


# Government of Omsk Region and BRICS CCI Sign Strategic Cooperation Agreement

# SCO SUMMIT 2025: GLOBAL INVESTMENT IMPLICATIONS FOR INDIA, BRICS, THE US AND EUROPE

The SCO (Shanghai Cooperation Organisation) Summit in Tianjin (Aug 31–Sep 1, 2025) brought India, Russia, and China to the forefront of discussions on trade, energy, finance, and technology. For investors, the outcomes signal a realignment of capital flows and sectoral opportunities across India, BRICS economies, and the Western world.

#### **Key messages for Investors**

- 1. Energy security & infra financing flows are shifting East, with India well-positioned.
- 2. Parallel payment, trade, and Artificial Intelligence (AI) systems are taking shape hedges against dollar dominance.
- 3. Tariff frictions remain the biggest near-term drag on India's export sectors.

# SCO vs US Economic Performance - GDP Growth Analysis

The economic scoreboard tells a compelling story:

SCO (2025 Growth Rates)

• China: 5.3%

• India: 6.5-7.0%

• Russia: 2.8% (despite sanctions)

#### **United States**

• Projected growth: 1.6%

Combined, China, India, and Russia have a \$25.5 trillion economy, that's 84% the size of the entire US economy.

# What This Means for Markets The SCO is putting serious money behind their vision:

- \$1.4 billion in new loans committed by China over three years
- \$890 billion in trade volume between SCO countries in 2024
- \$140 billion in Chinese investments across SCO nations

These are large numbers and represent the building blocks of an alternative global financial system.



# <u>The Real Game Changer</u> <u>The SCO is building parallel infrastructure:</u>

- Independent payment systems (against the dominance of US dollar)
- Digital trade platforms (+34% growth in cross-border e-commerce)
- Energy cooperation (72% of global renewable energy growth)
- New railways and shipping routes (reducing dependence on Western logistics)

#### **Big Picture Signals**

- Parallel financial plumbing
- China advanced the idea of a SCO development bank, expanded AI/energy cooperation, and offered broader access to its BeiDou satellite system, moves designed to reduce dollar and GPS dependence while building Eurasian (the total continental land mass of Europe and Asia combined) financing rails. Expect pilot projects first, with selective scaling thereafter.
- Durable energy realignment
- India and Russia reaffirmed deep energy ties, even as Washington escalated tariffs on Indian goods over discounted Russian oil purchases. This cements low-cost crude flows and increases the likelihood of rupee—dirham—ruble settlement mechanisms in bilateral trade.
- Technology & Artificial Intelligence (AI) corridor
- SCO members pledged greater cooperation in AI standards, compute sharing, and sovereign tooling. India emphasized "equal access" principles, hinting at its push for open frameworks amid a largely China-led initiative.

#### **India: Actionable Investment Angles**

#### **Opportunities**

- Energy & refining: Sustained discounted Russian crude strengthens refining margins and logistics players with Eurasian exposure.
- Infrastructure & green finance: If the SCO bank materializes, Indian EPC (Engineering, Procurement and Construction) firms, gridequipment makers, renewables OEMs, and datacentre developers could see new project pipelines in Central Asia.
- Space/geospatial stack: BeiDou integration opens markets for dual-mode navigation hardware, logistics telematics, and agri-tech solutions as an opportunity for Indian SMEs and system integrators.

#### **Risks**

- Tariff overhang: US tariffs remain a headwind for export-sensitive sectors like textiles and engineering.
- China optics: Rapid SCO engagement could complicate India's tech supply-chain shifts toward the West, especially in sensitive industries.

<u>Portfolio stance (India)</u>: Overweight energy, EPC/infra, power equipment, datacenter REITs. Neutral on export-heavy midcaps until tariff clarity emerges. Maintain hedges via gold and USD assets.



#### **BRICS Beyond India**

- Russia: Stable offtake to India underwrites upstream flows. Shipping and financing remain investable but sanction-bound.
- China: SCO bank and AI initiatives will favor Chinese grid, EV (Electric Vehicles), and surveillance hardware firms aligned with state-led financing.
- GCC (Gulf Co-operation Council) & Central Asia: Logistics hubs, dry ports, and power interconnects are poised for near-term investment, likely funded by sukuk or yuan-linked paper.

#### **United States: Sectoral Implications**

- Tariffs & trade: Persistent tariffs on India and China keep inflation sticky, reinforcing resilience in US value sectors, energy, and onshoring plays.
- Dollar primacy: Non-USD financing under SCO is a long-tail risk, but watch EM (emerging markets) reserve diversification for early signs.
- Big Tech: Divergent SCO AI standards may limit US cloud/semis' access to Eurasian markets, favor firms with entrenched US/EU demand and government-secure contracts.

#### **Europe: Navigating Fragmentation**

- Energy premiums: With Russian flows redirected east, Europe remains LNG (liquified natural gas) and MENA (Middle East and North Africa) dependent, sustaining opportunities in renewables, storage, and grid upgrades.
- Export competition: Eurasian trade corridors increase competition for EU mid-cap capital goods in Central Asia and Africa.
- Policy response: Expect Brussels to deepen tech controls while accelerating subsidies for semiconductors, hydrogen, and battery supply chains.

