YAMHILL COUNTY FAIR & RODEO General Rules and Regulations

The following rules and regulations become a part of the contract of each exhibitor with the Yamhill County Fair and Rodeo. Special rules take precedence over general rules if there is a conflict. The Yamhill County Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or connected to, or incident to the Fair and Rodeo. Yamhill County Fairgrounds Policy on Dissemination of Materials, Signature Collection and Related Topics. In order to protect and provide for the safety of all fairgrounds patrons and personnel, to insure the orderly passage of the large numbers of fairgrounds visitors and to provide reasonable time, place and manner restrictions on the speech, activities and travel of said visitors, the rules and regulations regarding all interim use of the grounds by exhibitors,

concessionaires, organizations and patrons, are as follows:

- The supervision and control of all fairgrounds property, activities and management are vested in the Yamhill County Fair Board. The Fair Board shall have the right to interpret its own policies, rules and regulations. Any conflict relating to the interpretation of Fair Board Policy, rules and/or regulations relating to the conduct of the fair, the operations of the fairgrounds and its facilities shall be resolved by the Fair Board or its managing agent.
- The following activities shall be conducted exclusively from within the confines of an assigned and leased fair booth and not otherwise, except as provided in Policy #3:
- 2.1 All dissemination or delivery of products, literature,

brochures, cards and handbills

2.2. The collection of signatures, collection of endorsements and

solicitation of funds.

- 2.3. Canvassing, gift-giving, sales and demonstrations.
- 2.4. All similar activities.
- All exhibitors are expected and required to conduct themselves in a professional and businesslike manner. Any unruly behavior, disorderly conduct, or use of threatening or harassing language to patrons or personnel of the fairgrounds shall be grounds for expulsion.

A person's rights to petition, campaign for or against an individual or ballot measure, or carry on any other activity protected by the First Amendment shall not be unreasonably restricted or restrained. It shall be the policy of the Yamhill County Fair Board to recognize and encourage the rights of persons to use its property and facilities for the purpose of political debate and discourse, subject to reasonable restrictions on the time, place, and manner of the exercise of said rights.

- Any person, including a business, association, or other organization may rent a particularly described area or space within an area of fairgrounds property designated for the purpose, for a specified term, on a first-come, first-served basis (no rented area or space may be sublet or assigned. No person having rented an area or space shall conduct any activity or operation outside of the rented area or space).
- 2. No signature gathering, pamphleting, electioneering, or distribution of printed materials shall be conducted in any area outside of a rented area or space or outside of any designated area. Additional information is available in Adopted Policy #3. Please request and obtain the policy from the fair office.

Yamhill County Fairgrounds Third Party Information Distribution Policy

It is the policy of the Yamhill County Fairgrounds to accommodate groups and individuals wishing to distribute information on fairgrounds property so long as the distribution complies with the following procedures:

- 1. Any group or individual wishing to distribute information, fliers, written material, or attempting to solicit signatures via petition, must register with fairground management at least 24 hours in advance of the event.
- 2. Fair management will provide a reasonable location to groups and Individuals, based on event logistics and with health and safety of the general public and facility users foremost in mind, without charge, as space is available on a first-come, first-served basis. The location will consist of an area not to exceed 10'x10'. The persons using the space may erect a canopy and a table. No person shall block doorways or walkways or interfere with the free flow of pedestrians and emergency traffic.
- 3. Groups and individuals utilizing such space must, at all times, remain within the allocated area. Straying from the allocated area for purposes of distributing information is prohibited. Violation of this policy will result in a first and final warning. Any subsequent violation constitutes trespass or disorderly conduct, and violators may be cited, arrested and/or removed.
- Those groups and individuals distributing information under this policy must maintain reasonable standards of conduct. No amplification devices of any kinds will be allowed.
- 5. Fair management reserves as its sole and discretionary right the ability to determine any and all locations under purposes of this policy. The building in which the Open Class entries will be exhibited will be secured to the best of our ability during the Fair. While the utmost care will be taken to protect entries, no responsibility for loss or damage to any item can, or will be assumed by the YCF&R, its Management, Employees and/or Volunteers. All entries are entered at your own risk.

Rule 1: Release time for Static Exhibits will be the Sunday following fair closing. Please bring exhibit tags.

Rule 2: *Entries:* Write all entries clearly, using blanks furnished by the Yamhill County Fair Board only. Entry Blanks must be completely and properly filled in. Please use a separate entry form for each department. The management reserves the right to reject any entry, if it is deemed objectionable in any way; requires excessive space, is offensive by reason of odor or appearance, dangerous by reason of explosive or combustible character. On entering article, a claim ticket will be furnished to each exhibitor, specifying the class and number of the entry. All entries must bear the entry tag. Every article must be entered for competition in the name of the owner or maker. Anyone trying to deceive the judge in regard to ownership, or who shall purchase articles or borrow them to enter in his or her name, shall forfeit all claims as an exhibitor. The Yamhill County Fair Board retains

the right to reject any exhibits when it becomes apparent that the facilities in question are full to capacity. Entries not accompanied by owners or their agencies must be consigned entirely at the owner's risk. Exhibitors may make one entry for each class as they desire, except where specified, but an exhibitor will not be awarded more than two cash premiums in any one class. Ribbons shall be given out in order of placing by the judge. A person having entered an item for competition will not be allowed to withdraw or change the entry after the opening of the Fair and Rodeo, except in the Floral Entries, which may be replaced with fresh stock after the first day if wilting or deteriorating.

Rule 3: Concessions and Booths: The management will authorize the letting of such privileges as are required to supply the necessary wants of the people or that may add to their comfort, convenience, and pleasure. All activities must be conducted under the supervision of the management by written permission and are subject to cancellation. Every concessionaire and agent shall work only in the area of his or her own concession or booth while working at the Fair and Rodeo. No roaming vendors or solicitors, acting for either a profit or non-profit organization or on his/her own behalf, shall be permitted on the fairgrounds. All solicitations for either contributions or sale must be made from within the confines of the concession booth unless otherwise exempted by management. All concessionaires must comply

with state and county food and health laws. Application for Health Permits should be sent to Yamhill County Health Department. On-site inspection may be arranged immediately prior to opening of Fair and Rodeo.

Rule 4: *Traffic:* **Unloading** – On entry day all exhibits must be quickly unloaded, and trucks and cars moved to the designated parking areas. The Yamhill County Fair Board and Management have the right to have vehicles and/or trailers that are not moved in an orderly fashion towed away at the owner's expense. All deliveries of supplies must be made before 8:30 am each morning, this includes, feed for animals that are being exhibited, etc. After delivery, parked cars, trucks, trailers, etc., are limited to the designated parking areas only. Due to lack of space, parking will only be allowed in designated areas under the direction of attendants. Enforced speed limit is 5 mph for all vehicles. Foot traffic and livestock have the right of way at all times.

Rule 5: *Liability:* The Yamhill County Fair Board will have Security Agents and Attendants on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution in its power for the preservation and protection of persons, articles on exhibit, livestock and property. Yamhill County Fair & amp; Rodeo will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire or other causes, or assume any liability for accidents to persons or property.

Rule 6: *Expenses and Claims:* No expenses or claims will be allowed unless specifically authorized by the Yamhill County Fair Board and Manager of the Fair and Rodeo.

Rule 7: *Treatment of Animals*: Improper treatment of any animal(s) will be grounds for dismissal for the owner or exhibitor of that animal(s).

Rule 8: *Dogs:* Dogs are not allowed on the grounds during the Fair and Rodeo, except for Service Dogs, and dogs entered in the 4-H Dog Show. Dogs must leave the grounds following the Dog Show.

Rule 9: *Smoking:* Smoking is prohibited in and within 20' of all barns, buildings, arenas and such other locations as may be posted by order of the State Fire Marshal.

Rule 10: *Littering:* All litter should be put into trash containers to keep the grounds clean, neat, and attractive.

