
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# For Caitlin







The silly monkeys had lost track of the amount of bananas they had given and received from each other.




Accountant Alligator, sick of having to listen to the fighting of the two monkeys, decided to help them.

"We will use a <u>T-account</u> to help you keep track of your bananas", said Accountant Alligator to the monkeys.




"A tea account!", shouted the monkeys. "But we don't like tea. We like bananas".


Accountant Alligator laughed. "It's not a tea account. It's a Taccount. It will help you two monkeys keep track of your bananas", he explained.

Debit





"On Thursday I gave three bananas back to Mick", said Nick. So he drew three bananas on the credit side of the T-account.


"Then on Saturday I gave another two bananas to Nick" said Mick. So

"Thats very kind of you. But I don't eat bananas. I only eat monkeys". said Accountant Alligator jokingly.




From that day on Mick and Nick had no more arguments about who owed who bananas. All thanks to Accountant Alligator and his wonderful T-Account.






# Economics Elchhant

.....and the Worried Chickens




One day, Economics Elephant was walking past the chickens in the Zoo. He noticed the chickens were very worried. "What's wrong?", said Economics Elephant.

"Last year, I could <u>trade</u> one of my eggs to the monkeys in return for ten of their nuts", said Helen the




"But ever since more chickens have come to live in the Zoo, I am only getting five nuts in return for an egg", she sighed.




"What you chickens need to do is lay less eggs", said Economics Elephant.


"What?", cried the chickens. "But that means we will get less nuts".







"No thanks", replied Economics Elephant. "I prefer to eat grass, and I get that for free".

As the amount of coal in the world decreases, what do you think happens the price of it?












"What's wrong Rob?", said Business Bear.


Business Bear smiled and asked "What do you think the honey badger would like to eat instead of his lettuce?".




"Aww but I don't have any honey to swap with him", Rob the Rabbit said sadly.

"But I'm only a little rabbit, I can't start a business", said Rob the Rabbit.


"Of course you can", said Business Bear. "What are you good at?"

"I'm good at picking flowers", said


Rob the Rabbit.




"Very clever Rob. What you are doing is called **Trading**", said




So from that day forward, Rob the Rabbit collected flowers from the bees and swapped them for honey. Then he took the honey to the honey badger and swapped it for lettuce.

"None of the lion or cheetah cubs want to drink my milk", she said sadly.


"Why is that?", asked Marketing Moose.

"Differentiate means to make different. You need to make your milk different from the other goats' milk.




"If the cubs see that your milk is different, then they might buy yours instead of the older goats' milk", said Marketing Moose.

"Oooohhhhhhh! I know how I can make my milk different", said Georgia the Goat with a smile.








The cubs were very interested in these new types of flavoured milk that Georgia the Goat was selling and immediately bought her milk instead of the other goats' milk.