#### **Cross-Market Sector Map**

Winners (6–24 months): refiners, tankers, EPC/infra, datacentres, SCO-AI integrators.

**Laggards/Volatile:** tariff-exposed exporters (India–US/EU), dual-use tech vulnerable to export controls.

#### **Scenarios to Price**

- 1. **Pragmatic integration** (55%): SCO bank pilots projects, tariffs persist with carveouts. *Position*: energy + infra barbell, selective exporters.
- 2. Hard bifurcation (25%): Tech/finance decoupling deepens. *Position*: overweight domestic demand, defense/cyber, plus cash/gold.
- 3. **De-escalation** (20%): Limited tariff relief, USD stability, and cross-listed projects. *Position*: rotate to quality growth, add EM FX duration.

#### **Investor Takeaway:**

The Tianjin SCO summit marks a structural step in building a Eurasian financial and energy ecosystem led by India, Russia, and China. India gains energy security and potential infra-finance flows, but tariff risks and China-linked sensitivities persist. For BRICS, the SCO expands infrastructure and technology demand; for the West, it creates competing supply chains and financing rails.

**Bottom line**: Play the Eurasian opportunity set selectively, hedge fragmentation risks, and keep portfolios balanced between East–West exposures

# China's 2025 Intellectual Property Nation Building Plan: Implications for BRICS IP Cooperation and India

#### **Introduction:**

China has announced intellectual comprehensive property building plan. The plan is designed to implement the "outline for building a powerful intellectual property country (2021-35)" and the "national intellectual property and utilization plan for the 14th Five-year plan." The plan is launched with the intention to transform China in term of its intellectual property. The plan covers various aspects of development of intellectual property including commercialization and international cooperation.

China is placing more emphasis on the quality of intellectual property (IP) as a whole by implementing quality indicators for patent applications and by creating pre-patent reviews that focus on industrialization. It is also working improve the efficiency of trademark examinations using better technology. On the market operations side the country is developing a strong intellectual property finance system with broader options for IP pledge finance and securitization options and developing more specialized insurance products to protection of intellectual property in international trade.

China's 2025 Promotion Plan entitled Intellectual Property Nation Building represents a fundamental change in its IP regime, not on the basis of minor amendments, but aligning IP law with its technological ambitions in AI, blockchain, and amongst other technologies. It is reshaping the IP national frameworks into innovative growth plans. China is moving institutions, organisations, artists and the public to align with this policy which in turn will be led to further economic development.

China's increased engagement in global governance like BRICS, ASEAN, WTO and bilateral engagements, reflects the desire of China to align its interests with the agenda of these engagements. This will result in a lack of equilibrium for countries such as India, which might be facing challenges in its public interest commitment towards IP. China's change in the legal process through statutory legal provisions regarding deterrent damages for IP and a nationally coordinated systems of enforcement, has increased its credibility. The focus on the digital public service platforms and compliance of IP agencies will lead to the setting up of a centralised service regime for IP which promotes domestic efficiency.

One of the major issues which the BRICS IP cooperation faces is with regards to the governance and implementation of IP rights. Countries like India and China are leading in enforcement of IP rights but other countries face issues in implementation of IP rights, like delay in judicial process. Another major issue arising from the excessive focus on economic growth which underscores the importance of IP rights.

# Implication for BRICS IP Cooperation:

China for a significant period has been an active participant in building of IP capacity within the BRICS arrangement. The new plan introduced by China also furthers their involvement, the plan explicitly includes measures for improving the BRICS IP cooperation mechanism.

China through the implementation of this policy has the potential of becoming one of the most prominent countries in terms of IP policies and implementation. Although China does not explicitly intend to impose TRIPS-Plus IP standards, its level of development may unintentionally raise expectations protection and enforcement among the BRICS countries. The new policy will not only strengthen China's position in the market but also lead to dominance in the BRICS IP cooperation. China could use its dominance to yield its agenda for IP that does not serve the interests of all members states including India. China's For instance. preference internationalize its renminbi and to deprive the US dollar of its dominance might affect the aspects of financial cooperation within BRICS. India must put forward its idea for a balanced cooperative approach to advance BRICS member perspectives, particularly developing economies. Such a balance is valuable in BRICS agenda of de-dollarization and green industrialization. India will have a critical role to play in advancing inclusive members' interests while attempting to curb undue influence by any one BRICS member state's agenda in this process.

China for a significant period has been an active participant in building of IP capacity within the BRICS arrangement. The new plan introduced by China also furthers their involvement, the plan explicitly includes measures for improving the BRICS IP cooperation mechanism.

