#### DO YOU KNOW ABOUT THE PPLI?

What is the Professional Pilot Leadership Initiative (PPLI)?

The PPLI is a three phase, structured leadership mentoring program that aims to accelerate the advancement of women in all pilot professions, facilitate mentoring, and enhance our leadership role in the aviation community.

Who should apply?

Highly motivated 99s who have at least a commercial certificate (and are actively flying) can apply. If members of your section or chapter are working on advanced ratings, looking for a career move, advancing their careers with a current or future employer, preparing for an upgrade, or recovering from a setback, then it's time for them to consider this program.

Because the program uses digital means of communication and guidance, time zones and location are not relevant. This program is for ALL 99s, no matter where they are career wise, where they live and what age they are. However, having access to internet and email is essential and English is the language that bonds us. Currently, we are having participants from the Far East, Canada, USA and Europe.

At this moment we are heading towards our Autumn Session application deadline of **July 31st**.







#### Biweekly FAA Safety Briefing News Update Updates to ACS Now Posted

On June 11, the FAA posted updates to several of the Airman Certification Standards, including the ACS for Private Pilot-Airplane, Instrument-Airplane, and Commercial Pilot-Airplane, as well as for the Remote Pilot-Small UAS certificate. Among some of the global changes were added language for part 68 (BasicMed), revised references to reflect the FAA's reorganization, and revisions to numerous tasks in all areas of operation to include more consistent element descriptions. GA accidents frequently result from pilots being unprepared for challenges presented by aircraft that are new or different from what they are used to flying. Even when pilots are legally certificated to operate aircraft within a specific category and class, significant differences can exist among different types of aircraft within that category and class — thus necessitating the need for effective transition training. Got weather? Given today's tech savvy GA pilots, you probably have the latest and greatest weather information in the palm of your hand. But did you know that depending on the device or the application you use, inconsistencies in information could introduce unintended safety risks? The FAA's Weather Technology in the Cockpit (WTIC) Program is looking at ways to address this issue by incorporating weather and human performance research into the standards and guidance documents that support pilot weather decision making.
