The Missing Man Table

This table set for one is small, symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner alone against his oppressors.

The single rose displayed in a vase reminds us of the families and loved ones of our comrades-in-arms who kept the faith awaiting their return.

The vase is tied with a yellow ribbon to symbolize our continued uncertainty, hope for their return and determination to account for them.

A slice of lemon is on the bread plate to remind us of their bitter fate.

There is salt upon the bread plate symbolic of the families' tears as they wait.

The glass is inverted, they cannot toast with us this night.

The chair—the chair is empty— they are not here.
