

Notes from Fr. Steve

As we approach the most sacred time of the Christian calendar, it's essential to reflect on the significance of the Easter Tridium. This three-day period, beginning with Holy Thursday and culminating in Easter Sunday, encapsulates the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Each day holds profound meaning and offers us an opportunity to deepen our faith and understanding.

Palm Sunday marks Jesus Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem, where crowds welcomed Him with palm branches, symbolizing victory and peace. This event signifies the start of Holy Week, reminding us of Jesus' mission as the Messiah and the fulfillment of prophecy.

On Holy Thursday, we commemorate the Last Supper, where Jesus shared a final meal with His disciples. During this intimate gathering, He instituted the Eucharist, demonstrating His love through the act of washing His disciples' feet, teaching humility and service. Please come to this beautiful mass at 7pm, with adoration following.

Good Friday is a solemn day of remembrance and mourning for Jesus' crucifixion and death on the Cross. It is a time for prayerful reflection on His sacrifice, which redeemed humanity and opened the door to eternal life. The Church often holds solemn liturgies and Stations of the Cross to meditate on the depth of Christ's love and suffering. Living Stations of the Cross 12 Noon. 1 pm Good Friday Liturgy.

The Easter Tridium reaches its climax with the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday night and Easter Sunday morning. The vigil begins in darkness, symbolizing Christ's tomb, and culminates in the joyful proclamation of His resurrection. It is a celebration of new life and hope, marking the triumph of light over darkness and salvation for all who believe. Easter Vigil 4 pm. Easter Sunday Mass 8:30 am & 10:30 am. No 5:30 pm Mass.

As we journey through Holy Week, let us immerse ourselves in prayer, reflection, and participation in the liturgies of the Tridium. May this sacred time deepen our faith, renew our spirits, and draw us closer to the profound mystery of Christ's passion, death, and resurrection. Please come to all of our High Holy Day Services and celebrate your Catholic faith with your sisters and brothers.

As always, I ask for you to pray for the parish, in particular for the sick and the suffering, your prayers being them healing, comfort and hope. God bless you and those you love.




DONUT SUNDAY THIS SUNDAY

- 2. Abstinence from Meat Required on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and all Fridays of Lent For Catholics aged 14 and older. This means avoiding meat from land animals (such as beef, pork, and chicken), Exceptions are made for those with health

GOSPEL MEDITATION

Palm Sunday Luke 19:28-40

"As he rode along, the people were spreading their cloaks on the road." (Luke 19:36)

Consider how useless it is to spread your clothes on the ground for a donkey to walk on. The clothes get smeared with hooves, and who knows the grimy places where they've been? The animal may leave some unsavory presents on them. They may get stolen by a thief looking to make a buck. The thorns, thistles, rocks and muck of the road will leave stains. The clothes may never be useful again, and you'll probably walk home shivering without your normal covering. Yet this is precisely the gesture the people employ to welcome Jesus and his donkey. Why does this detail matter?

Wastefulness is an essential part of celebration. Consider the unnecessary extravagance of Christmas decorations, confetti and ticker tape parades, baseball players spraying each other with bottles of champagne after a victory, birthday gifts for kids and so on. This wastefulness signals celebration and therefore participation in higher identities (as believers, winners, and parents, to mention the above examples). That's what the wasted cloaks are all about. Those who donate their cloaks participate in Christ's kingship in Jerusalem — and we savor it two thousand years later.

The lesson? Learn how to "waste" money, time, clothes, and food on Christ. We do this at Mass, but in so many other ways, too, like serving the poor, going on retreats, and doing prayerful study. When we practice this holy wastefulness, Jesus will ride into our lives and we'll be more deeply members of his kingdom.


Seven Churches Pilgrimage, Explained

The Seven Churches Pilgrimage is the practice of visiting seven different churches on Holy Thursday, in imitation of the journey of Christ on the eve of his crucifixion.

The devotion is thought to have originated in sixteenth -century Rome, where pilgrims — likely led by St. Philip Neri — would visit the seven major basilicas there: St. Peter's in the Vatican, St. John Lateran, St. Paul Outside the Walls, St. Mary Major, St. Sebastian Outside the Walls, St. Lawrence Outside the Walls and Santa Croce in Gerusalemme.

Pilgrims undertaking this journey anywhere in the world can visit any seven churches while adoring Christ in the Blessed Sacrament upon the Altar of Repose, fulfilling his request of his disciples to stay with him as he awaited his Passion. There are specific Scripture passages that pilgrims can meditate upon at each altar.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Jesus warns us in the Gospel of Matthew, "If anyone wishes to come after me, he must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me." It is an invitation to a way of life, and a plan that leads to holiness. But make no mistake, it is a warning as well. The cross is a sign of victory, but only in light of the Resurrection. Alone, it is a symbol of ultimate sacrifice: the sacrifice of Jesus Christ for a fallen world, and the sacrifice we are called to make to truly follow him.