Rule 11: All exhibits will be open for public viewing the

Wednesday fair opens through Saturday of Fair from 10 am to 9

pm. See Rule 13 for exceptions.

Rule 12: *Exhibitors:* All attendants at exhibits must be neatly attired and conduct themselves in a quiet and orderly manner. Premiums for Fair are budgeted by the Fair Board and none may be paid unless published in the Premium Book; ribbons only will be awarded. The Fair reserves the right to make such reductions in premiums in all Open Class as it deems necessary, or to pro-rate them at the discretion of the Fair Board. **Static exhibit premiums will be paid the Sunday following fair closing, from 9 am to 1 pm.**

All materials used in decorating booths, racks, exhibits, tack rooms, stalls or pens must be made from non-flammable material or treated and maintained in flame- resistant condition. Exhibitors of machinery in motion, and other exhibits liable to occasional accidents, injury damage to persons coming in contact with them shall guard their exhibits and protect the public coming in contact therewith, and every such exhibitor by exhibiting during the Fair and agrees that he/she will indemnify the Fair from and against any claim or demand, cost, charges, and expenses which suffering damage through or by the reason of such exhibit not being properly guarded or the demand not being protected there from, and that he/she will, upon demand, reimburse the Fair and/or County or any sums it may be compelled to expend by reason of such claims, expense or charges.

Rule 13: *Judging:* No person will be permitted in static display areas while judging occurs. These areas will be closed to the

public during those times. The awards will be marked 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and Best of Show, and will be made according to the merits of the exhibit. The judge may disqualify or award 2 nd or 3 rd premiums at his/her discretion. The judge shall disqualify or transfer to the correct section (at his/her discretion) any exhibit, which is not a true representative of the class or section in which it is entered. The judge may disqualify any exhibit not of show quality. The judge's decision will be final. An article without merit shall not be awarded a premium whether there are one or more entries in this section. Where there is one exhibit in a class, the award shall be made on merit alone, and a lesser premium than first, or no premiums, may be awarded. Judges or any member of the

immediate family or friends will not be allowed to show in departments they are judging. Any person interfering with the judges during their adjudication will forfeit the right of premiums or ribbons. All officers are required and exhibitors are requested to report any violation of this rule to the Yamhill County Fair Board. Any one causing arguments or physical disturbance during the judging of a class will be removed from the fairgrounds and any premiums to be awarded in the class being judged will have to be confirmed or denied by the Fair Management on the merits of the judge's decision. An error in the record of premiums awarded caused by oversight or neglect on the part of the superintendent or clerk shall be subject to correction by the Fair Management.

Rule 14: *Superintendents:* Each superintendent, under the direction of the management, shall have full charge of the department to which he or she may be assigned, and exhibitors must follow his or her orders relating to placing the exhibits, showing, etc. The superintendent will direct the calling of classes for showing, in accordance with the printed schedule, as far as practical. The superintendent has the right to request certificates of registration and transfers and examine it before the prizes are awarded and to notify Judges that the exhibitors have complied with these requirements. The Superintendent should not, under any circumstances, permit any exhibitor access to display cases or space where exhibits are shown. It is the duty of the superintendent to make such corrections as he/she may deem necessary if it is ascertained that an animal or article is entered in a division or class in which it does not properly belong.

Rule 15: *Clerks:* The clerks are requested to make a note of all cases where registration or entry blanks are not satisfactory to the superintendent and to so indicate by checks on the judge's report or on clerk sheets, Clerks shall not allow the clerk sheets of the Fair to go from his or her possession to be inspected by anyone except officials of the Fair. Any exhibitor, or person acting for the exhibitor, found examining the clerk's books will forfeit all premiums, ribbons or money won. No placing will be made known by the clerk until the judging is finished, at which time the clerk will announce the placing of awards, after each class, and the judge,

when required will give his reason for placing each class. When all the judging is finished, the clerk will hand the completed books to the superintendent in charge of that department.

Animal Health Rules:

No animal shall be admitted to the Fairgrounds that shows any evidence of communicable disease or any unsightly disease condition. No animal will be admitted from a quarantined herd or herd showing symptoms of contagious, infectious or communicable disease. The management reserves the right to require health inspection and diagnostic tests to be made before or after the animals are on the Fairgrounds and may order the immediate removal from the grounds of any animal which does not meet the health requirements.

All animals including Horses, Hogs, Sheep, Cattle, Dairy Goats,

Poultry, Rabbits and Cavies with active ringworm, or with more than five (5) warts larger than a U.S. ten (10) cent piece, or other skin conditions will be refused entry to the Fairgrounds or removed from the Fairgrounds at the discretion of the veterinarian, superintendent or the Fair and Rodeo Management. All sheep originating within 20 miles of a confirmed Blue Tongue outbreak will be required to have been vaccinated not less than 20 days, but not more than 18 months prior to entry. 4-H dogs exhibited at this year's Fair and Rodeo must have been

immunized against Distemper and Rabies and have been free from any infectious illness 30 days prior to the Fair and Rodeo. A certificate signed by a veterinarian verifying your dog's health is required for the 4-H Dog Show.

Agriculture Livestock

IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS) CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

1) All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.

2) Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

3) Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.

4) Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of, consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its

integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5) Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

6) The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7) Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

8) No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

9) The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10) The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expos and any special notices to members*.

11) The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

2021 – 2022 4-H / FFA Auction Rules

Revised December 1st, 2021

The word "Animal" in this section includes market beef, sheep, goats, swine, chickens, turkeys and rabbits.

1. All sold animals not floored will be delivered to a Livestock Auction Committee designated location or approved processor of choice listed in the auction sale catalog by the buyer of the animal.

2. Participants will abide by the National Show Ring Code of Ethics and either the FFA or 4-H Code of Conduct. Violation of these rules may result in loss of sale order or expulsion from the auction. Participants agree to accept the decision of the auction committee.

3. An animal that receives a white award (ribbon) in its market class will not be eligible for sale in the auction. If an animal is condemned in the slaughter process, the seller will absorb the loss. Any dockage will be passed on to the seller.

4. All animals must be tagged and weighed at first weigh-ins at the designated time and place to be eligible to sell at the YCLA auction. No uncastrated animals excluding fowl and rabbits will be allowed for initial weigh in. All animals must be dehorned prior to initial weigh in.

5. All personal information is to be completed and turned in at initial weigh in or tattooing.

6. All participants must provide proof of enrollment/membership in 4-H or FFA at the time of initial weigh in.

7. Student must sign the drug withdrawal compliance certificate prior to the sale. USDA requirements for withdrawal of feed additives and medications shall be followed.

8. Members of the immediate family may weigh in one additional shared animal to serve as a backup animal. Each 4-H Club or FFA chapter may weigh-in one additional "club or chapter" animal per species for every 10 members. (Example: 1-10 members = 1 animal, 11-20 members = 2 animals, 21-30 members = 3 animals, etc.) Every animal must be registered to an individual, immediate family, 4-H Club, or FFA Chapter at initial weigh in.

9. If a tagged animal should lose its tag or if it should die, member must notify the Auction Committee General Chair as soon as possible.

10. All hardship cases, exceptions to the auction rules and grievances must be handled through the Yamhill County Livestock Association Auction Committee. Grievances regarding the adherence to auction rules must be brought in writing to the General Chair. The Committee will respond to grievances within seven days.

11. Animals will be weighed at designated times and locations established by the Auction Committee. Species times will be posted in the barns. No reweighs.

12. The Auction Committee has the right to refuse to allow any animal to sell that is considered unsafe or not receiving proper care. If an animal does not receive proper care before and after the auction, the seller will forfeit the floor price for their animal.

13. The member has possession of the animal until the winning bidder is determined during the auction. At that point, the animal becomes the possession of the auction committee, and the committee retains that possession until the animal is released to the buyer, floor buyer or processor.

