What is this program, and why do we have it?

We must all do what we can to promote patriotism, provide care and comfort not only for our veterans, but to the families and communities who do so much for our great nation as well.

Several ways to participate in this program:

Star Spangled Kids:

HOW TO PROMOTE "STAR SPANGLED KIDS"



Educate youth on the history of the United States from the aspect of patriotism, Americanism and the U.S. Constitution.

- In conjunction with local schools, create a Unit Citizenship Award for children and youth who have demonstrated the ideals of the U.S. Constitution.
- Team with the Education chairman to bring veterans or servicemembers into the classroom to talk about what their service means to defending the ideals of the

Constitution.

- Share "Fascinating Facts about the U.S. Constitution" each month in the department or unit bulletin, in tweets, or in a newspaper editorial.
- List important constitutional dates by chronological order or by month. Encourage students to test their knowledge of the Constitution.
- Distribute patriotic coloring book pages for children in primary grades.
- Celebrate Constitution Day (also known as Citizenship Day) on September 17, the day set aside each year to commemorate the signing of the U.S. Constitution.
 - o Celebrate at September's Junior meeting with a cake or cupcakes.
 - o Let Juniors report on different sections of the Bill of Rights
- Print and distribute pocket copies of the U.S. Constitution for school children and/or Juniors.
- Put on a skit or musical about the Constitution and the signers.
- Hold a scavenger hunt in the post where children find information relating to the Constitution.
- Have members dress up as signers of the Constitution and describe the role of their character in the writing and signing of the Constitution.
- Encourage high school-aged students to use their knowledge of the U.S. Constitution by participating in The American Legion Oratorical Contest.

- ☐ Essay Classes: Class Grade Level Word Requirement is on Americanism Essay Cover sheet. THE DECISION OF THE JUDGES SHALL BE FINAL.
- □ Units choose a school submission deadline in time for you to select and submit winning entries to Department Chair.
- □ Submissions are due to the department chairmen no later than March 29, 2025.

Get Out The Vote: Your civic duty as an American citizen is to participate in the democratic process using the fundamental right to vote. Voting is a crucial tool used for making your voice heard at the local, state, and national levels. Your vote at the poll gives you a voice on the issues most important to you and helps decide who will take care of the issues you care most about, like veteran affairs, human rights, the education system, and climate change. The leaders we elect may sail the ship, but we are their guiding compass.



The American Legion Auxiliary is an institution with 99.72% of its members being female. The ALA was founded in 1919 before women were granted the right to vote. For 100 years, activists and political reformers — including many of the Auxiliary's founding members — fought tirelessly to gain equal access to voting. Making the choice not to vote could be considered disrespectful to the legacy of all the women who fought decades to earn all women in the future the right to vote. To continue the efforts of our foremothers, all Auxiliary members should not only exercise their right to vote, but they should also encourage all citizens to participate in our democracy.

By refraining from or refusing to vote, you are also supporting the "status quo," either intentionally or unintentionally. Not voting also means you are allowing other people to choose what happens that directly affects your life. Although voting is a fundamental right for every American citizen, many citizens still

experience barriers that prevent their vote from being cast. The privilege of being able to vote is a power that many still do not have equitable access to. You can use the power you have to speak up and create change for a better, more equitable future. Cast your ballot for leaders who will create positive change on the issues that matter most.

□ District Contest:

- ✓ Each year, the Post will identify two contestants in December to compete in a District Contest, which usually takes place in January.
- ✓ You will find the official rules, Assigned Topics, and other valuable tools to help prepare your five speeches at www.legion.org/oratorical.
- ✓ Your prepared oration is an 8–10-minute speech on any part of the US Constitution, and you must prepare a 3-5 speech on each of the Assigned Topics. Speeches must be memorized and presented without notes, props, a microphone, and a podium. You have all summer to work on your speeches; members of the Post should help you with feedback and take you to different Posts in their District to expose you to more opportunities.

Report Due Dates: Unit End of Year Report due by MAY 1, 2025

Committee-Specific Reporting Guidelines: What to include in your report:

- How did your units and department promote Star Spangled Kids, educating children and youth about the U.S. Constitution from the aspect of patriotism and Americanism? Incorporate how your department and units utilized the Star Spangled Kids kits provided by National, including the success stories highlights.
- What training on flag history, etiquette, and proper disposal methods did your units and departments provide in communities?
- How did your unit and department identify as the resource for training and assistance in promoting patriotism and Americanism in communities?
- What avenues were used to increase participation in the ALA Americanism Essay Contest?
- How did members, units, and department contribute to the advancement of The American Legion's Americanism programs?
- Photo submissions should be in a high-resolution format (at least 300 DPI) or sent using the high-resolution option on your smartphone. When emailing the photo, select "actual size" for attaching to the email. The request for photos is important for our national chairs to highlight members serving our mission.

2024-2025 National Americanism Program Awards Deadlines and Submission Requirements

All award submissions must include a narrative (either a PDF or Microsoft Word document) explaining why the department or unit you're nominating should receive the award. The narrative can also be the department chair's report. You may also upload other supporting documentation that will give the committee a full picture of the important mission work your department or unit has accomplished this year. These files can be photos (JPG, JPEG or TIFs -- no larger than 14MB) or PDF documents. If you have more than three supporting files, please email the committee email address listed in the form.

Here are the national awards for this committee:

Unit Award: Dorothy Pearl Most Outstanding Unit Americanism Program (per division)

- Presented: One unit in each division
- Materials and guidelines:
 - o Narrative not to exceed 1,000 words that includes specific examples of how unit delivered mission service. Narrative can also include portions from department chair's report
 - o Should include action (high-resolution) photos, scans/links to news articles, etc.

Note: You will receive a confirmation when your award is submitted.
