THE JOURNEY

"Sagan was having a very bad day. He pushed one teacher, struck two others. He refused to listen to instructions, and he refused to stay in his classroom. He was mimicking a gun with his hand and pointing it at students. Sagan had assaulted teachers and threatened students and would be suspended from school. A school board member was arguing that charges should be filed against him." This is the beginning of the chapter entitled "What is the School-to-Prison Pipeline?" in Ijeoma Oluo's book *So you want to talk about race*. Our first thought may be that Sagan is a threat to his school. But Sagan is 5 years old! He had never been in trouble at school before. Ijeoma continues, "But his day had started out poorly, and as the discipline continued with each outburst, he acted out more and more. There's no indication in the many paragraphs documenting the incident that any staff members tried to redirect Sagan's energy or ask him why he was upset. They simply ordered him to stop what he was doing and instituted some sort of punishment when he didn't respond the way they wanted.

A few weeks ago on the news, I saw a similar story. A very young boy had broken a computer and had run away from school. The school had contacted the police who found the child, handcuffed him, put him in the back of the police car alone and took him back to school. They showed live footage of the child being brought back to school. He was crying as he entered the school, and the school official who came to let him in began yelling at him. Having a 5-year-old granddaughter, my heart breaks for these children who experience such trauma. Ijeoma continues, "Nobody asked if Sagan was feeling well . . . frustrated or sad or uncomfortable about something. Nobody took the time to figure out how they could help this boy."

Five months into his kindergarten year, Sagan was suspended and learned that "he was too 'bad' to be educated." I do not have all the answers to this problem, but I do have the responsibility to learn all I can and do all I can to see that no child has to experience this! One of our Mission u studies this year is based on the book by Monique W. Morris, <u>Pushout: The Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools</u>. I invite you to attend our virtual Mission u July 23 – 24, 2021, as we explore and learn more about how decisions made by teachers, school administrators, and policymakers shape how our children learn and live.

The Holston Conference UMW logo is, *One Body, One Spirit*, from Ephesians 4:4-6, **One God and Father of us all, who is above all and through all and in all.** I pray we learn to live our lives in this way!

SPIRITUAL GROWTH—SPRING 2021 Finding Peace

Dear Sisters,

Time has flown since our Day Apart online gathering in April. Now we launch into summer. What a different climate, not only weatherwise, but politically, financially and, of course, health-wise than we experienced last year. Our hope is that, though we have been shaken up, that the past year has brought change for the better – that we're kinder, more vigilant and caring for our own health and that of others, that we erase the lines between color and privilege, and really experience life at peace here as God intended. There will always be bumps in our road, but how we choose to travel makes all the difference.

In early May, and prior to the challenges of an upcoming gas shortage, my husband Mickey and I traveled to South Carolina pulling our little camper to see family. We then trekked up the Atlantic coast to the serene and beautiful Outer Banks of North Carolina. We had deliberately isolated ourselves from the world and unbeknownst to us the fuel supply had been closed for ransom by cyber hackers and seven states were hit. We couldn't find gas anywhere and on our return trip we literally coasted into a campground in Raleigh, NC on fumes! God had us, as always, when he sent a local friend with two gallons of gas, a nephew with one gallon from his lawn mower, and good old AAA travel service with one gallon and bottles of ice water. Those same friends and family in Raleigh also carted us round-trip from the campground to their homes and treated us to sumptuous meals. How blessed we were!

The little bit of fuel brought allowed us to drive the area and search for stations that were still open. Of course, I could have let anxiety overtake me but instead I prayed throughout this and God spoke to me to, "Just relax." In Erin James-Brown's book, Finding Peace in an Anxious World, we are reminded that in times of uncertainty and anxiety, Jesus offers wisdom from Luke 24:36 "Peace be with you." I felt peace and I knew he would provide us fuel if he wished us to leave for home or sit tight. In His timing, He provided a station where we lined up with others, and were able to fill-up plus four gas cans... enough to get us on to Lake Junaluska Campground then home to Greenback, TN. I knew it was my faith in trusting Him that got us through and He had worked fast and plentifully!

