National Religious Retirement Office Announces Annual Retirement Fund for Religious Collection

**DETROIT, Oct. 31, 2024** — The National Religious Retirement Office (NRRO) is announcing the annual Retirement Fund for Religious collection, scheduled in parishes throughout the Archdiocese of Detroit on the weekend of Dec. 7-8.

In 2023, parishioners contributed \$455,779.85 to the collection. From this collection, the Basilian Fathers received a total of \$94,928.65 in financial support made possible by the Retirement Fund for Religious.

Mr. John Knutsen, NRRO director, expresses gratitude for the "profound generosity" of U.S. Catholics, emphasizing the importance of ensuring the "comfort and dignity" of those who have served tirelessly. "As we prepare for this year's collection," Knutsen stated, "we invite all Catholics to join us in honoring the legacy of these dedicated women and men by contributing to their well-deserved care."

Escalating healthcare costs and a lack of traditional retirement plans have created financial challenges for many religious communities. The Retirement Fund for Religious addresses this need, supporting more than 20,000 religious over the age of 70. In 2023, the average annual cost for their care was roughly \$59,700 per person. With skilled nursing care, the average cost was \$90,700.

Since its establishment in 1988, the collection has raised over \$1 billion, with nearly \$870 million distributed for direct care and over \$103.5 million allocated to self-help projects.

In 2023, the appeal raised \$29.3 million, providing financial assistance for the retirement needs of 286 U.S. religious communities. Beyond financial aid, the collection supports educational programs, empowering religious communities to plan for their long-term needs.

#### About the NRRO

The NRRO coordinates the annual national appeal for the Retirement Fund for Religious and distributes financial assistance to eligible religious communities. It is sponsored by the Conference of Major Superiors of Men, the Council of Major Superiors of Women Religious, the Leadership Conference of Women Religious and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops.

"Hail the King of the Jews." The kingship of Christ has always been different than the world expected. Many of Jesus' disciples hoped for an earthly Messiah who would overthrow the Romans. But, as Jesus says in today's Gospel, his kingdom is "not of this world." And yet it is a very real kingdom. Jesus is a very real Lord. And we are called to invite Jesus to be king of our lives. In the early 20th century, disillusionment with authority of all kinds was growing. Revolutions, atheistic thinkers, and World War I contributed to a rejection of faith. In 1925, Pope Pius XI called the Church and the world back to a sense of hope in Christ. He instituted the solemnity of Christ the King on the last Sunday before Advent. How is Jesus king of your life today?

Everyday Stewardship

The ancient Greek dramatist, Euripides, wrote, "No one can confidently say that he will still be living tomorrow." We seldom focus on that reality and often act like we are confident of a tomorrow. However, we all know names of those who died suddenly, maybe in tragedy or simply in the quiet of sleep. Calling those names to mind will probably still not force most of us to contemplate our own mortality tonight before placing our head on the pillow, but perhaps it should.

We don't need to obsess about dying or fear the unknown, but realizing the gift of today and reflecting on the possibility that it may be our last day can cause us to act differently. We might forgive more easily, argue less, and embrace one another. Rather than procrastinate, we might act now. We could become more mindful of our surroundings, see the needs in people, and reach out to those who are lost.

I write these Everyday Stewardship reflections every Sunday. You might read them in your parish bulletin, on a website, or in social media every Sunday. Just in case this is the last Sunday you ever have a chance to read these reflections, what is God calling you to do now before it's too late. If you are still here next Sunday after taking all this seriously, you might wonder at what it was to live more fully and to give of yourself more freely. Don't let a single day pass you by without truly loving others and your God. One thing you can be confident about: This day will never come again.

# Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

For the Solemnity celebration of Christ the King, today's Scripture readings proclaim the Kingship of our Lord Jesus Christ. In St. John's Gospel, Jesus makes clear to Pilate that *His kingdom does not belong to this world.* In revelation, the Lord God proclaims that he is the Alpha and Omega—the "first and the last" —and will reign for eternity. The Prophet Daniel tells of his vision: one like a Son of man coming, on the clouds of heaven verifying Christ's dominion and glory. How should we venerate our Lord and King? As Christian stewards, we acknowledge Christ's true Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity, present in the Most Holy Eucharist. During Mass, we strive to partake of Him in a prayerful, reverent, and respectful manner. The Eucharist is the "source and summit" of our faith. Through consumption of the Eucharist, we encounter Jesus in a personal way. He heals and strengthens us to do His work, especially for our needy brothers and sisters. As we acknowledge our Lord and Savior as King of the universe, may His joy and peace reign in our hearts, and may that joy and peace overflow to everyone we meet. Please take time to attend the next Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction at your parish.

# Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

When I was a young boy in Burlington, Vermont, my dad had a good friend named Phil who owned a sporting goods store. I loved sports, so meandering the treasure-filled aisles was an unmitigated joy. One afternoon, we were shopping for a baseball glove. Dad said to me, "Hey Johnny, see that man who just walked into the store? *That's* Phil." I remember being fascinated and a little terrified. I recall thinking, "That man right there is in charge of *everything* in this store!" He reigned over every ball, sneaker, jersey, and sweatsuit. Phil became a family friend. And he was a good owner. The store flourished, and I found myself even more at peace every time I went there. I felt a new hope and even responsibility for the store to flourish.

To say that Christ is the King of the Universe means that Jesus has absolute authority over everything in it. It should fill us with awe and fascination. He is in charge. The world and everything in it are finally his. Knowing that he knows and loves us should make us also feel a deep peace at being a part of his universe. This leads us to want his kingdom to flourish, to play some responsible role in it.

We advance his kingdom by promoting the truth. "Everyone who is of the truth hears my voice," Christ the King proclaims. In Phil's store, it was about the truth of athletics. In our world, it's all about the truth of all creation, especially the dignity of the human person, made by and for our loving God. Let's rejoice that we know the true king and commit to the flourishing of his kingdom.







# **Pumpkin Cheesecake**

#### **CRUST:**

1 c. ground pecans

1/2 c. ground gingersnaps

1/4 c. sugar

1/4 c. butter

Mix ingredients. Spray springform pan with Pam. Press ingredients into pan and refrigerate.

#### FILLING:

4 (8 oz.) pkgs. Cream cheese

1 1/2 c. sugar

6 eggs

3 tbsp. flour

2 tsp. cinnamon

1 tsp. cloves

1 tsp. ginger

1/2 tsp. nutmeg

16 oz. can pumpkin

1 c. heavy cream

2 tsp. vanilla

Beat cream cheese until fluffy. Add sugar and beat until smooth. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. In a small bowl, mix the flour, cinnamon, cloves, ginger, nutmeg, pumpkin, heavy cream and vanilla. Gradually add to cream cheese and beat until smooth. Pour into pie crust. Bake 15 minutes in a 425 F oven, then reduce heat to 300 F and bake an additional 90 to 105 minutes. Turn off oven and leave in until cool, 30 to 60 minutes.

## TOPPING:

1 c. heavy cream

1/4 c. powdered sugar

1/4 to 1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice

1/2 tsp. vanilla

Combine all ingredients and spread on cheesecake.

- 4. Eucharist makes the one present sacrifice of Christ the Savior." (CCC, no. 1330)

#### **Parish Registration:**

Welcome to all new families/individuals. Please register as soon as possible. Membership is a condition for the reception of the Sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation, First Eucharist, Confirmation and Marriage.

Registration is also required before the parish can issue a sponsorship certificate for those asked to be a sacramental sponsor. Registration forms are available in the Parish Office.

Arrangements must be made through the Parish Office at least six months prior to the desired wedding date. One person of the couple must be an active, registered member of St. Rene Goupil Parish for six months.
