, except in Israel. Please accept a gift from your servant." Elisha replied, "As the LORD lives whom I serve, I will not take it"; and despite Naaman's urging, he still refused. Naaman said: "If you will not accept, please let me, your servant, have two mule-loads of earth, for I will no longer offer holocaust or sacrifice to any other god except to the LORD."

Reading II 2 Timothy 2:8-13

Beloved: Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David: such is my gospel, for which I am suffering, even to the point of chains, like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore, I bear everything for the sake of those who are chosen, so that they too may obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, together with eternal glory. This saying is trustworthy: If we have died with him we shall also live with him; if we persevere we shall also reign with him. But if we deny him he will deny us. If we are unfaithful he remains faithful, for he cannot deny himself.

Gospel *Luke 17:11-19*

As Jesus continued his journey to Jerusalem, he traveled through Samaria and Galilee. As he was entering a village, ten lepers met him. They stood at a distance from him and raised their voices, saying, "Jesus, Master! Have pity on us!" And when he saw them, he said, "Go show yourselves to the priests." As they were going they were cleansed. And one of them, realizing he had been healed, returned glorifying God in a loud voice; and he fell at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. He was a Samaritan. Jesus said in reply, "Ten were cleansed, were they not? Where are the other nine? Has not this foreigner returned to give thanks to God?" Then he said to him, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you."

GOSPEL MEDITATION Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time Luke 17:11-19

Dorothy Day, the great Catholic activist, doubted God's existence. At least in her early adult years. But something changed when after giving birth to her daughter, she experienced an overwhelming gratitude. She later described how, as she held her daughter, the only appropriate response was a kind of unlimited gratitude. She had done nothing to deserve such a gift — this tiny, miraculous life — but there she was, flooded with gratitude, completely undone by the love of such a Giver.

Something similar occurs in Luke 17:19 when Jesus tells a healed leper, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you." This man had already received physical healing through his faith. But the moment of an even deeper transformation came when he turned back, fell at Jesus' feet, and gave thanks. Like Dorothy, this man's gratitude led him to encounter the Giver.

Isn't that what we want, too? Gratitude to God has the power to break our chains of sadness, bitterness, and disenchantment. It empowers us to step out of the prison of self-pity and into the reality of God's abundant love. It shifts our focus from what we lack to what we have received, from what wounds us to what heals us. Where do we learn this? The Mass. The priest prays: "It is truly right and just, our duty and our salvation, always and everywhere to give you thanks." Always. Everywhere. Not just when life is easy. Not just when prayers are answered as we expect. Gratitude is not a passive feeling; it is an act of faith. In the eucharist, we remember that Christ himself has given everything for us. And in this act of gratitude, we are healed.




We know this is nothing new when we look at the story of Jesus' healing of the ten lepers. After healing ten, only one comes back to show gratitude to the healer. Why did 90% of those healed not offer thanks?

We may also believe because everyone receives the same gifts — things like life, air, and the planet — that God didn't single us out, and our obligation to offer thanks is diminished. However, gratitude is never obligated. The other 9 did not get their leprosy back due to ungrateful hearts. Gratitude is simply the gift we give to the one who was generous to us in the first place. A gift for a gift. Generosity gives birth to more generosity. Without as much gratitude in the world, there is less chance for an increase of love and generosity. So, who do you need to thank today?

Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In today's Scripture readings in the Second Book of Kings and St. Luke's Gospel, we hear of the miraculous curing of those who have contracted leprosy. In Kings, Naaman is encouraged to seek out the prophet Elisha to cure his disease. After much uncertainty, he follows Elisha's counsel and is healed. In gratitude, Naaman constructs an altar in his homeland to *no* longer offer holocaust or sacrifice to any other god except to the Lord. In the Gospel of St. Luke, the evangelist narrates the account of the 10 lepers who encounter Jesus en route to Jerusalem and are healed. Yet only one, a Samaritan, returns in gratitude to thank Jesus. As stewards on a faith journey, do we remember to thank our Lord for His abundant blessings, or do we take our gifts for granted? Have we adopted an "attitude of gratitude?" Thank the Lord daily for at least five blessings received.

Mini reflection: I have enough faith to know that God can heal me. But do I have enough faith to embrace the purpose for which He heals me?

Your Faith Has Saved You

Your faith has saved you. These are the words I pray I will hear when my heart stops beating, when the last breath has left my lungs.

We hear Jesus say these words, or words like them, several times in the Gospels: to the woman bold enough to grasp for his cloak in a crowd, to the men who testify to their belief that he can restore their sight, to the leper kneeling before him in thanks.

These are some of my favorite passages in all of Scripture, because they illustrate so beautifully what salvific faith is — and what it is not.

It's so easy to think that I have done all the necessary work by simply *believing*. Yes, Christ is my Savior. Yes, the Church is his bride. Yes, this doctrine is true, that dogma is infallible, so on and so forth.

I believe!

Well, so what? Satan believes, too. It doesn't do him any good.

The lepers had faith — so they begged Jesus to heal them. They had faith — so they followed his instructions and went to the priests. Their faith was sufficient to motivate these actions, which led to their physical healing. But only one had faith strong enough to understand that physical healing doesn't mean anything without spiritual results. Only one had enough faith to go back to the source of his healing and say, "Thank you. Now what?"

I have enough faith to know that God can heal me. But do I have enough faith to embrace the purpose for which He heals me?

If Jesus tells you that your faith has saved you, he isn't talking about faith as merely an internally held belief. In each of these Gospel passages, he's talking about faith as a conviction that is making itself seen. Heard. Felt. He's talking about an arm that is reaching for the hem of a garment, a voice that says "I believe" or a knee that is bent in gratitude.

He's talking about faith that is so strong it becomes action. This is the faith I hope I can have.

Quick Beef Soup

1/2 lb. ground beef, browned and drained

1/2 pkg. dry onion soup mix

4 c. boiling water

10 oz. pkg. frozen mixed vegeta-

16 oz. can tomatoes, chopped

8 oz. can tomato sauce

1 tsp. sugar

1 c. fine noodles or small Shell macaroni

Cook ingredients together for 1/2 hour. To make more soup, add 1 can of beef broth or beef consommé and 1 more package of vegetables. Add water to taste.

In the documents of the Second Vatican Council, the Church Fathers describe the Eucharist as: "The source and summit of the Christian life. The term "Eucharist" originates in the Greek word Eucharistia, meaning thanksgiving.
