Flying for Fudge -- By Diane Cozzi

Roger Kelly and I flew our Cessna 172 "One-One-Honey" up to Mackinac Island for a couple days; it's one of our favorite places to fly. Virtually the entire island is a State Park and popular summer tourist destination. No motorized vehicles are allowed on the island and most people arrive by ferry. Transportation is by horse-drawn carriage or bicycle. The only exceptions are airplanes, and the island has a small well-kept airport to tempt any general aviation pilot.

We like to fly north along the Wisconsin lakeshore, then angle eastward over the lake. It's a 3.5 hour flight on the tach. However, there is no aviation fuel available on the island, so you need enough to get there and then get back to the mainland. There are other options available, but we landed at our traditional stop, Door County Cherryland Airport at Sturgeon Bay (SUE) to take on more fuel and to break for a picnic lunch we brought with us. Also, it was an overcast day and we couldn't get the altitude we wanted for a more direct route over Lake Michigan. So after lunch and refueling – both us and the plane – we went to Plan B and headed eastward, hugging remote little islands and the northern edge of the lake – you hardly need a map

and you can't get lost. Then just before beginning decent to pattern altitude, there are spectacular views flying over the famous Mackinac Bridge, one of the longest suspension bridges in the world.

Mackinac Island Airport (MCD) is the highest point on the island; after you land just phone for a horse-drawn taxi to take you into town. The weather for the rest of our stay, and the flight home, was PERFECT! There are two things we particularly like to do on the island – ride bikes and eat fudge. We rented bikes (taking a supply of fudge with us) and spent the better part of a day riding the lakeside path around the island (an 8-mile circumference), stopping to check out the gorgeous views along the way, and visiting "One-One-Honey" at the airport.

DESCRIPTION OF THE FLY NOW AWARD The FLY NOW Award is a progressive award given to Student Pliot Members with a need for financial assistance to become licensed pilots. The award provides up to \$6000 toward completion of the Recreational Pilot, Sport Pilot, Private Pilot certificate, or non-U.S. equivalent in any aircraft category. This award will be given progressively to winners AFTER they complete eligible milestones in their training. gplicant must be an official Student Pilot Member of The 99s at least three months prior to the Applicant must be an official outdet if his seminar of the raw at teast title more applied to the submission deadline. Must have a current medical certificate, if it is required for the plot certificate bought. Applicant must have logged a minimum of five hours of flight training in the six months immediately preceding the application deadline. Applicant need NOT have solved nor passed the knowledge test Each applicant who belongs to a Chapter needs to request a recommendation from her Chapter Amelia Earthart Memorial Scholarship Chairman. Each applicant in a Section without Chapters needs to request a recommendation from her Section Amelia Earthart Memorial Scholarship Chairman.
