

Notes from Fr. Steve

This Third Sunday of Advent—Gaudete Sunday—invites us to rejoice, for the Lord is nearby! The rose candle we light today reminds us that even in the midst of waiting, God is already breaking into our lives with hope, light and promise.

Our Gospel this week reflects on the journey of the Magi (Matthew 2:1-12). Though traditionally read during the Epiphany, this passage offers a powerful Advent lesson in **discipleship.** The Magi were seekers. They noticed the star, paid attention to God's signs, and responded with courage. They set out on a long, uncertain journey because they believed that God was doing something new—and they wanted to be part of it.

Their discipleship unfolds in three steps:

1. They listened and paid attention.

The Magi were alert to God's movement. True discipleship begins with the willingness to notice God's presence—in Scripture, in prayer, in daily life.

2. They acted on what they saw.

The Magi didn't just admire the star; they followed it. Discipleship demands movement, effort, and trust. We, too, are called not only to admire the faith but to actively live it each day.

3. They encountered Christ and were changed.

When they found the Child Jesus, they bowed down in adoration. Their encounter with Christ led them to offer their gifts and then "return by another way." Authentic discipleship always changes us—our priorities, our decisions, our hearts.

As we approach Christmas, the journey of the Magi invites us to reflect:

Are we seeking Christmas?

Are we willing to follow where He leads?

Are we ready to let our encounter with Him transform our lives?

This week, let us pray for the grace to be faithful disciples—attentive, courageous, and open to the Lord's transforming love.

On behalf of the parish community, I want to say farewell to Alex and Flor Sitchon. They have been very active in the parish; and they are moving to be near family in Australia. May the Lord bless them! Please pray they have a safe journey!

As we prepare for the celebration of Christmas, we encourage you to invite your family, friends, and neighbors to join you for Christmas Mass. Your invitation could be the star that leads someone back to Christ.

Please remember the parish in your prayers, especially the sick and the suffering. Your prayers bring them healing, comfort and peace! Happy Advent!

Readings for the The Third Sunday of Advent

Reading I Isaiah 35:1-6a, 10

The desert and the parched land will exult; the steppe will rejoice and bloom. They will bloom with abundant flowers, and rejoice with joyful song. The glory of Lebanon will be given to them, the splendor of Carmel and Sharon; they will see the glory of the LORD, the splendor of our God. Strengthen the hands that are feeble, make firm the knees that are weak, say to those hearts are frightened: Be strong, fear not! Here is your God, he comes with vindication; with divine recompense he comes to save you. Then the eyes of the blind be opened, the ears of the deaf be cleared; then will the lamp leap like a stag, then the tongue of the mute will sing. Those whom the LORD has ransomed will return and enter Zion singing, crowned with everlasting joy; they will meet with joy and gladness, sorrow and mourning will flee.

Reading II James 5:7-10

Be patient, brothers and sisters, until the coming of the Lord. See how the farmer waits for the precious fruit of the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains. You too mut be patient. Make your hearts firm, because the coming of the Lord is at hand. Do not complain, brothers and sisters, about one another, that you may not be judged. Behold, the Judge is standing before the gates. Take as an example of hardship and patience, brothers and sisters, the prophets who spoke in the name of the Lord.

Gospel *Matthew 11:2-11*

When John the Baptist heard in prison of the works of the Christ, he sent his disciples to Jesus with this question, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we look for another?" Jesus said to them in reply, "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have the good news proclaimed to them. And blessed is the one who takes no offense at me." As they were going off, Jesus began to speak to the crowds about John, "What did you go out to the desert and see? A reed swayed by the wind? Then what did you go out to see? Someone dressed in fine clothing? Those who wear fine clothing are in royal palaces. Then why did you go out? To see a prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written: *Behold, I am sending my messenger ahead of you; he will prepare your way before you.* Amen, I say to you, among those born of women there has been none greater than John the Baptist; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he."

(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC – BENEATH THE SURFACE

Mini reflection: We go to Mass. We go to Confession. We pray. We read Scripture. In doing all these things, again and again, we go out to the desert. Why? What are we expecting to see?

What We See in the Desert

I've always wanted to see a real desert.

I know all about frigid, snowy winters and warm, wet summers. I grew up on rich soil that yields lush vegetation and bountiful harvests. But I've never experienced a desert, not in my own country or abroad, and I'm curious.

I know there must be something magical about the desert for it to feature so heavily in Scripture, for it to provide a backdrop to so many crucial moments of salvation history. The Israelites following the cloud, the temptation of Christ, the voice crying out: "Prepare the way for the Lord."

Why do these moments have to happen in a desert? Why do they make so much less sense in a tropical rainforest or a verdant forest?

I think it's because the desert doesn't have anything to offer us, at first glance. No one longs for the physical sensation of a dry heat and a beating sun. But the vast emptiness and the almost mystical harshness — even if we don't desire and delight in it, this is a setting that we understand, somehow, intrinsically. We know it deep within our soul. God is there.

We go to Mass. We go to Confession. We pray. We read Scripture. In doing all these things, again and again, we go out to the desert.

Why? What are we expecting to see?

If we expect to be entertained, we will be disappointed. If we expect reassurance, we will be disappointed. If we expect to feel pleasant and safe and sheltered, we will be disappointed.

