I recommend scheduling our review meeting at least two months before your wedding date, but we can arrange it at your convenience once you are ready.

Loading In & Out: Many wedding venues have easy load-in, however in certain instances I will have to use a freight elevator. All of my equipment is stacked on rolling carts, and it is not possible for me to carry all of it up or down stairs. There must be a ramp or elevator in order for me to access the venue and set up my equipment.

Unfortunately, I can not accept help loading in or out from anyone, and I will not risk liability for accidents or injuries.

Note: Plan to end the evening at least one hour before you have to be out of the venue. It can take me up to an hour to pack up my DJ gear and get out. Most venues want everyone out by midnight, so typically the event will be ending at 11:00PM latest.

Floor Plan: The floor plan of every venue is different, and some venues will put DJs in a corner, away from all the action. This is not ideal for sound or the dancefloor experience. I highly recommend adjusting your floor plan if needed so that the main DJ booth will be close to the dancefloor. It does look pretty when the wedding party/head table is the main focus, but it's not always practical. You won't be sitting there very long, so it would be better to put it in a corner if there aren't other options and space is limited.

Note: Also, on floor plan, if you are serving your own food and utilizing multiple crockpots, make sure they are on a separate power circuit than what my DJ booth will be running on. You want to avoid overloading a circuit, because the breaker would trip and cut off all the power.

Note: If travel between venues is necessary, please indicate this, as it may incur an additional fee. Certain situations, such as when cocktail hour occurs outside the reception hall, may require more than two sound systems. Typically, there is no extra charge for this, as the ceremony speakers can be relocated quickly. However, I need to be informed in advance about the event flow to ensure adequate preparation. The flow is primarily dictated by the venue, so I recommend consulting with them regarding their guest movement procedures.

Equipment Capabilities: The ceremony system is designed for all-weather conditions and can be set up outdoors without the need for shelter. The event will proceed regardless, rain or shine! Should you decide to relocate the ceremony indoors at the last minute, this transition can be completed in approximately 15 to 20 minutes. However, please note that the main system is not weather-resistant and requires protection from the elements. It is essential to have a roof, tent, and appropriate flooring or a stage to prevent exposure to grass, dirt, or moisture from rain or snow.

Tip: If you are utilizing any pop-up tents, be warned that they need to be heavily weighted and staked down. Wind can easily pick them up and the potential for damage to property is high. This doubles for your ceremony arch or trellis backdrop.

Day-of Arrival: I typically arrive 2 to 3 hours before the event start time. I will text

you to confirm my arrival. You can advise the venue in advance that I do not need a

table or chair setup; I have my own.

CEREMONY

Before we delve into the music and other details, a few words of advice. There is no right or wrong way to get married. What matters most is that you choose what is meaningful to you and brings you joy. Let's make this a really special and memorable moment.

First and foremost, securing a competent officiant is essential. It has become increasingly common for a family member or friend to officiate the ceremony, which is perfectly acceptable. However, I recommend discussing the content of their speech in advance and practicing together. In my experience, ceremonies officiated by

non-professionals often do not proceed as smoothly, which can lead to awkward moments. Moreover, individuals without officiating experience may inadvertently treat the ceremony like a toast, focusing more on their personal connection to you rather than on the significance of the vows. This can detract from the solemnity of the occasion, making it feel less important than it should be.

While embracing non-traditional elements is totally fine, it is vital to keep the focus on your vows and what the marriage pact means to you as a couple. Consider what prompted your decision to marry and envision the life you are building together. What promises are you making to one another? I encourage you to invest time and thought into these aspects, and you may find it beneficial to communicate your wishes to the officiant rather than leaving it to chance.

Another piece of advice: the presence of your DJ at the rehearsal can significantly enhance the flow of the event. I do offer rehearsal service as an add-on, and I recommend that you reserve your date and time at booking to ensure my availability. Many DJs do not offer this option because they are losing money by not booking other gigs, and they'll likely tell you it's not needed. The reality is, practice makes perfect.

If you desire a seamless and coordinated experience, having me present to ensure everyone is on cue will make a notable difference, especially if precise timing is required for a special song verse. Additionally, if you have a large wedding party, consider that the selected music may not be long enough. Some DJs may simply restart the song, which may not matter to everyone, but a well-timed performance will contribute to a more polished presentation. Ultimately, my involvement will help alleviate stress and uncertainty for you on the night before your wedding as well as on the day-of.

