

Wisdom from Joseph Unpacked

Stanza 1

I once knew pain that cut me deep,
A pit where brothers left me weep.
Yet even there, God shaped my heart—
To honor others from the start.

Scriptural Insight:

Joseph's journey began in betrayal and suffering, yet even in the pit God was shaping his heart. Scripture shows that God often forms character through hardship, not comfort.

- **Genesis 37:23–28** — Joseph is stripped, thrown into a pit, and sold.
- **Genesis 50:20** — God uses evil intentions for good.
- **Romans 5:3–4** — Suffering produces perseverance, character, and hope.

Leadership Truth:

Honor is not learned in ease. It is forged when pain is surrendered to God instead of turned into bitterness.

Stanza 2

When power came into my hand,
And I stood ruler of the land,
Revenge knocked loudly at my door—

Scriptural Insight:

Joseph rose to power, but Scripture highlights his restraint. Though he held authority over those who wronged him, he refused to use it for revenge.

- **Genesis 41:41–44** — Joseph is given authority over Egypt.
- **Proverbs 16:32** — “Better a patient person than a warrior, one with self-control than one who takes a city.”
- **Romans 12:19** — “Do not avenge yourselves... leave room for God's wrath.”

Leadership Truth:

True leadership is not revealed by how much power we gain, but by how much restraint we exercise when we have it.

Stanza 3

For every wound that marked my past,
God wrote a story meant to last.
He turned my sorrow into grace,
So I could meet my foes face-to-face.

Scriptural Insight:

Joseph learned to see his story through God's sovereignty rather than personal offense. This reframing allowed him to face his brothers with clarity and compassion.

- **Genesis 45:5-8** — Joseph credits God's plan rather than their betrayal.
- **Isaiah 55:8-9** — God's ways are higher than ours.
- **2 Corinthians 1:3-4** — God comforts us so we can comfort others.

Leadership Truth:

Honor grows when leaders trust God's purpose more than their own perspective.

Stanza 4

I learned that strength is not demand,
But gentle words and open hand.
To lift another when they fall—
This is the truest strength of all.

Scriptural Insight:

Joseph's gentleness toward his brothers reflects God's definition of strength—power under control.

- **Genesis 45:3-4** — Joseph weeps and invites his brothers near.
- **Philippians 4:5** — "Let your gentleness be evident to all."
- **Matthew 20:26** — "Whoever wants to be great among you must be your servant."

Leadership Truth:

Strength that lifts others reveals far greater authority than strength that dominates.

Stanza 5

So choose the path where mercy leads,
Where hearts grow soft and pride recedes.
For those who hurt you need it too—
Honor may heal *them*... and you.

Scriptural Insight:

Joseph's mercy did not erase the past—but it healed the future. In extending grace, he brought restoration to both sides of the wound.

- **Genesis 50:19–21** — Joseph reassures and provides for his brothers.
- **Matthew 5:7** — “Blessed are the merciful.”
- **Colossians 3:13** — Forgive as the Lord forgave you.

Leadership Truth:

Honor has a healing effect—not only for those who receive it, but for the one who gives it.

Stanza 6

If you would lead, then lead with love;
Let God's own wisdom rise above.
Honor others as yourself—
And watch God's purpose write itself.

Scriptural Insight:

Joseph's life illustrates that when leaders choose honor, God's purposes unfold beyond what they could control or predict.

- **Romans 12:10** — “Honor one another above yourselves.”
- **Philippians 2:3–5** — The mindset of Christ.
- **Proverbs 3:5–6** — Trust the Lord, and He will direct your paths.

Leadership Truth:

When honor leads the way, God does the writing. Our role is obedience; His role is outcome.

Joseph's story teaches us that **honor is not a reaction—it is a decision**. It flows from humility, is sustained by trust in God, and reveals a leadership strength the world rarely understands.