14. At final weigh-in, a maximum of two (2) Market class animals or pens may be weighed-in per division.

15. Only one animal or pen per exhibitor maybe sold. A member exhibiting more than one species of market animal must choose which species will go through the sale by Thursday at noon, or the decision will default to the auction committee. If exhibitors have only one species, then it will be the highest placing animal that will be sold.

16. All auction animals must be entered in a regular 4-H or FFA market class at the fair, and participants must abide by the rules of those specific organizations unless otherwise specified.

17. All members and animals must be groomed for the auction as they should appear in showmanship classes. This means appropriate attire for the 4-H or FFA member.

18. The Auction Committee will deduct up to a 6% commission on the price of each animal or pen sold. All donations will be subject to up to 6% commission. Check off program fees will also be deducted separate from the commission fee. If a check must be re-issued, a stop payment fee will be charged.

19. Buyer thank you cards must be turned in to the auction office by 5:00 PM of the first day of the fair. Failure to do so results in removal from the sale.

20. 4-H and FFA members will be allowed to sell through their high school graduation year.

21. The auction committee, in conjunction with the fair veterinarian, will ensure that all animals in the auction are of sound health prior to the sale. An animal will be withdrawn from the sale if found to be in an unhealthy state.

22. The member must show their own animal in the auction. No exceptions unless approved in writing by Auction Committee.

23. A member may withdraw their project animal(s) from the auction up to the time they enter the market class show ring, no exceptions, if so animals ear tag must be removed prior to entering the show ring. Members withdrawing their animal(s) from auction after that will forfeit their rights to sell an animal in next year's auction.

24. In the event of a virtual auction additional virtual auction rules will be provided.

MARKET STEER RULES

- 1. Only beef steers may participate in the auction. Dairy or dairy cross animals are not eligible for sale.
- At first weigh-ins, all steers will be haltered with lead ropes attached to the halter (rope halters preferred). Three steers maybe weighed per member.
- 3. All market steers must be weighed and tagged on February 26th, 2022 at Yamhill County Fairgrounds, 8:00am-10:00 AM. 600-800 pounds is recommended weight.
- 4. Steers must be dehorned and castrated before initial tagging. (No solid horns) If banded, no mass will be hanging below the band. Steers must be fed in accordance with FDA regulations.
- At fair, steers must weigh over 1100 lbs. and be graded Select or better by the judge in order to qualify for sale. Steers must gain a minimum of 2.0 lbs./day between beginning and ending weigh-ins to be eligible for sale.
- 6. A maximum of 5 warts no larger than a dime will be allowed on market steers.
- Brand certificates (blue C slip or blue auction sale paper) or proof of ownership must be turned in at initial weigh-in. Transportation slips are required at final weigh-in.

MARKET LAMB RULES

- 1. All lambs must be weighed and tagged on May 13th, 2022, 6:00-8:00 PM and May 14th, 2022 8:00- 9:00 AM at Yamhill County Fairgrounds.
- 2. No more than three lambs may be tagged per member.
- 3. Lambs that have been soaked for misrepresentation of weight will not be weighed.
- 4. At initial weigh-in, recommended weight is 70-80 lbs.
- 5. Wool may not be longer than 1/2 inch at time of final weigh-in and may be measured at the scales.
- 6. At Final Weigh-in, lambs must weigh at least 110 lbs. and be graded Choice or better by the judge to qualify for the sale.
- 7. At Final Weigh-in, lambs must gain a minimum of 20 lbs. between beginning and final weigh-in to be eligible for the sale.
- 8. Lamb check of program fees will be deducted from the sale of the animal in addition to the commission.

MARKET GOAT RULES

- 1. No more than three goats may be tagged per member.
- All goats must be weighed and tagged on May 13th, 2022, 6:00-8:00 PM and May 14th, 2022, 8:00-9:00 AM at Yamhill County Fairgrounds.
- 3. Market goats must gain at least 14 lbs. from beginning tofinal weigh-in.

4. They must also weigh at least 70 lbs. at final weigh- in.

At Initial weigh-in, the recommended weight is 45-50 lbs.

5. All male goats must be castrated, and all goats must be dehorned prior to initial weigh in.

MARKET RABBIT RULES

1.Each member may weigh 4 fryers and choose 3 of

them for one market pen OR can weigh 8 fryers and choose 6 of them for two market pens.

2. Market rabbits must weigh between 3.5 to 5.5 pounds each. The rabbits must be less than 70 days of age at time of fair. All rabbits must be kindled on May 26^{th} or later.

3.Rabbits must be tattooed on June 19th, 2022, at Yamhill County Fairgrounds, 9:00–11:00 AM.

MARKET HOG RULES

- 1. Three market hogs may be tagged per member.
- 2. Market hogs must be weighed and tagged on April 22nd, 2022, 6:00-8:00 PM or April 23rd, 2022, 8:00- 9:00 AM at the Yamhill County Fairgrounds. At initial weigh-in, the recommended weight is 55-105 lbs. Market hogs must not exceed 160 lbs. at initial weigh-in. Market hogs must weigh between 226-300 lbs. at final weigh-in and grade US No.1 or No.2 to be eligible for sale.
- 3. Hogs must gain a minimum of 1.4 lbs. per day, between beginning and final weigh-in, to be eligible for sale.
- 4. Pork check off program fees will be deducted from the sale of the animal in addition to the commission.
- 5. Processors require hogs have a minimum hair length of $\frac{1}{2}$ inch except on ears and tails at time of sale.
- 6.Hogs are to be fed only commercial feeds and water after arrival at fairgrounds before final weigh-in. Animals must be clean before weigh-in, especially ear tags.

MARKET CHICKEN RULES

- 1. Each member may have up to 10 chicks marked. Chicks must be no more than 6 days old when marked or examined by a committee member on June 19th, 2022, at the Yamhill County Fairgrounds 9:00-11:00 AM.
- 2. Market chickens must be sold in broiler pen of 3 and exhibited in that class.
- 3. Broilers must weigh at least 5.5 pounds at time of final weigh in.
- 4. Subject to available pen space, market chicken exhibitors may be restricted to only one pen of 3 broilers after judging.

MARKET TURKEY RULES

- 1. Each member may have up to 4 turkeys. Turkeys must be marked or examined by a committee member on June 19th, 2022, at the Yamhill County Fairgrounds 9:00am-11:00 AM to be eligible for sale.
- 2. Market toms must weigh at least 18 lbs., and hens must weigh at least 14 lbs. at final weigh-in. No turkey shall be over 20 weeks of age.
- 3. Each member may weigh in 2 turkeys of either sex at final weigh-in.
- 4. Member may sell one turkey, which will be sold by the head.
- 5. Subject to available pen space, market turkey exhibitors may be restricted to only one turkey after judging.

FFA RULES:

1. All entries must:

- (a) Be on regular FFA entry forms, completed in detail, including age of animal, and approved by the Agricultural Education Instructor. Members will not be permitted to exhibit an entry that has not been properly entered in keeping with the deadline date.
- (b) Projects must have been owned or leased and managed for at least sixty days prior to the Fair as a part of the Supervised Agricultural Experience projects of members in good standing with their local FFA Chapter. Any leased project which is registered in the name of a person other than the member, or registered in the name of the member's farm family, may be exhibited if the project is documented in the member's SAE and the ID number on the project, and the ID number in the lease agreement match. The lease agreement for that project must be for a minimum of nine months and the project is exhibited solely by the FFA member during the period of the agreement. Documentation and/ or proof of ownership/lease must be presented at registration or checkin, i.e. lease/project agreement with ID numbers and signatures OR registration papers (copies are accepted).
- (c) Graduates who are active FFA members with local, state and national dues paid, may exhibit for three years after high school graduation. Incoming Freshmen who are active FFA members with local, state and national dues paid, as well as enrolled in an Agriculture Education Program with an approved SAE Program, may exhibit. Any FFA member that has received the Discovery Degree is also able to exhibit.
- Although care will be exercised to avoid loss, the Fair Management and State FFA Association will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.
- 3. Exhibitors are allowed two entries per class per division (or division where no classes apply) in each livestock, poultry, rabbit, and wool class, one in landscape class and one in each crops class, with the exception of "Any Other Variety" in which up to five different varieties may be entered. Note: Notmore than one of the same variety in "Any Other Variety" may be entered. Ten different cultivars per class in Nursery, two unlike entries in each agriculture mechanics class, and one properly fitted showman-ship entry in each kind of livestock entered unless otherwise stated. Members must show their own animal, except in exceptional situations approved by the Sectional Superintendent. Members having two entries in a specific livestock class may have the second animal shown by another FFA member in official dress. Only members and helpers in Official Dress will be allowed to show.
- 4. If there is no competition or an entry is deemed unworthy of the premium offered, the premium may be awarded at the discretion of the judges.
- 5. FFA Chapters may compete the same as individuals. When this is done, the Chapter will be assigned an exhibitor number. Chapters entering livestock must indicate on the registration form the name of the member who will show the animal.
- Animals entered in the FFA Division must be made available for use in the Livestock, Dairy Cattle or Showmanship contests, unless excused by the Superintendent.
- 7. Any FFA exhibitor violating Fair rules or guilty of undesirable conduct may be penalized by forfeiture of all premiums earned, at the discretion of the FFA Management.