Equipment and Power: Again, advise the venue I do not need a table or chair setup. All my equipment is run on battery power, so I do not require power outlets (ceremony system only).

MICROPHONES

You have the option to choose between a handheld microphone or a lapel microphone. I will leave the decision to your preference, as each environment presents unique considerations that may influence which option is more effective. Both choices have their advantages and disadvantages to weigh in any case.

A handheld microphone typically provides the most reliable sound quality; however, most officiants prefer to keep both hands free for tasks such as holding their officiant's book. During key moments, such as exchanging vows or placing rings, having your hands available without the need to hold a microphone can be advantageous. Additionally, photographers generally favor lapel microphones, as they are less obtrusive and do not appear in photographs.

Lapel microphones are also quite reliable and can easily be tucked into the breast pocket of a blazer. However, the bride will need to either wear a thigh strap or ensure that her dress accommodates a battery pack. Female officiants typically attach the battery pack to their dress or place it in a pocket. It is common for many DJs to mic only the officiant and the groom, but I find this approach less than ideal, as it can diminish the bride's voice clarity. I recommend using a lapel microphone for the bride as well, or opting for a handheld microphone that can be mounted on a stand or passed around. Alternatively, the officiant can hold the microphone up to you if they are comfortable doing so.

Lastly, in the event of rain or the likelihood of rain, we will need to rely on a single handheld microphone mounted on a stand. While I can provide a rain cover for the handheld microphone, unfortunately, this solution is not applicable to the lapel style.

Note: Having a contingency plan in place for inclement weather can significantly reduce stress. Given the unpredictable nature of Ohio's weather, if you have specifically chosen a venue for its outdoor ceremony space, it is vital to communicate your strong preference for this option, reserving it only for extreme conditions, such as thunder and lightning or whatever your specific threshold may be.

Rest assured, I along with other vendors, are committed to making your vision a reality. Additionally, consider the comfort of your guests; wet seats or frigid temperatures can detract from their experience. Designate someone to bring towels to dry off chairs, provide umbrellas, and advise guests to dress warmly or bring blankets. Take these proactive steps to ensure a successful event!

Tip: A receiving line is a traditional practice in which the wedding party forms a line after the ceremony to greet guests as they exit and proceed to the cocktail hour. This process typically lasts between 15 to 20 minutes, depending on the number of guests in attendance. However, it has become less common in recent times, as many couples prefer to expedite the process to focus on their photography.

Tip: On that last tip, I've seen photographers take anywhere from 30 to 90 minutes for photos. You'll want to get a time estimate from them based on how many photos you're taking so you can plan accordingly.

Optional: I have a HOVERAir drone, and I'm able to capture a group photo or video. Check out my Facebook page for examples of the highlight reel I will create for you. This is a nice option instead of a receiving line. Additionally, it can be effectively utilized later during the reception to encourage guests to get up from their seats and open the dance floor. Select One

Tip: After the ceremony, you will disappear with your photographer to take photos for the next hour or so. I would highly recommend asking someone who is not in the

immediate family, or in the wedding party, to bring you bottles of water and a plate of appetizers (just for the bride and groom) so you can snack and stay hydrated during this time.

Note: After the ceremony, I will attempt to run, and get ahead of your guests to start the music at the cocktail hour. There's nothing more awkward than dead silence when people walk into the reception hall. Once everything is up and running, I will come back and collect the microphones and ceremony setup.

COCKTAIL HOUR

Note: Some venues have a hard open time for the bar at cocktail hour. Make sure you time the ceremony accordingly so the bar is open and ready to go for your guests.

Note: I do not drink alcohol while I'm on the job. If you see me getting a drink at the bar, it's 100% a pop or water.

Note: Some venues will close the bar during dinner. Please let me know so I can make an announcement and prepare guests. Select One

Tip: I'm seeing more couples who want to finish pictures early and join the cocktail hour. Alternatively, some couples will take 15 minutes to themselves to snack or have a private break before coming into the grand entrance and reception. The day will flash before your eyes if you let it, so I recommend taking a moment to relax and slow down. This will also help settle your nerves so you can enjoy dinner.