The desert is there to challenge us. The desert is there to show us who we are, and who we can be.

So go.

There are many examples of false prophets in history. Some of these gifted charlatans have led people away from family and friends. 

Devotions, *Explained!* Our Lady of Guadalupe



Mini Explanation


Our Lady of Guadalupe appeared to Juan Diego in Mexico City in 1531. The Patroness of the Americas, Our Lady of Guadalupe is a beloved symbol of faith, motherhood and identity. Her feast day is Dec. 12.

Our Lady of Guadalupe, Explained!

The four apparitions of Our Lady of Guadalupe took place in December 1531, when Juan Diego, an indigenous convert to the Catholic faith, encountered a woman dressed as an Aztec princess on Tepeyac Hill in present-day Mexico City. The woman, who was pregnant, spoke to him in his native language. She identified herself as the Mother of God.

Over the next four apparitions, Our Lady requested that Juan Diego implore the local bishop to build a church on the hill, and performed miracles to prove her identity. Through one of the miracles, she imprinted her image onto Juan Diego's *tilma*, or cloak; the tilma bearing that image can still be viewed today at the basilica which now stands on the site of the apparition.

Our Lady of Guadalupe is venerated as the Patroness of the Americas, and she is beloved worldwide as a symbol of mother-hood, faith and identity. Her feast day is Dec. 12.





GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

December 14, 2025 Third Sunday of Advent Matthew 11:2-11

When I was 11, I was riding my bike on a Friday night in Scottsdale, Arizona. I saw giant spotlights swirling in the sky. Something amazing had to be happening. I pedaled after them with excitement. Sweaty and tired, I arrived, only to find a used car lot. Bright lights, flapping banners, inflatable balloon men swaying wildly in the wind. I stood there, heart sinking. All that spectacle, and all my effort ... for this? As life proceeds, we learn what it is like to pursue promising but fruitless searches. This week we hear Jesus ask the crowds regarding John the Baptist:

"What did you go out to the desert to see? A reed swayed by the wind?" (Matthew 11:7). He's not just describing the crowd's mis-aimed pursuit. He's naming our tendency to chase after what's flashy but flimsy.

What are our swaying reeds? For me, it is endless video reels on my phone, worldly pleasures, entertainment in sports, and the good opinion of others. Inflated distractions that bend whichever way the wind blows. But they can't satisfy my soul. What are your flimsy reeds?

John the Baptist wasn't a swaying reed. He was rooted, grounded, unafraid to speak the solid truth. The people went to see him because, deep down, they were starving for something real.

This Advent, the Church asks us to reassess: What are we really looking for? Are we chasing the dazzling but hollow? Or are we seeking what is solid and lasting — that which points to Christ?

All I do is give. Who is giving to me?


Raise your hand if these thoughts have ever run through your head. I'm sure they occur to all of us from time to time. We can become so easily depleted by the fast pace of life and whatever vocation God has called us to, whether that's parenthood, a demanding professional career or the caretaking of friends and family (or as so often happens, a hybrid of all three). Many of us also undergo certain seasons — seasons of the year, but also seasons of life — that seem to sap us of energy and leave us totally empty.

In these times, it seems impossible to continue in the spirituality of Everyday Stewardship. Graciousness, mindfulness, prayerfulness, gratitude, accountability — maintaining some semblance of these characteristics in our daily life feels not only overly optimistic, but totally impossible.

The Church gives us certain liturgical seasons that are meant to fill us up, almost like spiritual pit stops. Advent is one such season, and the Scriptural passages we reflect on at Mass during these four weeks are filled with images of nature defied. We see the dry steppe blooming. We see the weak made firm. We see the frightened made strong. We see the lame walk. We see the Virgin give birth.

If you think you don't have anything left to give this Advent, think again. This is the season of miracles when what we thought was depleted brings new life.

But how can we rejoice in a world full of sorrow? Amid illness and want, injustice and hate?





Scrambled Egg Casserole



1 cup cubed ham or Canadian bacon

1/4 cup chopped green onion

3 Tbs. melted butter

1 dz. Eggs, beaten

4 oz. can sliced mushrooms-drained

1/4 cup melted butter

2 1/4 cups soft bread crumbs

1/8 tsp. paprika

*cheese sauce (below)

Sauté ham and green onion in Tbs. butter in a large skillet until onion is tender. Add eggs and cook over medium-high heat, stirring to form soft curds; when eggs are set, stir in the mushrooms and cheese sauce. Spoon into a greased 13x9 pan. Combine 1/4 cup melted butter and bread crumbs, mixing well; spread evenly over egg mixture. Sprinkle with paprika. Cover and chill overnight. Uncover and bake at 350 F for 30 minutes or until heated thoroughly. (Serves 12-15)

Cheese Sauce:

2 Tbs. butter

2 1/2 Tbs. all-purpose flour

2 cups milk

1/2 tsp. salt

1/8 tsp. pepper

1 cup shredded American or cheddar cheese

Melt butter in a heavy saucepan over low heat; blend in flour and cook 1 minute. Gradually add milk; cook over medium heat until thickened, stirring constantly. Add salt, pepper and cheese stirring until the cheese melts and the mixture is smooth. (Yield: 2 1/2 cups)
