THE JOURNEY

The one thing that I have heard throughout the COVID pandemic is how much we as United Methodist Women have missed being together in person. On November 6, 2021, 65 of us gathered in person for the third annual Smoky Mountain District UMW Annual Meeting at Sevierville First United Methodist Church. We were so blessed to have Pat Bellingrath, Holston Conference UMW Spiritual Growth Coordinator, install officers and Rev. Sandra Johnson was the speaker. Our very special member, Norma Blair, was honored for 77 years of faithful service with a Special Mission Recognition pin. Since Norma will turn 99 in December 2021, we celebrated her upcoming birth-day after lunch with a surprise birthday cupcake and tiara. The Smoky Mountain District UMW is very blessed to have another member, Elizabeth Franklin, who turned 97 in July. Elizabeth has been a faithful member of UMW for half of its existence. Elizabeth continues to be in mission by making quilts, teddy bears and baby hats for those in need.

I have just completed the United Methodist Women Changemakers Soul Care Retreat which was held virtually. This is a part of the New Wineskins campaign that will be rolling out early in 2022 addressing the need for care of the whole person – body, mind and spirit. The New Wineskins campaign is based on Mark 2:22, *No one pours new wine into old leather wineskins; otherwise, the wine would burst the wineskins and the wine would be lost and the wineskins destroyed. But new wine is for new wineskins*.

There are also more changes coming in 2022 to United Methodist Women. There will be a new website coming out in January 2022. Mission u will have a new approach as adults, youth and children use the same study which will also be available for use in Sunday School and Bible Study settings. A National Membership Model will be available in 2022 which will allow online membership engagement. Yvette Moore described this Campaign in a Zoom meeting I attended as a "grand refreshment that will carve out ways for new women to engage in the United Methodist Women's organization which will encourage growth and invite new women." In the same Zoom meeting, Sally Vonner described the New Wineskins Campaign as "a way to reboot UMW by boldly being ahead of our time." She encouraged us to put our faith, hope and love into action and referenced Isaiah 43:19: Look! I'm doing a new thing; now it sprouts up; don't you recognize it? I'm making a way in the desert, paths in the wilderness. Change is always difficult and uncomfortable. But through us the dreams of our foremothers live on. Please be in prayer for our National UMW Leaders as they make new ways and paths and all United Methodist Women as we acquire new wineskins.



A Humble Legacy Woman of Tennessee

As a 13 year old, Elizabeth Jones' mother died and she had to leave school to care for her siblings. Then, to earn board and room, she worked for a prominent and compassionate family until her marriage to Raymond Franklin. He brought her into the Methodist church, brought five children into the world with her, and supported her creative gifts and leadership.

The Franklins were charter members of Green Meadow Methodist Church in 1966. Elizabeth helped to establish a unit of the Women's Society of Christian Service, the children's ministry, and the young adults' ministry, locally and in the district. The Franklins were active in district and conference events, including the Methodist Men's meetings.

When Raymond took a position with the Federal Highway Administration in Washington, DC, they became involved with the Upper Marlboro Methodist church, district, and conference ministries in Maryland. Concerned that she couldn't relate to the education and experiences of the women's meetings, she began taking "handwork" to break the barriers. She was recognized as an expert in their new hobby. When she was asked to speak, Raymond would help her write and practice her presentation.

After they had returned to Alcoa, Elizabeth felt inadequate in the speech-making expectations of the District Lay Speaker training. Thanks to her, leadership in projects became an avenue of service. She has been able to use her sewing, cooking, and woodworking skills to meet local church and mission needs. She's made sanctuary banners and was awed to tend to the altar. She's made thousands of stuffed toys, blankets, layettes, baby caps, quilts, book bags, wheelchair bags, and clothing. This modest woman, sure of her ability, reveals she has sent each item off with love.

Although they had designed and built a second house across the street from the church, when Raymond passed on and her health was keeping her from her gardening and cooking, she decided to move to the nearby Asbury Place retirement center. Of course, she immediately saved the United Methodist Women unit from folding, established her quilt frame and crafts in the activity room, began repairing residents' clothing and even trimming hair. She tended her raised bed garden and houseplants in the common areas.

During the pandemic shut down, Elizabeth relished the undisturbed time to complete a Wedding Ring quilt for each of her 13 great-grandchildren. When told of the need for small blankets for immigrant children passing through on buses to their next home, over 30 quilts were distributed with love.

At age 97, she wears many UMW "Special Mission" pins and has been recognized as a "Five Star Woman" ever since that was established as a goal. She has been duly honored with a major donation to the Legacy Fund for the 150th Celebration of the United Methodist Women. All the while, smiling with friendliness, she seeks to do justice, loves kindness, and walks humbly with her God.





NORMA BLAIR HONORED AT ANNUAL MEETING



During the service, Norma received a Special Mission Recognition pin for her 75-plus years of service to United Methodist Women from Susan Daffron, Smoky Mountain District President. As Spiritual Growth Coordinator for her home unit of Sevierville First, she participated in the annual Memorial Service lead by Cassie Sylvester, District Spiritual Growth Coordinator, by ringing a bell for every woman for whom 19 candles had been lighted and whom many churches in the district had lost in 2020.

Norma S. Blair was born on December 20, 1922. She has been a lifelong Methodist beginning at First Church in Oakdale, TN (Morgan Co.) She proudly wears her WSCS pin along with others she has received through the years.

It had taken so long to set it up due to Covid-19 restrictions at the Camp, we praised God to meet for fellowship, fun, food and spiritual growth!

After morning refreshments we kicked off our day. President Dianne McRae welcomed all followed by a Prayer Calendar devotion from Cassie Sylvester, Spiritual Growth, and guest speakers Pat Bellingrath, Spiritual Growth, Holston Conference UMW and Eva Pray, our Camp Wesley Woods BaseCamp Coordinator.