- 8. No animals may be advertised for sale during the Yamhill County Fair until after the auction is over. 9. FFA members may not sleep in the barns. Members may not stay in trailers or campers unless accompanied by parent or an approved adult chaperone.
- All livestock exhibitors must be accompanied by their Chapter Advisor or an officially designated replacement.
- 11. Breeding livestock may be registered or non registered purebred; other breeds; or commercial. When making fair entries, the animals must be entered by breed, by other breed, or as Commercial. If entering in other breeds, specify which breed. Market and feeder classes may be crossbred. Animals entered as registered must be registered by their respective breed association and identified by ear tattoo, tag or other identification as required and accepted by the breed association. Registration papers and the animal's identification must correspond with information on the entry form. This includes the percentage Exotic beef breeds. To be eligible for special breed association awards, animals must be registered in the exhibitor's name, and registration papers must be given to the Sectional Superintendent for review when animals are checked in. Tattoos must be readable. Animals, including Exotic breed, entered in commercial classes must be the progeny of purebred sire and dam, which need not be registered. EXCEPTIONS TO THE ABOVE RULE: Pending papers on all beef calves under 6 months of age are accepted with a copy of that animal's application for registration as well as sire and dam registration numbers.
- 12. All animals are subject to inspection by the veterinarian in attendance upon admission to the exhibition grounds. No animals shall be admitted to or allowed to remain on the grounds that shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease or any unsightly disease condition such as warts, ringworm, etc. The management reserves the right to require health inspection, diagnostic tests, treatment and/or other disease control measures or procedures which might become necessary in emergencies.
- Animals not passing health inspection by the State Fair Veterinarian must be immediately removed from the fairgrounds or exhibition area.
- 13. Bedding such as straw must be provided by exhibitors. There will be donated shavings for all exhibitors.
- 14. All FFA members will remove and clean straw from their pens and stalls prior to moving out. Failure to do so will result in premiums being withheld from the exhibitor.
- 15. Junior yearlings that have freshened are not eligible to compete.
- 16. Each FFA livestock exhibitor is responsible for: (a) Having the entry in the ring or place designated when class is called or exhibit is judged. Entries not in the proper place at time of judging will not be allowed to compete. (b) For giving proper care to animals entered. If animal or exhibitor area is not properly cared for, the Herdsmanship Judge has authority to have premium money withheld and have exhibitor take animal from the show.

17. We support and encourage the humane treatment of all animals. Exhibitors are expected to treat their animals with respect and provide for their continuous well-being through proper feeding, handling, disease prevention, sanitation and attention to their safety.

18. To be eligible for livestock association special awards, exhibitor must meet the requirement as stated for the award.

- 17. We support and encourage the humane treatment of all animals. Exhibitors are expected to treat their animals with respect and provide for their continuous well-being through proper feeding, handling, disease prevention, sanitation and attention to their safety.
- To be eligible for livestock association special awards, exhibitor must meet the requirement as stated for the award.
- 19. When classes are split, only one livestock association special award will be made and judges must determine and indicate who is to receive the award.
- 20. Animals are not to be watered at water faucets in the livestock building. This is essential to keep area clean and open for Fair visitors.
- Novice: never shown any species prior to the Yamhill County Fair, including 4-H, FFA, or Open classes. Beginning: shown 4-H or FFA for two years or less, or first year in species. Advanced: Shown more than two years.
- 22. No parents, leaders, superintendents, professional fitters, or advisors are allowed to assist members with tasks such as grooming or fitting animals or cleaning stalls. Only members exhibiting may help with showing, grooming, cleaning, etc.
- 23. All stalls, pens, and exhibition places must be cleaned before 8 am and refuse matter deposed of as directed by superintendents. All feed must be completed by this time.
- 24. All clubs will be house together in a barn. 25. All cattle will be double tied with short leads (halter and neck tie). All cattle with horns will wear horn guards at all times except the show ring. Tie outs are not allowed at county fair.
- 26. All livestock will have identifying cards on stalls or cages.

OFFICIAL SHOW DRESS FOR FFA LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS:

White shirt/blouse, official FFA tie/scarf and official FFA jacket zipped to the top. Black pants/slacks or jeans and dark shoes. White pants/slacks are strongly encouraged

for goat and dairy exhibitors. Participants in the above activities must be in official dress. Only closed toe shoes will be allowed in the show ring.

Superintendents have the authority to omit the wearing of jackets depending on the weather.

OFFICIAL DRESS IS REQUIRED TO BE WORN AT THE AWARDS PRO-GRAM. Many pictures are taken of award winners that are sent to donors and newspapers. Members not in official dress will not be allowed to receive awards at the Awards Program.

Apparel outside the show ring should always be in good taste. Tank tops must have a strap of 1 inch, armholes must not be revealing. No short shorts or skirt, underwear must be covered and not shown due to baggy pants or short shorts. Shirts must be worn at all times, no bare mid drifts or bare back tops. No low cut or revealing shirts. (bras must not be seen.) Clothes must not contain illustrations or words that are lewd, vulgar, obscene, plainly offensive, represent gang affiliation or which promote illegal activity.

SHOWMANSHIP AND ETHICS RULES FOR EXHIB-ITING AT THE FAIR

- 1. All members exhibiting livestock at the Fair are required to have read and signed the FFA Showmanship and Ethics Form.
- 2. Code of Ethics a. Treating an animal internally or externally with any irritant, counterirritant or other substance used to artificially change the conformation or appearance of an animal for show is considered unethical, inhumane and is prohibited. This includes, but is not limited to, the use of graphite, powders, hemp, artificial hair, coloring, common products such as fly spray, ointment or liniment used to the point that it is irritating, or similar type products. The use of dyes, spray paint or other artificial coloring, which result in altering an animal's true and natural appearance and/or color is prohibited. Adding false hair or hair-like material, fleece, or skin at any point, spot or area of the animal's body is illegal and will result in immediate disqualification. Any liquid or substance not considered part of an accepted and normal diet for livestock is deemed illegal and inhumane. For example: the use of alcohol or carbonated beverages as a drench or filler, etc. b. The use of tranquilizers, sedatives or depressants which alter the physical or physiological state of the animal is illegal. Exceptions to this rule would be licensed, certified veterinarian treatment of a recognized disease or injury, or recommendation for tranquilizing breeding animals in heat that might compromise the safety of others. The drugs must be approved by the Food and Drug Administration for use in meat producing animals. All exhibitors will advise show management of any drug and/or medication administered to an animal that might be detected at the time of showing or at meat inspection. The name of the drug, its purpose, the person who administered the drug, time and date of administration will be presented to show management prior to the showing of the animal. Failure to report this information to the show management will result in severe penalty and/or disqualification. Any use of drugs or substances not approved by the Food and Drug Administration is strictly prohibited. All animals entered into livestock competition will be subject to testing for foreign substances that exceed acceptable levels established by the DFA, FSIS, USDA or EPA. c. Surgery, injection or insertion of foreign material under the skin and/or into the flesh of an animal to change the natural contour, conformation or appearance of animal's body is illegal. This includes vegetable oil, silicon or any other substance used to alter the shape of an animal. Acceptable practices of physical preparations, which are allowed include: clipping of hair, trimming of hooves, dehorning or removal of ancillary teats. d. The use of inhumane fitting, showing and/or handling practices or devices shall not be tolerated. For example: breaking tails, striking of the animal to cause swelling or for bracing purposes, use of any electrical contrivance, muzzles, etc. is not acceptable. e. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. f. Show management reserves the right to require animal health certificates. Health inspection and diagnostic tests may be made before or after animals are on the livestock show premises for exhibitor and animal safety, or to inaugurate disease

