Notes from Fr. Steve

This past week the Church celebrated the Feast of the Guardian Angels. So I thought it would be helpful to write something here on the history and presence of the Guardian Angels. It is a beautiful reminder that God never leaves us alone. From the moment of our birth, He entrusts us to the care of the guardian angel whose mission is to watch over us, protect us, and gently guide us toward heaven.

Jesus Himself tells us, "See that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I say to you that their angels in heaven always look upon the face of my heavenly Father" (Mt 18:10). This means that while our guardian angels stand before God in worship, they are also at our side, helping us along life's journey.

Many of us have experienced times when we felt an unexpected sense of peace, a sudden warning, or even protection in a moment of danger. These can be quiet ways our angels are at work. I once heard someone share how they narrowly avoided a car accident after an unexplainable urge to slow down—and they attributed it to their guardian angel's nudge. Stories like these remind us that heaven is closer than we realize.

The Church invites us not only to believe in the angels but to call upon them. A simple daily prayer, such as "Angel of God, my guardian dear..." is a beautiful way to remember their presence. When we are anxious, tempted, or uncertain, we can quietly ask, Guardian angel, help me."

As we continue through our busy days, may this feast remind us of God's tender love and care. We are never alone—our angels walk with us, pointing the way to Christ.

Just a reminder, that October is the month of mercy for parishes to do good works. Every parish is asked to do a "mission of mercy". Our mission of mercy will be the same one we have done in the past several years. We will collect "new books" to be given to children to receive when they are receiving chemotherapy. The books are donated to the children's cancer unit, at Children's Hospital in Detroit.


How Much Is Enough?

During a conversation about good stewardship of money and time, my daughter shared that sometimes doing the best thing was so hard for her to do. It wasn't always a matter of right and wrong, black and white, but a matter of better and best. I began to reflect on the truth of her statement. When confronted with a decision, we can sometimes be given a choice of good, better, and best. We fool ourselves into believing that the good choice is not a bad one, so it must be enough. However, we have essentially placed a limit on our generosity or commitment with our false sense of good stewardship.

Jesus calls us in different ways every day. Sometimes the cost to us is clear. Yet sometimes there is no clear metric. When called to love, how much love is enough? When someone needs our time, how many hours is enough? When a small gift will bring about a positive outcome, what could a larger gift accomplish?

Don't be fooled by Jesus' teaching of the mustard seed. He was speaking to those who were caught up in concerns of status, uncertainty of heart, and lack of true faith. Jesus taught with parables and then demonstrated true faith and generosity by his crucifixion. Perhaps the mustard seed of faith allows us to move mountains and trees so that we may see through to the horizon of the cross. In the cross, we find the real metric of love and generosity that is for all who follow Him.

Readings for the The Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading I Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4

How long, O LORD? I cry for help but you do not listen! I cry out to you, "Violence!" but you do not intervene. Why do you let me see ruin; why must I look at misery? Destruction and violence are before me; there is strife, and clamorous discord. Then the LORD, answered me and said: Write down the vision clearly upon the tablets, so that one can read it readily. For the vision still has its time, presses on to fulfillment, and will not disappoint; if it delays, wait for it, it will surely come, it will not be late. The rash one has no integrity; but the just one, because of his faith, shall live.

Reading II *Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14*

Beloved: I remind you, to stir into flame the gift of God that you have through the imposition of my hands. For God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control. So do not be ashamed of your testimony to our Lord, nor of me, a prisoner for his sake; but bear your share of hardship for the gospel with the strength that comes from God. Take as your norm the sound words that you heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard this rich trust with the help of the Holy Spirit that dwells within us.

Gospel *Luke 17:5-10*

The apostles said to the Lord, "Increase our faith." The Lord replied, "If you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you would say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you. "Who among you would say to your servant who has just come in from plowing or tending sheep in the field, 'Come here immediately and take your place at table'? Would he not rather say to him, 'Prepare something for me to eat. Put on your apron and wait on me while I eat and drink. You may eat and drink when I am finished'? Is he grateful to that servant because he did what was commanded? So should it be with you. When you have done all you have been commanded, say, 'We are unprofitable servants; we have done what we were obliged to do."

GOSPEL MEDITATION Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time Luke 17:5-10

A priest friend of mine received a call from a family whose elderly mother was dying. Within thirty minutes, he was at her bedside, offering the consolation of the sacraments, anointing her with the oil of the sick, and commending her soul to God. She passed not long after, and for months, her family spoke of their deep gratitude for his presence. When I phoned him to commend his faithful ministry, he simply said, "I was just doing my job."

His words brought to mind Jesus' teaching this week in Luke 17:10: "So you also, when you have done everything you were told to do, should say, 'We are unworthy servants; we have only done our duty." In a world that often seeks recognition and applause, the Lord invites us into a different mindset — one of humble service. The priest did not see his response as extraordinary; he saw it as a grace to fulfill his vocation.