Pat's devotion was from Alisha Gordon's book "Our Entire Selves – Spiritual practices that help us be whole persons in Jesus Christ and create space for God". It teaches that bringing your entire self into the God space is essential. Jesus instructed us to love God and love our neighbors <u>as</u> ourselves, <u>not more</u> than ourselves. Taking care of you is not indulgence, it's preservation!

Acknowledging disparities between self-care and self-preservation is the first step in developing practices that seek to heal and restore our mind, body and spirit. Self-care becomes a critical part of our ability to carry out the work of justice, and enlisting our sisters and allies to ensure this happens is a part of the deep relationship building we as UMW members claim and crave.

Some spiritual practices can include gentle stretches as we pray, meditation – slowing our mind and body, meditate on the Word: Joshua 1:8 or Psalm 1:2, and music to lift your spirits. As author Alisha Gordon says, *"It takes time to build up our spiritual*"

being and nurture our body and mind as well. I have not mastered the seated yoga position yet but with patience for my body, keen attention to my mind and some help from Jesus, I will learn to embrace wholeness.

Pat also shared the Examen, an ancient guide to spiritual growth with five practices to center us in prayer.

- Notice God's Presence...Look back over your day and make note of the times you experienced His Presence.
- Give Thanks...As you review the day, thank God for each blessing and gift you remember.
- Ask Forgiveness...Be honest with God about the moments when you fell short today – when you

- were impatient or quick-tempered, when you lacked compassion or ignored a need.
- Pray About One Thing...Talk with God about one joy, one sorrow, one surprise, or one specific situation from today and let Him speak to your heart.
- 5. Hope for Tomorrow.

Following a sumptuous catered lunch, Eva Pray, Wesley Woods BaseCamp Coordinator, welcomed us and shared Camp stories of fun and fellowship. Eva said, "Covid 19 had delayed the camp in 2020, so this year was a great success with 330 summer campers on site, and 22 campers that traveled in our tripping programs all the way to Florida, the Northeast, and Minnesota."

Join us for an Advent study on Tuesday evenings starting November 30 at 6:00 on Zoom. We will be focusing on meditations by Sarah Bessey in her online book, *Waiting, Accepting, Journeying, Birthing*.

"...many of us are wondering: how could we possibly enter into this season of the Church calendar if we are paying attention to this world?

How do we celebrate or "get cozy" or turn towards Christmas when our hearts are broken by coronavirus, quarantines, death tolls, political divides, conspiracy theories, refugees, detention camps, broken treaties, by one another? When, in response to every crisis, our communities seem splintered and divided even in how to bind up each other's wounds and careless words are flung like rocks at our own glass houses? When perhaps we are lonely or bored or tired or

sick or broke or afraid? When we are grieving and sad and scared?

In these days, celebration can seem callous and uncaring, if not outright impossible.

But here's the thing, my friend: we enter into Advent now precisely because we are paying attention. It's because everything hurts as we prepare for Advent. It's because we have stood in hospital rooms and gravesides, empty churches and quiet bedrooms that we resolutely lay out candles and matches. We don't get to have hope without having grief. Hope dares to admit that not everything is as it should be, and so if we want to be hopeful, first we have to grieve. First we have to see that something is broken and there is a reason for why we need hope to begin with."

WESLEY HOUSE WALK-A-THON

In June, we received an invitation from Wesley House to participate in a Walk-A-Thon to raise funds their work with children and senior adults. Wesley House was founded by three United Methodist Women in 1907 to provide after school care and summer camps for working women. In the 1950's, they saw a need to support senior citizens who were experiencing social isolation. The SMD Leadership Team embraced this opportunity to support Wesley House and challenged each of our 22 units to donate \$100. Our \$2,200 would be 20% of the goal of \$11,000.

Several units participated donating over \$3,000! One unit has continued the walk meeting the 3rd Friday of each month to walk and raise funds for a mission project.

Once again, United Methodist Women have answered a call to mission. Thank you for your donations to support Wesley House in their work.

MISSION GIVING

Start 2022 with a reminder to your members. United Methodist Women's Mission Giving—which is unrestricted funds—supports the total program of the organization. There are five avenues for Mission Giving

Special Mission Recognition: Special Mission Recognition pins offer a meaningful way to honor members and non-members who have dedicated time and effort to service. The honoree receives a small gold oval lapel pin and certificate. Gift amounts range from \$40 to \$2,000. Pins can be ordered from your unit, district, or conference treasurer.

Gift to Mission: Make a gift for a minimum of \$5 in honor of someone and send a card to the honoree. Ecards are available for: Friendship, Mother's Day, Peace, and Thoughts and Prayers. On your donation form, check "Yes, I would like to send a gift notification" under "Send an Ecard." Cards are also be available through your district or conference treasurer.

Gift in Memory: Give a gift for a minimum of \$5 in memory of a member, friend or anyone else. Gift in Memory cards, available free from the district treasurer, may be sent to the family of the deceased. You can also send an Ecard with your gift when you donate using our donation form. Your district or conference treasurer are also available through your district or conference treasurer.

Pledge to Mission: An individual member's Pledge to Mission is the amount she pledges to contribute via her local unit. To support the foundational mission work of United Methodist Women. After the pledge she makes to her local church, her Pledge to Mission is usually the largest amount she gives every year for mission.

World Thank Offering: Spontaneous additional gifts can be given out of gratitude for God's abundance and in celebration of the joys of life. Gifts are collected throughout the year in a World Thank Offering box or jar or other container. World Thank Offerings are usually received in the fall during a special service of thanksgiving in the local unit.