control procedures which may become necessary in emergencies as determined by animal health officials. Any violation of the Code of Ethics or specific rules as designated by individual fairs and livestock shows will result in forfeiture of premiums and awards, disqualification may result in probationary status and/or loss of eligibility for future participation in organized livestock competitions. Possible civil penalties may be imposed by the proper authorities based on evidence provided by the livestock show of exhibitors in violation of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic act/or the animal mistreatment, neglect and abandonment laws that apply on the local, state, and national levels. Other cooperating shows will be notified of the action taken by show management, which may affect the eligibility of the individual, group or sponsoring organization for participation at other shows. The decision of the livestock show management will be final.

3. Protests concerning entries must be filed in writing, accompanied by a \$50.00 deposit by an FFA Advisor with the FFA General Superintendent prior to the actual start of judging of the entry. Protests that are sustained will have the deposit returned. The FFA Fair management reserves the right to deal with ethical violations in the following manners, depending on the severity: 1. Withhold premium money and cancel award. 2. Remove exhibits and/or exhibitor and possibly ban from future shows. 3. Report evidence to local school administration and other youth livestock show managers.]

The finding of the Division Superintendent, General FFA Superintendent, and the official veterinarian shall be final and conclusive. The Yamhill County Fair will not be responsible for the consequences, direct or indirect, of any animal or exhibitor being disgualified or barred from showing.

TAMPERING WITH LIVESTOCK

Artificial coloring of any animal or any artificial means of removing or remedying physical defects of conformation in exhibition animals, such as lifting or filling under the skin, will be considered as fraud and deception. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition at the Yamhill County Fair.

If any animal is found by the official veterinarian to have been tampered with as previously described, it shall be disqualified from competition. All prize money that has been won at the 2022 Yamhill County Fair by the exhibitor on any animal or animals so disqualified will be forfeited. The finding of the official veterinarian as to whether or not any animal has been improperly tampered with shall be final and conclusive. The Yamhill County Fair will not be responsible for the consequences, direct or indirect, of any animal or exhibitor being so disqualified or debarred from showing.

FFA LIVESTOCK HERDSMANSHIP

Factors to Consider When Scoring Herdsmanship

1. The Exhibitor-including a. appearance, neat, clean

and properly dressed b. cooperativeness with fellow exhibitors and those in charge c. manner, degree and promptness in carrying out duties and responsibilities d. general attitude and conduct

- Care of animals a. animals held in pens for best effect b. animals well cared for (1) animals kept clean at all times (2) adequate bedding used (3) animals fed and watered regularly (4) blankets used properly
- 3. Care of stalls, pens and aisles a. exhibitor card displayed that is fully and neatly completed b. equipment kept in show boxes c. feed kept in feed aisle and not on top of pen d. stalls or pens kept clean and dry-MUST BE STRIPPED AND REBEDDED DAILY! e. aisles kept clean and free for spectators f. all large equipment (trimming stands, wheel barrow, etc.) and tack areas will be labeled with the exhibitor's name and chapter g. no for sale signs are to be exhibited on pens or stalls
- Each exhibitor will automatically entered into the contest. Herdsmanship will be judged twice a day. Scores will be posted regularly with in each species barn.
- 5. Exhibitors are required to attend the Herdsmanship meetings for their respective barns at 8am each morning.

2022 GENERAL 4-H INFORMATION

ELIGIBILITY

1. A 4-H exhibit must be the work of the 4-H member and completed as part of the current year's project. Work done after county fair, but prior to October 1 and not previously exhibited, may be included in the next project year.

2. Exhibitors must be enrolled in 4-H during the current 4-H year. Age classifications (as of Sept.1):

Junior: 9-11 years old Intermediate: 12-14 years old

Senior: 15-19 (not graduated from high school)

3. 4-H Members must pass the April 4-H Records Check for each project in order to be eligible for exhibition.

4. A 4-H member may enter only one exhibit per class number unless otherwise specified.

5. The 4-H member must be enrolled in the project in order to exhibit in that project, except computers, educational displays, communications and conservation which are open to all 4-H members.

6. The same exhibit may not be entered in more than one class.

7. No exhibit may be entered in both 4-H and FFA with the exception of Horse and Dog.

8. The 4-H project manuals shall be the guides for requirements not specified in this fair book.

9. 4-H exhibits at the Yamhill County Fair are entered and displayed at the risk of the exhibitor. OSU Extension 4-H in cooperation with the Yamhill County Fair accepts exhibits and will exercise due care to protect them. 4-H and the County Fair cannot accept responsibility for loss or damage due to the conditions imposed by large crowds, the arrangement of the building in which displays are housed and the great number of exhibits. Every exhibitor shall indemnify the County Fair and 4-H from and against any claims for damage to persons or property caused by them or by their exhibits. 4-H'ers who have exhibits of great sentimental and/or monetary value, should carefully consider whether such exhibits should be exposed to the hazards of the Fair.

EXHIBIT TAGS AND STALL CARDS

1. A standard 4-H exhibit tag shall be securely attached to each exhibit except wool fleeces, clothing and animals. These are provided at the time of entry. There are special exhibit tags for wool and mohair fleeces and clothing/ sewing. These can be found on the State 4-H website. <u>https://extension.oregonstate.edu/4h/state-fair</u>.

2. Livestock stall cards and small animal cards will be available at the OSU Extension Office prior to fair. They may be filled out at home and brought to the Fair or at the 4-H Fair office during fair week.

3. Tags and cards are available at the Yamhill County Extension office. All tags and cards must be filled out completely, <u>except for addresses</u>.

4. Small animal sale advertisement program available for animals being exhibited at fair. There will be a \$1 donation for each sale animal, with proceeds going to the improvements of the rabbit and poultry barns.

A pre-register form must be filled out and a for-sale card will be provided. Signs must be posted on their cage in the designated holder. This will be available after check-in and passing the health check. Members are solely responsible for the sale and pick up of their rabbits and poultry. Sales are not final until after the close of fair and sold animals must remain in their cages until Sunday at 8am.

EXHIBIT JUDGING AND RIBBONS

- The Merit Method of judging will be used for all exhibits and contests. Entries will be placed in Blue, Red, and White award groups according to quality as they merit:
- Blue excellent to superior
- Red good to excellent

White - acceptable but needs improvement

No ribbons will be awarded to those that do not qualify for the class.

- Champions and reserve champions will be selected in each class only when the judge deems there are entries of championship quality.
- 3. Best of Show will be awarded only where champions are judged together. See Animal Science Rules for specific animal science championships.
- 4. All judges' decisions are final.

Premiums

- 1. Premium monies are provided by the Yamhill County Fair Board.
- 2. Premium money will be distributed during Fair and must be claimed at that time or forfeited. Monies will only be released to member, parent or Leader.
- 3. The Premium payout office will be open 3:00pm-6:00pm, Saturday of Fair week.

