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THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

## Notes from Fr. Steve

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, celebrated on the Sunday following the Epiphany, marks a pivotal moment in Jesus' earthly ministry and holds profound spiritual significance for Christians. On this day, we commemorate Jesus' baptism by John in the River Jordan, an event rich with symbolism and transformative meaning. It is not only a historical moment but also a spiritual invitation to us all.

Jesus' baptism is a theophany—a divine revelation of God's presence. The heavens open, the Holy Spirit descends like a dove, and the Father's voice declares, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased" (Matthew 3:17). In this moment, the mystery of the Trinity is revealed, and Jesus begins His public ministry of proclaiming the Kingdom of God.

Though sinless, Jesus submitted to baptism to identify with humanity's need for repentance and to sanctify the waters of baptism for all who would follow Him. His baptism foreshadows His death and resurrection, through which He redeems us and opens the way to eternal life.

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord invites us to reflect on our own baptism. It is a time to renew our commitment to Christ and to live out the promises made at the font of salvation. Here are three key ways this feast can spiritually impact us:

### 1. **Renewal of Our Baptismal**

At our baptism, we were adopted as children of God, marked by the Holy Spirit, and commissioned to share in Christ's mission. This feast reminds us who we are and calls us to live as beloved sons and daughters of God, Striving for holiness and love in our daily lives.

### 2. **A Call to Conversion**

Just as John the Baptist's call to repentance prepared the way for Christ, we are reminded to turn away from sin and embrace a life of grace. The waters of baptism are not just a past event; they are a living reality that invites on-going transformation and renewal.

### 3. **Empowerment for Mission**

Jesus' baptism launched His mission to being God's love to the world. Similarly, our baptism empowers us to be His hands and feet in the world. Whether through acts of kindness, sharing the Gospel, or standing for justice, we are called to make Christ present in our communities.

As we celebrate this feast, consider renewing your baptismal promises and reflecting on how you can grow in faith. This might involve participating in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, praying for a deeper awareness of your identity as a child of God, or finding new ways to serve others.

Let this feast inspire us to live with greater purpose, knowing that through our baptism, we are united with Christ and called to shine His light in the world.


**Everyday Stewardship**

What have been the most significant moments in your life? You probably celebrate your birthday every year, so the day you were born must be pretty important. ## EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP I Hope I Am Like Him

“Who is this Christ? Is he like you?”

Perhaps you’ve heard this story, often attributed to the life of St. Teresa of Calcutta. A sick man asked her this question, as he marveled at her tireless service to himself and others in the name of someone named Jesus Christ.

“He is nothing like me,” the saint is said to have answered. “But I hope I am like him.”

Though the authenticity of this exchange cannot be verified, its message rings perfectly true: all the value of our stewardship lies in its relativity to the one in whose name we perform it.

Consider the figure of John the Baptist — a magnificent, towering character even purely from a literary or historical perspective. A martyr who fed on wild locusts and boldly spoke truth to power — a man so great some mistook him for the Messiah.

But why is he great? Because he prepared the way. All his accomplishments and escapades mean nothing if they are taken out of the context of salvation history. He only makes sense relative to Christ — and this is exactly as he wanted it. “One worthier than I is coming,” he insists. And because of that humility and that total embrace of God’s will, he is given one of the greatest honors in the New Testament — he baptizes the Son of God.

Let’s examine our lives in the light of their relativity to Christ. How do we prepare the way? When Christ comes to us, what do we do? How do we leave ourselves open to be actors in God’s plan?

May this fire move us forward as faithful stewards to carry out our baptismal promises to cast off evil and be committed to His Word, to love and serve God and our neighbor, and to spread the Gospel message of the Good News to everyone we encounter. We can begin to evangelize —or re-evangelize—family members and friends by simply inviting them to an evangelization program offered in the parish, like Alpha or Christ Life.

### Reading I

*Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7*

Thus says the LORD: Here is my servant whom I uphold, my chosen one with whom I am pleased, upon whom I have put my spirit; he shall bring forth justice to the nations, not crying out, not shouting, not making his voice heard in the street. A bruised reed he shall not break, and a smoldering wick he shall not quench, until he establishes justice on the earth; the coastlands will wait for his teaching. I, the LORD, have called you for the victory of justice, I have grasped you by the hand; I formed you, and set you as a covenant of the people, a light for the nations, to open the eyes of the blind, to bring out prisoners from confinement, and from the dungeon, those who live in darkness.

