MARK 14:1-15, 47: Through his own personal suffering and humiliation, the obedient servant in Isaiah's prophecy is able to teach others about the uncompromising love of God. In Jesus this song takes on a new and astounding reality, for here is the Son of God, with whom God is 'well pleased', undergoing insults, slander, torture, death, and, perhaps most hurtful of all, desertion by every one of his followers and even a sense of isolation from his Father. However, can such a bleak and distressing drama be cherished generation after generation? Why did God not answer Jesus' desperate prayer that the horror might be averted? When Jesus returned to find his disciples sleeping, perhaps his words applied also to himself: 'The spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak.' For here is the essence of what it meant to save us from the prison of sin; God had to empty himself of all rights, privilege and status and become utterly weak and vulnerable; he had to submit to the very worst that evil could throw at him and still continue to love, forgive, and trust. Had his flesh not been

weak he would not have been able to achieve this ultimate in loving obedience. Yet even at his most helpless, most cruelly treated and most terribly alone, Christ still loved the world which rejected him, and it is the incredible wonder of such love that draws us stumbling to his feet.

**HOLY WEEK:** Today we enter into Holy Week, the most significant week leading up to Easter Sunday, and the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus. **Palm Sunday** marks Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem when people welcomed Him by laying down palm branches on the road as He rode into the city on a donkey.

Tradition holds that the cross-shaped mark on a donkey's back is a result of the donkey that carried Jesus on that day. Palm Sunday sets the stage for the profound events of Holy Week—the journey from Christ's triumphant entry to His ultimate sacrifice and glorious Resurrection. Maundy Thursday, also known as Holy Thursday, solemnly commemorates the institution of the Eucharist during the Last Supper. It's the oldest observance specific to Holy Week. On this day, Jesus shared



bread and wine with His disciples, establishing the sacrament of the Eucharist. One of the most iconic rituals on Maundy Thursday is the washing of feet symbolising humility, service, and Jesus' command to love one another. Maundy Thursday invites us to reflect on Christ's selfless love, His sacrifice, and His commandment to serve one another. Good Friday is a solemn and significant day in the Christian calendar. The term "Good Friday" has an interesting origin. Some believe it comes from "God's Friday" (Gottes Freitag), while others argue it stems from the German "Gute Freitag," meaning "holy." Whatever the origin of the name, it is the day of Christ's crucifixion and our redemption from sin through his voluntary sacrifice. On Good Friday, the Church Meditates on Christ's passion and death; Adores the cross as a symbol of salvation; Commemorates its origin from Christ's side on the cross. Mass is not celebrated on Good Friday, but a liturgy is performed and, since 1955, laypeople have also received Holy Communion. Good Friday invites us to contemplate Christ's immense sacrifice and His victory over sin and death. Remember, Holy Week invites us to reflect on Jesus' suffering, sacrifice, and ultimate triumph over death. It's a time of deep prayer and spiritual contemplation. Holy Saturday is a day of quiet reflection and waiting and is a day to meditate on the suffering and death of Jesus. Jesus descends into hell, to free the just who have gone before him. We do not celebrate Mass on Holy Saturday until the Easter Vigil, which is celebrated after sundown, and the day is often marked by prayer and fasting in preparation for the joy of the Resurrection. The Easter Vigil is the principal liturgy of the entire liturgical year, and we will be joined by our catechumens who will be initiated into the Catholic Church, as the celebration of Resurrection begins.

**HEALTH AND SAFETY:** We have been undertaking a couple of tasks at both churches over the last few weeks, including completing the Pat Testing for electrical devices and inspecting and updating the fire extinguishers. Work is due to start shortly on removing the fir trees at St Paul's Church, which have a potential danger due to storm damage.

**FEAST OF THE ANNUNCIATION:** This year the Feast of the Annunciation is moved to April 8<sup>th</sup>, as it cannot be celebrated during Holy Week.

If you don't have envelopes currently or if you can't find a box with your name on, please write your details on the form and a box will be available next weekend.