China through the implementation of this policy has the potential of becoming one of the most prominent countries in terms of IP policies and implementation. Although China does not explicitly intend to impose TRIPS-Plus IP standards, its level of development may unintentionally raise expectations of IP protection and enforcement among the BRICS countries. The new policy will not only strengthen China's position in the market but also lead to dominance in the BRICS IP cooperation. China could use its dominance to yield its agenda for IP that does not serve the interests of all members states including India. For instance, China's preference to internationalize its renminbi and to deprive the US dollar of its dominance might affect the aspects of financial cooperation within BRICS.

India must put forward its idea for a balanced cooperative approach to advance BRICS member perspectives, particularly developing economies. Such a balance is valuable in BRICS agenda of dedollarization and green industrialization. India will have a critical role to play in advancing inclusive members' interests while attempting to curb undue influence by any one BRICS member state's agenda in this process.



India and China have both been prominent members of BRICS. Both the countries have contributed significantly in the implementation of IP rights in developing countries and the TRIPS agreement. The approach of the two countries varies from one another, as the strategy of China focuses on creation and exploitation of IP rights, and the strategy of India lags behind in this regard.

India and China both had come up with their National IPR Policy in 2016 and 2025 respectively. The aim of both the policies was to improve the intellectual property regime. The legal framework of the Indian policy is such that it balances the rights of right holder and the public interest. It was designed to ensure adherence to the TRIPS Agreement and the Doha Development Round. China's 2025 intellectual property nation building promotion plan intends to make amendments to the existing laws to remove redundant aspects of law and include new or emerging technologies such as AI and blockchain, etc. India's policy is clear that it wishes to improve the legal mechanism to support IP, China's plan lays down the improvements to the system, including the concept of punitive compensation for infringement.India's National IPR Policy gives importance to a strong adjudicatory and enforcement mechanism. The Intellectual Property Division established by the Delhi High Court in 2021 was a result of the policy. However, there are concerns that enforcement placed emphasis domestic on Chinese firms over foreign firms transparency and questions international trust.

There is a major difference between the two policies in relation to compulsory licensing. India's policy is clear about the inclusion of compulsory licensing and it continues to use it. This makes India's IPR system unique especially when compared to other developing countries who had moved increasingly towards prioritizing commercial over social economic realities. China's plan does not explicitly mention compulsory licensing. It only discusses a strengthening of patent protection and punitive remedies.

The new plan introduced by China has introduced strong enforcement actions against infringement and counterfeiting. These enforcement actions by China will put a pressure on India to improve the enforcement of IP rights. Another essential change which the plan brings is with regards to IP rights in the digital world including addressing issues pertaining to AI and large-scale data. These efforts by China will impact business and foreign firms in India, as the policies of China are such that it not only addresses issues pertaining to IP protection but also introduces measures to tackle the recent issues arising in the digital era, these additional safeguards provided by China will encourage businesses and investors to be associated with China. This will significantly impact the economic growth in India. There is a need to introduce reforms in the IP regulation, it essential to do so for the economic growth of India.



#### **Conclusion and Insights:**

China's 2025 Intellectual Property Nation Building Plan represents a pivotal moment towards its role as a global leader in intellectual property governance. The emphasis on quality enhancement, effective enforcement, international collaboration, and digital reforming of IP measures, portray that China is raising its ambitions to not only build capacity of IP filings quantitatively, but create a significant holistic environment that ties innovation to economic growth for a wide, broad-based economy. This development presents as an opportunity and threat to the BRICS IP cooperation. The opportunity presented to it is to enhance cooperation on intellectual property, establish consistent enforcement processes, and collectively expand its influence in global intellectual property governance processes. The threat is that of dominance by China and dilution of the collective agenda of the other countries by furthering the need of one.

The emergence of the plan presents challenges and opportunities for India. China's emphasis on stricter enforcement, digital reforming of IP processes, and international standardization, will compel India to bring about changes in its IP regime.

However, increased collaboration of the BRICS countries provides India with an opportunity for balanced, development-oriented IP norms that protect access to knowledge, public health, and technology transfer. India has to vouch for maintain a balance in the BRICS IP cooperation. Failure by India to maintain the balance in BRICS will nullify the intent of the organisation. The failure to keep pace with China, could threaten its standing in attracting foreign investment, and innovation, while impacting its competitive positioning in world trading systems.

Therefore, China's 2025 plan serves as a reminder that intellectual property has moved from the margins to core of national competitiveness and global economic strategy. India should act on the imperative to reform its IP regime based upon international standards and to work with BRICS towards a resolution of protecting ideas, developing innovation, and establishing just distribution.





# India becomes ground zero in the global Al race


#### 'Yatra' a generic word, can't be monopolised: Delhi High Court in Online vs BookMyYatra Yatra trademark case

# GI filings in India jump by 380 percent over five-year period

The number of filings for geographical indications (GIs) in India jumped by 380 percent over the last five years, the biggest increase among IP filings in the jurisdiction during the period, as reported by the Ministry of Commerce and Industry.

In 2020-21, only 57 GI applications were filed. The number increased to 116 in 2021-22 and further ballooned to 210 in 2022-23. However, total filings plummeted to 134 in 2023-24 but recovered to reach 274 applications in 2024-25.
