

Notes from Fr. Steve

This past week on Friday we celebrated the Feast of St. Anthony, so I thought it might be timely to share something here about his life and spirituality. St. Anthony of Padua, born Fernando Martins de Bulhoes in Lisbon, Portugal, in 1195, is one of the most beloved saints in the Catholic Church. Known as the "Hammer of Heretics" and the "Wonder Worker," his life and spirituality continue to inspire countless individuals worldwide.

Fernando grew up in a wealthy and devout family, receiving an excellent education. At the age of 15, he entered the Augustinian monastery in Lisbon to deepen his spiritual life and devotion to God. However, inspired by the martyrdom of Franciscan missionaries in Morocco, Fernando was moved to join the newly formed Franciscan Order in 1220, taking the name Anthony in honor of the Desert Father, St. Anthony of Egypt.

Anthony's desire to preach the Gospel and imitate Christ lead him to Morocco, but illness forced him to return. Providentially, his ship was blown off course, and he landed in Sicily, eventually settling in Italy, where his eloquence and holiness would make him renowned.

Anthony's exceptional talent for preaching was discovered somewhat unexpectedly at a gathering of Franciscans and Dominicans. His profound knowledge of Scripture and theology, combined with his humility and deep faith, captivated his audience. He soon became a powerful preacher, traveling extensively throughout Italy and France to combat heresy, call people to repentance, and bring them closer to God.

He was so effective that Pope Gregory IX referred to him as the "Ark of the Testament." His sermons were marked by clarity, simplicity, and compassion, which made profound theological truths accessible to both the educated and uneducated alike.

St. Anthony is renowned for the many miracles attributed to him during his life and after his death. Stories of healing, protection, and even the restoration of life to the dead surround his legacy. Perhaps the most famous is the miracle of the mule, where a disbeliever was converted after his mule knelt before the Blessed Sacrament.

In popular devotion, St. Anthony is invoked as the patron saint of lost items. This stems from an incident where a novice who had stolen a book of psalms returned it after being confronted by Anthony's prayers.

St. Anthony's spirituality was deeply rooted in the Franciscans tradition, emphasizing poverty, humility, and charity. He encouraged others to live the Gospel fully, particularly through acts of service to the poor and marginalized. His writings reflect a profound love for Christ and a desire for union with God.

Anthony's life exemplified trust in divine providence and a commitment to spreading the Good news. He urged his listeners to seek a deep personal relationship with Christ and to allow their lives to be transformed by the power of the Holy Spirit.

- St. Anthony of Padua passed away on June 13, 1231, at the age of 36, in Arcella, Italy. He was canonized less than a year later by Pope Gregory IX, a testament to his widespread impact. His tomb in Padua has become a major pilgrimage site, and he was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1946 by Pope Pius XII.
- St. Anthony's of Padua's feast day on June 13 is a time for Catholics to reflect on his example of holiness and dedication to God. His life reminds us of the transformative power of faith, the importance of humility, and the call to serve others with love and compassion.

Through his intercession, may we grow closer to Christ and live out the Gospel in our daily lives. Please remember the parish in your prayers, especially the sick and the suffering, your prayers bring them healing, comfort and peace. May God bless you and your family!


Everyday Stewardship

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP It Takes All Kinds

"If every flower wanted to be a rose," wrote St. Therese of Lisieux, "spring would lose its loveliness."

Who is God asking you to be today? There is an obvious answer that springs to mind right out of the gate. God wants me to be a good person (a good father, a good husband) today; today, God wants me to be a saint.

But this answer fails to get to the heart of the question. We are all striving today to serve the same Spirit, but we are given different gifts to do so. The one who has the gift of knowledge may fail if today he decides he wants to be a healer. The one who has the gift of "varieties of tongues" might falter in the expression of wisdom.

Think about the wedding at Cana and the players in the scene: the servers, the guests, the bride and groom. They all have a unique role to play, and though it is to the servers that Mary gives the instruction, "Do whatever he tells you," her words apply to all.

Today, are we called to be the servers — do we wait on God's instruction and carry it out, no matter how foolish or impossible it may seem to our human ears? Are we asked to be the disciples, to bear witness to a miracle and to give our testimony? Are we called to imitate the Blessed Mother herself and give encouragement to follow God's word?

Let us examine our gifts and listen in the silence of our hearts to the direction of the Spirit. Then and only then, let us do whatever He tells us.

Reading I Isaiah 62:1-5


For Zion's sake I will not be silent, for Jerusalem's sake I will not be quiet, until her vindication shines forth like the dawn and her victory like a burning torch. Nations shall behold your vindication, and all the kings your glory; you shall be called by a new name pronounced by the mouth of the LORD. You shall be a glorious crown in the hand of the LORD, a royal diadem held by your God. No more shall people call you "Forsaken," or your land "Desolate," but you shall be called "My Delight," and your land "Espoused." For the LORD delights in you and makes your land his spouse. As a young man marries a virgin, your Builder shall marry you; and as a bridegroom rejoices in his bride so shall your God rejoice in you.

