Notes from Fr. Steve

Today we heard the preaching of Mark where Jesus is preaching on service. I wanted to add to the them because it is so very important, so I thought I would take another avenue of thought, this one from the Gospel of John and another from Matthew. Jesus on service, in the Gospel of John, Jesus tells His disciples, "I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you" (John 13:15). These words, spoken after Jesus washed the feet of His disciples, reveal the heart of Christian service. They challenge us to move beyond self-interest and pride, and to step into the humble, loving, and sometimes uncomfortable work of serving others.

At the core of the Christian faith lies the call to service. This call is not merely a suggestion; it is an essential aspect of living out the teachings of Jesus. Throughout His ministry, Jesus demonstrated this by serving others—feeding the hungry, healing the sick, and even washing the feet of His followers. Jesus, the Son of God, didn't come to be served, but to serve (Matthew 20:28). If we are to truly follow Him, we must take up this mantle of service with love and humility.

One of the most powerful moments in Scripture is when Jesus, the King of Kings, kneels to wash the feet of His disciples (John 13:1-17). In doing this, He not only performs a humble task but redefines what leadership and greatness look like in His kingdom. Jesus' actions remind us that the greatest among us are not those who seek positions of power, but those who serve others selflessly.

Humility lies at the heart of Christian service. It means setting aside our own desires, pride, and ego to meet the needs of others. Jesus invites us to look beyond ourselves, to the needs of those around us—whether they are the marginalized, the vulnerable, or even the people we interact with daily.

At the Last Supper, Jesus gave His disciples a new commandment: "Love one another, as I have loved you, so you must love one another" (John 13:34). This love is not simply a feeling, but an active, outward expression. It is a love that requires us to serve others in practical, meaningful ways. When we serve others, we reflect God's love for humanity, offering kindness, compassion, and grace, even when it is difficult or inconvenient.

True service requires sacrifice. Jesus laid down His life for us, the ultimate act of love and service. When we serve others, we follow in His footsteps, choosing to make sacrifices of our time, resources, and energy to meet the needs of our brothers and sisters. This is not always easy, but it is through these small, everyday acts of love and kindness that we build up the body of Christ.

Serving others is not only just about doing good works; it is an act of faith. It is trusting that God will use our efforts, however small or insignificant they may seem, to accomplish His greater purpose. It is believing that through our service, God's kingdom is advancing, lives are being transformed, and His love is being made manifest in the world.

When we serve, we often experience the grace of God in profound ways. Serving others opens our hearts to God's presence, reminding us that we are not alone in our efforts. We are co-laborers with Christ, and through Him, we find the strength and courage, even when the work feels overwhelming.

In Matthew 25:40, Jesus says, "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." This verse reminds us that when we serve others, we are serving Christ himself. Every act of kindness, every moment spent caring for another, is a reflection of Jesus' love for us.

This understanding changes the way we view service. It is not a burden, but a privilege. When we serve others, we are participating in the work of God. We become His hands and feet in the world, instruments of His peace, love and mercy.

Jesus' call to serve one another is not just a command; it is an invitation to live a life filled with purpose and meaning. Through service, we experience the joy of giving, the blessing of building community, and the privilege of being part of God's work in the world.

Let us embrace this call with open hearts and willing hands. Let us serve one another as Christ has served us, with humility, love, and faith, trusting that in doing so, we are bringing His kingdom to earth. May we never grow weary in doing good, but continually seek to love and serve those around us, knowing that our service is a reflection of the One who came not to be served, but to serve. Amen.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

What's in it for me?

I think we've all been guilty of looking at a situation and wondering what's in it for us. It doesn't matter if it's a particular work assignment, someone at the parish asking for help with the mission trip bake sale, or your spouse asking if you'll take over the grocery shopping this week. Often, our first reaction to one of these requests is a heavy sigh and the thought: "If I do this, what will I get?"

Sometimes it surprises us to realize that the Apostles were no different. We tend to idolize these contemporaries of Christ as giants who walked with the Savior. But in reality, these individuals were merely human beings struggling to commit to the task of everyday stewardship.

In the Gospels, we see glimpses of them longing for praise and affirmation. We see them jockeying for positions of power within the group of twelve. We see them expect earthly rewards like honor and admiration. We see them acting a lot like us.