### Reading II

*Acts of the Apostles 10:34-38*


Peter proceeded to speak to those gathered in the house of Cornelius, saying: "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him. You know the word that he sent to the Israelites as he proclaimed peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all, what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power. He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him."

### Gospel

*Luke 3:15-16, 21-22*

The people were filled with expectation, and all were asking in their hearts whether John might be the Christ. John answered them all, saying, "I am baptizing you with water, but one mightier than I is coming. I am not worthy to loosen the thongs of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire." After all the people had been baptized and Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in boldly form like a dove. And a voice came from heaven, "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased."





## GOSPEL MEDITATION

**The Baptism of the Lord****Luke 3:15-16, 21-22**

Almighty ever-living God, who, when Christ had been baptized in the River Jordan and as the Holy Spirit descended upon him, solemnly declared him your beloved Son, grant that your children by adoption, reborn of water and the Holy Spirit, may always be well pleasing to you.

In my second year of theology studies, I went to confession to a priest visiting the seminary for a three-day retreat. My heart wasn't in it. I was going through the motions. I confessed my sins and waited for his response. The priest said, "For your penance, I'd like you to go into the chapel and repeat the words '**You are my beloved Son, with you I am well pleased**' (Luke 3:22) until they mean something to you." Easy penance, I thought.

But to my surprise, I struggled to say those words. I sensed a strong interior resistance blocking them. How could God be well-pleased with *me*? He couldn't be, I thought. A battle within me ensued. Two hours later, the resistance vanished, and I found myself able to speak, and claim as my own, those marvelous words. I emerged from the chapel with a new, deep, peaceful conviction that I was indeed God's beloved son.

Those words are a precious gift from heaven to all of us. Jesus' baptism, which we celebrate this week, offers them to us. Are we willing to receive these words anew? Many things can block this deepening of our baptismal identity: failings, sins, disappointments, traumas, problems, and so on. Yet God's love is always greater. This week I challenge you to prayerfully repeat these words over yourself — or perhaps over someone you're struggling to love — until those words find a home in your heart.



We seek you in so many ways and places in our life. We seek you for guidance and for comfort. But you have told us that when there is hunger, it is up to us to feed the hungry.


We ask you to help us see you in other Christians and humbly ask you for strength in the search for what we have in common.

We ask all this through Christ our Lord and brother, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.



**Lemon Rice Soup**

- 10.75 oz. can cream of chicken soup
- 1 1/4 cups milk
- 1/2 cup uncooked white rice
- 1 cup water
- 2 oz. lemon juice

In a medium saucepan combine soup and milk. Heat through while whisking. In a small pan boil 1 cup of water and uncooked rice. Reduce heat and simmer 20 minutes, or until tender. Add rice to soup and cook until heated through. Add lemon juice in small increments until a “subtle” lemon taste develops. Serve warm.

**St. Rene Mission Statement**

St. Rene Goupil Parish is a Catholic Community, dedicated to strengthening the faith and love of its people. Our mission is to proclaim that Jesus is Lord, to celebrate His Presence, and to reach out to others in His name.

**Parish Registration:**

Welcome to all new families/individuals. Please register as soon as possible. Membership is a condition for the reception of the Sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation, First Eucharist, Confirmation and Marriage. Registration is also required before the parish can issue a sponsorship certificate for those asked to be a sacramental sponsor. Registration forms are available in the Parish Office.

**Baptism:**

Baptisms are celebrated the third Sunday of the month at 12:00 p.m. A parent preparation class is mandatory. Classes are held on the fourth Saturday of each month at 10:00 a.m. Call the Parish Office during weekday office hours to register for a class.

**Penance:** Saturday 3:00 p.m. Special schedules for Advent and Lent.

Arrangements must be made through the Parish Office at least six months prior to the desired wedding date. One person of the couple must be an active, registered member of St. Rene Goupil Parish for six months.
