Inaugural Student Tiny Houses Build Day

Tiny Home Central was proud to be part of the inaugural Tiny Houses Build Day held on September 18th at the AGC Apprentice Facility in San Diego. Organized by the Warrior Village Project, the event consisted of five local high schools building six tiny houses on site. Some were at the beginning stages of insulating the trailer foundation while another was all the way close to the completion stage of working on the internal finishes. It was truly a win for everyone there. Our own Ellen Stone spoke to students, high school administrators, and industry professionals about local legalization efforts, the permitting process in the City of San Diego, and the opportunity to install these moveable tiny homes built by high school students into the community once completed. It was great exposure for the students and a very inspiring day for all in attendance!

As you know, Tiny Home Central permitted one of the first legal Movable Tiny Home ADU's in San Diego. Last month we held an open house for prospective clients to tour that very tiny home.