Tip: On that last tip, it can be difficult to eat and finish your meal at dinner time. The stress and nerves of the day will do a number on your stomach. I recommend that you bring something to settle your stomach, whatever works for you. i.e. Tums, Ginger Ale, a Vape etc.

Note: Get your dress bustled before the grand entrance.

Note: When it's time, I will round up everyone and get you in order for the grand entrance. I will check with the venue and photographer beforehand to determine which door is the best to enter through.

Note: Throughout the evening, I will be coordinating with your photographer to make sure they are in the right place at the right time. They may need to change lenses or adjust lighting. I want to make you aware that when there is a brief pause between things, that is usually the reason. I will make sure music keeps playing so there isn't an awkward silence.

RECEPTION

ORDER OF EVENTS

Example: Grand Entrance, First Dance, Parent Dances, Blessing, Dinner, Cake Cutting, Toasts, Bouquet/Garter, Group Picture or Anniversary Dance, Open Dance Floor.

Note: I recommend scheduling toasts towards the conclusion of dinner. This approach tends to flow smoothly, especially if the cake is cut beforehand, allowing it to be served by the caterer during the toasts. I prefer to space out the events rather than rushing everything at the beginning; however, this may vary depending on your preferences.

If you anticipate many older guests who might depart after dinner, it's advisable to complete the toasts earlier in the evening. Some couples are eager to transition to dinner and prefer to reserve dancing and other activities for after the meal. This emphasizes the importance of planning ahead, and another reason I suggest you snack during the cocktail hour.

Conversely, some may worry about spilling drinks or food on their attire and prefer to conduct all the events before dinner. This strategy also works well for couples

who just want to get it all done so they can relax, and get to the party and dancing as
quickly as possible. Ultimately, the choice is yours; however, I have found that the order
in the example above tends to yield the best results.

Q. How should I announce you? Mr. and Mrs. Last Name?

Tip: It's getting more common for all couples, LGBTQIA+ included, to be introduced with first names only. If you're not taking the other's name or maybe it's complicated, don't worry, first names work fine!

Note: A Ballroom Blitz is a fun activity. You run around to each table and take a picture with everyone before the end of the song. Or, you can be seated, and have each table run up to you for a picture. It works well both ways. It's a great way to kick off the reception, and an opportunity to get a picture with everyone at your wedding!

DINNER

Note: Please count me in for dinner. I do not have any food restrictions. I will eat at my DJ booth, and I will need an extra plate and silverware set aside for me.

But if you both want to smash it, go for it! **P.S.** Practicing feeding each other cake could be a romantic date night idea;)

Q. Can guests make song requests? Select One

Note: I will have a light-up sign, directing everyone to text their song requests. It's a convenient option that guests love. However, I realize the bride and groom might not have their phones handy, so you are welcome to approach the DJ booth and make song requests anytime! Additionally, if you want to take the microphone and make an announcement or sing along, I will allow it...just be gentle and don't drop the mic!

Q. Should I stick to your playlist, or give guest requests preference? Select One

Note: Musically, I love it all and I'm game to play whatever you want. The only exceptions to that include: political themed songs, and as much as I love the song "(I've Had) the Time of my Life", frequently an overly drunken guest will attempt the lift from Dirty Dancing and inevitably fall on their face. I also steer clear of mosh pits, as liability insurance will not cover you or me if someone gets injured.

Q. Should I play clean versions of songs, or is it ok to play explicit versions? Select One

Note: I typically reserve the most explicit music for the last hour. I call it the dirty hour! I've found it's better to ease people in, otherwise the older folks will quickly leave. At the

beginning of the night, I will play the traditional crowd pleasers, and gradually play more explicit and racier music. Let me know if that works for you or if you envision something different.

Tip: If you've got a lot of kiddos there, they love to dance to their favorite Disney movie song.

Note: Kids love to touch my DJ booth and stare into my flashing lights. Adults will let their kids run wild at weddings, so just beware of the potential for injuries and damage to occur. I would highly recommend nominating a guest, or hiring someone to be in charge of watching them all.

Tip: It's a good idea to set a time for kids to go home. If you've set a time, let me know so I can kick it in gear with the dirty hour!
