






USA Median Annual Earnings by Education

The Fate of 20 Ninth Graders (Nationally)

- 6 drop out (30%)
- 6 graduate & go to work (30%)
- 8 Enroll in college (40%)
- 4 Drop out (20%)
- 4 Graduate in five years (20%)
- 2 Take "gray collar" jobs, nationally (10%)
- 2 Win the one-way-to-win game (10%)

GAP: TRUE CAREER COUNSELING

WHEN ASKED TO RANK 12 INFLUENCES ON FUTURE CAREER DECISIONS, 23,000 HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS PUT "COUNSELING" LAST WITH ONLY THREE PERCENT (MI/SkillsUSA)



Why we need better career preparation:

- 7,000 students drop out of high school every day
- 6.5 million young adults not in school or working
- \$1.7 trillion in higher education student loan debt
- 43% of recent college grads either underemployed or unemployed
- 39% of ALL college students require remediation
- America spends over \$3.7B each year to provide community college remediation for recent high school graduates
- Only 50% of all college students graduate with a post secondary degree
- Only a third of the labor market requires a BA or higher
- 71% of college students work while in school
- Yet 58% of employers report that graduates are not adequately prepared for work





-PURPOSE

6 Steps to Career Success:

1. Self Exploration. (Ask: "What do you love to do," as well as "What are you good at doing?")

2. Career Exploration (Ask: "What can you get paid to do?", "What occupations/industries are a high priority and/or are emerging?")

3. Discuss & verify alignment between career goal and personality/skills

- 4. Set a tentative career goal
- 5. Education/Training research: Investigate & verify multiple paths to initial goal (work experience, job shadowing, interviews, apprenticeships)
- 6. Establish a skills-based educational plan




Most Jobs in the Workplace are Middle Skilled: (e.g. Health Care)




This Ratio is True Across ALL Industries except for 2...

Most jobs will not require a BA




Percentage of Job Openings by Educational Obtainment in the year 2025









Description: The Michigan Skilled Trades Training Fund (STTF) awards funds to employers to assist with work-based learning that leads to an industry recognized credential through on-the job training or classroom training for new and incumbent and workers, and apprenticeship training for new registered apprentices. Employers can be reimbursed up to \$1,500 per employee for on-the job-training or classroom training, and \$3,000 for each registered apprentice, upon completion of training. The Michigan Advanced Technician Training Program also offers grants to employers whose program is registered as an apprenticeship.

Michigan's School-To-Registered Apprenticeship (STRA) program is for youth age 16-19 and enrolled in high school or a GED test preparation program. Students are employed part-time, and their structured on-the-job training is combined with classroom work. Employers who participate in the program qualify for a tax credit of up to \$2,000 annually for every registered apprentice trained.

Calculate Advanced Placement vs. Articulation/Dual/Concurrent Enrollment



Nationally:

Only about 13-16% of students taking an AP class will get college credit.

For those taking an articulated class, 91% of completers earn college credit.

For those that completed a dual or concurrent enrollment class, 100% earn college credit.

Even better:

Ask them what problems they want to solve.


