Notes from Fr. Steve

We have a new Pope, and this pope is a member of the Augustinian order. Saying that **Pope Leo is** an Augustinian means that he is a member of the **Order of St. Augustine** or closely follows its **spiritu**al tradition. The Augustinian order is a Roman Catholic religious order that follows the Rule of **St. Au**gustine of Hippo, a 4th-5th century bishop and one of the Church's most influential theologians.

What Does Being an Augustinian Mean?

- It typically refers to someone who is part of the Order of St. Augustine (OSA), a mendicant
 order founded in the 13th century, or affiliated Augustinian communities (like Augustinian Recollects).
- Members live in community, embracing a life of prayer, study, contemplation, and apostolic service.
- They follow the **Rule of St. Augustine**, one of the oldest monastic rules in the Western Church, emphasizing **unity**, **charity**, **and communal living**.

Spirituality of St. Augustine

The spirituality of St. Augustine is deeply **interior**, **intellectual**, **and communal**, centered on seeking **God through the heart and mind**. Key themes include:

1. Interior Journey to God:

- Augustine emphasized that God dwells within us: "Do not go outside yourself: return to yourself. In the interior man dwells truth."
- Personal conversion and continual self-reflection are central.
- 2. Restless Heart:
 - One of Augustine's most famous lines: "Our hearts are restless until they rest in You, O Lord."
 - This reflects the deep human longing for God and the ultimate peace only He can provide.
- 3. Love and Community (Caritas):
 - True Christian life is lived in **loving community.** The Augustinian motto is often: "One mind and one heart on the way to God."
 - Unity an mutual support are core values.
- 4. Search for Truth and Wisdom:
 - Augustine was a philosopher as well as a theologian. His spirituality encourages a **love of learning** and theological reflection in service of faith.
- 5. Grace and Humility:
 - Augustine Stressed the necessity of **God's grace** for salvation and personal transformation.
 - Humility is the foundation of Christian life.

In short, Augustinian spirituality is a path of inward reflection, communal love, and deep dependence on grace, all aimed at a more profound union with God.

Pope Leo brings with him a rich spirituality of mission and service, and as he recently said, "I am walking with Jesus, and I invite everyone to come with me along for the walk". Let us all join Pope Leo and walk with Jesus!

Fifth Sunday of Easter

In today's Gospel from the evangelist St. John, Jesus presents a new directive to His followers: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. Jesus further declares that everyone will know His disciples because of their love for one another. The Scripture passages from the Acts of the Apostles and Book of Revelation affirm God's presence in the lives of disciples who face trials for practicing their faith. Full discipleship in the Lord requires a total sacrificial love for others. In Unleash the Gospel, Archbishop Vigneron emphasizes: Growing as his disciples demands a daily surrender to the one who loves us and gave his life for us: "I live no longer I, but Christ lives in me" (Gal 2:20) (Read, Unleash the Gospel, Marker 9.2, Grow, https:// www.unleashthegospel.org. In a spirit of evangelization, disciples who center their lives in Christ give their God-given gifts of prayer, service, and generosity to their parish and their neighbors in need. When determining their weekly financial sacrificial offering to God, faithful stewards give back their "first fruits" to the Lord—not just what remains after their monthly expenses are paid. Remember, God's generosity is never outdone.

Readings for Fifth Sunday of Easter

Reading I

Acts of the Apostles 14:21-27

After Paul and Barnabas had proclaimed the good news to that city and made a considerable number of disciples, they returned to Lystra and to Iconium and to Antioch. They strengthened the spirits of the disciples and exhorted them to persevere in the faith, saying, "It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the kingdom of God." They appointed elders for them in each church, and, with prayer and fasting, commended them to the Lord in whom they had put their faith. Then they traveled through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. After proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia. From there they sailed to Antioch, where they had been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now accomplished. And when they arrived, they called the church together and reported what God had done with them and how he had opened the door of faith to the Gentiles.

Reading II *Revelation 21:1-5a*

Then I, John saw a new heaven and a new earth. The former heaven and the former earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. I also saw the holy city, a new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, God's dwell-ing is with the human race. He will dwell with them and they will be his people and God himself will always be with them as their God. He will wipe every tear from their eyes, and there shall be no more death or mourning, wailing or pain, for the old order has passed away." The One who sat on the throne said, "Behold, I make all things new."

Gospel John 13:31-33a, 34-35

When Judas had left them, Jesus said, "Now is the Son of Man glorified, and God is glorified in him. If God is glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself, and God will glorify him at once. My children, I will be with you only a little while longer. I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another. This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

"There's something different about you."

Think about the times in your life when this has been said to you. Maybe it was after someone complimented you on a job well done, and you realized that you were walking through life with a little more confidence. Maybe it was after meeting someone special, as you carried the glow of that relationship wherever you went. Devotions, *Explained!* Hail Mary Mini Explanation




The words of the Hail Mary — undoubtedly the most recognizable Catholic prayer after the Lord's Prayer — are deeply rooted in scripture, but Catholics did not begin to utilize the Hail Mary prayer in its current form until around the 11th century.

Hail Mary, Explained

The words of the Hail Mary — undoubtedly the most recognizable Catholic prayer after the Lord's Prayer — are deeply rooted in scripture. The opening lines of the prayer are taken from the words of the angel Gabriel at the Annunciation — "Hail Mary, full of grace, the Lord is with thee." This line is known as the Angelic Salutation. The following words — "Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb, Jesus" — echo the sentiments expressed by Elizabeth at the Visitation.

The Angelic Salutation is regarded as the earliest devotional prayer to Mary, since it forms the very first words spoken to her as the Mother of God, but Catholics did not begin to utilize the Hail Mary prayer in its current form until around the 11th century.

An in-depth explanation of each line of this prayer is provided in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2676-2677.



GOSPEL MEDITATION

5th Sunday of Easter John 13:31-35

I've always found it amazing that Jesus never says to his disciples the straightforward and bumper stickery words "I love you" or "I will always love you" (a la Dolly Parton's song). Why doesn't Jesus say, "I love you"?

Well, actually he does, but in particular ways. He says, "As the Father loves me, so I love you" (John 15:9) thereby rooting his love for us in the space of the Holy Trinity. This week he commands, "Love another as *I have loved you*" (John 13:34). He presents his love for us as a completed action which continues into the present moment. How *has* he loved us? By becoming one of us, one with us, and finally giving his life for us in his suffering on the cross. We weren't there when he did that, but neither were his Apostles (except one). Still, that action is his great "I love you" to us.

His love is also hedged in a command: "Love one another." So how can we practically follow it? The great St. John XXIII wrote in his diary that each day he followed this rule: "Only for today, I will do one good deed and not tell anyone about it." The hidden nature of a good deed is a sign that it is truly loving. This week, take on St. John XXIII's practical method of following Jesus' great commandment of love. It's a splendid way to say, "I love you."





Registration is also required before the parish can issue a sponsorship certificate for those asked to be a sacramental sponsor. Registration forms are available in the Parish Office.

Baptism:

Baptisms are celebrated the third Sunday of the month at 12:00 p.m. A parent preparation class is mandatory. Classes are held on the fourth Saturday of each month at 10:00 a.m. Call the Parish Office during weekday office hours to register for a class.

Penance: Saturday 3:00 p.m. Special schedules for Advent and Lent.

Marriage:

Arrangements must be made through the Parish Office at least six months prior to the desired wedding date. One person of the couple must be an active, registered member of St. Rene Goupil Parish for six months.

Anointing of the Sick:

On request or by appointment through the Parish Office.