How tempting it is to seek affirmation for doing what I ought to do! Yet Jesus reminds us that true discipleship is not about grandstanding but about quiet faithfulness. It is enough to have served. It is enough to have loved. It is enough to be grateful that we were given the chance to do our duty in the first place. Whether in priesthood, parenthood, or any vocation, what peace-soaked freedom there is in simply doing what is asked of us. No more, no less. Jesus, that is how you quietly love us.

Devotions, *Explained!* God is Good, All the Time



Mini Explanation

This popular phrase is an affirmation of God's faithfulness amidst the trials of life, a theme that is presented again and again in Scripture: come what may, God will be with us.

Good is Good, All the Time: Explained!

Perhaps you have been a member of a congregation to whom the pastor says, expectantly, "God is good!" The congregation responds, faithfully, "All the time." In turn, the speaker repeats: "All the time." And the congregation affirms: "God is good!"

A collective affirmation of God's faithfulness amidst the trials of life, this refrain communicates a theme presented again and again in Scripture: Come what may, God will be with us.

There is no official consensus on the origins of this saying, though it is often associated with African Christianity. Whatever this saying's roots, its message is truth: "For the Lord is good; His mercy is everlasting; and His truth endures to all generations," says Psalm 100:5. "Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good! For His mercy endures forever," echoes 1 Chronicles 16:34. Jesus confirms this in Matthew 28:20: "I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

As Christians we shouldn't be surprised to look ourselves in the mirror and own that reality. We are not as strong as we may think. We are time and time again shocked and dismayed by our own weaknesses, our own fears, our own shortcomings.

Should we be careful what we wish for? The apostles asked Jesus to increase their faith, and He told them it would take work. It would take suffering. It would take patience. But He didn't say it was impossible.


As everyday stewards, we need to continue wishing recklessly. Ask God for anything and everything, come to Him with all your needs. Beg Him for grace without limit.



Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

The topic of faith connects today's Scripture passages. In both the First Reading from the Book of the Prophet Habakkuk and St. Paul's Second Letter to Timothy, the sacred writers proclaim that faith and patience are necessary to withstand hardships and struggles. Arrested for professing faith in Christ to the people, St. Paul writes the Second Letter to Timothy from prison. In St. Luke's Gospel, Jesus declares to his Apostles that belief the size of a mustard seed can uproot a mulberry tree and plant it in the sea. In other words, just a minute amount of faith is very powerful. Being a disciple of the Lord demands both faith and trust. Faith is God's gift to us. How do we, as Christian stewards, increase faith and trust in our Lord and Savior? Begin each day with a few minutes of prayer and include some verses of Scripture reading. Participate in sacramental Confession regularly. At Mass, partake in the Eucharistic mystery where Jesus becomes truly present—Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity—in the consecrated Bread and Wine.

(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC – BENEATH THE SURFACE

Mini reflection: "Increase my faith." I've said it to God plenty of times, imagining a prayer life that is effortless and a sacramental life that is uncomplicated. Easy faith — that's what I'm asking for, and lots of it, please. But easy faith isn't faith at all.

The Father Who Knows What You Want

It's easy to give your kid what he's asking for. It's hard to give him what he wants.

If a kid asks to eat an ice cream cone, there's nothing wrong with giving him one. But if he's grumpily demanding an ice cream cone at 7:45 in the morning, what he wants — whether he realizes it or not — is some protein and whole grains and a little encouragement to get him going on his day.

So you give him eggs and toast, and you watch him struggle to accept it. Sometimes he does and sometimes he doesn't, but either way, you'll be here. You'll forgive him for whatever names he calls you and you'll put the healthy breakfast in the fridge, waiting for him when he's ready to eat it.

"Increase my faith." I've said it to God plenty of times, imagining a prayer life that is effortless and a sacramental life that is uncomplicated, an acceptance of truth that is unshakeable. Easy faith — that's what I'm asking for, and lots of it, please.

But easy faith isn't faith at all, and faith that you aren't strong enough to hold will break your arms. And what God will never do is say, "Sure, kiddo, here you go," and pass off a false gift as the real thing, just to make us both feel good. He won't hand me something I'm not strong enough to hold.

That would be a classic lazy-father move. That would be an ice-cream-cone-at-7:45 a.m. move.

Instead, He watches carefully while I navigate the bumpy terrain of the spiritual life, ready to whisper directions in my ear. He holds his breath while the challenges of this world create deep grooves in my soul — and then He irrigates those grooves with the life-giving waters of grace, transforming them into valleys of consolation and respite.

Sometimes I call Him names. Sometimes I refuse what He's offering. It's not what I asked for, after all.

But it's what I want. Luckily, He knows that better than me.

Cherry Chiffon Pie

1 env. Unflavored gelatin 1 (16 oz.) can sour cherries with juice

1 tbsp. lemon juice

1 (8 inch) baked pie shell

1/4 c. water

1/2 c. sugar

1/8 tsp. salt

1/2 c. whipping cream



Mix the gelatin and water. Stir in the cherries and juice with sugar and salt. Heat to boiling, stirring all the while. Chill until thickened. Whip the cream and fold into the cherry mixture. Pour into the pie shell and chill.
