I served on the former Maryville District UMW team as Vice President, Mission Coordinator for Social Action, as Program Resources Coordinator, and served as Unit President and in other offices of my home church unit.

My husband Mickey and I moved to Tennessee 18 years ago and just love it! As I write this my mind turns to spring in the mountains and by the time you read this, it will be here! Spring is a time of new beginnings here in East Tennessee as the flowers begin to bud and days warm up. They are great to read alone or to use in a study.

Pat also encourages us for the upcoming Lenten season, that we simply find a devotional to use, focus on our daily prayer, and instead of "giving up" something for Lent, try "adding something" to our lives that will give purpose and meaning. A great suggestion!

In the past, we've offered a hands-on mission opportunity for the Day Apart event. This year, due to Covid -19 restrictions and for safety, we're taking the "hands -on" off, that is, simply requesting your monetary donations for two critical mission organizations which help the homeless.

Jesus said it in Matt. 28:20, in the Great Commission, "...go out into ALL of the world,"

so we're requesting your support for Shades of Grace UMC in Kingsport, TN and Proverbs 3:27 Mission Center, Hunt Memorial UMC, Bristol, VA. Your donation will be split between both.

Here's info from the local Pastors about their outreach passion and how they help the homeless:

<u>Shades of Grace</u>, a United Methodist Congregation is a new church start in the Holston Conference, which began in 2014.

We provide cremation, burial, and funeral services for homeless individuals that are unclaimed. At our most recent internment service in October, we buried the remains of 22 persons. We serve a daily community meal to anyone who shows up. We have a clothing closet that assists with emergencies and recently released inmates. We purchase birth certificates and photo identification for anyone requesting them. We have a community mailbox where many homeless persons receive mail.

Shades of Grace is the closest thing whom some call home. We pay co-pay's for insured persons who may be unable to afford their prescription (non-narcotic).

We recently began an international outreach in Nigeria, Africa. We send monthly offerings to this project which is called Shades of Grace Uzoma. We are currently sending money to build (bore) holes for 4 freshwater wells. The pandemic is just now beginning to

appear in those villages and our assistance is an answer to prayer.

We offer a weekly worship service at 4 p.m. on Sundays which is also live streamed to over 54 countries in the world. We have baptized 95 persons since we began this ministry. We also offer bible studies, grief support, and G.E.D. classes.

Shades of Grace has been closed to public gatherings since March 2020, but our staff continues to work each day in the building meeting needs as they arise.

We seek to be an inclusive congregation where all people are welcome, and no one will face discrimination because of who they are. Jesus loves us all.

#### Proverbs 3:27 Mission Center at Hunt Memorial

**United Methodist Church** began as a dream for Pastor Caroline Hawthorne about four years ago. Hunt Memorial UMC has always worked with low-income families in our neighborhood, but one Christmas found out that one of our families was actually living in their car. Through much prayer and support, we began opening our church doors when the daytime high temperature did not rise above the freezing mark. That first year we opened our doors a handful of times and the donations began pouring in. Local churches donated food, blankets, hats, gloves, and socks. It then became our mission to reach out to homeless individuals and those at risk of becoming homeless.

In July 2020, this dream became more of a reality as the Pastor received a full-time appointment at only our church to be able to fully concentrate solely on our church and mission. We are working on becoming a full-time Day Center in Bristol, VA for homeless individuals and opening our doors year-round Monday through Friday 9:00 - 4:00.

Our guidance comes from Proverbs 3:27: "Do not withhold good from those who deserve it, when it is in your power to help them." Currently we are providing the following services:

\*Shelter during inclement weather – when the daytime high temperature hovers at 32 degrees, we open our doors as a daytime warming shelter \*Breakfast and lunch are served on daytime warming shelter days \*Mondays we provide sack lunches to the homeless (hot lunch during non-COVID times) \*Mail receipt for those with no permanent mailing address \*Blankets, sleeping bags, bed rolls, coats and jackets, gloves and hats, and clothing through our clothes closet \*Toiletries and hygiene items; toilet paper \*Showers, restrooms, and laundry facilities \*Motel assistance (Thanksgiving lunch and Christmas gifts) to those staying at the local motel through People Inc. (Rodeway Inn) \*Food assistance and Laundry \*Transportation and help moving to transitional and permanent housing \*Referrals to United Way, People Inc., and Salvation Army for services they may provide (i.e. overnight accommodations, motel, bus tickets, groceries, etc.) \*Referrals to Frontier Health and Ballad Health as needed for services they may provide (i.e. counseling, inpatient therapy, after surgical care, etc.) \*Referrals to Bristol Faith in Action and Salvation Army for services they may provide (i.e. utilities, rent, etc.).

Funding is appreciated for our <u>immediate</u> goals as follows: Lockers so individuals can store some of their belongings \* Partnering with our local Family Promise affiliation to become a full-time Day Center \* Partnering with Crossroads Medical Mission to provide free healthcare to homeless individuals \* Partnering with Bristol TN & Bristol VA Housing Authorities to help move individuals into permanent housing \* Capital Campaign to build additional showers and laundry facilities onto our church, a new roof on our church house which is where the shower & laundry facilities are now located \* Funding funeral services for homeless individuals \* Funding utility and rent assistance.
