



Kentucky Bluegrass Ninety-Nines Presents

AMELIA EARHART MEDAL

FIRST WOMAN TO CROSS THE ATLANTIC OCEAN SOLO

BACKGROUND

The city of Philadelphia presented this medal to Amelia Earhart in recognition of her 1932 solo, non stop flight across the Atlantic Ocean making her the first woman and only person since Charles Lindbergh to fly nonstop and solo across the Atlantic Ocean. On May 20, 1932 she took off from harbor Grace Newfoundlan, Canada and 15 hours and 2,026 miles later, she landed in Londonderry, Northern Ireland.

FUNDRAISER

The Kentucky Bluegrass chapter has received a generous donation of duplicates of the medal presented to Amelia Earhart. They are being presented for donations to help support the chapters scholarship funds. There is a strong tradition of scholarship recipients in the Bluegrass Chapter and the medals are being sold to help continue that tradition of supporting ladies in flight training to help support the need for women in Aviation.