In a recent sermon, Pastor Emeritus Joe Green said to trust God in what you don't understand and cited scripture where we are assured that when things are shaken up, the "unshakeable" things are left behind.

He reminded us of the precious promise in Jeremiah 29:11"For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." And a friend sent me this from Deuteronomy 31:6 "Be strong and courageous! Do not be afraid and do not panic...For the Lord your God will personally go ahead of you. He will neither fail you nor abandon you."

Now those words are a comfort! Be at peace.

HOLSTON CONFERENCE UMW TAKE A STAND ON RACIAL INJUSTICE

On a warm spring day, members of the United Methodist Women of the Holston Conference gathered at the steps of the Blount County Courthouse in Maryville as Blount County Mayor Ed Mitchell presented Holston Conference United Methodist Women President Donna Mosby with a Proclamation recognizing the establishment of the Holston Conference United Methodist Women's Charter for Racial Justice.

In 1978, the Women's Division (now United Methodist Women) of the United Methodist General Board of Global Ministries created and adopted the Charter for Racial Justice. The Charter was adopted by the whole denomination in 1980. The Holston Conference UMW now has a policy encouraging members to work together to live out the tenants of the Charter and create increased opportunities for inclusion, accountability, and growth across racial lines.

Since our founding in 1869, United Methodist Women have fought for racial justice and against racial discrimination. From sending female educators and doctors to India in 1869 to sending missionaries around the world, the United Methodist Women became the women's mission organization of The United Methodist Church in 1973.

"This is our legacy," Mosby said at the reading of the Proclamation. Given the racial unrest that continues today and is spreading across communities and churches, the time is right to bring education and acceptance to the forefront. UMW is encouraging action through advocacy and civil engagement. Mosby asks us to participate in community events and help organize them if none are planned.

Holston Conference United Methodist Women 2021 Mission Giving Focus The Bethlehem Center • Chattanooga, Tennessee

The Bethlehem Center is one of the two *National Mission Institutions* located in the Holston Conference, (Wesley House Community Center, Knoxville being the other) and is the 2021 Mission Giving Focus. Born out of two separate Methodist ministries; The Good Shepherd Fold daycare, run by Reverend Sallie Crenshaw, and the Wesley House, established by Mrs. Miriam Brock, the now known Bethlehem Center offers programs for children, youth, adults, and the community.

During this time of COVID 19, the Bethlehem Center has partnered with Hamilton County Schools to launch Virtual Learning Centers whereby students gather in small groups, under the supervision of qualified adults to engage in remote learning. This partnership ensures students who are learning remotely have support and supervision when needed.

Other programs offered include Read to Lead After School Academy and Camp Restart which provides children with a safe place after school where they can grow academically, socially, emotionally, and spiritually and provides children with adventure-filled summers that includes science, technology, art, reading, and more.

Programs and activities for youth include leadership training and mentoring programs like the Bethlehem Leadership (B.L.U.), the Unit Independent Youth Services Foundation (IYSF), Boys to Men at the Beth, and the Omega Lamplighters, all seeking to empower high school youth with the tools they need to be effective citizens. The primary focus of these mentoring programs is to stress personal and social development with educational, cultural, social, emotional, and psychological activities. They are designed to provide good life skills and prepare them to become successful and contributing members of the community.

Other happenings for children include a sports program and The Nehemiah Project. Being a part of one of the sports leagues encourages growth and togetherness, develops skills such as trust and teamwork. Partnering with other agencies, The Nehemiah Project provides backpacks and school supplies to ensure children have basic items they need to do well in school.

Adult programs include Faith and Finances which provides faith-based support for financial stability, Building Stable Lives provides life coaches in neighborhoods to empower participants to develop social and economic independence, and Impact1!, a mentoring program for men who strive to achieve their goals and are provided with employment assistance.

The Bethlehem Center also partners with other agencies and provides four Community Outreach programs that support families in the areas of economic empowerment, leadership & spiritual development, and connection to resources.