State Fair Eligibility

- 1. 4-H members who exhibit animals or enter contests which require attendance at the State Fair must be Intermediates or Seniors.
- 4-H members who exhibit non animal projects must be Junior, Intermediate or Senior.
- 3. All 4-H exhibits must have been shown and selected at County Fair and approved by the County 4-H Agent to be eligible for entry at the State Fair.
- 4. Animal exhibitors must show in showmanship.
- State Fair quotas will be filled by participants earning blue ribbons in showmanship with blue ribbon animals or as designated by judge. See Horse section for their selection process.
- 6. The judge will select State Fair participants. The judge will also select alternates and designate a rank order.
- 7. All Animal Exhibitors are required to turn in State Fair entry forms to fair 4-H office by Sunday, 9am and attend State Fair, post fair Exhibitor Meeting.
- At State Fair, members will be expected to cooperate and work as a team with other members in herdsmanship.

ANIMAL SCIENCE RULES

EXHIBIT REQUIREMENTS

1. 4-H Exhibitors are limited to two entries per class. Exceptions:

Differing rabbit varieties and poultry breeds.

•Two Market entries permitted per class.

- The same animal may not be entered in more than two classes except for projects with performance classes (Dogs, Horses, etc.).
- 3. Only animals officially entered at County Fair will be allowed in the barn with the exception of animals in milk with nursing offspring.
- 4. No animal may be entered in both 4-H and FFA with the exception of Horse and Dog. In addition, members in both organizations will abide by the current memorandum of cooperative service between the Oregon 4-H and FFA Programs.
- 5. Animals that have been sold prior to the County Fair are not eligible.
- 6. Market Animal health records and COOL affidavit are required for market projects.
- Animals (except horses and dogs) used in showmanship must also be exhibited in conformation class. In addition to a showmanship class, horses are required to be shown in a driving, ground training, and performance or gaming class.
- 8. We support and encourage the humane treatment of all animals. Animals showing any evidence of prolapse or mechanical repair will not be allowed. Exhibitors are expected to treat their animals with respect and provide for their continuous wellbeing though proper feeding, handling, disease prevention, sanitation and attention to their safety.

LIVESTOCK OWNERSHIP

- 1. All animals exhibited must have been a 4-H project since April 15th. (Except for chicken and rabbit pen of fryers).
- Registered animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor. (Registration in a partnership or family name is acceptable if the 4-H member's animals have been designated at the beginning of the project).
- Exhibitors must own the animals they exhibit (exceptions: leased animals and brace dogs).
- Leased Animals: Members may have only one leased animal in species where they do not have their own animals (exception: dog and horse). Copies of leases specifying responsibilities of lessee and lessor must be on file at the County Extension office. Members in the Dog Project may have one leased dog. Copies of leases specifying responsibilities of lessee and lessor must be on file at the count ty Extension office by April 15th.
- 4. 4-H exhibitors are not allowed to share an animal in Livestock and Small Animal Projects. Two or more members of the same family may share an animal in the Horse and Dog projects. In addition, two non-family members can share the same horse including care and training responsibilities.
- 5. Owners of cattle should provide haulers with transportation certificates.
- 6. All cattle with horns must wear horn guards at all times, except when in the show ring. (Only polled or dehorned animals will be allowed at State Fair.)

HOUSING OF 4-H LIVESTOCK

- Exhibitors must bring their own hay and feed from home. Exhibitors must provide their own feeder and water buckets.
- Shavings may be available for bedding. Other bedding must be provided by exhibitors.
- All animals exhibited in 4-H classes must be housed and groomed in the 4-H barns.
- 4. 4-H Members must do their own work including feeding, cleaning, fitting, and grooming. Members may assist each other, but parents and 4-H Leaders must not do any work for the 4-H Member. Parents and 4-H Leaders are encouraged to serve in a coaching role.
- 5. All beef and dairy cattle must be double tied at night (halter and neck rope).
- 6. All animals are subject to inspection by the superintendent and/or veterinarian in attendance upon admissions to the fair grounds. No animals shall be admitted to or allowed to remain on the grounds that shows evidence of any infectious or contagious disease or any unsightly disease condition such as warts, ringworm, etc. The management reserves the right to require health inspection, diagnostic tests, treatment and/or other disease control measures or procedures which might become necessary in emergencies.

- 7. Animals not passing health inspection by the County Fair Veterinarian must be immediately removed from the fairgrounds or exhibition area.
- All 4-H members will remove and clean bedding from their pens and stalls prior to moving out.
- Livestock exhibitors will be limited to a total of seven animals in each of the following departments: Dairy, Dairy Goats, Pygmy Goats, Fiber Goats, Market Goats, Swine, Beef, Sheep, Dog, Rabbit, Poultry, and Cavy. Maximum of 14 large livestock animals per exhibitor allowed at fair.
- 10. All exhibitors must follow the rules established by the Barn Superintendent.
- 11. Health certificates are required for dogs and cats. Dogs must be on a leash.
- 12. All Breeding Cattle over 6 months of age must be Brucellosis vaccinated.

LIVESTOCK JUDGING AND AWARDS

- 1. The decision of the judge is FINAL.
- The "Merit" method of judging will be used. Judges will rank the exhibits in 1, 2, 3 order, then divide them into Blue, Red and White award groups according to quality.
- 3. Á champion and reserve champion will be selected only when the judge deems there are entries of champion quality.
- 4. Each breed must be represented by two or more animals in order to have their own breed shown. Those with less than two must be shown in "Other".
- 5. Non-registered (grade) females shall be entered in the breed class.
- 6. When purebred females with crossbred produce are shown in the dam and daughter class, they shall be shown in the class designated by breed of dam.
- 7. If a member shows a mixed herd, it will be shown in the "other breeds" category. **HERDSMANSHIP**

The 4-H Herdsmanship contest is to help 4-H members learn skills in making presentable exhibit for the public as well as learn skills in courtesy, cooperation, neatness, and proper care of animals.

- Basis for scoring:
- 1. **4-H members:** Appearance, friendliness, courtesy, conduct, cooperation and work done by members
- Animals: Securely tied or penned, clean and comfortable, regularly fed and cared for.
- 3. Exhibit Area: Alleys, stalls and pens attractive for audience; feed and equipment safely stored; stall cards displayed and filled out; fitting stands and blocking chutes clean, neat, and labeled by Club.

Exhibitors are to maintain their livestock exhibit in an appropriate manner as designated by the herdsmanship judge and superintendent. The herdsmanship judge will consult with the designated superintendent if an exhibit

is not maintained in proper fashion. 4-H exhibitors will enhance and improve the exhibit if a problem is identified.

Questions on herdsmanship may be directed to the species junior superintendent(s). <u>SHOWING</u>

- 1. 4-H members must show their own animals unless excused by the superintendent.
- Abusive language, unsportsmanlike conduct, or abuse of an animal in any contest can be reason for dismissal from the show ring at the discretion of the show superintendent.
- 3. The 4-H Division is a youth show. All care and fitting must be done by 4-H exhibitor. Exhibitor should be able to demonstrate if asked. Involvement of adults must be limited to advising. Any 4-H animal fitted for showing by adults or a professional will be declared ineligible for showing. 4-H animals must be fitted in the 4-H barn area.
- 4. No use of talcum powders, oil, or artificial coating material will be allowed when fitting or showing animals in any swine class.
- 5. Sheep, lamb and goats must be shown with their front feet on the ground. No muzzles allowed.

SHOWMANSHIP

- Animal Science exhibitors are required to participate in showmanship contests relating to their exhibits, including ALL horse and dog show exhibitors. Animals exhibited in showmanship class must also be shown in a conformation class (Exception: horses and dogs).
- Contestants must show their own animals which are entered in 4-H classes at this show.
- 3. Judges may ask questions about the member's animal, fitting, showing as well as general 4-H knowledge.

For general information about animal rules please refer to the Animal Science Rules section at the beginning of this book.