Reading II1 Corinthians 12:4-11

Brothers and sisters: There are different kinds of spiritual gifts but the same Spirit; there are different forms of service but the same Lord; there are different workings but the same God who produces all of them in everyone. To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit. To one is given through the Spirit the expression of wisdom; to another, the expression of knowledge according to the same Spirit; to another, faith by the same Spirit; to another, gifts of healing by the one Spirit; to another, mighty deeds; to another, prophesy; to another, discernment of spirits; to another, varieties of tongues; to another, interpretation of tongues. But one and the same Spirit produces all of these, distributing them individually to each person as he wishes.

Gospel John 2:1-11

There was a wedding at Cana in Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples were also invited to the wedding. When the wine ran short, the mother of Jesus said to him, "They have no wine." And Jesus said to her, "Woman, how does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come." His mother said to the servers, "Do whatever he tells you." Now there were six stone water jars there for Jewish ceremonial washings, each holding twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus told them, "Fill the jars with water." So they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Draw some out now and take it to the headwaiter." So they took it. And when the headwaiter tasted the water that had become wine, without knowing where it came from—although the servers who had drawn the water knew—, the headwaiter called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves good wine first, and then when people have drunk freely, an inferior one; but you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this as the beginning of his signs at Cana in Galilee and so revealed his glory, and his disciples began to believe in him.

GOSPEL MEDITATION

A friend invited me to an invitation-only wine-tasting event. There were over two hundred varieties of wine. Having no idea how to approach such a massive selection, I wandered aimlessly among the tables, sipping this and that. At the end of the evening my friend asked if I had tried some of the exceptionally expensive wines. I hadn't. "The really good stuff disappears first," he said. "My man, you missed out on some amazing vino." I was so disappointed. I wasted my chance for amazing once-in-a-lifetime wine. The wine I tasted was, well, *blah*.

Don't we often feel a similar disappointment in life? I missed this or that opportunity. If only I had known. Optimism sputters and fades. The glory days are gone. The chances, it seems, for the really great things in life come and go so quickly. Then they are gone forever. The good stuff goes first. Then life is just *blah*.

Not so with the Lord Jesus. In Jesus' miracle at the wedding at Cana, the steward of the feast says, "Everyone serves good wine first, and then... an inferior one" (John 2:10). That's the natural downward progression of life. The good stuff disappears quickly. But he says of the groom (who symbolizes Jesus), "But you have kept the good wine until now." This is the ever-improving trajectory of the realm of God's grace. With Jesus, the "good wine" of divine love, hope and peace gets better as our journey of faith progresses. Where are your greatest disappointments? Don't give in to the lie that the really good stuff is gone. Tell Jesus you've run out. Then learn how to taste *that* amazingly good wine, because he saves the best until now.

They showed up with presents and sang "Happy Birthday" and stood around patiently while my kid ripped through his cache of gifts. The very least they were expecting was to be fed sufficiently.


I'll tell you what, I sure could have used the Blessed Mother that night.


I love the story of the wedding at Cana because it's such a silly little miracle. I don't mean to be disrespectful — of course it's an incredibly important moment in Christ's public life. But it's not healing a leper. It's not raising the dead. It's not even walking on water. It's saving a young couple from embarrassment.

I think sometimes we forget, or even refuse, to bring small concerns and inconveniences to God because we think we should be able to handle them on our own. What a ridiculous attitude that is — as if we could handle anything on our own. It's so fitting that Mary, ever the observant Mother, is the one to bring the matter to Jesus' attention. He asks her what this problem has to do with him. She doesn't answer him, because, between you and me, I don't think he's asking her. I think he's asking us. All she does is tell the waiters what I consider to be the best piece of advice in all of Scripture: "Do whatever he tells you."

I'm so quick to throw up my hands and feel sorry for myself when I encounter a barrier in my life. What I should be doing is taking the matter to God, and then doing whatever He tells me.



Devotions, *Explained!* The Angelus


Mini Explanation

The Angelus is an ancient devotion whose practice developed over the course of several centuries. It is composed of three antiphons that tell the story of the annunciation, each followed by a Hail Mary. It is usually said daily at noon.

The Angelus, Explained

The incarnation of Christ changed the life of every Christian person who ever lived. Reflecting on that moment in salvation history is an opportunity for grace, growth and peace. Who wouldn't want that every day, or even three times every day?

The Angelus is composed of three antiphons which narrate the annunciation, each followed by the recitation of a Hail Mary (a prayer that itself contains the "angelic greeting" of the angel Gabriel). Its name is derived from the first words of the prayer in Latin. This devotion was developed over the course of several centuries and is rooted in the ancient practice of saying three Hail Marys in the evening. Historically, people were called to prayer by the ringing of church bells — "the Angelus bells." Most people who recite the Angelus do so daily at noon, though it is often said in the morning, at noon and in the evening.

Pound Cake

1 lb. butter or margarine (I use 1/2 of each)

1 lb. sifted powdered sugar

1 rsp. Almond extract
