Notes from Fr. Steve

In a recent pastoral letter, Archbishop Allen H. Vigneron of the Archdiocese of Detroit announced a strategic initiative to restructure the archdiocese's parishes into "families of parishes." This plan aims to address challenges such as declining parish membership and a shortage of clergy, while fostering a more mission-orientated Church.

The "families of parishes" model will group existing parishes into clusters that collaborate in sharing resources, ministries, and clergy. This approach seeks to strengthen parish communities, enhance the quality of pastoral care, and better serve the faithful across southeast Michigan.

Archbishop Vigneron emphasized that this structuring is not merely a response to current challenges but also an opportunity for spiritual renewal. He envisions a Church that is "unleashing the Gospel" by becoming more outward-focused and mission driven. This initiative builds upon previous efforts, including the 2017 pastoral letter "Unleash the Gospel," which called for a radical transformation of the Church's culture to better evangelize in todav's world.

The archbishop acknowledged that change can | Welcome, Archbishop-elect Weisenburger! be difficult but expressed confidence that this new model will lead to more vibrant and sustainable parish communities. He called upon all members of the archdiocese to embrace this transition with faith and to actively participate in the mission of spreading the Gospel.

Further details about the implementation of the "families of parishes" model will be shared in the coming months, with the goal of fully transitioning to this new structure in the near future. Parishioners are encouraged to stay informed through official archdiocesan communications and to engage in dialogue with their local parish leaders.

This initiative reflects the Archdiocese of Detroit's commitment to adapting to changing circumstances while remaining steadfast in its mission to proclaim the Gospel and serve the people of God.

In the next month the archdiocese will begin to hold meetings to lay their plans for the next year and the future of every parish. The priests and parish staff will meet this month. More detailed information will be forth coming. If you receive Detroit Catholic on the web, you can find detailed information on that site.

Pope Francis has appointed Bishop Edward J. Weisenburger, Bishop of the Diocese of Tucson, as the sixth Archbishop of Detroit. The archbishop-elect succeeds Archbishop Allen H. Vigneron, who has served the archdiocese since 2009.

The new archbishop will be installed at a ceremony at the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament on March 18. Additional details about the installation liturgy and other welcome events will be shared in the coming days.



To provide clarity on our current circumstances and next steps, this Appendix offers key data points that illuminate both the challenges we face and the pressing need to continue aligning our resources within the broader Families of Parishes framework.

The data brings into sharp relief some of the challenges we face as a local Church, including fewer priests to care for our parishes, declining Mass attendance, and a surplus of aging church buildings that require more financial resources than we have.


The data is sobering but not defeating. Throughout history, the Church has continually responded to societal changes—like those depicted in this data—with apostolic boldness and faithfulness, leaving behind the "second tunic" and adapting her methods without compromising her timeless message. We will rise to the challenge and continue this legacy in our own time, creating Mission-Ready parishes with a clear sense of mission to form joyful disciples.

- In 2034, projections indicate Active Priests in Parish Ministry will decline to 134.





Everyday Stewardship


6th Sunday in Ordinary Time

When I was a child, I often thought of the Church as something mystical and supernatural. I wasn't wrong in my understanding of the Body of Christ, for surely the Church has these characteristics. However, even though we speak about the foundation of all we are as Church being the "mystery of Christ," Jesus became a man so that supernatural element could break into the natural world in a profound way. What we once could not see, we now see. What we saw as a God in a distant place now dwelt among us. The communion of saints is heavenly and earthly at the same time.

.(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC – IN THE END, DOES IT MATTER? By Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman

Mini Reflection: Jesus was radical in his teaching that the "stuff" in life wasn't all that important. It was radical for him to say that the worldly signs of success did not amount to a whole lot in the grand scheme of things and that suffering could sanctify us. Are we ready to be radical, too?

In the End, Does it Matter?

When I was a teenager, the priest I would go to for confession used to tell me, over and over: "In the end, we all get the same dirty hole in the ground."

What he meant was, it doesn't matter how rich or smart or well-liked we are. We're all heading to the same place. This life comes to an end for every man. All the money he earns, all the *stuff*, all the worldly esteem, will at some point be of no further use. We all get the same dirty hole in the ground.

It was an important message for me to hear, because at the time, it all seemed so *important*: my after-school job and my FAFSA application and my grades. The admiration of my friends and teachers. I was so consumed with *what* I was going to become that I wasn't spending a lot of time thinking about *who* I was going to become. But the *who* is the only thing that lasts until the next life.

And to be honest, it's all still too important to me. Avoiding sadness and disappointment. Saving money and being liked. Focusing on "the five-year plan" when it comes to career, house plans, and a whole bunch of other things I can't take to my dirty hole in the ground.

Jesus was radical in his teaching that the "stuff" in life wasn't all that important. It was radical for him to say that the worldly signs of success — wealth, popularity, pleasure — did not amount to a whole lot in the grand scheme of things and that suffering could sanctify us. It was radical in the ancient world, and it's radical today.

Are we ready to be radical, too?



Italian Monkey Bread

3 tbsp. margarine, melted
1/4 tsp. garlic powder
1/2 tsp. dry mustard
1/4 c. grated Parmesan cheese
10 oz. can flaky refrigerated biscuits

Preheat oven to 400 F. Combine melted margarine, garlic and mustard. Coat bottom of 8 or 9 inch round pizza pan with 2 tablespoons of the melted mixture (save the rest).

Separate the 10 biscuits and cut each biscuit into 4 pieces. Arrange biscuit pieces even on pan. Drizzle the remaining margarine mixture over top. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake for 12 to 17 minutes or until golden brown. Turn onto a wire rack. Invert onto a serving plate; serve warm.
