# EVA KOZLOWSKI CHAPTER CHAIRMAN

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Happy Holidays Fellow 99s and Friends -

What a wonderful Holiday Party! Great to see so many members from WAI that were in attendance. I wish to thank all those responsible for organizing the Holiday Party – Madeleine Monaco, Sharon Schorsch, Colleen Murphy and Natalie Berman – thank you for all your hard work. I would like to briefly share my recent experience of losing electrical power in a Cessna 172. My CFI and I were going to head out the practice area, about 25 nm away, but the ceiling was fairly low. The airport was VFR, so we decided to stay and wait it out, doing some pattern work.

I did the pre-flight, and all necessary check lists – the run-up did not indicate any issues with the battery or ammeter. I was cleared for take-off to do "options." First time around the pattern was no issue. As I did my second time around the pattern, I was already cleared to land on runway 2L on my downwind leg, when I started getting major static in my headset, and just like that lost all comm. I already had 20% flaps down and on the base leg we lost all electric. We flipped the Master switch with no change in the situation. Following the check list, at that point we shut all the electric off and on final I squawked 7600. I received a steady green for my first light gun signal landing - hopefully my last, also!

By the time we safely cleared the runway, my CFI was calling the tower on his cell phone. I did receive a steady red light gun signal, for traffic that was crossing in front of us on one of the taxiways. The tower stayed with us on the cell phone until we got to the maintenance hangar.

The mechanic determined the alternator was bad and needed to be replaced. No more flying that day.

A couple of take-aways:

- Your flight starts and stops on the ramp. Squawking 7600 is necessary at any point when you are no longer on the ramp. I have been told by ATC to go around when on final. Even though that day, I knew there would be no issue landing, I still needed to let the tower know I lost comm with them.
- Make sure that you have the proper phone number to reach the tower in cases like this.

Things can go bad quickly – always stay one step ahead of the airplane



## **Richard J. Santori Memorial Scholarship**

The Richard J. Santori Memorial Scholarship offers two annual scholarships to members of the North Central Section ("NCS") under the auspices of The Chicago Area Chapter of The Ninety-Nines ("CAC").

One scholarship in the amount of \$2,000 is to be used to assist a 99 in the completion of an additional pilot certificate or rating. Applicants must be a current pilot with the appropriate medical certificate and must be approaching the flight time requirement for the desired rating or certificate.

The other scholarship offers \$1,000 to assist a Student Pilot Member toward completion of an initial pilot certificate, in any aircraft. Applicants must have soloed, and, if required for the pilot certificate sought, must have a current medical certificate and must have passed the written exam.

Applicants must be a current member of The 99s, the NCS and their chapter in good standing.

Applicants must submit three (3) copies of each: the completed and signed application including the form; attached essay; letter of recommendation from their chapter chair; proof of certificates and ratings held; medical certificate; proof of date and score of knowledge tests taken; copy of last page(s) of logbook showing current hours flown; and a letter of reference from someone outside of the aviation community who is not a relative. These documents must be mailed to the address on the application form to be post-marked no later than the date indicated on the form.

Funds will be paid from receipts which document the training. Receipts must be signed by both the student and instructor and include copies of the logbook if applicable.

Funds are to be used within two years of the award date. Prior applicants and recipients may re-apply in future years.

The winning candidate and all candidates who did not qualify will be notified within one month after the receipt deadline.