- Must meet 4-H ENTRY DEADLINE (see scheduling). No Exceptions!! One online entry/entry form per exhibitor needs to be submitted in for all Horse Division classes.
- Exhibitors may enter 15 classes in addition to their required showmanship class/ classes.
- 2a. Exhibitors must use the same horse in all events except Ground Training, Driving classes, Gaming and In Hand Trail. Showmanship is required of all exhibitors, but only one showmanship class is allowed for <u>each horse</u>. If your horse is in equitation or pleasure classes it MUST show in <u>performance showmanship</u>. All other horses are required to show in their appropriate showmanship class (ie gamers in gaming showmanship, drivers in driving showmanship, ground trainers in ground training showmanship, etc). Ground trainers and drivers that premier will be eligible for medallion round.
- 4-H Horse project is open to members ages 9 through 19 (as of September 1st of current 4-H year).
 4-H members must be enrolled by May 1st and pass records check in order to exhibit at fair.
- 4. The 4-H exhibit must be the work of the 4-H member. Exhibitors must ride; show or exhibit horses they have owned, leased and/or trained for 90 days prior to the County Fair and State Fair (April 26th, 2022). The 4-H Exhibitor's State Fair horse must be the same horse that qualifying Horse from County Fair. NO TRAINERS, paid or unpaid, are allowed to ride the 4-H exhibitor's horse with the purpose of improving its performance within 90 days of Fair. The intent is for the horse project to be under the training and control of the exhibitor.
- 5. The deadline for ownership is **90 days prior to County Fair**. 4-H project horses must be owned or leased by this deadline. All leased horses must have a proper lease agreement on file with your 4-H Horse Leader and the Extension Office by this deadline. Forms are at the Extension Office. No exceptions unless approved by the Superintendents and Agent.
- 6. In the event of injury, sickness, or loss of a 4-H Project Horse, an exhibitor must contact the Extension Agent and provide written documentation (a note from a veterinarian.) regarding the animal. Then an exhibitor will be allowed to participate in County Fair, but will not be able to qualify for State Fair Team. If hardship horse qualifies for Master Showmanship they can compete in that contest.

7. A 4-H project horse may be shared between 4-H exhibitor in the immediate family or two non-family exhibitor. The exhibitors must work out class conflicts as they arise.

Exhibitor Guidelines

• All Oregon 4-H exhibitors participating in any equestrian activity, regardless of riding seat, will wear a properly fitted equestrian helmet which meets the standards imposed by the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM F1163) and includes certification and labeling required by the Safety Equipment Institute (SEI). Such headgear will be secured with the harness engaged and be properly fastened when mounted on an equine or in a vehicle (cart, wagon, buggy, etc.) being pulled by one or more equine. This policy is the responsibility of the 4-H family, not the 4-H leader. 4-H Horse Leaders have the right to refuse participation in a county 4 -H function if the helmet does not meet the ASTM-SEI certification or is not worn secured with the harness properly engaged.

· Horse Advancement Rules: All participants must comply with the 4-H Horse Advancement Guide and the 4-H Horse Contest Guide; both are available from your leader or the Extension Office. Participants MUST be working on advancement level set below by June 1st and marked as such on the Advancement Sign Off form completed by your leader. You must have passed each level by the end of the division (Novice, Junior, Intermediate, and Senior).

Novice & Jr. - Advancement Level 1 Intermediate - Advancement Levels 1 & 2 Senior - Advancement Levels 1, 2 & 3

- In addition to the "Regular" advancements above, you are required to be working on the same level in the other events advancements in order to participate in each following events at fair; Trail, Jumping, Driving or Gaming. For Ground Training only, Exhibitors must have passed level 1 ground work and pass any level 2 or 3 steps they are attempting in their appropriate ground training class. The leader will sign the ground training score sheet to verify advancement completion.
- · "Novice" is a rider in their first year showing anywhere as of Oct. 1 of previous year. Novices will do walk trot only in ALL classes. No cantering or loping. Novices will not be allowed to show a horse under 2 years of age.
- Appropriate attire shall be worn at ALL county fair classes; see 4-H Horse Contest Guide (effective October 1, 2015)
- · Exhibitors must do their own work while on the grounds, and are encouraged to help each other
- · All age divisions in state fair qualifying classes are eligible for premier ribbons and return in the medallion class. All age divisions in County only classes are eligible for Champion qualifying ribbons and a return to the Champion class.

SHOWMANSHIP CLASSES: (REQUIRED)

All ANIMALS must show in Showmanship at County Fair. Refer to Entry Guidelines 2 and 2a. To qualify for State Fair in showmanship and equitation (hunt seat, or western), exhibitors must have received a minimum combined score of 170 (with the same horse in equitation and showmanship) and each individual score must be 80 points or higher. In addition, they must have used the same horse in both classes. For those exhibitors showing multiple performance horses, you may only qualify for state fair with ONE horse/rider combination. EQUITATION:

To qualify for State Fair in showmanship and equitation (hunt seat, or western), exhibitors must have received a minimum combined score of 170 (in equitation and showmanship) and each individual score must be 80 points or higher. In addition, they must have used the same horse in both classes.

For exhibitors who ride multiple seats, the highest equitation score must be used to determine eligibility. Then, if exhibitors have received blue ribbons in other seats on the same horse, they may ride those seats as well. The same horse must be used for all equitation classes.

There is no maximum or minimum number of exhibitors a county may send.

GROUND TRAINING:

Regardless of when a horse is born, their birth date is January 1st. Stallions over one year of age must be gelded. Horses entered in yearling and two year old ground training MUST NEVER have been mounted. Your 15 minute time limit begins from when you enter the arena for your class. To qualify for State Fair in Ground Training, exhibitors must have received a blue ribbon in ground training at County Fair. A total of 8 ground trainers (four seniors and four intermediates). The horses may be either yearlings or two-year olds. The same person may show both a yearling and a two-year old. Colt trainers and pony drivers may show another horse at State Fair if it qualifies.

Horse may be any age over two years, but must not have been ridden more than 12 months prior to Pre-Fair and Fair. Exhibitors will do individual work made up from any of the 4-H Advancement steps. Exhibitors must give the judge a filled out First Year Under Saddle score sheet (obtained from the extension office and show office) at the time they enter the arena. This score sheet will contain the list of exercises to be attempted and the order in which they will be done. The exhibitor may also indicate the length of time training has taken place. The horse should have been worked and ridden mainly by the 4-H exhibitor, exceptions being initial training of horse by a skilled professional or adult or if safety is a major concern. The 4-H leader should be consulted and/or notified.

What do ribbons mean? County Fair is one of the few competitive events that are a part of the 4-H program. However, they are just a part of the program and competitive events should be fun and enjoyable for everyone.

Somewhere in 4-H many people have mistakenly started thinking that a white ribbon means "poor job". That's not true. In most 4-H competitive events you are being evaluated against certain standards, not other people; and just because you receive a white ribbon does not mean you shouldn't feel good about yourself. In that particular activity and at that particular time, a white ribbon might indicate the best you can do. Try to keep these ribbon color definitions in mind:

PARTICIPANT D/Q Disqualified by the Judge for off course/off pattern.

WHITE Good, but much improvement needed to meet top standards.

RED Very good, but still one or two major improvements needed.

BLUE Excellent meets or nearly meets top standards.

Judges will take into account the amount of professional training. Cavessons, protective leg wear and running martingales are allowed. A time limit of 10 minutes maximum will be allowed to each exhibitor. Novice exhibitors are NOT eligible for this class. Any step attempted in this class MUST be signed off in your advancements. The leader will sign the score sheet to verify advancement completion. Teens and Oregon Mustangs may not cross enter into any other riding class.

Description: The purpose of this type of exhibit is for members to communicate the processes and outcomes of a scientific investigation they design and conduct themselves. The display must include (1) a question or hypothesis, (2) an investigative procedure (What was done?), (2) the data collection or observation method (How was it collected/ observed), (3) a report of the data collected or observations made, (4) an analysis of the data collected or observations made (How do you interpret the data and evidence?), (5) a conclusion addressing the original question or hypothesis (Does the evidence support or refute your claim?). Intermediate and Senior Exhibits must include a data chart and a graph or other visual representation of the data.