But in the end, we see them transformed by the grace of God. Like all the saints, their holiness stems from their commitment to their call. They stumble through, and as they stumble, they keep trusting God. They keep turning to Him. They keep asking for help. They don't give up just because they keep failing at it.

We are defined by what we give when we have no hope of being reimbursed, rewarded, or recognized. The Apostles understood this, eventually, and they gave accordingly. Most of them gave their very lives.

Remember, they're just like us. If they can do it, we can too.

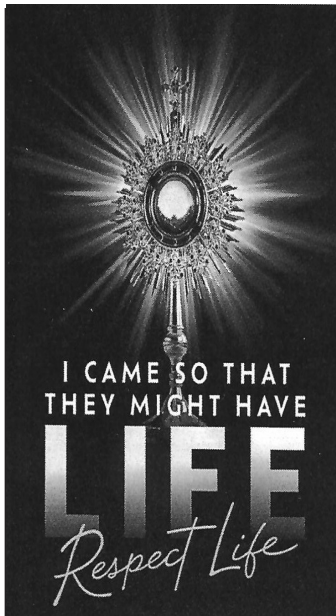

GOSPEL MEDITATION

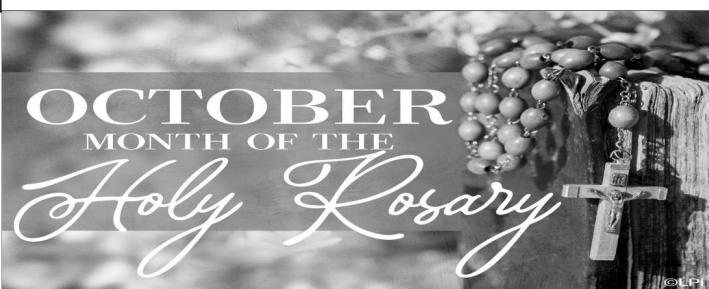
29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

From a young age, I loved winning at sports. I confess that winning was a bit of an addiction. It was probably coming from a deep desire for attention and affirmation from others. Nevertheless, it was a driving motivation for me. Baseball, soccer, track, table tennis, and whatever else I could find was a chance to win. Competition was my obsession.

Another John, and his brother James, demonstrate a kind of wildly competitive obsession when they dare to say to Jesus: **“Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory”** (Mark 10:37). Their audacity arouses an indignant reaction from the other apostles, who are clearly raw that these two are out to win the highest spots.

How does Jesus respond to us in our desires for greatness? The same way he does to James and John. He does not criticize them for their desire for glory. But he does highlight their ignorance (**“you do not know what you are asking.”**). Then he invites them to be champions of true greatness: by drinking not the cup of worldly victory, but his cup of self-giving suffering love, to be the **“slave of all.”** The true winners are slaves of love. This week, dare to tell Jesus what your ambitions truly are. Hear him call you to an even greater victory.

Readings for The Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading I *Isaiah 53:10-11*

The LORD was pleased to crush him in infirmity. If he gives his life as an offering for sin, he shall see his descendants in a long life, and the will of the LORD shall be accomplished through him. Because of his affliction he shall see the light in fullness of days; through his suffering, my servant shall justify many, and their guilt he shall bear.

Reading II *Hebrews 4:14-16*

Brothers and sisters: Since we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who has similarly been tested in every way, yet without sin. SO let us confidently approach the throne of grace to receive mercy and to find grace for timely help.

