





TicTacToe x3


Tri-Plex is simply 3 games of 3D TicTacToe all played at the same time with movable pieces.




The board is 3 TicTacToe grids stacked on top of each other.



There are 2 sets of pieces. Each has 3 squares, 3 triangles, 3 circles and 1 wild piece.




The goal is the same as that of TicTacToe: to get 3 in a row, but there is a simple change:




Since Tri-Plex is 3 games of 3D TicTacToe played at once, then the goal is tripled as well.


The goal is to get 3 in a row of all 3 types of pieces and all at the same time




The wild piece may be played as any of the 3 types pieces to form a row.



The wild piece may also be used to form more than one row at the same time.



The Big NOT: Diagonal rows are <u>NOT</u> allowed.



The Short Explanation

In turns, players play their pieces, one at a time, into any open spaces. This is called the SetUp. Once all of the pieces have been played onto the board, AllIn is announced and players may then move their pieces from where they were first played into any open spaces on the board. Rows may be broken (as strategy to be reformed elsewhere later) as long as in the end all 3 types of rows are made at the same time.

Goal

To be the first player to get 3 in a row of all 3 types of pieces at the same time.

Rules

- 1. In turns, players play any one of their own pieces into any open space.
- 2. All pieces must be played onto the board before they may be moved.
- 3. Players may then move any one of their own pieces from where it was played into any open space on the board.
- 4. The wild piece may be played as any of the 3 types of pieces to form a row.
- 5. The wild piece may be used in multiple rows at the same time.
- 6. Rows may be broken in order to reposition them later in the game.
- 7. Diagonal rows, not formed within the 3 straight directions, are **NOT** allowed.