Each exhibit piece must be labeled with the member's name, county and class number. If more than one

article is contained in the exhibit each article must be labeled with the member's name, county and class number. AQUATIC MACRO-INVERTEBRATE SPECIMENS

Macro-invertebrates, regardless of developmental stage, serve as an energy source in fresh water (lakes, ponds, streams, rivers) fisheries. They include but are not limited to: eggs, larvae, nymphs, scuds, leeches, stoneflies, caddis flies, mosquitoes, dragonflies, hellgrammites, etc. Specimen photos or drawings of specimens may be displayed in a three ring binder. Photos and drawings must be the original work of the exhibitor. Preserved specimens are to be displayed in specimen jars in display boxes. Each specimen, including photos or drawings, requires a label be affixed to the display box or page for easy reading. Labels (3/4"x1 1/2") on preserved specimens, photos or drawings are to include the name of the collector, date collected/ photographed/drawn, order name, common name, name of body of water from which specimen was found, county and state.

Art has three divisions: Expressive Arts is based on the entry being entirely original. **Crafts** that include components that have been designed or created by others, and Pottery. In all divisions, the member will be expected to create their work by applying the elements and principles of design.

- 1. All artwork is to be mounted for display, including jewelry.
 - a) All jewelry exhibits must be mountedin some way to a board or fabric covered board for display and the explanation card must be folded and attached in a small plastic bag (bags will be available on judging day).
 - b) All art MUST be mounted on board as thick as mat board. Matting spray fixatives and /or over wrap with plastic are acceptable for protection of the artwork.
 - c) If an item is meant to hang, a hanger that will support the weight of the item must be securely attached. Adhesive plastic hangers are encouraged to protect other artwork. Two adhesive hangers per hanging art piece is sugaested.
 - d) Exhibits 3" or smaller MUST be mounted on board, the thickness of mat board. The board should be no larger that 4" x 4".
- 2 Due to weight, most artwork may not be framed.
 - a) EXECPTION for work done with chalks, charcoals or pastels that require protection - only lightweight frames with plastic can be used for protection during display - NO work frames or glass allowed
- 3. Exhibits should not contain parts that expose the public or volunteers to injury (i.e. sharp edges or points).
- Identification needed! 4.
 - a) 4-H Exhibit tags must be attached to the lower right hand corner of the exhibit.
 - b) Each piece of an exhibit must be labeled on the back or bottom with the member's name, county, and exhibit class number.
 - c) Exhibits that have more than one piece MUST be tied together or connected together in some way so that the pieces can be considered as one exhibit.

d) Must have 4-H Expressive Art Exhibits Explanation card (231-02) fully completed for art projects to qualify for judging. These forms take the place of interview judging at state Fair, so be as thoughtful and comprehensive as possible when sharing the required information. The following classes are for still photography. Video projects should be entered under Communications.

Members may enter up to three classes (no more than one entry per class) and be part of a club entry. Senior and Intermediate members may also enter one exhibit in the Innovation class and in the Celebrate our World class.

PLEASE NOTE, ONLY 2 PHOTOS CAN GO ON TO STATE. (Not including Celebrate our World class) IF ALL THREE OF AN EXHIBITORS PHOTOS ARE PICKED FOR STATE THEN IT WILL BE UP TO THE EXHIBITOR, NOT THE OF-FICE TO PICK THEIR TOP TWO. All photos must have been originally taken by the member. Public display of exhibits will be at the discretion of 4-H management. Exhibits are entered and displayed at the risk of the exhibitor; see rule 12 under General 4-H Information – Eligibility.

To qualify for judging, a fully completed 4-H Photography Exhibit Explanation card (241-01) and a Celebrate our World Explanation Form (998-03) if applicable must be attached. Judging criteria are outlined on the Photography Exhibit Evaluation Form (241-02). Forms are available at the county Extension office and on the State 4-H website,

https://extension.oregonstate.edu/4h/state-fair

Photography classes are divided by subject matter or technique. If a photo includes more than one type of subject (i.e. people and animals), the member should decide which category is the most appropriate. Digital and film photos will be included in the same class except as restricted by the class description. Color and black & white images will be included in the same class according to subject or technique.

All single images must have one side, the shorter side, no less than 5 inches. Photos must have a backing for protection.

Photos must be either mounted or matted with rigid backing using a material firm or rigid enough to protect the photos on the backside and should not show when viewing the exhibit. Photos MAY NOT be entered only matted; they must have a backing for protection. The surface which shows from behind mounted only photos or matted photos must be mat board. Poster board is not acceptable for mounting or matting. For more information on matting and mounting please visit the State 4-H website: https://extension.oregonstate.edu/4h/state-fair

Exceptions to photo size limits include:

Class 241 100 10_ Panoramic - photos must be at least twice as long in one direction as they are in the other direction. Matted or mounted exhibit must not exceed 16"x20".

Neatly attach 4-H Exhibits tags from the back and centered in the lower edge of the exhibit. Explanation cards should be attached to the back of the exhibit with the writing visible to the judge. Members may not enter the same garment or accessory in an exhibit class and in the fashion revue. All items should be clean and in good repair.

Judging criteria are outlined in 4-H Sewing/Clothing Construction Score Sheet (320-01), 4-H Sewing/Clothing Creative Expression Score Sheet (320-02), or the Skills Notebook Evaluation Sheet (320-96) which can be found on the Oregon 4-H State website: <u>https://extension.oregonstate.edu/4h/state-fair_or</u> through the county office.

Judging standards are listed in Measuring Up: Quality Standards for Sewn Items/ Projects (PNW-197). **Each entry will be evaluated on ALL features.** For skill levels 1-6 the use of fabrics or skills that are beyond the recommendations for this level are expected to be done well according to the standards, but will neither be given extra credit consideration for increased difficulty nor disqualified during judging. It is in the best interest of the member to stay within the suggested guidelines. See <u>4-H Clothing</u> Guidelines for Leaders: Basic, Expanding and Advanced Skills (4-H 320-00L).

The 4-H Clothing and Textile Exhibit Card (320-04) requests information about the exhibit which is needed by judge to thoroughly evaluate the exhibit. Food Preservation

Members may enter four classes in their age division and up to two different exhibits per class. Intermediate and Senior member may also enter an exhibit in the Celebrate our World class.

Members are encouraged to use recipes from reputable food preservation sources (ex. OSU Extension or other University Extension Services, Ball Blue Book, pectin package inserts, or So Easy to Preserve).Current OSU Food Preservation publications can be found at https://extension.oregonstate.edu/mfp/publications All recipes must meet current USDA recommendations which can be located here: http://nchfp.uga.edu/

All products, including all preserved products in gifts packs, must have a 4-H Food Preservation Explanation Card (512-07) with complete information and instructions/ recipe. Entries in the Celebrate our World classes must also include the Celebrate our World Explanation Card (998-03). Explanation Cards areavailable at the county Extension office or on the State 4-H website.

In addition, all containers must have a label or tape with member name, county, and class number. Labels should be placed on the bottom of the container so product is visible. Include jar rings on all canned products in order to transport safely. Be sure all jars are properly sealed. Unsealed jars will be disqualified. For judging reasons, use clear jars only. Regular and wide-mouth Mason-type, threaded, home-canning jars with self-sealing lids are the best choice.

Jars may be opened during the judging process. For this reason we strongly urge you to use smaller jars for your fair exhibits.

Suggested are 4oz. Jars for jams and jellies, half pints & pint jars for other products. Larger jars will be accepted, but food may be wasted as any opened jars may be emptied before returning after fair. Tip: Bring two exhibits to the county fair, one for county fair judging and one to come to state fair (if chosen). Dried foods should be exhibited in jars or sturdy plastic bags, with labels securely attached. Make sure to follow the approved processing times listed for your product.
