SECRIST, P.C. 13 PARTIAL TRANSCRIPT OF PROCEEDINGS 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 Hearing in this matter was commenced on September 21, 2012, before the HONORABLE DAVID L. 22 DICKINSON, District Judge, in Durango, Colorado. 23 This is a transcript of the in-chambers interview of DYLAN REDWINE pursuant to 14-10-126(1) recorded in this case on the above date and is sealed by 24 order of Court. 25

(Whereupon, the following proceedings were 1 2 conducted out of the presence of the parties and counsel and entered of record:) 3 THE COURT: Let's sit right here. 4 5 Hi, I'm Judge Dickinson. DYLAN REDWINE: I'm Dylan Redwine. 6 7 THE COURT: Glad to know you, Dylan. I told you I have to make a record of this. 8 9 You see the clock that's running up there? That tells me that it's being recorded. 10 11 DYLAN REDWINE: Okay. 12 THE COURT: But as I said earlier, somebody's 13 going to have to give me a very good reason why they should know what you told me. 14 DYLAN REDWINE: Okay. 15 THE COURT: Okay? 16 17 DYLAN REDWINE: Okay. 18 THE COURT: A couple of ground rules. 19 First, I know this is horrible. I wish I 20 didn't have to put kids through this, but it's part of 21 the job. I know that even good parents, not meaning to, 22 can put pressure on kids in this kind of situation and I 23 apologize for that if this makes you feel like you're 24 under pressure.

Second thing is I want you to know what I want

you to tell me is what's on your mind, not what somebody 1 2 else told you, you should say. Okay? 3 DYLAN REDWINE: Okay. 4 THE COURT: Are you okay with that? DYLAN REDWINE: Yep. 5 THE COURT: All right. It's my job to decide 6 which parent you should live with most of the time and 7 where you should go to school, and I want to know what 8 9 you think about that. Now, I might not be able to do everything that 10 you would like. I'm sure you wish that this would go 11 away. I can't make it do that, but I'll certainly take 12 into account what you tell me when I make the decision. 13 Do you have any questions about what I'm doing 14 or what I have to do? 15 DYLAN REDWINE: No. 16 17 THE COURT: Okay. Tell me what you think about where you should live and where you should go to school. 18 DYLAN REDWINE: Well, I'd like to go to school 19 in Colorado Springs in Monument because like in Monument, 20 it's just -- it was kind of -- I like the teachers 21 22 there --23 THE COURT: Go ahead. DYLAN REDWINE: -- the teachers there more. 2.4 25 And the students, the students here -- or in Monument,

they're friendly and they're nice. And some of the 1 teachers in Bayfield, they were nice, but sometimes they 2 3 just -- you know, sometimes they would like have a bad day and they would just kind of be a little bit mean. So 5 I didn't really like it there as much. So in Monument, it's -- I like my teachers 6 7 because they come to school and they're happy and, you know, they just have no problems teaching and just they 8 9 feel happy there. (Pause.) 10 11 THE COURT: How long have you lived in 12 Bayfield? DYLAN REDWINE: I believe it was seven years. 13 THE COURT: Did you have friends there? 14 DYLAN REDWINE: Yeah. 15 16 THE COURT: Do you miss them? 17 DYLAN REDWINE: It's nice to see them every 18 once in a while. THE COURT: Have you made new friends in 19 20 Monument? DYLAN REDWINE: 21 Yep. 22 (Pause.) THE COURT: How do you get along with your dad? 23 24 DYLAN REDWINE: Lately it's just kind of been 25 different than what it was like two to three years ago.

THE COURT: How? DYLAN REDWINE: I've been -- like after all 2 3 this -- like the -- going to Colorado Springs and that, he thinks I should have stayed in Bayfield and he's 4 5 always telling me that. So it kind of makes me a little bit mad and frustrated, so, you know, I kind of storm off 6 7 and go in my room or, you know, if we're on like a trip or something, I'll go and just kind of -- just think to 8 9 myself a little bit. And then he'll just kind of get mad and then he'll say why are you being so like -- so 10 11 different than what you were. 12 THE COURT: How long have you been in Colorado 13 Springs? DYLAN REDWINE: We stayed there for like a 14 year, maybe. Since about like August -- no. Like ten 15 16 days before August. 17 THE COURT: So early -- late this summer, this 18 past summer? DYLAN REDWINE: Yeah. 19 Is that right? 20 THE COURT: 21 DYLAN REDWINE: Yes. 22 THE COURT: Had you been there before? DYLAN REDWINE: Yeah, we visited every once in 23 24 a while to go see my mom's boyfriend Mike. 25 THE COURT: How long have you been doing that?

DYLAN REDWINE: We've been doing it like two, three years.

THE COURT: One of the sad realities of life is that judges can't do anything about how far it is between places.

DYLAN REDWINE: Uh-huh.

THE COURT: It's 300 miles to Colorado Springs from here or 350, something like that. And that's too far to allow you to see your dad or your mom real often, depending on who you live with. You would have to live most of the time one place and see the other parent only occasionally. Do you understand that?

DYLAN REDWINE: Yep.

THE COURT: And there's nothing I can do about that. I've not myself been through this, but my granddaughter did. Her mom, who is my daughter, lived here and her father is in Fort Collins, and that was a tough deal for everybody.

And I think it will be just as tough for you. Do you understand that?

DYLAN REDWINE: Yes, sir.

THE COURT: Knowing that that's the way it has to be, you're going to spend most of your time with your mom or most of your time with your dad and see the other parent maybe once or twice a month, some time in the