Gospel *Mark 10:35-45*

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came to Jesus and said to him, "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you." He replied, "What do you wish me to do for you?" They answered him, "Grant that in your glory we may sit at your right and the other at your left." Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking, You can drink the cup that I drink or be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" They said to him, "We can." Jesus said to them, "The cup that I drink, you will drink, and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at my right or at my left is not mine to give but is for those for whom it has been prepared." When the ten heard this, they became indignant at James and John. Jesus summoned them and said to them, "You know that those who are recognized as rulers over the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones make their authority over them felt. But it shall not be so among you. Rather, whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant; whoever wishes to be first among you will be the slave of all. 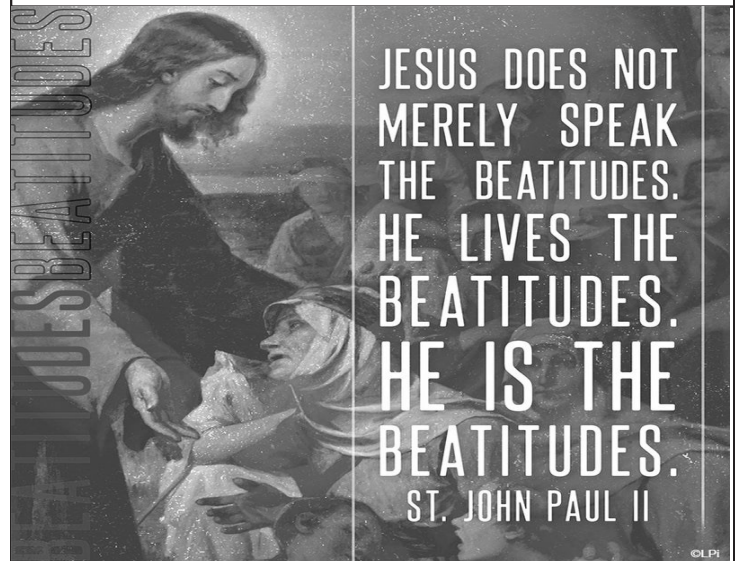

Political Church Guidelines

In 2024, as in previous election years, the Archdiocese of Detroit takes its lead from the Michigan Catholic Conference (MCC) and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). Guidelines published by these two organizations clarify the appropriate political and electoral activity for Catholic parishes and organizations in southeast Michigan.

Churches and other 501 (c) (3) institutions that qualify for tax-exempt status under the Internal Revenue Code are not permitted to be involved in partisan politics, including any expressions of preference, support for, or opposition to any specific candidates or political parties.

- Do not endorse or oppose candidates, political parties, or groups of candidates
- Do not make available the use of church facilities
- Do not authorize distribution of partisan political materials
- Do not invite or permit only selected candidates to address your members
- Do share the Church's teaching on human life, marriage and the family, immigration, education, social justice and peace
- Do highlight the moral and ethical dimensions of public policy issues and ballot proposals
- Do urge parishioners to join the party or campaign of their choice and, in light of Church teaching, evaluate candidate positions
- Do facilitate voter education through the provision of materials only published by the local diocesan bishop, the Michigan Catholic Conference or the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops.
- Do encourage active participation in church-sponsored voter registration efforts
- Do urge parishioners to register to vote.
- Do take precautions to avoid partisanship

The Mysteries of the Rosary

Have you ever wanted to explore the life of Jesus and Mary in a deeper way? Each decade highlights a sacred episode:

Joyful Mysteries: Through the Annunciation (1) and Visitation (2), we get a glimpse at Mary's joyful yes to God. She gives birth to Jesus in the Nativity (3). Mary and Joseph present their son at the temple (4) and bring him there again when he is a teenager (5).

Luminous Mysteries: Jesus is baptized in the Jordan River (1) before Mary gives him a nudge to his first miracle at Cana (2). Jesus proclaims the Gospel (3), is transfigured on Mount Tabor (4), and institutes the Eucharist (5). The light is shining!

Sorrowful Mysteries: Jesus prays in agony in Gethsemane (1), knowing his hour of suffering has come. After his betrayal and arrest, Jesus is scourged (2) and crowned with thorns (3). He carries his cross (4), and Mary stands at the foot of the cross as he is crucified (5).

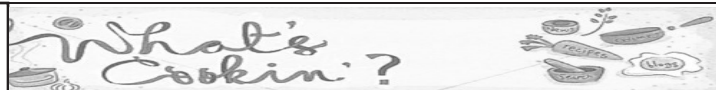

Salmon Patties

- 1 lb. can pink salmon
- 2 eggs—beaten
- 1/4 c. milk
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/8 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 c. fine cracker crumbs
- 6 Tbsp. shortening

Drain and remove bones and skin from salmon. Flake. Beat eggs and add to milk and then add salmon. Add seasoning and cracker crumbs. Form into six large patties. Melt shortening in skillet, place patties into hot shortening, and brown on both sides. (Serves 4-6).