The power of this symbol has been diminished in popular culture. It is often used in fashion and simple wall art and on bumper stickers and T-shirts, sometimes with Christian clichés and sometimes not. But the cross is something so much more. It is a reminder of the pain, suffering, and death of one who loved us so much that he would give his very life for us. It is our God on that cross. It is God who cries out in despair, feeling the ultimate depth of human emotion. And there lies the key for us in trying to live this life of carrying our crosses.

For those who suffer the death of a loved one, the Father lost his Son. For those who suffer the ravages of disease, his body was broken, beaten, and pierced. For those who feel they have no way out - whether due to prisons that are physical or prisons that are of the mind - he hung on a cross and cried out, "Why?" For those who feel alone and abandoned, he hung on a tree where no one could comfort him, not even his own mother. He has walked in all our shoes, and now we are called to walk in his. In the cross, we find solidarity with the human condition. In an empty tomb, we find our hope.



Cheesy Potatoes

1/2 cup melted butter

1/2 cup onion—chopped

1 can cream of chicken soup—undiluted

1 can cream of mushroom soup—undiluted

1 pint sour cream

5 cups shredded cheddar cheese

6 lb. pkg. hashbrowns—thawed

Topping:

1/4 cup melted butter

7 cups crushed corn flakes

Mix butter, onion, and both cans of soup, sour cream and cheese. Add potatoes and blend. Pour mixture into greased 3-qt. casserole or 9x13 pan. In a bowl mix butter and corn flakes. Cover potatoes with topping and bake at 350 F for 55 minutes or until bubbly.

(PRACTICING) CATHOLIC – BENEATH THE SURFACE

Mini-reflection: I'm Catholic. I'm proud of being Catholic. But is that wordless witness really evangelization?

The Stones Will Cry Out

I have a complicated relationship with evangelization.

I don't think that we (I'm talking about 21st-century American Catholics here) have had much formation around what exactly it means to proclaim the Gospel. We don't know how to do it. We don't really want to do it. It sounds kind of scary and awkward. It sounds like knocking on strangers' doors and yelling through the keyhole, "Have you accepted Christ as your Lord and Savior?" It sounds like arguing with friends and family. It sounds like a real pain.

I'm Catholic. I'm proud of being Catholic. I do my Catholic things in my Catholic house throughout my Catholic life. But is that enough?

All Christians are called to "wordless witness" in how they live their lives, writes Paul VI in the apostolic exhortation Evangelii Nuntiandi — but this alone, he says, is "insufficient." We must talk about Jesus. We must name him. We must speak of his life, his promises. We must proclaim him.

We must be loud enough that a Pharisee would cringe at us.

And yet — and Paul VI acknowledges this — it's not actually evangelization if we do it so badly that nobody listens. If we "impose" truth on someone's conscience instead of "proposing" it. If we make the mistake of thinking there is one singular way to share Christ with the great variety of personalities that exist in this world.

Dear reader, I am running out of column space, and still I have no answers for you, or for myself. I don't know how to do it well. But I know we have to try. We have to pray. We have to reflect. We have to be patient. We have to be humble. We have to remember it's about him and not about us.

Most of all, when we find ourselves confused and retreating into silence, we must remember Christ's words: "If they keep silent, the stones will cry out."



PALM SUNDAY





Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord

Today, St. Luke the evangelist indicates in his processional Gospel that Christ directs two of His disciples to go into the village and bring Him a tethered colt, and they carry out His command without reservation. On this colt, Jesus humbly and triumphantly enters Jerusalem. But when the crowds gathered learned that Jesus is not a military leader who will deliver them from Roman oppression, Christ's triumph soon turns to betrayal, scourging, and death, as described in St. Luke's Passion account. Do we, as faithful stewards, respond to our Lord's invitation to serve Him through our God-given gifts of time for prayer, skills, and financial resources? Are we open to sharing these gifts with our parish community, the Archdiocese of Detroit, and our neighbors in need? In a spirit of evangelization, do we use these talents to spread Christ's "Good News" to those we meet? Craft a cross with today's blessed palm leaves or place them behind a crucifix or religious picture at your home as a reminder of Jesus' tremendous gift of salvation made available to us.

Parish Registration:

Welcome to all new families/individuals. Please register as soon as possible. Membership is a condition for the reception of the Sacraments of Baptism, Reconciliation, First Eucharist, Confirmation and Marriage.

Registration is also required before the parish can issue a sponsorship certificate for those asked to be a sacramental sponsor. Registration forms are available in the Parish Office.

Baptism:

Baptisms are celebrated the third Sunday of the month at 12:00 p.m. A parent preparation class is mandatory. Classes are held on the fourth Saturday of each month at 10:00 a.m. Call the Parish Office during weekday office hours to register for a class.

Penance: Saturday 3:00 p.m. Special schedules for Advent and Lent.

Marriage:

Arrangements must be made through the Parish Office at least six months prior to the desired wedding date. One person of the couple must be an active, registered member of St. Rene Goupil Parish for six months.
